The mercury dipped to 36 during the night as approximately two inches of rain fell on already wet ground, causing some high water in various spots throughout the area.

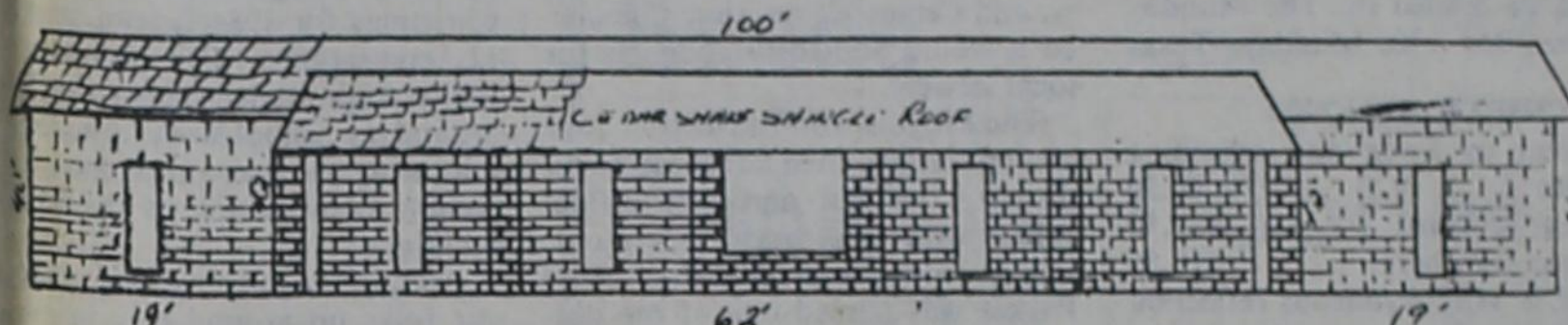
Monday's high was 38, and weathermen were calling for chances of more rain mixed with sleet and snow in the evening, promising a bad day for holiday travelers. The weather was reminiscent of last winter's blizzard which occurred during the latter part of December.

## Earn Chance To Landscape New City Hall In Contest

The Knox County Sesquicentennial Committee is sponsoring a contest for Munday area residents and former residents to landscape grounds and design parking areas for the new city hall and fire station in Munday.

City officials have proposed that the lawn area be small with trees or plants that require little maintenance and that parking areas should be increased because of a shortage of existing parking space. Large parking areas should be included on the south and west sides.

Blueprint drawings and rules of the contest may be obtained at city hall. To receive a copy by mail, write the city for one and include a stamped self-addressed envelope.

Using the blueprint, draw in landscaping and parking. Entries must be turned in to city hall by March 1, 1985. The winning entry chosen by the city council will be announced during the Sesquicentennial variety show which will be held in March.

The winner of the contest will receive a \$100 savings bond. Mickie Hutchinson is in charge of the

variety show and will release more information at a later date. Funds raised by this project will finance the landscaping plants, trees, shrubs or flowers and purchase Christmas lights to decorate the exterior.

The landscaping contest is being

planned by Munday's Sesquicentennial committee to commemorate Texas' 150th birthday and Knox County's 100th birthday in 1986. Members of the committee are Paula Schur, Phillis Urbanczyk and Gail Ramirez.

## Wet Weather Hard On Cotton Farmers

Area farmers are really having a hard time getting their cotton out of the fields this year. Just when you think it's getting dry enough to strip some, it comes another shower and the waiting starts all over again.

One man commented that if it stopped raining now, it would still be three weeks before they could get back into the fields.

Farmers are not the only ones having to sit back and wait for dry weather. Area gins are getting a little anxious themselves. Munday Gin and Seed has reported 902 bales of

cotton ginned as of Monday, December 31. This is no where near the half-way mark for cotton season to be through. There are lots of fields left to be stripped yet.

Knox Prairie Seeds is approximately one-third of the way through with cotton ginning, with 1,830 bales ginned in 1984. They are also having to wait for dryer weather so the cotton can be stripped. A long cotton ginning season is expected this year, needless to say.

## Heart Monitor Purchased By Ambulance Group

The Munday Ambulance Service has accomplished another goal to help serve the people of our community, thanks to \$3,688 in memorials and \$2,473.75 in donations made during 1984. The service has purchased a heart monitor and recording machine.

This equipment will give ambulance personnel more information about heart patients when they are traveling to the hospital. It also helps doctors or nurses make faster diagnoses and speeds up treatment in cases of known or suspected heart disease, which is the number one killer in the United States.

