AT TOWN HALL MEETING

Carriker Addresses Variety Of Subjects

Questions concerning everything from House Bill 72 to the nuclear disposal waste site were asked of State Representative Steve Carriker at a town hall meeting Friday night at the Munday Community Center. The small group attending represented retail merchants, agriculture, elected county officials and the media.

Carriker commented on the small attendance, saying he enjoys the small, informal sessions. "Persons seem to be more comfortable, to be able to speak more freely."

The legislator outlined the purpose of the meeting as a means of communicating with his constituents "face-to-face", trying to let them know what is happening within their state government. He began by explaining that over 4,000 bills were introduced in the 1985 Legislative session, with about 400 of them passing. Of this number, approximately 75 percent were bills of local interest in various regions of the state, so only a few pieces of legislation with statewide significance were passed.

Some of these new laws include the increase in the legal drinking age from 19 to 21, the repeal of the "blue laws", an indigent health care package and the mandatory seat belt laws, which will go into effect in September. Some noted measures that failed to pass this session were any significant legislation to amend House Bill 72, a proposal to create a direct state Presidential primary, a measure to provide alimony in Texas divorce cases and permission for banks to charge fees to credit card holders. One important measure that Carriker fought was the altering of the homestead protection amendment.

He cited some reasons for the shortage of state funds and reviewed some of the methods by which the state added to its budget coffers. The three biggest factors in the loss of revenue, he said, are the decrease in oil production, the general economic welfare and huge slashes in federal funding.

When he requested input from his audience, Carriker fielded questions dealing with water development packages, possibility of future tax increases, HB 72 and recent pesticide rulings.

The audience agreed that an increase to 5 percent in the state sales tax, when added to the local one cent tax, would be a more equitable, cost effective tax to encompass the general public than a state income tax. The sales tax, Carriker said, would be easier to apply and to collect as a means of raising state revenues.

No one, other than Council members, was in attendance.

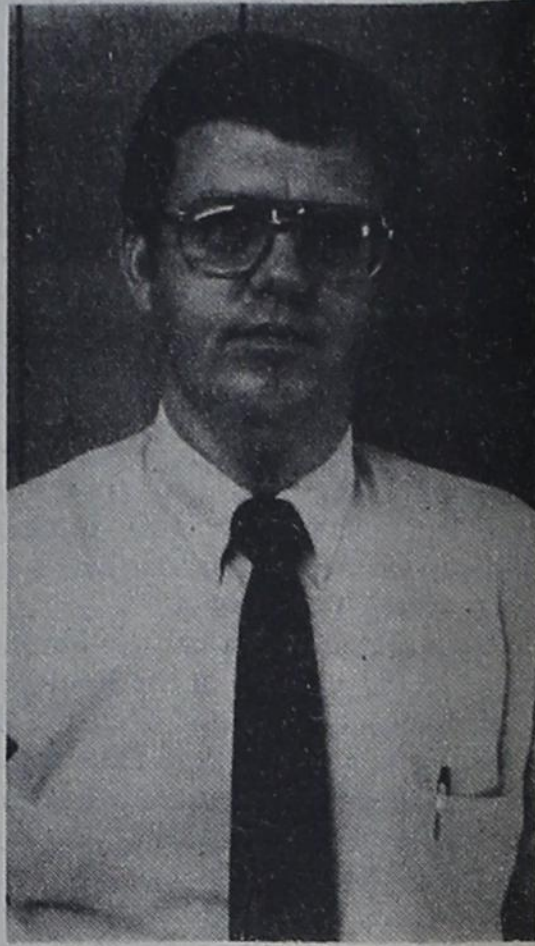
Albus moved the 1985-86 budget as presented be officially adopted by the City Council. Andrade seconded, all members voted in favor.

Moguls Rated #1 In Texas Football Poll

It came as no surprise to local residents when the famed Dave Campbell's *Texas Football* magazine rated the Munday Moguls number one among Texas Class A high school football teams. Union Hill, the team Munday defeated for the 1984 state championship, was rated second.

The rest of the pre-season top ten selected by Campbell includes Runge, Goldthwaite, Godley, Roscoe, Maypearl, Flatonia, Wheeler and Nazareth.

