## Top Class A Band At Six Flags

The Purple Cloud band at Munday High School has won another honor to add to their list of achievements for the 1985-86 school year. The band was awarded the Best of Class trophy at the Six Flags Invitational contest held Saturday at the Six Flags Over Texas park. The band received two excellent scores and one superior rating from the judges.

A total of 85 performing groups went on stage during the three-day festival. Many bands were from other states, and most of the Texas ensembles were from large high schools, according to Munday director Rodney Pennett. Judges included the Texas University Interscholastic League director of bands and band directors at the University of Oklahoma and the University of South Florida.

Munday played their spring UIL concert entry, which included "Alamo March" by King, "Adventures" by Spears and "Ashton Overture" by Swearingen. The UIL band director from Austin said the Purple Cloud was a well-taught, con-

sistent band and commented that it was one of the finest Class A bands he has ever heard.

Along with the Sweepstakes award given for winning first division ratings in marching, concert and sightreading competitions, the Six Flags invitation and recognition culminates one of the best years a Munday band has experienced in a long time, and the members and their director are to be commended for their accomplishments.

### Musicade

All band students in the Munday school system will be presented in concert at the annual spring Musicade, which is set for 7 p.m. Tuesday, May 13, at the Munday High School auditorium. "150 Years of Music in Texas" will be the theme.

Three performing bands, representing elementary, junior high and high school, will conclude their year at the Musicade, which will be highlighted by the presentation of the outstanding musician in each grade as well as the Director's award and the John Phillip Sousa award.

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### LIGHT TURNOUT SEEN

## Roberson, Sutton To Compete In Runoff

Knox County Precinct 2 voters will go to the polls again June 7 to decide the race for commissioner of that precinct. A light turnout of about 625 votes was registered in the county during Saturday's Democratic primary.

Incumbent commissioner Bobby Roberson of Benjamin outpolled Wayne Sutton of Vera 151-111, but failed to gain the 50 percent of the vote needed to avoid a runoff. The

third contender, Charles Griffith of Benjamin, ran a close race, gaining 98 votes. Thus, Roberson and Sutton will be on Precinct 2 ballots in the June 7 runoff.

Vote counts in Benjamin and Vera were heavy as residents of those towns turned out to make their choice for commissioner, but the counts were much lower in Munday and Knox City, both of which have Precinct 2 voters, and in other county boxes.

Elected unopposed were County Judge David Neil Perdue, County and District Clerk Gloria L. West, County Treasurer Evelyn Balis McBeath, Precinct 4 Commissioner Lee Patterson and Justices of the Peace in Precinct 2, Imgean Young, and in Precinct 4, John Phillips.

County voters chose Andrew Briscoe over Mark White 185-173, but White gained the party's nomination without a runoff. Local polls gave Wellington farmer Doug Seal a 218-203 nod over Don Stribling, and Seal will face Republican incumbent Congressman Beau Boulter in November. Steven Carriker, 78th District Representative, won 428 votes locally to 187 for his challenger, Danny Hunter, following the trend throughout the district. Carriker won an easy re-election bid.

In the Republican primary, about 70 votes were cast. Former Governor Bill Clements gained 32 votes here, followed closely by Kent Hance with 29. Clements won the GOP nomination, setting up a November showdown against incumbent White, who defeated Clements in the last election.

### Conservation Reserve Program Bids Taken

Bids are now being accepted for the Conservation Reserve Program for 1986 and 1987. The program takes highly erodible land out of cultivation for 10 years. Land accepted in the program must be established to permanent grass. Cost shares of approximately 50 percent will be paid to establish the grass. Eligibility for the program is determined by the Soil Conservation Service.

The last day to bid is May 16. For further information contact the local ASCS office or the Soil Conservation Service.

## Moguls Breeze To Track Title

The Munday Moguls wrapped up another regional championship at Shotwell Stadium in Abilene Saturday, qualifying two relay teams and two individual events for the state track meet in Austin May 16-17.

Munday compiled 80 points to take the meet trophy, and the Knox City Greyhounds were second with 52. Munday coach Bill Kingston noted that the district that produced these two teams has to be a tough one.

