Area Sees Growth In Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock sent checks totaling \$55.3 million in local tax payments to the 988 cities that levy the one percent city sales tax.

"We've sent Texas cities nearly half a billion dollars this year," Bullock said. "That's more than 17 percent over what these cities had received by this time last year. Every one of the 20 biggest sales tax cities is ahead of last year's totals."

Following the trend, Munday's check for this reporting period took a big jump over the rebate received in 1983. Sales tax netted the city \$2,555.80 for the month, compared to \$2,280.53 at this time last year. Munday has received \$25,806.27 thus far in 1984, a 1.39% increase over the 1983 rebates.

Knox City's economy is making great strides, according to the \$3,912.37 check that city earned this month. Their 1984 total of \$40,929.83 in rebates shows an increase of 11.36% over 1983.

Goree received \$511.18 this month to bring their yearly total to \$3,041.66, which is 23.63% ahead of last year's rebates at this point, and Benjamin is 2.29% in front of 1983 with a six-month total of \$1,368.99.

Weinert completes the area sweep in rebate boosts with a total of \$1,091.30, up 30.79% from 1983.

AS AREA FIELDS ARE CLEARED

Producers Oversee Vegetable Harvest

Produce trucks loaded down with local vegetables are a familiar sight in Munday these days, as harvest has gotten into full swing the past few weeks. Several fields of cabbage and onions have been emptied of their crops, and commercial harvest of cantaloupes is expected to begin shortly.

Harvest has been spread out a little more this year than in 1983, when wheat, potato and other vegetable crops began rolling into the elevators and processing sheds almost simultaneously, causing a few good traffic jams in Munday when trucks began transporting the produce out of town. This year wheat and potato harvest were conducted separately with some breathing space between them, and now the attention can be focused on the remaining vegetables and melons.

An excellent price for red potatoes made up for below average yields on this crop, and most producers agree it was a successful year despite the disastrous growing con-

ditions. The story was not the same on white potatoes, as low yields of potatoes not fully mature coupled with a lowered price could have hurt growers who concentrated primarily on this crop. For all practical purposes, the year's potato harvest has been completed.

Both yields and market prices on onions seem to point to a good year for local producers, and the onions taken from local fields are showing good quality. R. B. Todd Produce Company will be harvesting onions for another few weeks.

Quality of area cabbage is not as good as in some years, due to high winds and an especially heavy sandstorm that hampered growth and affected the cabbage heads and leaves. This harvest will reportedly be winding down in another ten days. Extreme dryness has been cited as a cause for slow ripening of melons, although the quality of the crop looks good at this point.

Locals' Son Receives NTSU Masters Degree

Some 1,177 students were awarded degrees May 12 at North Texas State University spring commencement ceremonies.

In addition to 844 bachelor's degrees, the university granted 287 master's and 46 doctoral degrees during ceremonies in the NTSU Coliseum.

Among the NTSU graduates was Joe Robert Wise, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Louise L. Wise of Munday. He was awarded the master of education degree in secondary education.

Pep Squad Shirts Are Here

Munday Ambulance Report For June

Only 13 calls were answered by the Munday Ambulance Service during the month of June, according to coordinator Bobby Hutchinson. This brings the year's total of ambulance calls to 97. In comparison, June, 1983, was a busy month, with ambulance volunteers responding to 25 calls.

Charges for June are \$919, and fees for the first six months of 1984 are just under \$8,000. 46 percent of this amount has been paid thus far.

Council Reviews Plans For New City Hall

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met in special session Thursday, June 21, at the Munday City Hall.

Members present: Mayor Doris Dickerson and Aldermen Garon Tidwell, Gary Decker, Richard Albus, Von Marr and Jessie Tucker. Members absent: none.

Mayor Dickerson called the meeting to order. Minutes of the June 12, 1984 minutes were read. After a correction, Mayor Dickerson stated minutes were approved as written.

First business was consideration of a rate increase request by West Texas Utilities Company. An approximate 12% increase is being requested, primarily to help finance the new coal fired power plant being constructed. Frank Jackson of West Texas Utilities Company met with the Council to discuss and explain the W.T.U. request. After discussion, Marr moved a resolution be passed suspending the adoption of proposed rate schedules filed by West Texas Utilities Co. for a period of 90 days beyond the date in which such schedules would otherwise go into effect. (Suspended 90 days from July 13, 1984.) Decker seconded. All members voted for. Full text of resolution is filed in city's resolution files.

After discussion and in accordance with Council instructions of May 8, 1984 in regard to free water being furnished the Pony League and Little League ball fields, meters have been installed and the following results were tabulated: Pony League - 542,000 gallons, city's cost \$491.00; Little League - 25,300 gallons, city's cost \$21.50. Decker moved that Pony League water be discontinued as of June 22, 1984, (unless payment to city is made for future water), and that Little League water service be continued since usage was low until end of season without charge. Tucker seconded. All members for.

Next discussed was collision and comp. insurance on two fire trucks and the van. Tabled for study, to be discussed at later meeting.

