IN HOMECOMING GAME...

Mogul Attack Stuns Greyhounds 48-0

A huge homecoming crowd watched in delight Saturday night as the Munday Moguls triumphed to a resounding 48-0 win over their long-time rivals, the Knox City Greyhounds.

The multi-talented Moguls totally dominated the line of scrimmage as their fired-up defense completely stymied a faltering Knox City offense. Because of the previous success of the two Moguls halfbacks, Todd Thompson and Tim Collier, the Hound defense concentrated on the outside threat, leaving the door open for fullbacks Ronny Lowrance and Jim Earl Dockins, who ate up great chunks of yardage through the middle of the Greyhound line and scored three and two touchdowns, respectively.

The statistics showed just how consistently the Moguls controlled the game, mounting up 398 yards rushing compared to a minus yardage for Knox City, with 23 first downs to the Hounds' two. The only Knox City offense was a 17-yard pass to Tracy Carter late in the game.

The Moguls won the coin toss and elected to receive. On the first possession, a 65-yard drive to the end zone was called back because of an illegal receiver penalty, and the Hounds gained the ball at their 15. Another penalty against Munday helped them to a first down, but they were immediately flagged for two five-yard penalties and the Munday defense took over. Forced to punt only three yards from the original line of scrimmage, the Hounds gave the ball to the home team near midfield and had to watch burly Ronny Lowrance break a couple of tackles as he took the ball 47 yards for the touchdown on the next play. The try for two extra points failed, and the Moguls took the lead 6-0 at 3:16 in the first quarter.

After an exchange of punts, the Moguls struck again, with Dockins capping a seven-play drive with a 21-yard sprint. Again the Moguls failed to connect for two extra points, and the score stood 12-0. Both teams stalled on their next series, but late in the half a combination of Mogul rushing and Greyhound penalties led Lowrance across the goal line again, this time from the six. Dent Offutt and Tim Collier set the stage for Lowrance's TD with good runs, and Offutt kept the ball for the two-point run, so the Moguls took a 20-0 lead in with them at halftime.

Although the Greyhounds had sure hopes of staging a comeback, they were quickly extinguished early in the third period when Hollis Adams recovered a fumble on the Knox City 24. Two plays later, Lowrance bulldozed his way through the line for 18 yards, then added two

more points on the conversion to put Munday's lead to 28-0.

The remainder of the third quarter was a less-than-exciting series of fumbles and punts, but two successive quarterback sneaks by Offutt took the Moguls to the Knox City 36 at the start of the fourth period. From that point, Dockins carried the pigskin across the goal with 9:56 left in the game. Less than three minutes later, Offutt tossed a 33-yard pass to Todd Thompson, and the Mogul margin was widened when Lowrance booted the ball through the uprights.

Munday coach Jim Edwards substituted heavily for the rest of the game, giving the starters a well-deserved rest. Freshman quarterback Anthony Stinnett, playing in his first varsity game, kept the ball and ran 12 yards for the final Mogul touchdown. Lowrance's kick made the score 48-0.

The Moguls carry a spotless 5-0 record into district play when they travel to Windthorst Friday to take on the winless Trojans. Fans need to remember that district games begin at 7:30 p.m., and the players and coaches will undoubtedly be glad to see a large number of Munday supporters in the visitors' stands at Windthorst.

Bid Acceptance On City Hall Expected

In a special meeting held Friday, October 5, Munday city councilmen examined bids on construction of a new city hall and fire station.

Munday mayor Doris Dickerson presided over the meeting and councilman Garon Tidwell read each bid. Other council members present were Richard Albus, Gary Decker and Jessie Tucker. City manager Walter Hertel was also in attendance, as were several bidders and other interested parties.

The council was somewhat surprised at the fact that only three bids were submitted for approval. Ten companies had obtained specifications for the building project, and it was expected that more bids would be turned in.

The bids studied included Rickie Herring Construction, Munday,

\$168,202.86; John Lee Wilde Building, Munday, \$143,800.00; and M&F Littekin Company of Wichita Falls, \$238,400.00.

A regular City Council meeting was held Tuesday night, October 9, and at press time, it was anticipated that the low bid would be accepted. All the bids listed above were base bids, and each contractor listed other alternatives and their prices. City officials met Monday night with John Lee Wilde to clear up some unanswered questions concerning his bid, and Hertel said satisfactory conclusions were agreed upon in each instance.