The magazine was quoted as saying, "When opponents line up to play the Munday Moguls, they are literally taking on the entire male student body. Munday has 65 male students enrolled for the 1985-86 school year, notes coach Jim Edwards. Sixty of them will don pads and helmets for the Moguls' junior varsity - which is coming off an undefeated season - or the varsity - the defending Class A state champions."

"Of course, it isn't enough just to have bodies. You need agility - the type that carried Munday's basketball team to the state semifinals. It's also nice to have speed - like the quick-footed Moguls who hotfooted away with the state track title in May."

"Specifically, it helps to have Dent Offutt, Tim Collier, Todd Thompson, Terry Shields and Hollis Adams, the cream of Munday's one and future champions."

"In a conference filled with fine running backs, the Moguls have two of the best in Collier and Thompson, the latter a 4.4 burner in the 40-yard dash. In Offutt, they have Class A's premier quarterback. And in Shields and Adams, Munday boasts two defenders who hit hard and often."

In a synopsis of District 3-A, Campbell mentions Offutt, Collier, Thompson, Kregg Sanders, Shields, Neil Waggoner, Randy Kuehler, Ronny Lowrance, Adams, Russell Smith and Scotty Jackson as players to watch during the coming season. Other teams in the district are Valley, Knox City, Throckmorton, Archer City, Asperment, Chillicothe, Crowell, Windthorst, Motley County, Spur and Bryson.

The Moguls have 30 returning lettermen from last season's undefeated team, with eight offensive and nine defensive starters. Coupled with the playoff experience gained in '84, this adds up to a promising year for the local athletes.

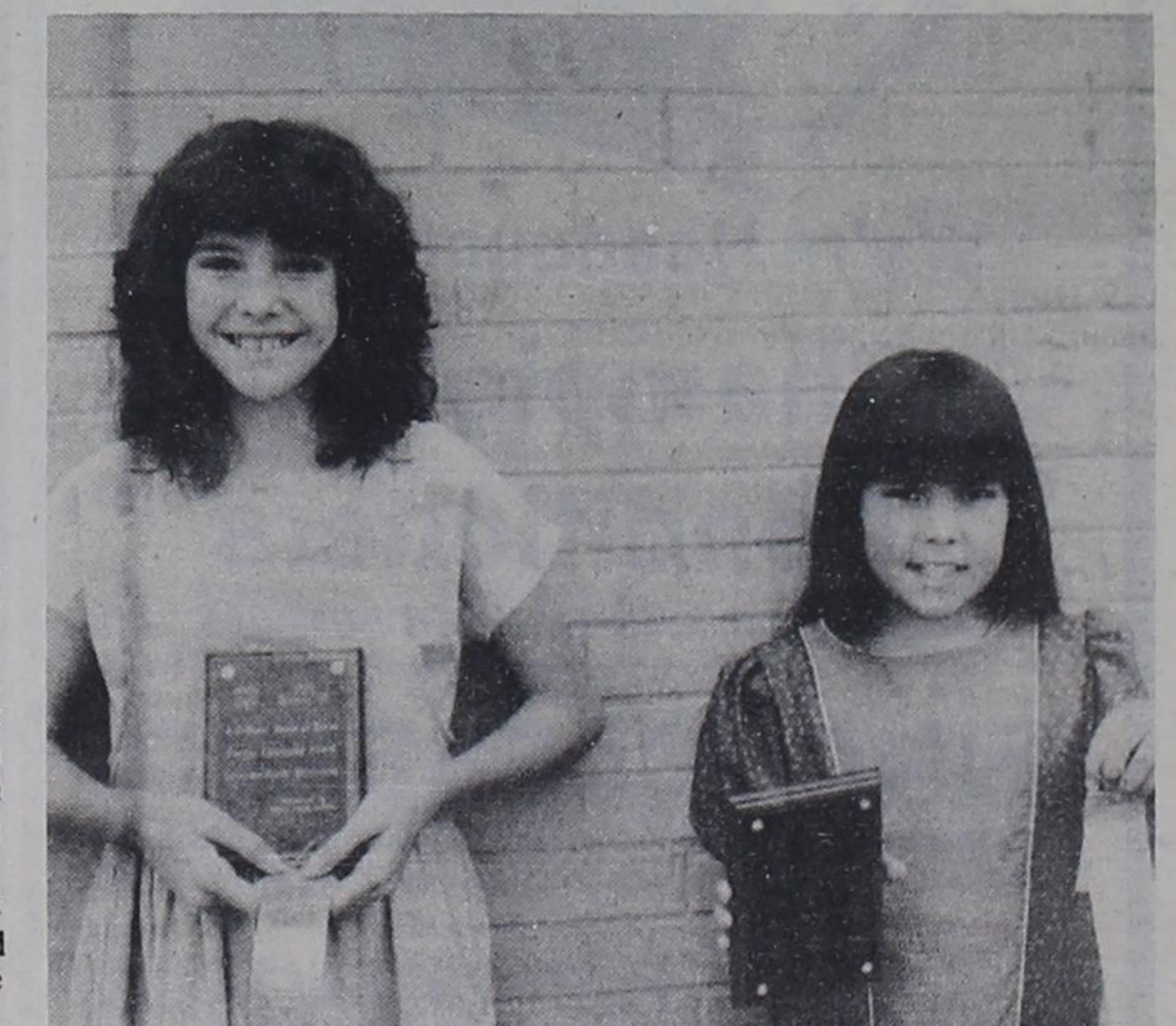
Munday 4-H's Receive Plaques At Design Contest