In announcing the purchase of the heart monitor, Ambulance Service coordinator Bobby Hutchinson said he is sure that the people in this community are the best in the state to support not only the Ambulance Service, but any other organization or project that needs help. This support is the reason the Ambulance Service is able to meet the needs of residents in the area.

Several ambulance volunteers met recently to examine the procedures that must be followed in using the heart monitor and recorder. They also discussed the need to schedule a refresher course so county Emergency Medical Technicians can renew their certificates which expire in April. Hutchinson said he would try to schedule a class in March if the plan is approved by the regional office in Abilene.

New officers elected for the Ambulance Service are Hutchinson, president; Mickey Jackson, vice-president; and Reba Redder, secretary-treasurer. On behalf of these officers and the other volunteers, Hutchinson stated, "Again, I want to thank the people of this community for their support and backing to help us serve the community with the best ambulance service possible."

# Recap: The Year in Review

It's hard to believe another year has passed, but we have changed calendars, and the date on the new one says January, 1985. 1984 was a very interesting year in many ways, and in case it went by so quickly that it seemed like a blur, here are some items that should refresh your memory.

### JANUARY

Steve LeFevre was hired as vocational agriculture teacher at Munday High School. A large crowd of youngsters entered fine animals at the Knox County Junior Livestock Show held in Munday, and for once, the weather cooperated.

Politics were in the forefront of the news, as several persons threw their hats into the ring for the May primary election. Van Green, Tom Schrandt, David Hajek, Philip Homer, Billy Gene Johnson and Steven Carrier all announced their candidacies.

Munday city councilman Bobby D. Burnett resigned his seat due to his decision to run for the county attorney post. Former Munday resident Gerald Bowden was promoted to Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Army at Northeastern State University in Talequah, Oklahoma.

### FEBRUARY

Announcement was made early in the month that Perry Kuehler had assumed ownership of Irene's Flower Shop. Ralph Howell was named minister of music and youth at the First Baptist Church. A widespread flu virus caused high numbers of absenteeism at local schools and throughout the area.

Oscar Mangis and Steve Bisbee rounded out the ballot for the May Democratic primary. The General Shelters plant in Munday began production, and local potato growers planted their 1984 crop. Mogul and Moguette basketball teams ended their seasons with disappointing losses to Hamlin.

The month of February was sadly marked with the passing of longtime Munday newspaperman Aaron Edgar, who died February 17, and former State Representative W.S. Heatly, who passed away on February 24.

### MARCH

It was decided to revive the Knox

County Vegetable Festival in an effort to promote the superior vegetable production in this area. Jeanie Haynie, a hairdresser in Munday for 25 years, retired and was honored with a surprise reception at the Shamrock Cafe.

Ronnie Baker was elected president of the Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture. Mrs. Ruth Ishmael, education diagnostician for the Haskell-Knox Consortium, received the Council for Exceptional Children's outstanding teacher award. A contest developed in the Munday school board election when Larry Thompson, Bill Williams, Sonny Moore, B.R. Winchester and Gifford Wilde filed for two trustee seats.

Ray Herring won the Texas Rural Heroism Award for his action in 1983 when he pulled a stunned Bill Longan from his truck in an electrical accident. Bobby Hutchinson was named Citizen of the Year at the Munday Chamber of Commerce banquet, and Dr. Newton D. Neufeld of Knox City announced that he would open a clinic in Munday for a portion of each week.

### APRIL

Holly Hutchinson and Cherie Welch won the right to compete in the regional tennis competition, and Eva Escamilla, Regina Jones, Kelli Smith, Gwen Stinnett and Janet Myers qualified for the regional girls track meet. The Moguls captured the district track crown, with eight going on to regional.

The Munday Gym-Dandeez hosted a gymnastics competition and took second place. Rhineland's Water Supply Corporation applied for an FHA grant to finance a project to furnish water to the rural areas. Brother Jeremy Myers, a Rhineland native, was ordained to the priesthood in Subiaco, Arkansas.

Maynard (Sonny) Moore and B.R. Winchester won seats on the Munday ISD board of trustees, and Vernal Zeissel and Maurine Reeder were elected to the Knox County Hospital Board. Garon Tidwell was appointed to the Munday City Council, and also taking office were new mayor Doris Dickerson and councilmen Richard Albus, Von

Marr and Gary Decker, who were elected unopposed.

Paula Waggoner was named valedictorian of the senior class at Munday High School, and Julie Partridge was salutatorian. Ron Redder qualified for the state journalism contest.

### MAY

Rhoades Allen was named outstanding cooperater for 1983 at the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District banquet. Kacy Longan was the SWCD grand champion poster winner and she also won one of three state poster awards. Alexis Bordovsky and Corey Moore were announced as valedictorian and salutatorian, respectively, for the eighth grade graduating class.