"It must be very unusual for two teams from the same county to finish first and second at a regional track meet," he pointed out. "I don't know if it's ever happened before."

Robert Lee was a close third with 50 points. First through sixth places counted in the point total but only

the first two places qualified for the state meet.

Jerry Shields, who ran on a state champion relay team last year, will make a trip to Austin to compete in the 200 meter dash. Shields won the race at Abilene with a time of 22.77. Anthony Stinnett placed second in the long jump with a leap of 22'8". Running a first place 43.81 in the 400 meter or sprint relay were Tim Collier, Jerry Shields, Dent Offutt and Todd Thompson, and the team of Shields, J.B. Jones, Curtis Taylor and Stinnett ran a 3:26.74 mile relay that Coach Kingston called "picture perfect."

"Jerry ran a good 50.6 first leg to start us off, then J.B. made it in about 53, even though he was suffering an injury. Curtis stood off a challenge from Cherokee in the third leg for a time of 52.4, and Anthony really blazed it in with a 49.8, pushing off a challenge from Bron- te. It was a great race."

An unhappy note in the meet came when Todd Thompson placed a surprising sixth in his best race, the 400 meter run. Thompson, who is the defending state champion in the event, is still being hampered by a pulled leg muscle he suffered in an earlier meet. The leg was tight and sore Saturday, and made for a pain-

## Producers Can Apply For Disaster Loan

Joe Boone, Knox County Farmers Home Administration supervisor, reminds farmers that the county has been designated as a natural disaster area for crop production loss. The deadline for filing a written application for an FmHA disaster loan is December 3, 1986.

This designation gives the FmHA authority to make emergency actual loss loans for farmers and ranchers whose operations were substantially affected by the disaster. Basic eligibility requirements state that applicants must:

- Be an established farm operation, either an owner or tenant, who was operating and managing the farm at the time of the disaster named above. Applicants can be individuals, cooperatives, corporations or partnerships, and must be U.S. citizens. If the applicant is a cooperative corporation or partnership, more than 50% interest in it must be owned by U.S. citizens and the business must be primarily engaged in farming (must realize over 50% of its income from farming).

- Have the training or experience and ability to repay the loan.

- Show evidence of a qualifying physical loss, or production loss, of at least 30% on one or a combination of similar-type crops.

- Reveal whether suitable credit can be obtained from a lender other than FmHA.

- Provide enough collateral to secure the loan or loans.

FmHA considers Payment-In-Kind (PIK) benefits in figuring whether a producer is eligible. Acres contracted under PIK and Set-Aside are figured as if they produced a normal yield in the disaster year.

Farmers and ranchers who believe they are eligible for an FmHA loan under the requirements listed are urged to file their application as soon as possible, so the FmHA office can process the application more speedily.