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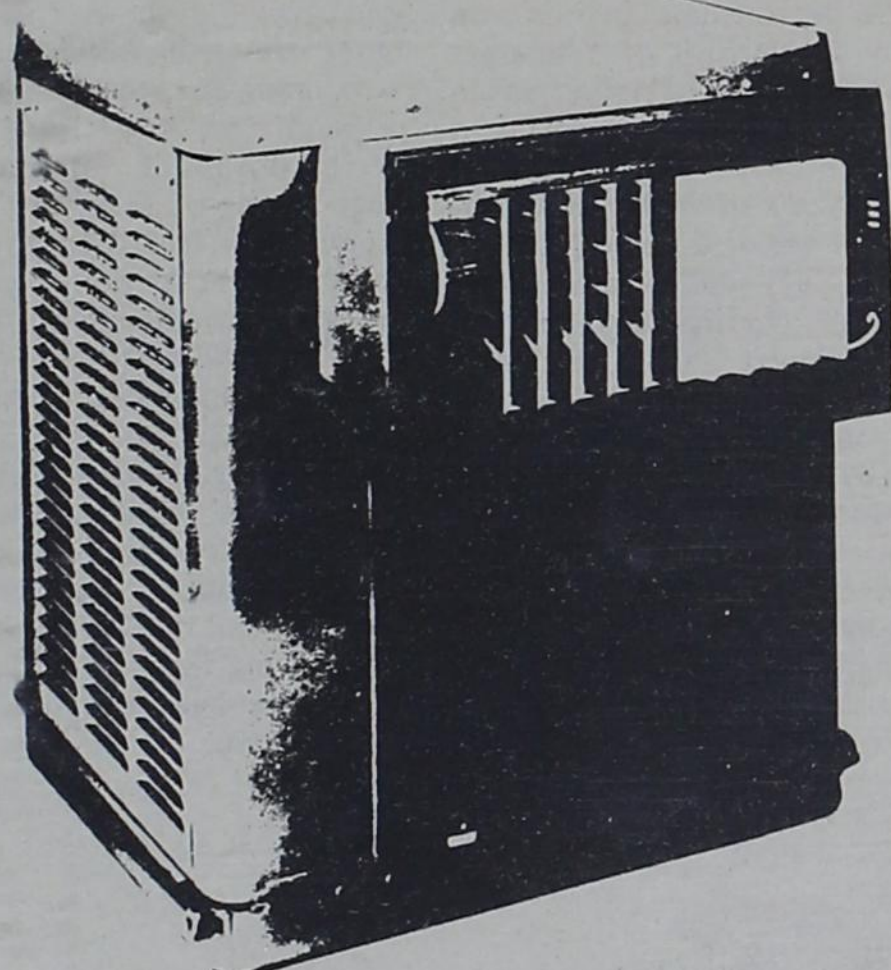
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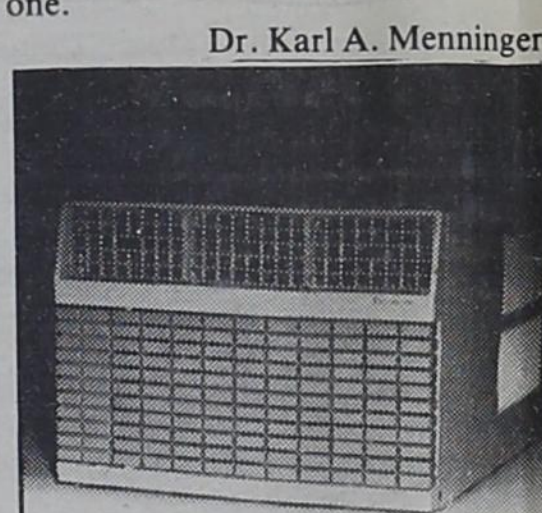