Robert Redden, Munday boys' basketball coach, announced his resignation, and Paul Wright won the John Phillip Sousa award at the band Muscadade. Wright, Quincy Adams, Johnny Collier, Mary Jane Kuehler and Janet Myers took honors at the all-sports banquet. Winning awards at the FFA picnic were Wright, Kregg Sanders, Douglas Schumacher, Jay Donoho and Neil Waggoner.

Gene Nix was re-elected sheriff and Oscar Mangis got the nod for county tax assessor-collector in the May primary. Also elected were district attorney W.H. Heatly and district judge David Hajek, as well as several officials who ran with no opposition. Lynn Parker, Jae-Jae Reneau, Julie Partridge and Amy Parker won the county 4-H fashion show awards.

### JUNE

David Milson was employed to coach boys' basketball at Munday High School. A fire at the Lake Creek Golf Club course damaged several carts and equipment. Julie Partridge received an \$8,000 scholarship from the Houston Livestock Show, and Keith Sanders, a Munday High School graduate, was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force.

Residents of Knox County turned out in force to watch the Olympic torch as it made its way through our area. The Promotion Day activities that preceded the Knox County

Vegetable Festival were a great success, and the festival itself surpassed everyone's expectations. Salwa Choucair and Michelle Ezell were crowned festival royalty.

### JULY

Vegetable harvest was in full swing early in the month, and new equipment speeded things up considerably. Members of the First Baptist Church in Munday began planning a missionary trip to Australia. The long drought was broken temporarily by a few much appreciated showers of short duration.

W.R. Moore, Jr. of Munday was named a Man of the Year in Texas Agriculture by the Texas County Agricultural Agents Association. Munday native Bill Stewart was selected as an Outstanding Young Man of America.

### AUGUST

A child welfare board was established to develop child welfare and child protection services in Knox County. Plans were announced for the new city hall and fire department to be built in Munday.

School began with enrollment figures similar to those of the first week of 1983 classes. The Moguls worked out in the heat, training for the upcoming football season. An election was called to decide a school bond issue concerning funds to renovate the elementary school and add new classrooms at the high school, all in an effort to eliminate the use of the junior high building.

A contract was signed between the Munday Housing Authority and a Hurst construction company for modernization work on the Community Center and the Housing Authority apartments. The Amerison Apartments were completed and quickly rented.

### SEPTEMBER

Douglas Morton was hired as patrolman for the City of Munday. Druggist Bernard Pang returned to his native Hong Kong, hopefully to await approval of his permanent resident visa. The Moguls started their football season off on the right track with a 20-2 win over Haskell, and Hawley, Rotan and Anson fell to the Munday squad in succeeding

weeks.

Plants, Etc., a local flower shop, was completely destroyed by fire September 7. The school bond election passed by a 10-1 margin, and school trustees traveled to New York City to present their bond rating proposal.

Munday was well represented when the county received its Sesquicentennial flag denoting official sanction as a Texas Sesquicentennial County. Ted Jordan and Larry Swan agreed to direct the 1984 United Fund drive in Munday.

### OCTOBER

Worth Gafford retired from the barbering business, and he and his wife packed up and moved to Missouri. Mary Thompson opened Mary's Books and More downtown. A musical stage presentation of Goldilocks and the Three Bears was sponsored by the Munday Entertainment Team, and a large group of students won awards at the Haskell County Fair.

The Munday Moguls delighted homecoming fans with a 48-0 rout over the Knox City Greyhounds, then proceeded to shut out their next five opponents. Homecoming was a memorable event that was well attended. Col. Jack Williams spoke at the assembly, and Pam Welch and Latreece Johnson Lane were crowned homecoming queen and coming home queen during halftime of the ballgame.

The resignation of ag teacher Gary Decker was accepted, and Paul Richwine was employed at the Texas A&M Research Station. The Texas Parks and Wildlife approved a \$46,000 contract for construction of a boat ramp at the Miller Creek Reservoir.

John Lee Wilde turned in the lowest bid for construction of the new city hall and fire station in Munday, and a Dallas firm was awarded the sale of Munday school bonds. The first county cotton was ginned, and Mike Sloan, manager of the local Production Credit Association office, was promoted to the central office in Stamford. He was replaced in Munday by Bobby Sosolik.

The Mogul band received its first

number one, or superior, rating at the fall UIL marching contest. Amy Parker and Robin Reneau won the senior and junior division Gold Star awards at the annual 4-H Achievement program, and Yolanda Escamilla of Munday received her diploma from the Texas Department of Public Safety trooper academy.