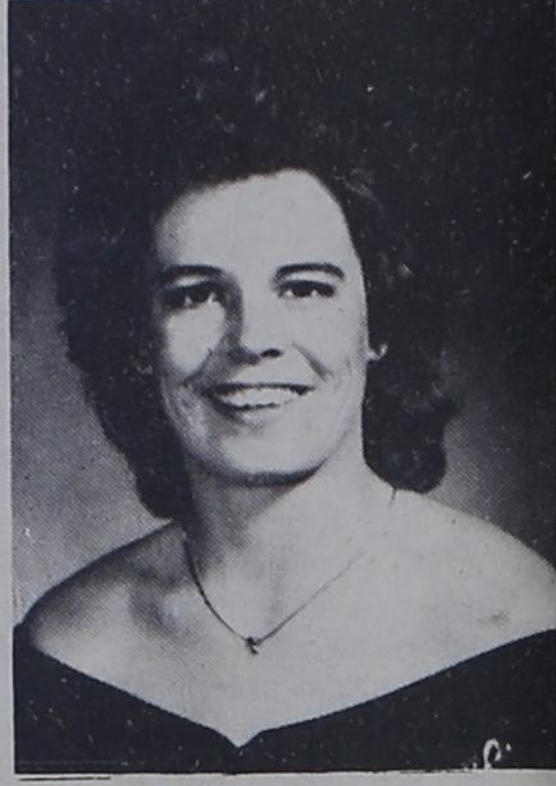

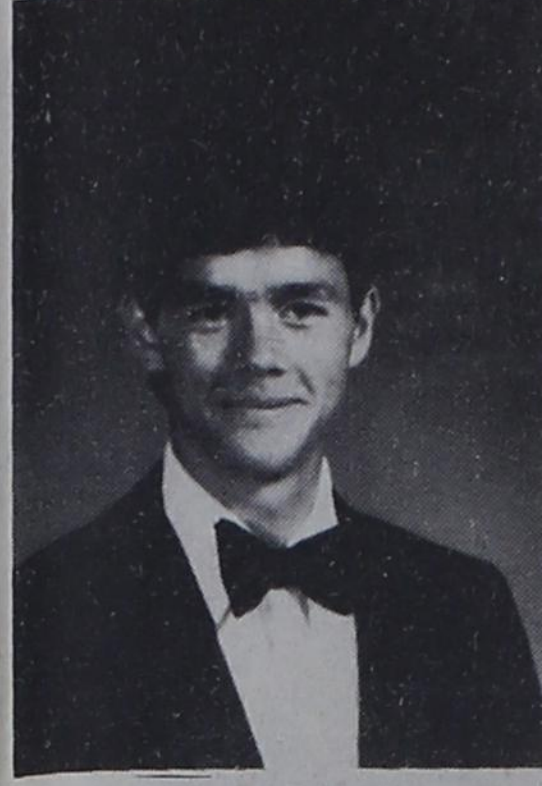

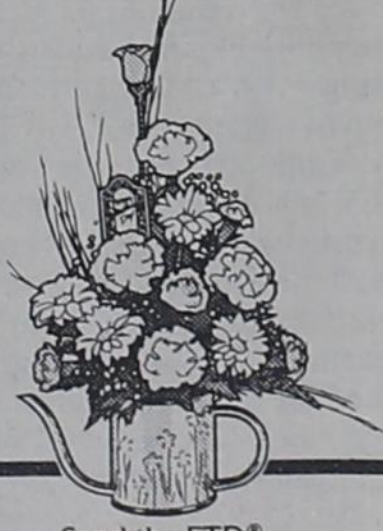

day.