Heat Exhaustion Or Sun-Stroke, What Is The Difference?

Heat exhaustion and sun-stroke are both caused by the same thing - over-exposure to extreme heat. But, they are very different and you should know how to tell them apart.

With sun-stroke, the skin is very hot and very dry. It is more serious than heat exhaustion and a doctor should be called at once. A cold water bath or sponging, ice on the head, moving to a shaded area and undressing can help until the doctor arrives.

With heat exhaustion, the skin is cold and clammy. Move the person to a shady place, keep head lower than the body and loosen tight clothing while waiting for help to arrive.

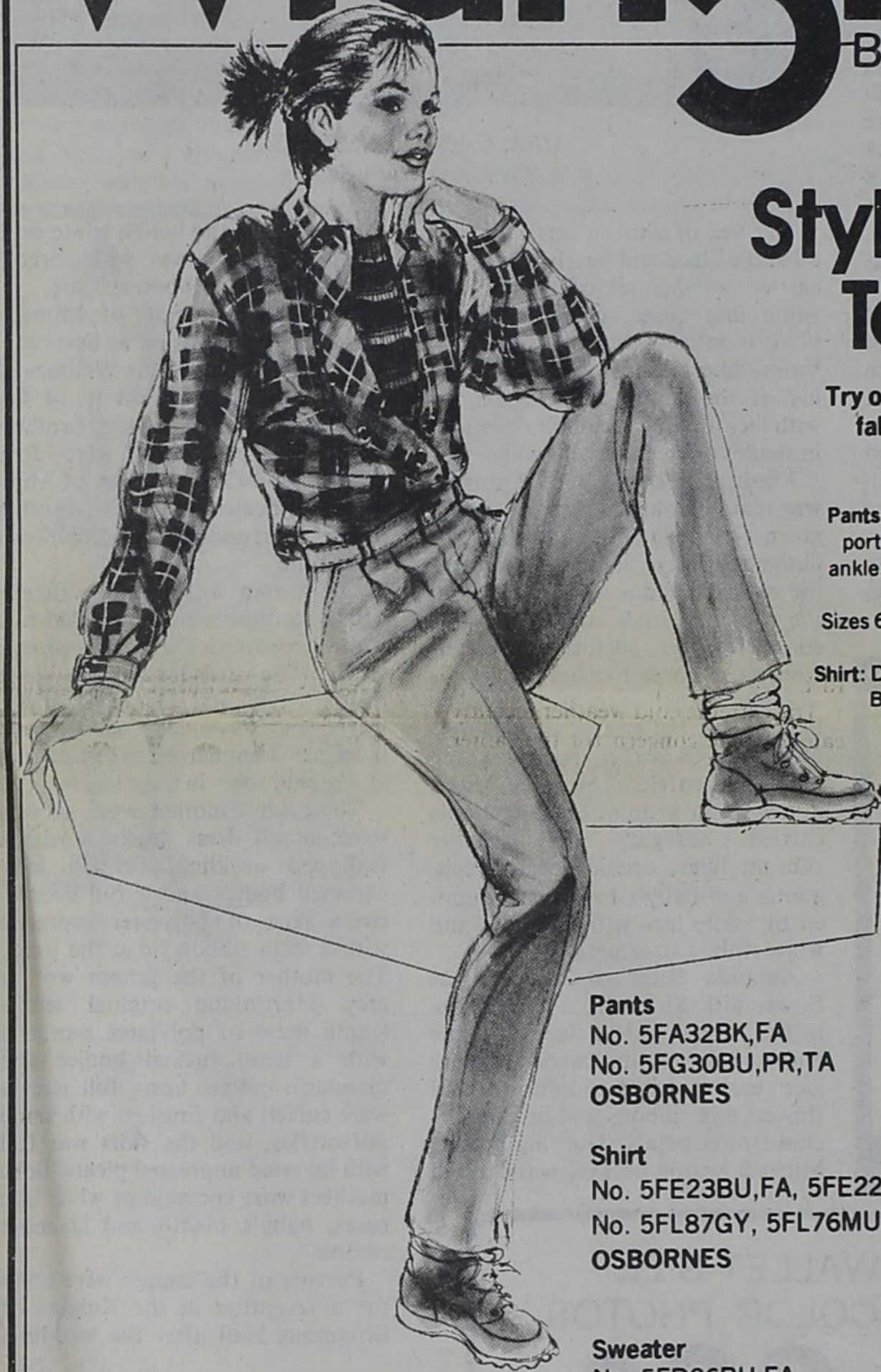

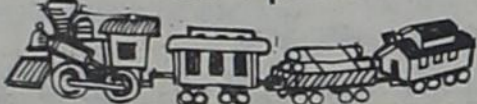

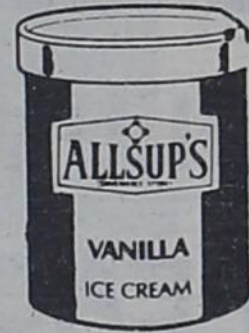

Memories From The Year

The following news articles were taken from the 1966 files of the Munday Courier.

January 13, 1966
Farmer Plows Into Gas Main;
Munday, Goree Without Gas

"I'm just lucky to be here," said E. Hunter, local farmer, Tuesday morning as he appeared in town, his jacket covered with dirt after his moldboard plow tore into a gas main west of Munday. Gas service to Munday and Goree was disrupted for around 925 customers, some for more than 14 hours.

Hunter said he knew the "spewing" was either a gas main or the butane on his tractor after his plow broke into the tapline. He shut off the tractor, went over the top of the machine, then ran until out of danger of the gas.