#### NOVEMBER

City Hall square became vacant as demolition of the old city hall was completed to make way for new construction. Pam Welch, Jim Earl Dockins and Mark Brown were honored as football and band royalty, and Centex Cablevision announced it would add three channels for local viewers.

The Moguls won the district zone championship, then advanced to bi-district, regional and quarterfinal action with wins over Aspermont, Valley View and Wheeler. Amy Parker was named one of the outstanding 4-H'ers in the Rolling Plains District.

Local businessman Robert Nix died November 9 after a long illness. Groundbreaking ceremonies for the new city hall were held, and work began on the square as debris from the old building was removed. Munday police chief Gerald Saffel tendered his resignation effective January 1. Knox and Haskell Counties swept the junior division at the District 3 4-H Food Show held in Wichita Falls. As football continued, the Munday Mogulettes began their basketball season.

#### DECEMBER

Munday residents kicked off the Christmas season by attending a community Christmas tree decorating party complete with Santa

himself. The first Knox County pecan show was held, and several locals won prizes for their entries.

Ralph Hernandez of Munday won third place at the Greater Texas Powerlift Classic in Irving. The Fire Department hosted an enjoyable party for members and guests, and several other Christmas demonstrations were held around town. David Perdue of Knox City was appointed county judge, and former judge Homer T. Melton, his wife Kathleen and tax assessor-collector John Smith were honored with a retirement reception at the courthouse.

Mary Jane Kuehler won the honor of being named Miss Merry Christmas for 1984 from a field of 12 contestants. Elementary and junior high students were shuffled around as school drew to a close, relocating to accommodate upcoming construction of the school buildings.

### Bullock Publishes Ideas To Help Save Tax Dollars

State Comptroller Bob Bullock recently published for consideration a list of nearly 100 ideas for cutting costs and raising state government productivity that could help save hundreds of millions of state tax dollars.

"We've detailed nine productivity ideas that alone could save Texas \$100 million, and eleven cost-cutting alternatives worth as much as \$300 million more," Bullock said.

"Now we're not laying down any blanket endorsements or recommendations," Bullock emphasized. "We're throwing out these ideas to help the Legislature and Texas citizens make better choices and put Texas government on an increasingly productive track."

Texas government has the same opportunities and challenges in the future as Texas business - spending more money or finding better ways to do the job. And options for dealing with fiscal pressures are available, Bullock said.

"Productivity Ideas and Cost-Cutting Alternatives to Control State Budget Growth" offers a set of 94 options based on successful practices in industry and state, local and federal governments. Ideas in the report from the State Comptroller's Office run the gamut from use of technology such as satellites for telephone service to simple reduction of forms and paperwork.

"We're providing ideas with the thought in mind that the Legislature will perfect them," Bullock said.

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### Knox County Appraisal District REMINDER TO TAXPAYERS January 31, 1985

is the last day to pay your 1984 taxes and avoid the additional penalty and interest charges.

#### HOMESTEAD EXEMPTIONS

Homeowners are not required to file a homestead exemption annually. If you are already receiving the state mandated \$5,000 homestead exemption or additional over-sixty five \$10,000 exemption, you need not reapply for the taxing year of 1985. However if you became 65 after January 1, 1984 and before January 1, 1985, you need to apply for the additional over-65, \$10,000 exemption. If you have changed your place of residency, you need to apply for a new exemption. All homestead exemption applications must be filed with Chief Appraiser, Oscar Mangis, between the dates of January 1, 1985 through May 1, 1985. These exemptions forms are available at the Knox County Appraisal District Office, which is located in the Knox County courthouse.

#### AG-USE EXEMPTIONS

Annual Applications for qualifying land for agriculture use is not required. If you have been receiving the AG-USE exemption on your land in prior years, you need not reapply for the exemption. If you have recently purchased a farm, you need to report this to the Chief Appraiser. AG-USE exemption forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1985 and May 1, 1985.

#### DISABLED VETERANS EXEMPTIONS

These exemptions need not be applied for annually. If you received your exemption on the 1984 tax roll, you will automatically receive it for the tax year of 1985. However, if your disability percentage has changed, you need to report the change to the Chief Appraiser. Deadline for filing new exemptions are between January 1, 1985 and May 1, 1985.

#### RENDITIONS

Taxpayers are reminded that it is still their responsibility to render their property to the Chief Appraiser. These rendition forms are also available at the Appraisal District Office. Deadline for tax renditions are between January 1, 1985 and May 1, 1985.