John Lee Wilde and M. Booe met with the Council to aid in discussion and building needs. Bill Williams and Ray Lynn Hardin met with council to relay fire department decision of their preference for a separate building.

Next business was discussion of new city hall and fire station progress. Decisions determined at this time are as follows:

1. Funds on hand will be used to pay for fire department building site acquisition, title work, legal fees, etc.; site selected by firemen to be acquired is possible.

2. Fire department building is to be paid for from funds on hand and bid will be for a pre-engineered metal building with some firm or person not yet selected to draw detailed plans for bidding. After completion of the fire department building, city hall will move into and operate city business from the new fire department building until the new city hall can be built on present city hall site.

3. Proposed financing arrangements for the new city hall will commence about a month prior to fire station completion. (Some existing bonds will be paid off in approximately 30 months.) No tax increase is anticipated to finance either of the buildings.

Further discussion. Marr moved that the city offer Charles & Kenneth Baker \$5,000 for a 150' x 200' tract for the new fire station site. The City Administrator is authorized to proceed with the purchase, check on title insurance or abstract (as price determines) and have Bobby D. Burnett prepare necessary instruments as needed. Decker seconded the motion. All for.

Also mentioned by Alderman Albus was possible negotiation with J. W. Smith for an adjacent 50' x 200' tract. The City Administrator will secure information in this regard.

Tidwell moved to adjourn. Albus seconded. All in favor.

Gilliland Woman To Do Missionary Work In Jamaica

The Foreign Mission Board of the Baptist Church has asked for 100 Texas volunteers to serve with a team of 400 in evangelistic work in Jamaica during the week of July 16-23.

Teams of five volunteers will conduct vacation Bible school on Tuesday through Friday and will also be involved in evening evangelistic sessions. Saturday will be free for shopping and sightseeing. On Sunday morning, the volunteers will lead another Bible school, followed by graduation exercises on Sunday night.

There will be no language barrier, since English is the primary language of Jamaica. Volunteers will be housed in college dormitories and native homes.

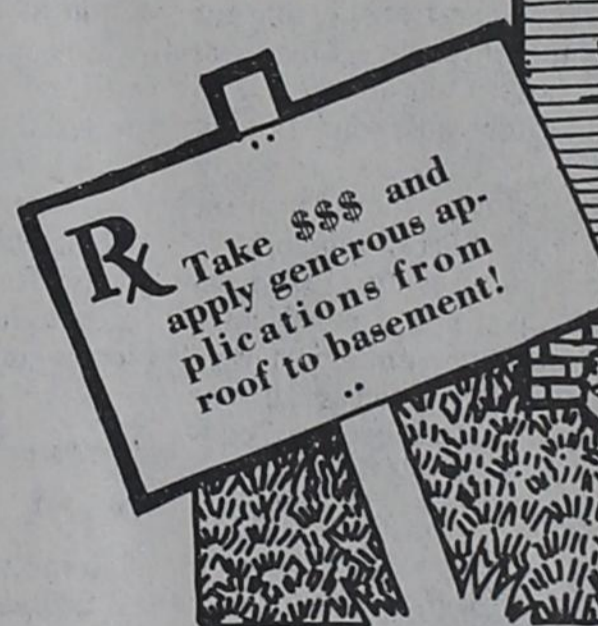

Coupons can offer a real bonus for grocery shoppers. They can also cause shoppers to waste their money and time.

Coupons entice some shoppers to purchase products that give more convenience than they need, products they don't ordinarily buy, products with less nutrition for the money spent, and more of a product than can be used in a reasonable amount of time.

Remember that manufacturers use coupons to attract your business to introduce new products and build brand loyalty, and grocers offer coupons to attract your business to their store. Coupons are a legitimate form of advertising. But they are not always the best value.

Here are some tips for successful shopping with coupons:

Before you go to the store, do your "homework". Study the food advertisements and check your current food supplies. Shopping wisely with coupons requires a high level of price-consciousness in order to determine whether a product is a good buy or not.

Make a shopping list of the things you need and select coupons for the products on your list.

Once you get to the store, don't buy a product simply because you have a coupon. Compare prices for the item, the item with a coupon, the store brand and the generic brand to determine which is the least expensive. Use the unit prices on the shelves to make this comparison.

Even with a cents-off coupon, a generic or store brand will often be less expensive, although you may want to purchase the national brand for special occasion dishes.

Eliminate "junk" foods if their only value is for redeeming a coupon. Just as with every other food purchase, read the nutritional labels on coupon items.

To make the most of coupons for products you need, combine coupons with store specials for additional savings. Also, if the store offers double or triple coupons you can usually save more by buying several small packages of the same item rather than one large package, if you have more than one coupon.

Finally, watch for errors at the checkout counter, even with the

electronic scanning systems. Make sure you are charged the advertised price rather than the regular price on sale items, and that your coupon savings are accurately deducted from your total.

According to the A. C. Nielson Company, American consumers cashed a record 5.56 billion cents-off coupons last year from manufacturers. The coupons were worth 1.56 billion dollars, and does not include retailer's coupons. That is a lot of money! Hopefully it was money saved, not wasted.
