If it hasn't been, it will be pretty soon! We think it's because of these that some friends have said to us: "We never turn television on after the news during the summer."

We guess we sorta created an aversion to repeats long before such a thing happened, or could happen on the tube. In fact, "the tube" was unknown to us at the time.

It was in the mid-1930's!

Down in the little town of Eldorado, Texas—before we made our debut in Munday in November, 1938—we had a Methodist preacher who had a twice-a-month charge at the Cliff school, some 15 or 16 miles west of town. He was P. S. Connell.

The trip to Cliff was over a rough and rocky ranch-type road that received very little, if any, maintenance. Having company to go with him on this appointment was a delight, indeed. We suppose it was for fellowship, but often we thought it was because he might need some help in case of a flat tire, or other disorders, on the lonely trip.

There were "bump gates", too, along the route—and if you'd had no experience with a bump gate, you might run into a batch of trouble in bumping your way through.

Anyway, some two or three of Connell's "old faithfuls" were invited to the 2 p.m. Sunday service at Cliff, and it seemed to be his custom to repeat the Sunday morning sermon that afternoon.

We'd kid him, telling him that if we were nice enough to go along with him, he should be nice enough to preach us a different sermon!

We got a new wrinkle on repeats recently! As we emerged from the bathroom one evening, we noticed the TV had been tuned in to Billy Graham, who was preaching his sermon on "The Road to Armageddon". Next evening, we tuned in on Billy again, thinking this sermon was a continuation of Armageddon. To our surprise, it was a repeat of the night before! We were just listening to it over another station.

Someone as good as Billy Graham was not good enough for a repeat in our repertoire, so we switched.

Two things we'll always remember, though. One was that Billy quoted Gen. Douglas MacArthur, when he was accepting Japan's surrender on the Battleship Missouri, as saying: "This is the last one. The next battle will be Armageddon!"

The other was that Billy located Armageddon for us, and others no smarter than we are. He said it is the same territory in which Iran and Iraq have been waging battle for several months.

Maybe these two nations are already fighting their "battle of Armageddon!" We don't know for sure.

But this we think we do know: Armageddon will never be subjected to a repeat!

The first report to The Courier office was the Rhineland Co-operative Gin, with the first bale being ginned on Tuesday, September 15. This was brought in by John Ed Wilde, and was a little green due to early harvest. Mr. Wilde reported that 70 acres had been defoliated.

A check with the Rhineland gin on Tuesday of this week revealed that eight bales had been ginned thus far.

The Weinert Gin, Inc. was next to report, having ginned its first bale on Thursday morning, September 17.

The first bale for Knox Prairie Seeds, Inc., was ginned last Monday afternoon, and Joe Decker, gin manager, said some 10 or 12 bales were on the yard Tuesday morning.

This cotton was being brought in from the farm of Ernest Hooten, and was

Early in the second period, Moses Dena intercepted a Greyhound pass on his own 38-yard line. The Moguls went into action with an 11-yard run by Collier, then Chris Moore added two, and a 23 yard pass to Dave Hunter placed the ball on the two-yard marker. Dena then came into his own by plunging over for the score and kicking the extra point. Munday 7-0.

On the first play after kickoff, Junior Andrade picked off a Knox City pass. The Moguls lost the ball on downs on Knox City's 22-yard line. Four plays later, Robert Murray recovered a Knox City fumble on the 32.

Moore was tackled for a 15-yard loss, then hit Dave Hunter on a 29-yard pass. Three plays later, Dena went over left tackle to score from nine yards away, then added the extra point.

Knox City had one first down and was minus three on offense, while the Moguls gained seven first downs, 60 yards passing and 29 rushing.

In the third period, Munday fumbled on the 46-yard line, and the Greyhounds took 11 plays to score. Dewayne Watkins was stopped on the one-yard line, then it appeared that he just pitched the ball into the end zone, where Kevin Leach recovered. Two more points were added on a Watkins to Leach pass.

Twelve plays after receiving the kickoff, the Moguls again scored on a pass, Chris Moore to Robert Boyd, and the extra point try failed.

Munday later recovered a fumble on the 45-yard line. On the seventh play following, Lawrence Collier gathered a 29-yard pass to his chest and was stopped at the 2-yard line. Robert Murray went over to score his first TD of the year. Again the extra point failed, with 7:18 remaining on the clock.