The city offices were moved this week to the Oscar Cypert garage, and it is expected that demolition on the present city hall building will begin very soon.

Accident Near Munday Causes Serious Injury

An accident that occurred just on the Knox-Haskell county line early Monday evening resulted in one person being transported to Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene.

Officers and ambulance personnel were called to the scene of a one-vehicle rollover at about 7 p.m. Monday. According to reports, the 1984 Ford club cab pickup was traveling north into Munday at a probable high rate of speed when the driver apparently lost control and the pickup rolled over once.

Ignacio Ortiz Jr., 18, of Rochester, driver of the vehicle, was unharmful in the incident. His brother, Felix Ortiz, also of Rochester, was transferred to Hendrick Medical Center by Munday Ambulance Service suffering a possible broken neck. Another passenger in the vehicle, whose name was not known at press time, was treated at Haskell Memorial Hospital and released.

Texas Department of Public Safety trooper Brian Williams was the investigating officer, and he was assisted by personnel from the Knox and Haskell County Sheriff's Departments and the Munday Police Department. Munday firemen also helped at the scene.

Fire Prevention Week Recognized In Munday

Anything will burn and nothing is fireproof. This fact was brought out by Ben Bullard, Assistant Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, Waco, in a graphic animated fire prevention demonstration held Monday, October 8, at the Munday Community Center.

The three things needed to start a fire - air, fuel and heat - brightly illuminated as Bullard plugged in the parts of his fire triangle board, causing the flashing "F-I-R-E" sign. He defined fire control as he removed, one at a time, the three parts.

As part of a discussion on fire control and the classes of fire (A, B,

C, D), Bullard demonstrated taking away air by smothering the flame of a candle; smothering the flame of a kitchen fire (pot of burning grease - class B) and taking away the air or oxygen of another class B fire - a burning gasoline rag.

The audience also witnessed the burning of steel (steel wool) and the loud shotgun-like explosion of one drop of gasoline.

With each sequence of animated and actual fire hazard of the various classes both inside and outside the house and around the farm, Bullard gave applicable prevention and control suggestions. For fire control,



October Tax Rebates Up

State Comptroller Bob Bullock
has sent checks totaling \$58.2 mil-
lion in local tax payments to the 990
cities that levy the one-percent city
sales tax.

"So far this year, these payments
are running better than 16 percent
ahead of last year, and most Texas
cities can expect even bigger checks
for the rest of 1984," said Bullock.
The Comptroller explained next
month's checks will reflect the first
increases from new goods and ser-
vices taxed for the first time begin-
ning October 2.

October checks represent taxes
collected on sales made in August
and reported to the Comptroller by
September 20.

Munday's tax payments this year
are gaining on those of 1983. The
payment for October was \$3,234.81
which was a large increase over last
year's October payment of
\$1,910.20. Our yearly total stands at
\$37,231.48, which is 4.43% down
from the yearly total of \$38,957.46
in October 1983.

Knox City showed another large
increase this month with their check
of \$4,245.73. Their yearly total is
\$57,122.43, which is a 7.42% in-
crease over last year's total at this
time.

Benjamin received \$578.35 with
their yearly total to date showing
\$2,666.78 which is a 44.09% in-
crease over last year's total in Octo-
ber. Weinert and Goree did not re-
ceive rebate checks this month.

"Vanishing Memories"

It will be a sad day for many when the old City Hall is bulldozed down. It was in the finishing stages, in the latter part of 1917, when they ran out of roofing. Earnest Gray had the Texaco dealership where the roofing was purchased. He sent his younger brother, R. D. Gray, in the old republic truck to Throckmorton to get enough roofing to finish the new building.

When R. D. got back to Munday, he was crossing the railroad tracks in front of Marvin Reeves' elevator and the tire rod on the truck came loose causing the wheels to spread apart.

The new City Hall was finished in the early part of 1918 and it was a place the people really appreciated. There was a large auditorium upstairs where many school programs, graduation exercises and other activities were held. I remember a medicine show being held there one time because I won a 25 lb. sack of flour.

This was before the large tabernacle was built near where the grammar school is located now. The school activities and big summer meetings were all held in the tabernacle after it was constructed.

The City Hall has been a memorial to me since four generations of our family have run in and out of those doors. May the younger generation appreciate the new modern City Hall as much as we appreciated the old one.





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
