Letter To The Publisher

Dear Marion,
As a member of the Board of Directors of the City-County Library in Munday, I wish to inform the citizens of Knox County that due to cuts in the federal budget, we will begin a fund-raising program to insure the continued maintenance of our library. We operate on a "shoe-string" budget as it is, so we are asking for support from the people who use the library as well as from those who feel the library is an important service to our county.

We are extremely grateful for the permanent contributors which follow:

Knox County, \$3,000 (The county will soon make a decision on the \$1,500 of this that is revenue sharing funds which will no longer be available.); City of Munday, \$2,400; City of Knox City, \$750; City of Benjamin, \$350.

We also receive help from the United Way of Munday, the amount having been as much as \$1,400 in the past, and we receive some personal donations and memorials. Without all of these yearly contributions, we could not have existed and provided the services we have.

As a member of the Big Country Library System, we offer many services which will no longer be available if we cannot show an annual increase in our budget. Some of these services include money to buy books, audio-visual equipment and large-print book editions.

From Interlibrary Loan we obtain books and information that we do not have. This enables us to find almost anything for UIL contestants and students working on term papers, as well as the everyday reader.

Kathy Bowen, the librarian, offers a Story Hour on Thursdays from 10-11 a.m. Children from 3-5 years of age see a film, listen to a story, participate in activities and check out books. A summer reading program is also available for preschool and elementary children.

As you can see, we do serve Knox County. Our patrons, anyone who checks out books, materials, or equipment, range from Truscott, Gilliland, Knox City, Benjamin, Goree and Munday. We hope to continue to serve these people as well as those who have not yet visited the library.

Our first fund-raiser will be a Bake-and-Book Sale on May 9 from 9-3 p.m. We will be selling donated baked goods and duplicate and out-of-date books and materials in front of the library, which is located on the north side of the square in Munday. Anyone wanting to donate baked goods or money may call 422-4877. Our regular library hours are 10 to 12 and 2 to 5 on weekdays.

Local Man's Home Damaged By Flames

Munday volunteer firemen responded to two calls last week, with both resulting in extensive damage. A cotton stripper on the Olen Coffman place burned during the afternoon of Wednesday, April 15. The fire started in the hydraulic machinery and burned about three-fourths of a load of cotton before being contained by local firemen. The farm is across the river on the Hefner highway, and the cotton was reported to be of good quality.

The following afternoon, the home of R.B. Beal in east Munday was partially destroyed by a cooking fire left unattended. According to fire officials, the kitchen and bedroom of the house were burned, and other rooms and furniture suffered some smoke damage.

Assistance for Beal is being planned by the West Texas Utilities personnel. Donations to help him replace his belongings may be made at the WTU office or at the First National Bank in Munday.

MUNDAY GIRLS PLACE SECOND

Moguls Save Best Effort For District

The Munday Moguls poured it on in the district track meet held Friday, April 17, at Aspermont and completely dominated the boys' division to take their first meet crown of the year. The team has now won district in all three of the major sports activities participated in by area students.

Munday scored 213 points to the 105 accumulated by runner-up Knox City. Other finishers were, in order, Rochester, Aspermont, Rule, Paint Creek, Benjamin and Weinert.

The Mogulettes, after winning three consecutive out-of-town meets, saw their hopes of a district trophy fade away as Knox City's Beatrice McCrary streaked across the finish line to give her team a surprise victory in the 800 meter relay. Knox City won two of the three relays in the girls' division and took the championship by a mere seven points over Munday. Final totals were Knox City, 159; Munday, 152; and third place Aspermont, 66. The rest of the lineup included Goree, Paint Creek, Rochester, Rule, Benjamin and Lueders-Avoca.

Historical Society Committees Formed

Officers and committee members for the Knox County Historical Society were elected at a meeting held April 8 at the Knox County Courthouse.

Directors for 1987 are Clara Brown of Truscott, chairman; Kenneth Roberts of Benjamin, vice-chairman; Marion Cunningham of Goree, secretary; Doris Crownover of Knox City, treasurer; and Kay Looney of Munday, reporter.