Munday and Knox City both lost the ball on turnovers, but both were unable to score. The final score, Munday 26, Knox City 8.

September Sales Tax Rebates Up 14.7%

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently released the amount of sales tax rebates received in September by 750 Texas cities as \$40.9 million. The September payments push the cities' rebates for this year to \$480.3 million, up 14.7 percent over yearly payments to date during 1980.

Munday received \$2,693.59 for this period. Last year for the same period, Munday's check was \$2,630.56. The Comptroller's office did not release a report on Knox City for the current period.

Lions Eye Bank Program Aired

Chas. E. Davis of Wichita Falls, who served as Falls, who served as executive director of the District 2E-1 Lions Eye Bank movement for almost eight years, gave an interesting report of progress made by this movement since its inception.

In giving some history of the eye bank, Lion Davis complimented the Munday Lions Club as one of the "founder clubs" and for being 100% in membership dues, \$1.00 per member, for the past eight years.

He also gave his listeners some idea of how the eye bank program works, stating that his district has helped to provide sight to some 32 persons through the cornea transplants.

He cited one instance of the rapid service given by this program, in that eyes were removed from a donor in Wichita Falls, and within five hours they had been shipped to Dallas, and on to a point in Pennsylvania where a blind person was awaiting a transplant.

"In our district of 23 counties," he said, "our preference is given to the need within the district. One qualified surgeon in Abilene has performed 13 surgical transplants in recent months, providing sight to those who could not see."

A Life Fit To Live

Most of us have ideas about what life should be like. We have wondered about it and may have dreamed about it. Sometimes our experiences fall short of our ideas and dreams. There are times, however, when our experiences have been greater than we could have ever dreamed or imagined.

The apostle Paul, writing to Timothy, made a significant statement about life in the salutation of his second letter. He said: "From Paul, whose apostleship was designed to make known to all men God's promise of real life in Christ Jesus." (2 Tim. 1:1, Barclay) Paul seems to be saying that life as God meant it to be is known and experienced only in union with Jesus Christ. "In Christ" we experience life as God meant it to be. In him we discover "a life fit to live".

A life lived in union with Christ Jesus is a life of gratitude, faith, brotherhood and reconciliation. Such a life includes showing gratitude. Jesus showed gratitude for the commitment of the disciples and for the fact that God heard him

as he came to him in prayer. Do we express gratitude to God for the sunshine and rain, for the gift of life? Do we say thanks to Jesus Christ for his sacrifice that we might have the opportunity to experience the abundant, eternal life with God? Are we grateful for our families and friends?

A life in Christ includes a life of faith. We talk about faith in our discussions in Christianity - a quality Jesus exhibited in his life on the earth. We must know that faith is not a resignation to the circumstances we know, but an assurance that God will lead the way through trial, doubt and fear - if we will let Him.

We know that brotherhood is an important aspect of the Christian faith. Jesus was sensitive to the needs of all persons and ministered to those needs. It has been said that "people can be brothers only in something." We become brothers and sisters in the Christian faith as we receive and share "God's promise of real life in Christ Jesus."

Reconciliation is a fourth aspect of this life that is lived in union with Christ Jesus.

Jesus came into the world to achieve reconciliation between man and God, a relationship that had been broken by man in the Garden of Eden years before. But we cannot be reconciled (made right) with God without being in a right relationship with other persons. Reconciliation is not easily achieved, but it is necessary if we are to experience the life God has promised in his Son Jesus Christ.

Experiencing the life God has promised in Christ Jesus is determined by what a person is and not by what he has or what happens to him. Some have had the notion that to secure a lot of money and/or material wealth was to really have life. Many persons have learned that this is not true. Even though they amassed a great fortune it was not the key in bringing them into a close relationship with God. Our worth in material things does not determine our relationship with God. But our stewardship of our material wealth, our time, our abilities and our lives gives an indication of our relationship to God.

The way we meet difficulties in life also gives an

indication of our relationship with God. When difficulties come do we become bitter and resent our problems or do we continue to trust God for guidance? So often we want to strike out at something or someone, and God seems to be the prime target at times. But God is patient and kind. He calls us to Himself, to repent of our sin and receive the new life He promises in Christ Jesus. As we respond to His call we experience a life that is truly "fit to live".