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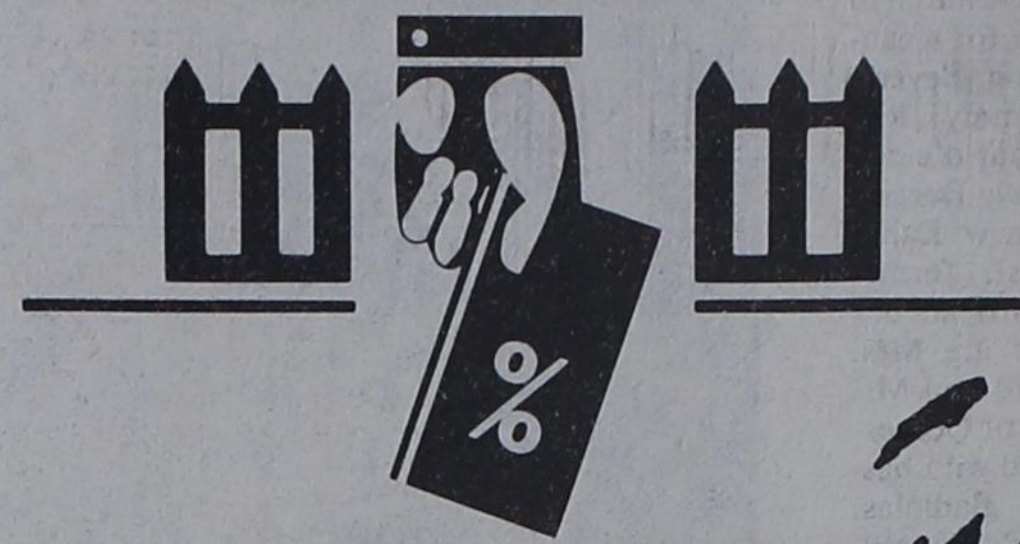

## FARM AND RANCH REPORT

### Fall Is Tree Planting Time

Fall is a beautiful season in many ways and it's the time of the year when you can add to the beauty of your own little "piece of nature".  
Fall is easily the most ideal planting season for most ground covers, vines, shrubs and trees. Here's why.  
The most critical aspect of any transplant effort is for the plant to re-establish an effective system of feeder roots before it is subjected to severe stress. By planting in the fall, new plants have several cool, leisurely months during which to proliferate new feeder roots before the rigors of summer heat and drought set in.

In fact, research indicates that planting now will give plants almost a full growing season advantage over planting next spring. Furthermore, fall planted materials will have enough feeder root development by spring to be able to effectively use an early spring application of fertilizer for even faster growth.  
Fall is also a good time to purchase landscape plants because individual specimens can be rated on the clarity and brilliance of their fall colors.

Finally, nursery and garden center personnel usually have more time to answer questions and help with specific landscape concerns than during the spring rush.  
To get your landscaping project off to a good start, select some authoritative books on do-it-yourself home landscaping. Several free publications are available at the Knox County Extension Office in the county courthouse. Most homeowners don't realize how large many trees and shrubs can get and, as a result, they plant too many, too close together and thus dwarf the house.

Next, choose tough, low-maintenance, pest-resistant plants that are adapted to local environmental conditions. Smart homeowners will avoid poorly-adapted, troublesome or pest ridden plants so common in today's marketplace. Arizona ash, sycamore, cottonwood, poplar, fruitless mulberry, umbrella tree or chinaberry, silver maple, tree-of-heaven, arborvitae and euonymus fall into this category.  
When planting, dig generous holes, backfill with an open, well-drained growing mix, and mulch the soil surface with 6-8 inches of dry grass clippings, leaves, straw or other organic material to moderate soil temperature. Water regularly throughout the fall and winter.

To make your landscaping venture a smashing success, remember three things: enlightened planning, proper plant selection and lots of tender loving care.

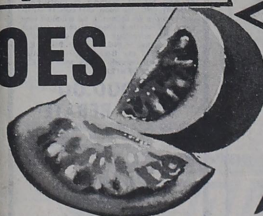

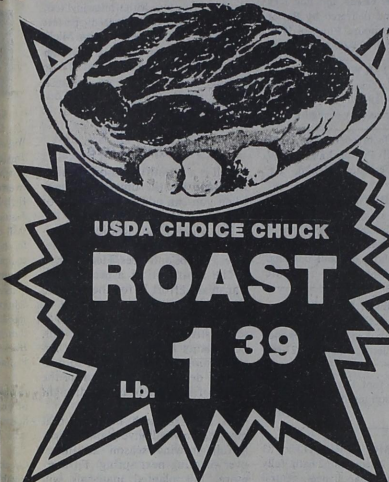
