Instead, what our missus says if we sneeze more than twice, "Are you taking a cold?"

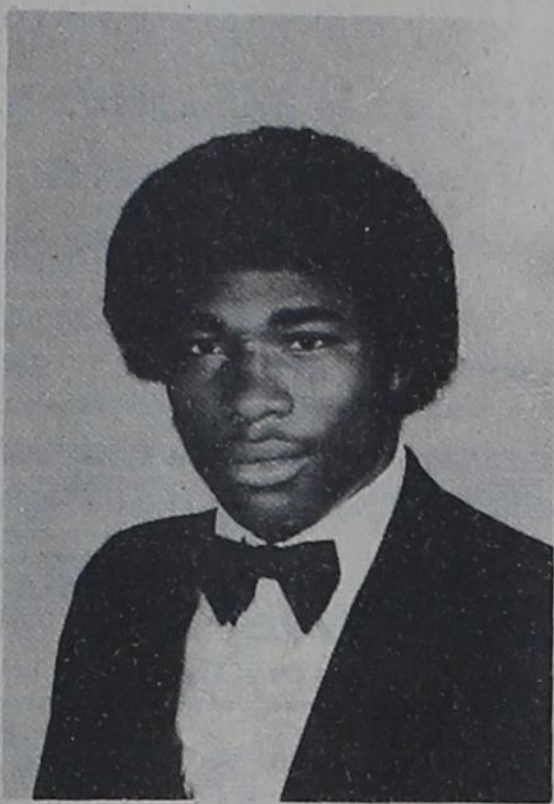
The umbrella: Never open it indoors. Umbrellas are to be used only outdoors. Failure to do this will bring about the "righteous wrath of the sun".

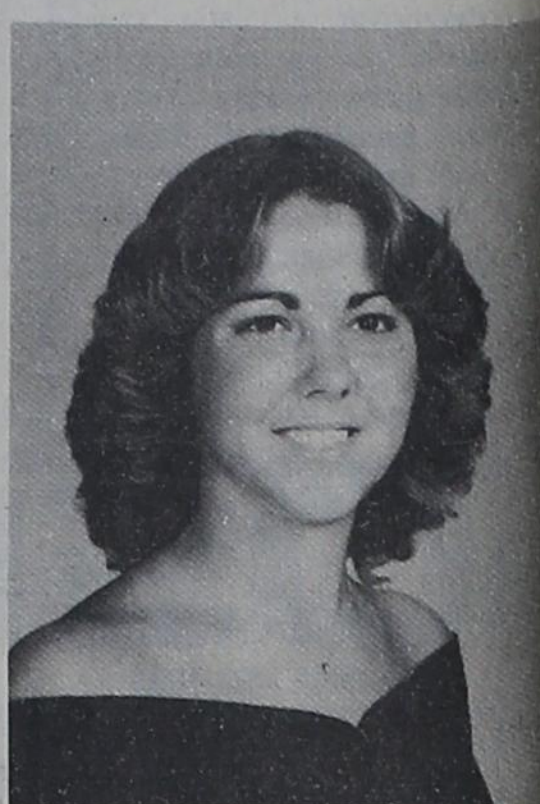
For those who are really superstitious, you should:

6. Knock on wood three times after

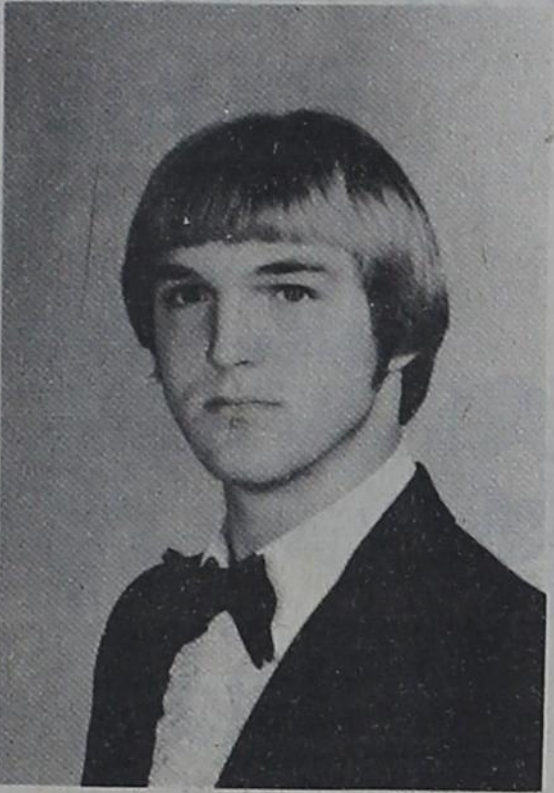

The 400-meter relay team from Munday High School placed second in the Region 1-AA track meet in Lubbock Saturday, thereby qualifying for the state meet in Austin this weekend. Team members are Jerry Shields, Todd Thompson, Quincy Adams and Lawrence Collier.

Posting a fast 43.2 time, the team was aided by fine individual performances and some perfectly executed handoffs. The winners of the race was Panhandle, with a time of 42.69. Panhandle was the overall team winner of the regional meet.

All-Around boy athlete. Lawrence, a senior, has been outstanding in football, basketball and track. He was selected as an all-district running back this year and is a member of the sprint relay team which qualified for state competition.

Best All-Around girl honors went to Kristi Smith, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richie Smith. She has been a valuable asset to the Moguelette basketball team, participated in track, and qualified for the regional tennis meet.

Vegetable Group Buys Stocks In Muntex Cold Storage Plant

Negotiations were completed Monday by which a group of three local vegetable growing firms purchased a majority of stock in the Muntex Cold Storage Corporation in Munday.

This move has been under way since mid-April when the Muntex directors, headed by Charles Baker as president, received an offer to purchase all of the Muntex capital stock. Since then, original shareholders have been contacted regarding the sale.

A majority of the stock was sold; however, several of the shareholders decided to retain their stock. The facility will continue to operate under the name of Muntex Cold Storage Corp.

Involved in the purchase were: Colville and Wilson, Inc.; Munday Vegetable Growers Cooperative, and North Texas Growers, Inc., a comparatively new organization involved in growing onions and other vegetables in the Munday area.

Muntex Cold Storage was organized on May 11, 1965, with better than 500 shares of stock. The first officers were Charles Hogsett, president; Ernest Horton, vice president; and Clint Norman, secretary. Original incorporators were: Jack Tidwell, Edward Smith, Hogsett, Horton, Norman, Boyd Meers and Le-

land Floyd.

The facility has been operated each season under lease agreement between Muntex, Colville and Wilson, and Munday Vegetable Growers.

In view of current conditions and the need for continued operation of the cold

storage facility in Munday, the board of directors unanimously voted to accept the offer of purchase, and the facility will continue to be operated under the same firm name. New officers and directors will possibly be named within the near future.