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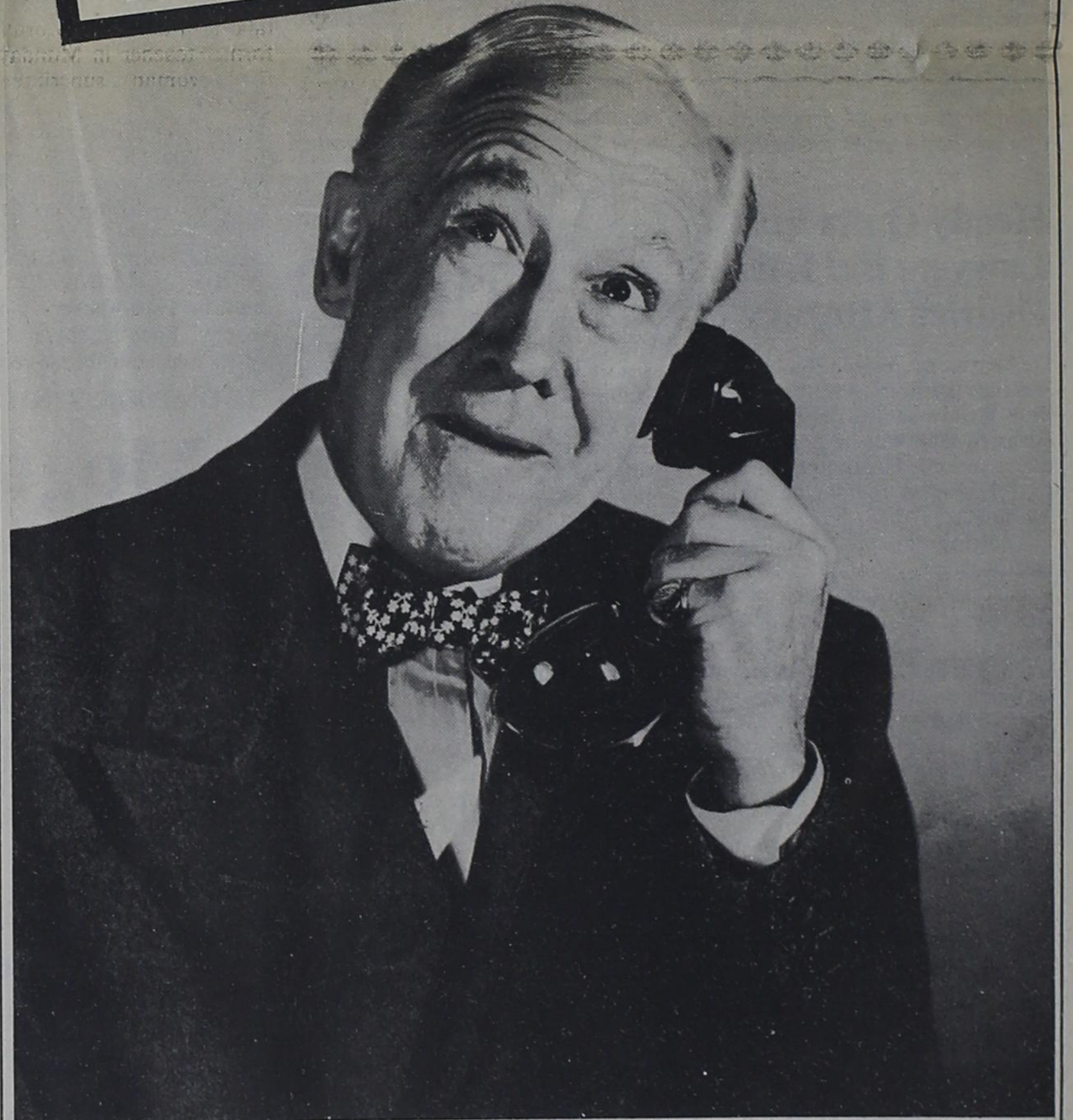
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### ★ TRUSCOTT—GILLILAND NEWS ★

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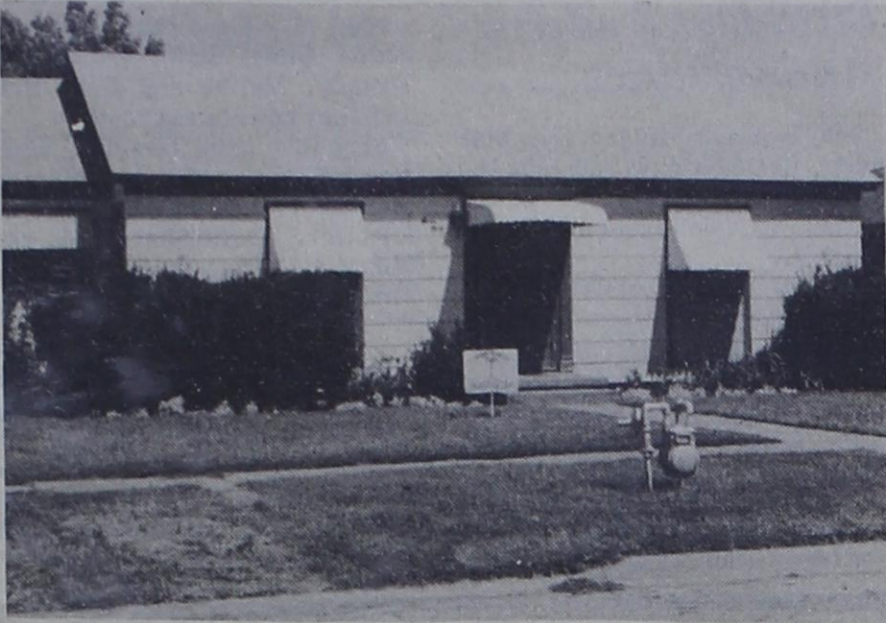