The disruption affected businesses and schools, as well as residential areas, and the school lunchroom served cold cuts instead of the usual hot lunch.

Operations at the Munday Times were at a standstill for over nine hours, as gas was one of the essential commodities to operation of the linotype machines.

February 3, 1966
Father-Son Team Harvests
35 Lbs. Of Tomatoes Daily
By Joe W. Doby, Knox County Agricultural Agent

Joe Roberts and son, Don, are partners in a greenhouse tomato growing program.

Their greenhouse is 55x105 feet and constructed of lumber and covered with plastic.

The pair is growing Manapel and Florilu varieties of tomatoes. The seeds were planted in boxes August 6 and transplanted in the house September 16 in rows spaced on four foot centers. (The found that they should have been planted on five foot spacing.)

Rows are doubled on each of the intervals. They pruned one row back and will remove it as soon as the fruit on the vines has ripened. This will give them more operating room.

First mature tomatoes were picked before Christmas. Full production was attained after the first of the year. Currently they are gathering 80-85 pounds daily and the pair has been able to market all they have produced without any effort.

The extreme cold weather recently caused some concern for the father and son and they spent the night in the greenhouse, tending the heaters. They came through without any loss.

"It sure is a nice, warm place to work when the ground outside is covered with snow and ice," said the elder Roberts.

