Local Sales Tax Rebates Increase Dramatically

If January's local sales tax rebates are any indication of things to come, then Munday is in for a

good year economically. According to the January report issued by the State Comptroller's Office, Munday showed a 37.76% increase overlast year's payment. The net payment this period was \$3,952.49, as compared to 1991's total of \$2,869.12. While the total figures do not show a large increase dollarwise, they do indicate a rising trend in the economic situation.

Other communities in the county reported losses, with Goree dropping 37.62% and Knox City falling 5.65%. Benjamin did not report any sales taxes for the period.

Taking all communities into consideration, Knox County showed a 3.05% increase overall. In comparison, Haskell County

Schrandt Announces Bid For 50th District Judge

Former District Judge Tom Schrandt has announced his bid for election as Judge of the 50th Judicial District Court. Schrandt was judge of the 50th District from June, 1983, until January 1, 1985. Since he was on the bench, the budget for the District Judge's office and staff has tripled, rising from \$26,500 a year to over \$79,000 a year. During the same period, the population has fallen nearly 20%.

"At a time when the economy is suffering, we as public officials should do everything we can to save taxpayers money. If I am elected, I pledge to cut \$35,000 of county money from the present District Judges' yearly budget."

Dumpground At Truscott Closes

The dumpground at Truscott has joined the majority of area refuse collection sites and officially closed its gates. January 1, 1992, marked the demise of the garbage facility.

At the present time, the unincorporated community has no plans for disposing of household trash. A community dumpster has been suggested, to be located two miles west of Truscott in a fenced area on a county road. A petition to this effect is being circulated by concerned citizens of the community.

The County Commissioners' Court is presently considering a solution to the situation.

Mr. Schrandt has also served as District Attorney for the 50th Judicial District, Baylor County Attorney, Acting Knox County Attorney, and Wichita County Attorney.

He and his wife, Michele, live in Seymour with their two sons, Michael, age 6, and Christain,

Mr. Schrandt stated further, "The District Court must be accessible to the people more than once a month. Hearings need to be scheduled when needed and held on time when scheduled.'

According to Pam Nelson, Branch Manager, Mediplex will offer skilled nursing services to patients recovering from surgery and homebound elderly who re-

quire medical attention. Their main goal is to monitor the patient's condition and assist the patient's physician as needed.

The facility will also instruct the patient and family members on the disease, necessary medications and treatment. Nurses will work in conjunction with area physicians to coordinate the best care possible for these homebound

patients. The Munday office will serve all of Knox County for a 25-mile radius. In addition to Mrs. Nelson, the facility is staffed by Ila Kay Gross of Knox City, office manager. Local nurses are currently receiving training to assume their duties in patients'

Cotton World Price

The adjusted world price for upland cotton remains at 44.07 cents per pound through midnight, Thursday, January 16. Therefore, the loan deficiency payment is still 6.7 cents per pound.

Conservation Sign-Up

A conservation program signup will be held in Knox County from January 21 through January 31. Programs covered by this signup are as follows:

Seymour Aquifer Project

All farms south of the Brazos River in the Seymour Aquifer Area are eligible to sign up for any conservation practice normally covered by ACP plus others; however, the cost share rate is 75% instead of the usual 50%. You may sign up for an annual practice or a long-term practice (3 to 5 years). This is a special practice designed to help decrease pollution of our underground water supply, the Seymour Aquifer. Since the Aquifer also extends to the area around Gilliland and Vera, these areas have been submitted for approval, but are not approved at this time.

Under this program, we take your application and determine the amount of funds needed and submit a request to our State Office for funding. Please take advantage of this opportunity as it will help you, your land, and our water supply.

ACP - Agriculture Conservation Program

The Annual Program is applicable to the remainder of the county not covered by the Sevmour Aquifer Project. Cost share rates are generally 50%; however, critical area shaping is 60% and waterways are 75%. In addition to the standard conservation practices normally offered, livestock water wells and stockwater storage facilities have been added. The regular ACP Program has an ongoing sign-up; however, it would be beneficial if you would sign up between January 21 through January 31 in order for us to see where we stand on funds needed.

LTA - Long Term Agreement

This program is for larger conservation practices and is a contract that runs from 3 to 5 years. All conservation practices eligible under regular ACP are eligible under the LTA including stockwater wells and storage. Cost share rates are generally 50%; however, critical area shaping and waterways are 75% of cost. The sign-up for LTA's is limited to January 21 through January 31. We must send requests to our State Office for funding under this program.

If you are interested in applying for any of these conservation programs please do so January 21 through January 31.

TAXPAYERS January 31, 1992

is the last day to pay your 1991 taxes and avoid the additional penalty and interest charges

Homestead Exemptions

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over sixty-five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1992. However, if you became 65 after January 1, 1991 and before January 1, 1992, you need to apply for the additional over 65 \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser Stanton Brown between the dates of January 1, 1992. and May 1, 1992. These exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County Courthouse.

Ag-Use Exemptions

Annual applications for qualifying land for agricultural use is not required. If you have been receiving th AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1992, and May 1, 1992.

Disabled Veterans Exemption

These exemptions need not be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1991 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1992. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1992 and May 1, 1992.

Renditions

Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions is between January 1, 1992 and April 1, 1992.