As a long-range goal, the society voted to acquire a building to house a Knox County museum. Kenneth Roberts was requested to report on possible historic buildings available in the county at the May meeting. Various fund-raising projects were discussed, and the following committees were assigned:

Historical preservation - Kenneth Roberts and Dovie Partridge; historical markers and research - Frances Coffman and Marion Cunningham; history appreciation - Lucille Moorhouse, Juanita Burnett and Corinne New; finance and budget - Walter Hertel and Doris Jones; advisory - Kay Looney and Doris Crownover.

The Texas State Historical Commission will send an advisor to assist the local society in May or June. The group's major goal will be to promote our Knox County history.

Coach Ron Steele said he felt better after the district meet than he had since track began. "This was the first time I felt like we did what we were capable of doing. The team broke a lot of mental barriers out there Friday - they found they really could accomplish what we had been telling them they could."

The team's confidence level is way up at this point, the coach continued, and he feels they have a shot at the regional title. Eleven Moguls will travel to the regional meet May 2 at McMurry to enter 11 individual events and two relays. Two more will go along as alternates.

Outstanding efforts included that of the mile relay team, which pared its time down to 3 minutes and 25 seconds, which Coach Steele said is the best of any Class A team in the state; the sprint relay, which won in 43.73 seconds; and Anthony Stinnett, who won the long jump and quarter, placed second in the high jump and anchored both relay teams.

Girls' coach Gina Farmer was disappointed for her team, but pleased with their performance. "I saw more character and determination Friday than I've ever seen in any group of girls. But we definitely hated to settle for a close second."

Munday will enter eight individual events and three relays at the regional meet. Eight Mogulettes will travel as the regional team, with a couple more as alternates. "We have a good chance at regional," Miss Farmer said. "We stand to make points in every event we're in, and we should bring home several medals."

She pointed out Robin Reneau's outstanding performance in the two-mile run, Kathy Wilde's in the hurdles and that of Mindy Myers in her three events. "Mindy ran a good mile - she made it look easy."

Other bright spots were the relay teams, which improved their times, and the performances of several of the younger girls who were pressured to place in events in order to gain team points. Eva Campos and Esther Escamilla came in fourth and sixth, respectively, in the mile run, Alicia Cook came up from her preliminary trial time to place a very close fourth in the 200 and Shawna Simpson also brought her preliminary time up to come in sixth in the hurdles, eliminating a Knox City runner from the top six.

The Moguls will run in a regional qualifiers meet at Breckenridge Saturday, with field events beginning at 10 a.m. Running events start at 2 p.m. and all the competitions (See TRACK RESULTS, Page 2)

Showers Return As Spring Weather Proves Unreliable

Tried-and-true forecasters who swore that we would have an "Easter spell" were right - they were just a couple of days late. The cold front that blew in Monday night surprised many area residents who were just getting used to the summery weather experienced last week. As of press time Tuesday, the temperature was still on the cool side - mid-50's - and the city had received about a quarter of an inch of rain.

Rainfall totals varied throughout the area, with some folks around Goree and on east to Bomarton reporting anywhere from half an inch to more than twice that amount. The rain arrived at a perfect time for the wheat crop, which was beginning to need some moisture.

The wheat is showing some signs of freeze damage, but experts are saying that right now it doesn't look as though more than 10 or 15 percent of the crop was hurt. Later varieties or wheat that was grazed later looks good and the rain will provide the moisture needed for growth.

Although most people didn't think we'd need rain for a long time to come, producers said the wheat didn't root down very far because of the wet weather, and when the top of the ground gets dry the wheat needs water. An inch of rain will wet down about four inches of soil, so many farms in the area should be in good shape - for now.

Parenting Seminar Scheduled Tuesday

An Active Parenting Training seminar will be held at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 28, in the Munday Church of Christ. The group is limited to eight to ten parents and babysitters will be provided. The session will last from an hour and a half to two hours.

Sponsored by the Knox County Child Welfare Board, the seminar will be conducted by Greg Sallas, a therapist with the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation in Abilene. Topics for discussion include child-parent relationships, communicating with children, parenting techniques, assertive training, stress in dealing with children and teaching children to accept responsibility for their actions.

