

## Commissioners & Committee Study Best Plans for Redistricting

BAIRD — The County Commissioners and Citizens Advisory Committee have spent the better part of this week trying to tabulate an accurate count of the County's rural voters.

Judge A. E. Dyer Jr. explained that the Commissioners and the Committee hope to have a clearer view of the situation, and be close to a definite decision by noon Monday, September 23.

An attempt is being made to

set the lines of the four precincts according to both population and register voter count. According to a recent court decision, Texas counties must be divided into four precincts of approximate equal population.

The four precincts are now divided as follows: Baird, Clyde and Eula comprise Precinct 1; Admiral and Putnam, Precinct 2; Rowden, Cross Plains, and Cottonwood, Precinct 3, and Oplin, Dudley and Denton Valley, Precinct 4. The proposal now under consideration will have Clyde and Hamby in Precinct 1; Baird, Putnam and portions of Admiral in Precinct 2; Cross Plains, Rowden, Cottonwood and the rest of Admiral in Precinct 3; and Oplin, Eula, Denton Valley and Dudley in Precinct 4.

The Commissioners and Committee hope to divide the County into such proportions that Precinct lines will not have to be moved again for several years. The redistricting will place approximately 1,300 people in each precinct.

## Clyde Bulldogs Take Win Over Stamford; Meet Hamlin Friday

CLYDE — The Clyde Bulldogs whipped Stamford 18-7 here last Friday night in the first home game.

The Clyde offense made 16 first downs and 272 yards, while the defense limited Stamford to 7 first downs and 131 yards.

Johnny Arms was the big gun in the attack as he rushed for 153 yards and scored two touchdowns. Marty Clifford smashed over right tackle for the Bulldog's third score. Billy Dugan was the leading pass receiver with 2 catches for 22 yards. The Bulldog defense held Stamford's outstanding halfback Don Earl to 75 yards.

Excellent defensive plays were made by cornerback Jackie Brown, defensive end Jimmy May and linebacker Chuck Swofford. Defensive halfbacks Clifford, Mike Mitchell and Russell Bland came up with interceptions, while May recovered a key fumble.

Excellent line play on offense was logged by center Ray Walker, guards May and Mike Hogan, and tackles Royce Watkins and Mike Dugan.

Stamford's lone touchdown was scored with 7 minutes left in the game.

This week the Bulldogs travel to Hamlin to take on the state-ranked Piper and talented half-

back Johnny Jones. The Pipers have eliminated Rotan 62-0 and Haskell 36-7 in their first two outings. Hamlin has tremendous speed which must be contained by Clyde's defense. Kick-off time is 8 p. m. Friday in Hamlin.

## Sept. 22 Designated Voter Registration Week

The right to vote is one of the most important rights guaranteed under our Federal and State Constitutions. The right and privileges of citizenship cannot be valuably exercised unless each qualified voter accepts the responsibility to be a part of the decision-making process of our government.

Tuesday, November 5, is the date of the next General Election in Texas, and on this date the citizens of Texas will, by their vote determine who shall hold their state, local and federal offices.

In order to be eligible to exercise the right to vote in the next General Election, Texans first must register to vote with the Registrar (Tax Assessor-Collector) in their County.

Therefore the week of September 22 has been designated as VOTER REGISTRATION WEEK in Texas, and calls upon all Texans who have not done so, to register to vote in an effort to insure maximum citizen participation in the selection of officers of state, local and federal government.

## BURGLARS STAGE 4 BREAK-INS IN COUNTY TUESDAY NIGHT

It seems we had some scattered burglaries in our area during the night of Sept. 17. Hardwick Insurance Agency was one of the companies, broken into sometime during the night. As it now appears, someone kicked the back door in, all that was taken was some petty cash.

Lone Star Gas Co. also was attacked but officials say about the only damage done there was to the front door, everything else was locked up so the thief or thieves was very unsuccessful.

Then they apparently moved over to Putnam where they tried to enter the post office, where they only got as far as the small room at the back of the office and could not get through the

door to the mail room. Also, while the burglars was visiting Putnam they stopped by the Mobil Station, where they broke into the cigarette machine taking what money was in it. They were very particular about the type of cigarettes they stole, taking only part of those in the machine. They also broke into the station, taking some pennies they found. They did not bother the cash register.

## USDA Proposed New Food Stamp Eligibility Rule for Students

The proposed regulations are scheduled for publication in the Federal Register of September 16. Written comments should be sent to P. Royal Shipp, Acting Director, Food Stamp Division, Food and Nutrition Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The proposed rule applies to any student, age 18 or over, who attends an education institution beyond high school and is claimed as a tax dependent by an ineligible household (i. e. receives over half of his support from that household). It applies only to the individual who is claimed as a tax dependent; other members of the student's household can receive food stamps if they are otherwise

eligible. The individual would also have an opportunity to prove that he does not receive over half his support from an ineligible household.

The proposed regulations are scheduled for publication in the Federal Register of September 16. Written comments should be sent to P. Royal Shipp, Acting Director, Food Stamp Division, Food and Nutrition Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C. 20250. Comments must be received by October 16 and will be open to public inspection.

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





## NEW MACHINERY BEING INSTALLED

Progress and advance are the terms we are using at Callahan County Star as we are planning now for the future. Very soon changes will be made in the office appearance, as well as a big change in the type of equipment we will be using. By making these changes we will be better equipped, making it possible to better serve you, our readers, and advertisers.

Pictured on this page is our present type of operations and those that will be used in the near future.

Shown in the first picture (top left and bottom left) is the linotype and ludlow, which play the biggest part in production in your weekly paper now. The linotype, a typesetting machine operated much like a typewriter casts each line of type in one piece. When all copy has been set, plates are assembled. The ludlow is used in casting larger figures and letters such as headlines and advertising.

The plates are then placed on the press (bottom left) through which each paper is hand fed through the press. After this procedure is completed, printed copies are taken to the folder (bottom left) where they too, are guided through, folded and cut. When papers are folded, they are stenciled and wrapped and mailed all over Callahan County, Texas, and all parts of the United States. This is our present mode of publication each week.

**This section is printed offset to show you what your newspaper will look like**

In the very near future the Linocomp machine (upper right) will be installed in the remodeled office of the Callahan County Star.

Shown upper right on this page is the Linocomp which is a multi-purpose photo typesetter, actually a no-nonsense "photographic typewriter". It has been designed for growing newspapers, print shops, art and production. This new machine will produce our reading matter.

The wax coater (bottom left) is a machine necessary for paste-up needs and used in off-set type productions. Copy is simply fed into the machine, the rollers automatically apply a thin film of pressure-sensitive adhesive wax. Copy then is applied to the surface desired, pressing it down flat with the pressure roller. This compact easy to operate machine can be used in any convenient location, and simply plugs into a standard outlet and is ready to go.


The processor (lower right) makes quick enlarged proofs. Strip printer (middle right) sets all larger type used in newspapers. The composing room gets galleys fast from this high speed processor. With this machine we will have higher quality, consistent results, maintained from day to day.


