
Leonard Phipps Wins Commissioner Race

Munday Girls Win **District Track Title** Outdistancing their nearest

competitor by 74 points, the Munday girls' track team retained the district high school track title at Phillip McAfee Memorial Track last Thursday. The girls, led by junior track standout Sherita Jones, gathered 163 points for the lopsided victory. Knox City came in a distant second with 89 points, followed by Aspermont with 78; Spur with 77; Motley County with 64; Paducah with 40; Crowell with 32; Throckmorton with 8, and Chillicothe with 3.

In the boys' division, Ray Hernandez led the way for Munday, placing second in both 100 and 300 meter hurdles. The boys, with a diminished force, placed seventh out of nine teams.

For 1992-93 School Year . . . **Requirements Named For** Pre-K And Kindergarten

Doug Donoho, Elementary School principal, has released the following list of requirements for students entering Pre-Kindergarten and Kindergarten at Munday ISD next fall.

All students entering Pre-Kindergarten must be four years of age on or before September 1, 1992. Students entering Kindergarten must be five years old on or before September 1, 1992.

All students must be able to provide an immunization record for the following: Diphtheria/ Tetanus/Pertussis (DTP); Polio; Measles; Mumps; Rubella; and Haemophilus Influenza Type B (HibCv).

Students are also required to provide a birth record/certificate and a social security number.

Parents are encouraged to complete all of these requirements before students register next

Students are required to take the TASP test by the time they have accumulated nine semester hours credit in college. It measures reading, writing, and methematics skills needed to perform successfully in higher education, and is one of the Academic Excellence Indicators used to evaluate the academic performance of high school campuses across the state. The results of the test, when used in conjunction with other Academic Excellence Indicators, gives an indication of how well a particular campus performs in relation to other similar campuses over the state.

Results of the TASP test given to seniors graduating from Munday High School in 1990 were recently made available. Approximately one third of the seniors graduating in 1990 have taken the TASP. Of that number, 86% of Munday High School seniors tested passed all three tests on the first attempt. When broken down by individual test, 100% passed the reading portion, 86% passed the writing portion, and 86% passed the mathematics portion on the first attempt.

State averages and averages for schools in Region 9 (in parenthe80.5% (81%) passing writing and 83.1% (84%) passing math on the first attempt.

"We are very encouraged by these results when seen in comparision with state and region wide date," state MHS principal, Dr. Bill Kingston. "One of our goals is to provide students the background necessary to be successful in college. These very positive results are a credit to the hard work of our faculty, the students and their parents."

Bids will be opened May 14 at 4:00 p.m. during the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Trustees. A decision will be made at that time based on the cost and the availability of funds.

Former Benjamin Resident To Host "Roots Of Faith" Series

Crowell Brine Lake Project

The Crowell Brine Lake public works project, critical to the salinity control of the entire Red River Basin, has been removed from the list of projects subject to be canceled at the urging of President Bush. The House Energy and Water Appropriations Subcommittee, acting on a request by Congressman Bill Sarpalius (D-Amarillo), restored the project last week.

Sarpalius met with every Democratic member of the subcommittee during the past two weeks soliciting support to retain this vital water project.

"I was able to convince each of

the subcommittee members that salt pollution in the Red River Basin and in the Panhandle of Texas is the main threat to our long-term drinking water supplies," Sarpalius said. "Fortunately, they agreed and today took this important step in removing the roadblock that President Bush had placed in the path of this project."

Sarpalius pointed out that the inclusion of Crowell Brine Lake on the President's rescission list announced March 21 not only would have canceled this project, but would have set a precedent that likely would have blocked

any appropriations this year for the Lake Meredith Desalinization Project in the Texas Panhandle.

"I support the President in his efforts to cut unnecessary spending," Sarpalius said. "We need to spendless, but we certainly should not start with important public works projects that will assure our citizens a supply of drinkable water for generations to come."

Sarpalius said the House Appropriations full committee will consider the subcommittee actions on April 27. "I plan to continue my efforts lobbying the full committee membership during the next two weeks, and I fully expect

we will be able to retain the funding for this important project," he added.

The Red River Chloride Control Project, authorized in 1966, had been virtually dormant for a decade, until Sarpalius was successful in getting a \$5 million appropriation earmarked for the Crowell Brine Lake approved in the 101st Congress.

He was able to get another \$3 million approved for the brine lake in last year's appropriation bill, and those two appropriations represented the first construction monies ever approved for Crowell Brine Lake.

"Senator Bentsen has been an equally effective advocate for the Crowell Brine Lake in the Senate during the last three years, and I know he will work to make sure the project is protected when the Senate Appropriations Committee marks up their rescission list in the near future," Sarpalius said.

"Congressman Jim Chapman, (D-Sulphur Springs, TX) was key to our efforts to save this project and he has promised to help me protect these funds as the appropriations bill winds its way through the committee process to the House floor," Sarpalius added.

"It is my hope that President Bush and his supporters will join me in finding other areas of the budget where we can make some meaningful cuts," Sarpalius said.





Crop Disaster Payments Are Finally 'In The Mail'

Congressman Bill Sarpalius (D-Amarillo) announced that the USDA-ASCS will begin mailing crop disaster payment checks this week to eligible producers. USDA will be using a national factor of 50.04% to calculate crop disaster payments.

Eligibility for crop payments is based on the yield loss suffered by farmers nationwide. "While I am pleased that some aid is finally being granted to our nation's farmers, I am disappointed and angry that the Administration has refused to recognize quality losses in this disaster program," Sarpalius said.

"Since the Administration intends to use only \$995 million of the \$1.75 billion Congress authorized for crop disaster assistance, there is not enough money to provide relief for all of the yield losses sustained by farmers. As a result, each farmer's eligible losses will be multiplied by the

national factor, 0.5004, to determine his or her payment amount.

"For the President to deny farmers payment for quality losses and to fail to use the additional \$775 million approved by Congress for the disaster program, seriously underestimates the difficulties faced by America's farmers," Sarpalius commented. "Perhaps if America's farmers were to move to a foreign country, the President could find it in his heart to use the funds authorized and increase crop disaster payments."

According to a news release from the Texas Farm Bureau, farmers without crop insurance will be paid on 60% of their losses while those producers with crop insurance will be paid on 65% of their losses. The disaster payment guidelines state that farmers must have sustained at least at 40% loss of their crop before being eligible for assistance.

Although only \$995 million was allocated for disaster assistance, total claims approach \$2 billion.

Senior Citizens Group Holds April Meeting




