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

"Any government big enough to give everything you want is big enough to take what you have from you."

. . . More and more, as never before, we look to Washington for what we seem to think is "Washington Money". But, far be it, it is still the money of the people. It is our money, and anyone who would think in depth knows that "when our money comes back, it comes with control".

. . . Too many public officials regard the office to which they have elected as theirs, and what goes on in the office is more or less personal. Not too long ago, an official in a very high elective office (national) said in effect, "I will tell the people what is going on when I think there is something they should know".

And what makes the feelings and conditions much worse is the fact that millions of people from the top to the bottom levels have become dangerously apathetic. On local, state and national levels during the past several years, the number of people showing very little, if any, interest in their governments has been increasing. The "don't care" attitude results in approximately 30 percent of our citizens even taking the time to participate in the selection of our local officials. Check the records and see for yourself - a very low percentage to say

Those who are elected to office certainly are aware of this fact; and, many of them, be assured, know what to say to whom and where. It is interesting, and at the same time disgusting, to watch the manipulations of politicians who have succeeded in getting into office at the hands of a few people, who than take note of the comparitively small percentage of people who carry the load that

should be borne by all. This year is election year. Already ghost writers are turning out millions and millions of words, making countless promises, most of which would be impossible to fulfill. But, are the seventy percent (approximately) paying any attention! Stock comments include, "Oh, let them run it. I'm disgusted with politics." "I don't intend to vote - politics have become rotten". All these and many other excuses for non-participation are being heard across the land, on local, state and national levels.

The people can have any kind of government they want. Just be assured of that. It is strictly up to the people. They can think and act for themselves or they can sit by and let someone else do it for them. The number not participating in elections, in the choosing of our public servants, can on longer be called a "minority group". No, indeed! An estimated seventy percent is not a minor-

ity group. Check the records. As repeatedly stated, a government is not a government without people. A church is not a church without Christian members. An army is not an army without soldiers. So, this Bicentennial year, why not take a look at that person you see in the mirror? Ask him does he think we are getting off to an uneasy start. Ask that person what he or she can do for America - a bountiful land entering its third century.

Let us never forget that America is everybody's business, so let's do something about keeping it that way . . . The place to start is in our own neighborhood, our own community, our own state. Then let's resolve to "stay close" to our public servants after carefully selecting them.



Local WTU Customers To Receive Refunds

New rates for West Texas Utilities Company's retail customers have received final approval of the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are now in effect. The rates are designed to provide an annual revenue increase of \$11.97 million. The company, in its rate request filed last June 10, had asked for \$26.5

Although the change means a 5.2 percent increase in total retail rates, the current effect will be a decrease for customers who have been paying temporary rates the past 21/2 months. WTU had started collecting interim rates, as allowed by law, on October 22 from all customers except those in 30 towns whose cases had been appealed to the

Because the final rates approved by the PUC are lower than the temporary rates, WTU will refund the difference plus interest. This will be done by crediting customer bills and should be accomplished during February and March.

Cash refunds will be mailed to customers who have moved off WTU lines or transferred to towns where the interim rates were not in effect. These checks will be sent to the customer's last known address. If these customers have not received refunds by April 1, they should contact their former local WTU

Amount of refunds will vary according to the size of the customer bills. For example, for a customer using 1,000 kilowatthours of electricity a month, the difference would be \$4.34. At this rate, his refund for the entire period would amount to about \$12.

Refunds will be made to all customers served by WTU during the period from October 22 to January 6, except those who live in the city limits of the following towns:

Alpine, Aspermont, Balmorhea, Bronte, Clyde, Cross Plains, Dodson, Estelline, Hawley, Iraan, Jayton, Junction, Lawn, Lueders, Marfa, Memphis, Menard, Merkel, Miles, Presidio, Putnam, Quitaque, Rankin, Santa Anna, Shamrock, Sonora, Sterling City, Turkey, Tuscola and Valentine.

None of the rate changes apply in the City of Vernon, where WTU's rates are kept the same as those of the city's municipal system and already are higher than those in the remainder of the sys-

City Shows Decrease In **Monthly Sales Tax Rebates**

State Comptroller Bob Bullock issued checks totaling \$44.6 million in local tax payments to the 980 cities that levy the

one percent city sales tax. "These checks are up to a whopping 39.5 percent over last January's payments," Bullock said. "A big part of that increase came because 15,000 taxpavers who previously only paid taxes four times a year started paying every month and we got their money back to these 980 city halls that much quicker. But some of the increase is due to the economic recovery we're seeing in Texas "

Sales tax receipts in Munday have taken a dip recently, as shown by the \$1,982.44 check for rebates. This amount is 7.61 percent less than the \$2,145.81 the city received a year ago. Knox City's check this month was for

\$3,919.94, 16.15 percent larger than the January, 1983 rebate. Goree, Benjamin and Weinert receive rebate checks quarterly.

January checks were for taxes collected on sales made in November and reported to the Comptroller's office by December 20.