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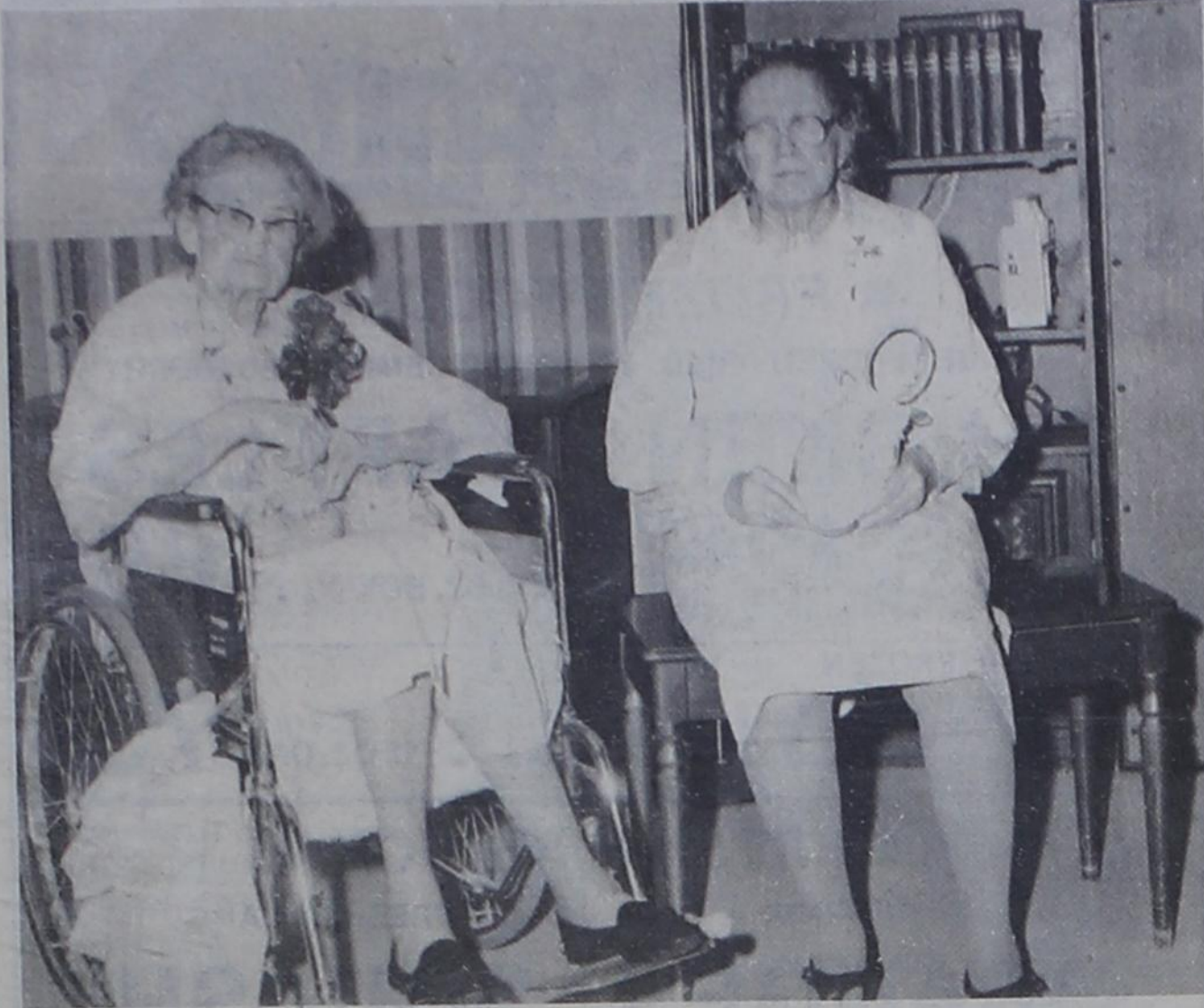

April Drilling Report

Railroad Commission Chairman Mack Wallace announced that Texas operators reported 101 gas and 68 oil discoveries in April 1983.

One year ago, 126 gas and 57 oil discoveries were filed with the state's energy regulatory agency.

Gas discoveries in April included 33 in deep South Texas, 19 each in Southeast Texas and the Refugio area, eight in the Midland area, seven each in North Texas and West Central Texas, three in East Texas, two in East Central Texas, and one each in the Panhandle and the Lubbock and San Angelo areas.

Oil discoveries included 14 in Southeast Texas, 11 in North Texas, nine in the San Angelo area, eight in the Midland area, six each in deep South Texas, West Central Texas and the Refugio area, four in the San Antonio area, two in East Texas, and one each in the Panhandle and Lubbock area.

In April, operators reported 465 exploratory and field

tests would up as dry holes. New applications for permits to drill oil and gas tests totaled 2,402 in April, which was the same total for these tests during the same month a year ago.

Applications to drill, deepen, plug back and for service wells in April amounted 2,799 against 2,767 a year earlier.

Operators filed 731 amended applications to drill. A year earlier they submitted 898 amended requests.