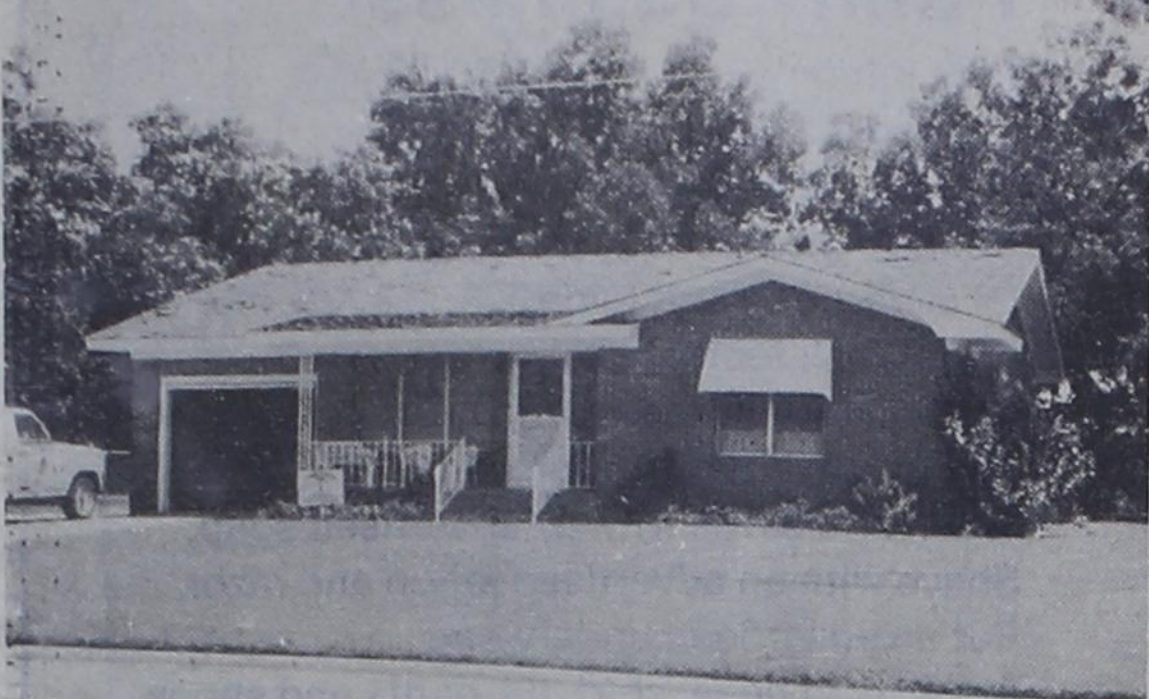

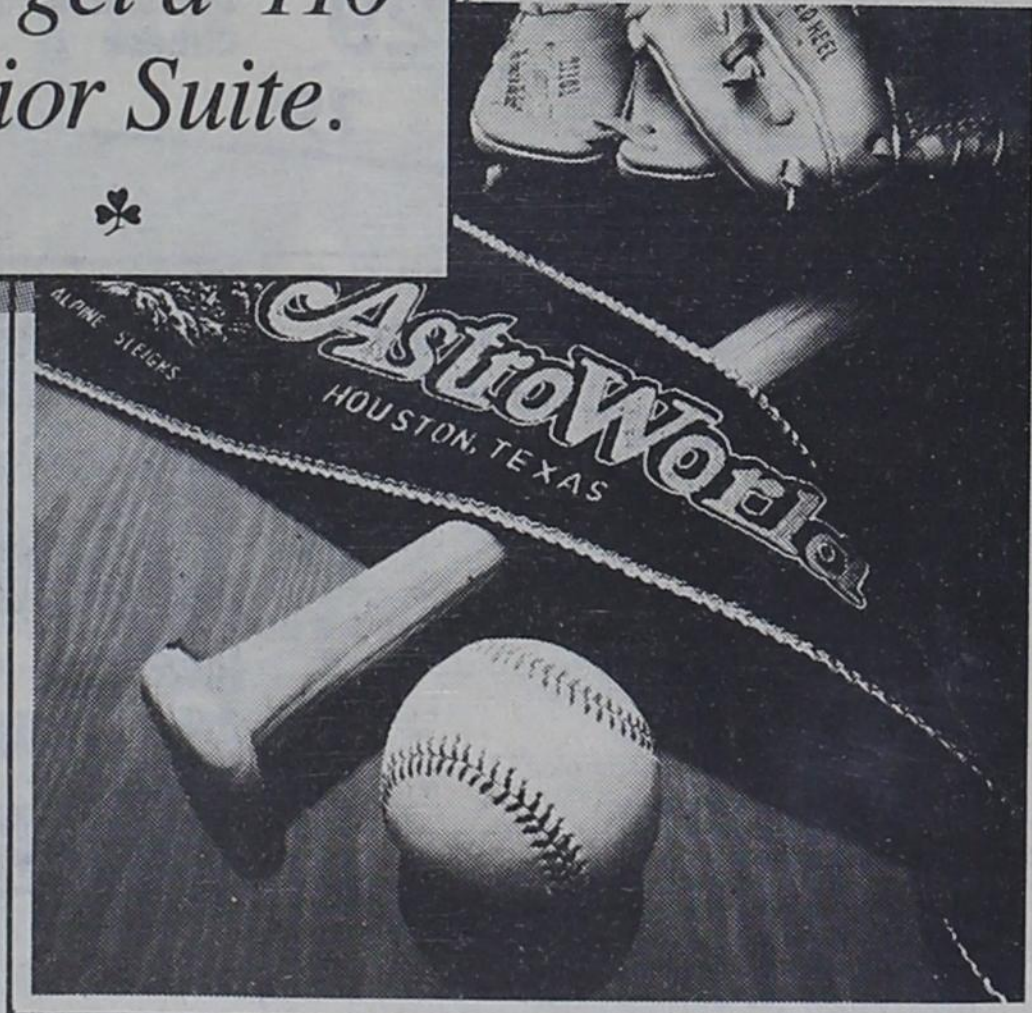

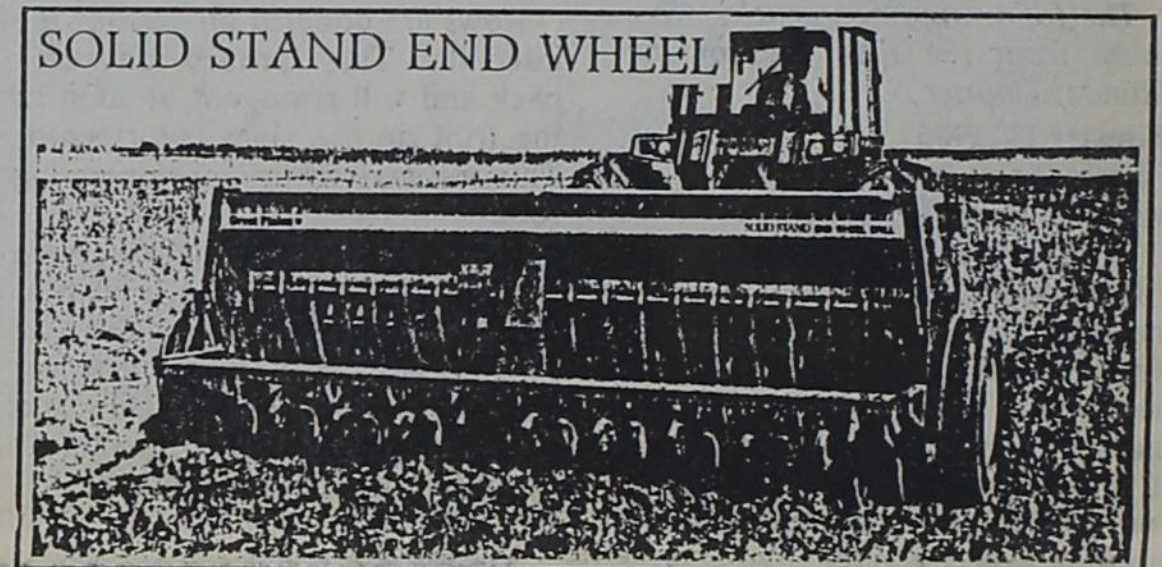

METER TAMPERING NOW A FELONY
The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a term of not more than 10 or less than 2 years. In addition to imprisonment, an individual adjudged guilty of a third degree felony may be punished by a fine not to exceed \$5,000.
Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the loss of service was more than \$200. Under the new law, any meter tampering regardless of the amount of loss is now a felony of the third degree.
Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to:
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device.
(3) Unauthorized activation of electric service.
As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.
All Cooperative meters are sealed. This seal should not be cut or broken without special authorization. In cases where the seal must be cut for emergencies the Cooperative should be notified as soon as possible so that the meter can be resealed.