Child Welfare Board members hope there will be enough interested in this type of group sharing experience to hold sessions on a regular basis throughout the year. School Officials Concerned About Possible State Cuts

Officials of the Munday Independent School District are facing some real concerns over the future of school finance. Losses of oil value and the possibility of a reduction in state funds will place an additional burden on local taxpayers, according to Doyle Lowrance, school superintendent.

"Munday ISD has maintained a steady tax rate since 1983," Lowrance said, "even though it has lost \$2,863,752 in taxable value. Any reduction in state funds could result in an increase in local taxes. Write your state officials today and urge them to solve the tax problem at the state level."

Lowrance suggests that one solution to the problem would be an ex-

pansion of the sales tax base, and says that Governor Clements, Senator Farabee and Representative Carriker need to hear from every local citizen in regard to this matter. Letters may be addressed to:

IN LOCAL DISTRICT COURT

New Mexico Gunman Gets Prison Sentence

Christopher Wofford, 23, of Lovington, N.M., was sentenced to a ten-year term in the Texas Department of Corrections at district court proceedings in Benjamin last week. Wofford was tried on one count of attempted capital murder.

Jury selection for the trial began Monday, April 13, and testimony was completed Tuesday morning, after which the jury returned a guilty verdict. After lengthy deliberation on the punishment phase, the case was concluded Tuesday night with the jury's assessment of a ten-year prison sentence.

Wofford also faces charges of armed robbery in Archer County stemming from an incident in which he allegedly held up a Megargel liquor store and fired shots at Knox County DPS trooper Brian Williams and Knox County Sheriff's Department deputy Randy Russell when they stopped him west of Benjamin. A second count of attempted capital murder is pending against Wofford in Knox County, but officials say another trial here is improbable.

In other district court action, Jesse Tennison of Benjamin ap-

peared on the state's motion to revoke probation. Tennison, who was on probation in Knox County for burglary, was recently extradited from Alabama, where he was arrested on theft charges. He was found to have violated the terms and conditions of his probation and was sentenced to serve six years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

District Judge David Hajek presided over both cases and the prosecution was represented by District Attorney Tom Schrandt.

Baseball Tryouts, Workday Planned

Tryouts for 1987 PeeWee League teams in Munday will be held Saturday morning, April 25, at the local baseball field. All eligible youngsters are urged to be at the field that morning. In addition, coaches are needed for three PeeWee League teams, so any adults interested in assisting with the program will be welcome at the tryouts.

Adult help is also requested that afternoon, when the annual Little League workday is scheduled. There will be a job for everyone as volunteers get the field in shape for the summer baseball season. Those planning to help with the workday are asked to bring the necessary equipment.

Postal Exam To Be Given Locally

Munday Postmaster Dolores Lambeth said the Postal Service will accept applications from qualified persons wishing to take an entrance examination for a position at the Munday Post Office from April 27 to May 1. Applications for the exam will be available from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. during that week.

The position open is that of a clerk and carrier, level 5. Salary for the position is \$10 per hour. An announcement listing full details is posted in the lobby of the Post Office.

In order to be considered qualified, applicants will be required to take a written examination designed to test aptitude for learning and performing the duties of these positions. The exam will be given at a date to be announced.

Pre-Enroll Children For Kindergarten Class

Parents of children who will be five years old on or before September 1, 1987, are reminded to pre-enroll these youngsters for the 1987-88 kindergarten class. Pre-enrollment services are available at the elementary principal's office during any school day.