Farm Program Signup Begins January 16

"We will begin accepting applications for the 1984 farm programs on January 16," Glenn R. Brzozowski, county executive director, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said. The 1984 acreage reduction programs were announced last August for wheat and during the fall for corn grain sorghum, barley, oats, cotton and rice.

Brzozowski said to be eligible for loans and target price protection, farmers must sign up and comply with the acreage reduction program requirements.

To emphasize the conservation aspects of the 1984 programs, land removed from production will be put reserve (ACR). "We encourage farmers to place more erosive land into the ACR while continuing to balance supply with demand."

"For reducing their wheat acres by 30 perdent of their base, farmers will be eligible for target price protection at \$4.45 per bushel, price support loans at 3.30 per bushel and the option to reduce their acreage an additional 10 to 20 percent for a paymentin-kind at 75 percent of their program yield," said Brprogram yield," said Brzozo-

Farmers who reduce their feed grain acreage by 10 percent of their base will receive federal target prices of \$3.03 per bushel for corn, \$2.88 for grain sorghum, \$2.60 for

barley and \$1.60 a bushel for oats. They also will be eligible for loan rates of \$2.55 a bushel for corn, \$2.42 for sorghum, \$2.08 for barley and \$1.31 for oats.

The upland cotton program offers farmers a target price of 81 cents per pound and a loan rate of 55 cents per pound for reducing their cotton acres by 25 percent of their base. Farmers who reduce their extra long staple cotton acres by 10 percent of their base will be eligible for target price protection of 99 cents per pound and loans at 82.50 cents per pound. "The 1984 crop of extra long staple cotton will be the first covered by new farm legislation, making the program similar to the upland cotton pro-

gram," Brzozowski said. The ASCS official said participation in the acreage reduction programs is a way in which farmers can control over-supply situations. "The programs also will provide a degree of insurance for farmers against price fluctuations and adverse weather conditions."

Contracts signed by program participants will be considered binding and will provide for liquidated damages for failure to comply with program requirements. The sign-up period ends February 24.

The other day Mary Welch of Gilliland brought to the Knox County Extension office cuttings from a wax-leaf ligustrum and nandina. The first sign of damage to the plants was the brownish-yellow color of the leafs. Other plants may turn brown or almost black. The damage is the result of record-breaking cold temperatures over a prolonged period with little or no accompanying moisture. Many questions come to

mind about freeze-damaged plants and the best course of action. Whether to back plants that appear dead is usually one of the first. Mary will wait on all of her woody shrubs, broadleaf evergreens and trees that appear damaged until they leaf out in the spring or when a definite assessment can be made. Pruning tends to stimulate new growth which could be easily damaged again by typical winter cold spells.





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

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Ad-Valorem Taxpayer Information Knox County Appraisal District

Taxpayers are reminded that January 31, 1984 is the deadline to pay their taxes to avoid penalty and interest.

The law requires (Section 22.01) that a taxpayer render his property. The rendition dates are January 1, 1984 through April 30, 1984.

EXEMPTIONS Ag-Use Exemptions

If your land was granted an ag-use exemption for 1983, you need not apply again. However, if you have purchased land since January 1, 1983, you need to apply for an exemption before April 30, 1984. If you have changed the use of the land from agriculture purposes, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser before April 30, 1984.

Homestead Exemptions

If you received a regular \$5,000 or additional \$10,000 for Over 65, homestead exemption, for the tax year of 1983 you need not apply for the tax year of 1984. If you have become 65 after January 1, 1983, you need to sign an over 65 exemption before April 30, 1984. If you are a new home owner you need to apply for your homestead exemption before April 30, 1984.

Disabled Veteran Exemption

If you qualified for and received a disabled veterans exemption for the tax year of 1983, you need not reapply for 1984, unless your percentage of disability has changed.

All rendition forms and exemption forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office located in the Knox County Courthouse, Benjamin, Texas. The address is Box 2, Benjamin, Texas 79505. 

"The Heart"

Many times in the Bible the work heart is used when the mind is meant! "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." We all know, of course, that a man does not think with his old blood pump. Some have said that religion is better felt than told. Others have gone to the extreme and said that religion is not of the emotion but of the mind. I wonder if there is not a middle ground where the truth is to be found?

The old law was a legal system yet could have been obeyed from the heart! Note Romans 2:15, "In that they show the work of the law written in their hearts . . ." Then in verse 27, 28, "For he is not a Jew who is one outwardly; neither is circumcision that which is outward in the flesh. But he is a Jew who is one inwardly; and circumcision is that which is the heart, by the spirit, not by the letter, and his praise is not from men but from God."

I think religion today is not all that different from religion in the first century. The religious leaders then, Scribes, Pharisees, and Sadducees, bickered over scripture. I guess that might be compared to denominations today. Yet, in Mt. 15:7, 8, 9, Jesus says, "You hypocrites, rightly did Isaiah prophesy of you saying, This people honors me with their lips, BUT THEIR HEART is far from me. But in vain do they worship me. Teaching as doctrines the precepts of men."