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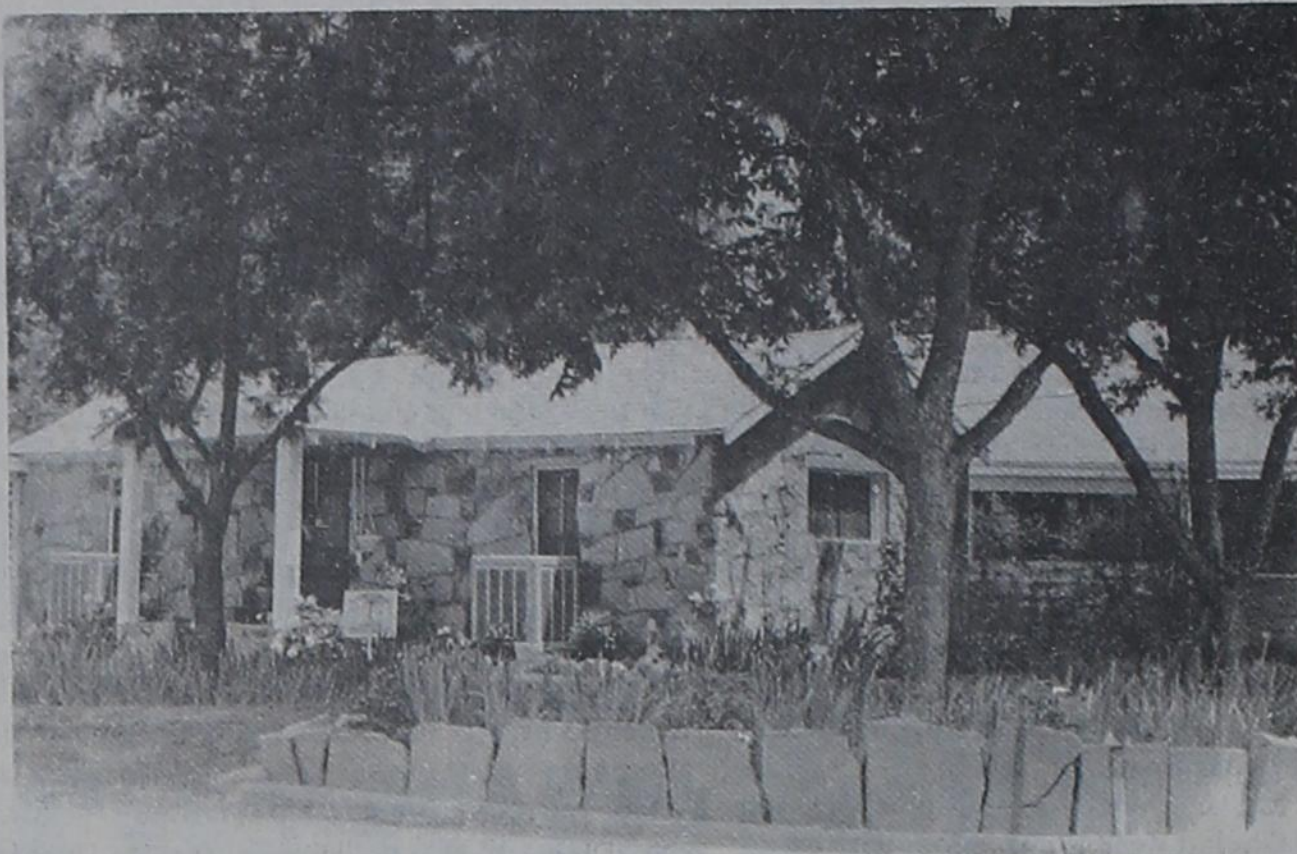

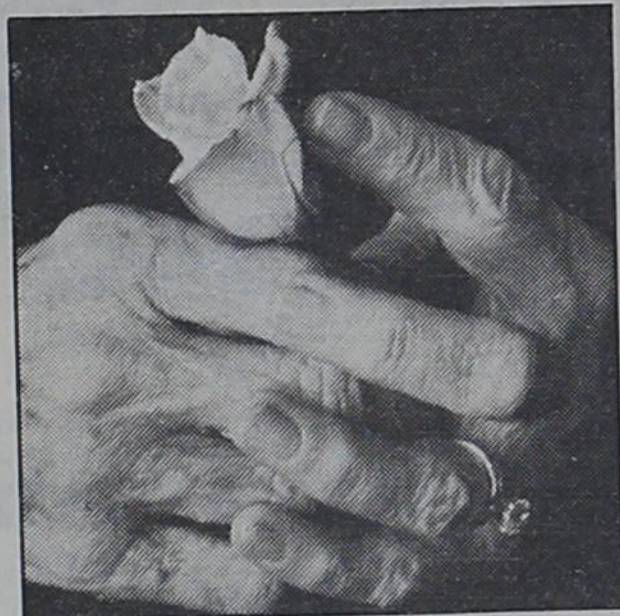

HERBICIDES FOR BRUSH CONTROL

Soil-applied herbicides can be effective in controlling range brush if used in the spring before expected rainfall, says a range brush and weed control specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. These herbicides include 10 percent picloram pellets (Tordon 10K or Grazon 10K), 20 percent tebuthiuron pellets (Graslan 20P), 10 percent dicamba granules (Banvel 10G) and hexazinone (Velpar L).

PIK Program Costs Predicted As Lower

When the final verdict is in, PIK may not be as costly a government program as some have suggested.

While estimated costs of the payment-in-kind program range from \$10 to \$25 billion, two economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System, peg the cost at about \$11 billion.

Dr. Ron Knutson and Ed Smith break this figure down to \$7.5 billion as the value of PIK commodities, \$2.3 billion for deficiency payments and \$1.3 billion for diversion payments. Deficiency payments result when farm prices drop below a designated level while diversion payments are for taking cropland out of production.

Analyzing the \$11 billion cost of PIK, here's a breakdown by specific commodities: corn, \$5.4 billion; wheat, \$3.1 billion; cotton, \$1.4 billion, grain sorghum, \$700 million; and rice, \$500 million.

"Although the total cost of PIK may seem high compared to farm programs in the '70s, the figure is low compared to what the government's farm program would have cost without PIK," say Knutson and Smith. They estimate that farm program costs for 1982-83 will reach about \$18 billion and that costs for 83-84 would total almost \$21 billion without PIK.

Since this estimated \$21 billion would include \$3 billion for the dairy support program and another \$2 billion on minor agricultural commodities and general

administrative expenses, the remaining \$16 billion represents program costs for grains and cotton in the absence of PIK. Thus, if the \$11 billion estimated cost of PIK stands up, the program could be viewed as causing a net savings of about \$5 billion.

"These savings would result mainly from reduced commodity storage costs and reduced deficiency payments," say the economists.

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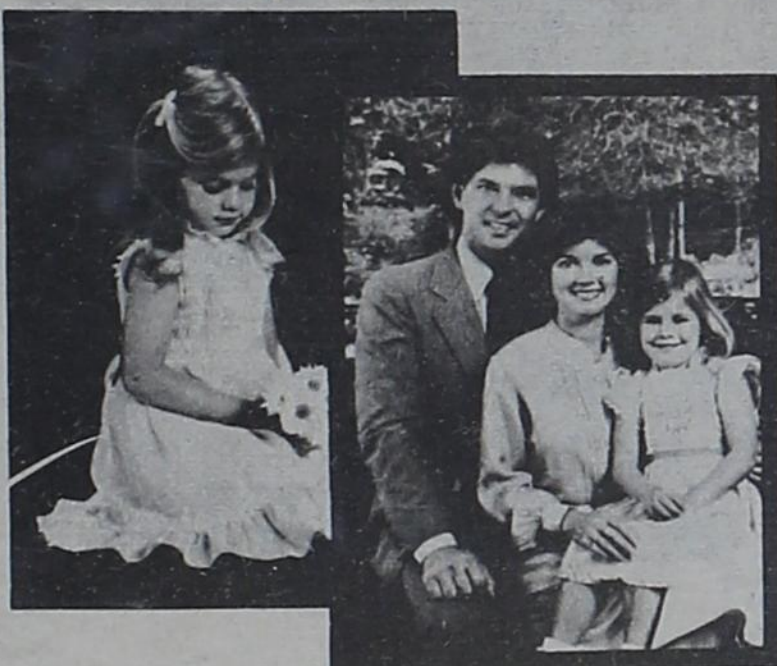

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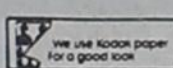