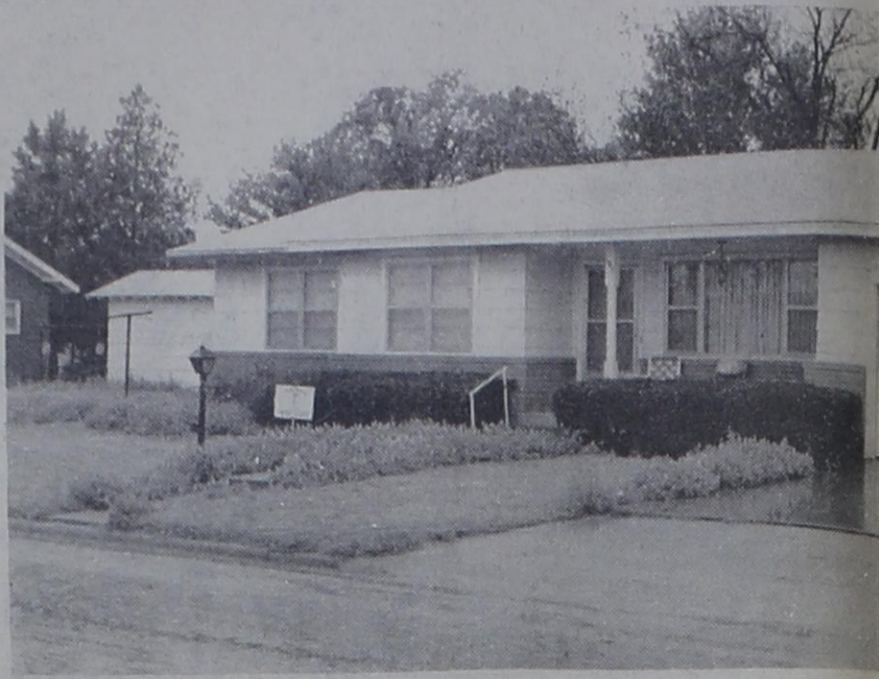
She was born January 14, 1927, in Munday and had lived here all her life. She married Coy B. Jennings December 5, 1947, and he preceded her in death in 1982.

of the current 15 board members will expire. W.R. Moore Jr. of Munday, representing District III, is one of the outgoing directors.

The Wheat Producers Board was formed in 1971 in the Panhandle-North Texas area as a self-help program to enhance the value of wheat in Texas. The board was expanded state-wide in a producer referendum in 1985. Since the group's organization, wheat production has increased from 3.5 million acres producing 31.4 million bushels valued at \$37.3 million in 1971 to a high of 8.1 million acres producing over 187 million bushels with a value of over \$700 million. Today the producer value continues to exceed \$500 million even with almost a third of the acres idled under government set-aside programs.

Farmer-elected chairman Cagle Kendrick said much of the shift was caused by changing government programs, market conditions and economics of production versus other crops, but that the board's role has been to help bring order to the burgeoning crops production, marketing, storage, transportation and world demand.

Any farmer producing wheat in Texas is eligible to vote for a board member in the district in which he farms. District III includes Childress, Hardeman, Foard, Knox, Throckmorton, Haskell, Archer, Baylor, Wilbarger, Wichita, Young and Clay counties.

Any person qualifying to vote in the election may place his name in nomination for a six-year membership on the board by application to the organization, signed by himself and at least ten other persons eligible to vote in his district, at least 30 days prior to the final election date (June 8). Applications should be sent to the headquarters at 600 Texas Commerce Bank Building, 2201 Civic Circle, Amarillo, TX 79109.

The election will be held by mail ballot, which will be provided to all eligible voters 15 days prior to the election. Qualified voters who do not receive a ballot 15 days before the election date should obtain one at Agricultural Extension Service offices as provided by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

Letter To The Editor

To the Editor:

House Bill 2321 was recently introduced in the Texas House of Representatives and has been referred to the Committee on State Affairs. This bill includes provisions that will require an environmental impact statement followed by thorough review by various state agencies before the Texas Railroad Commission can issue a permit for eminent domain for oil, gas or other minerals pipeline construction. The bill further provides that notice be given to landowners and counties through which the pipeline route is proposed and public hearings be held.

House Bill 2321 represents legislation that will provide greater protection of our most valuable resource -- water -- by assuring pipelines are not constructed where irreparable harm would result should leaks occur.

Public support is essential for the bill to be presented for House vote. In order to insure that the Committee is made aware of your concern in this regard, please contact your State Representative and State Senator voicing your support of House Bill 2321. All Texas State Representatives' addresses are Box 2910, Austin, 78769 and all State Senators' addresses are Box 12068, Austin, 78711. The Texas Legislature will consider this bill soon.

READING SALE ADS

Beware of misleading sale advertising. When looking for bargains, your best protection is to be a comparison shopper and to be familiar with current prices on brand-name merchandise. However, don't rely on so-called "list" prices unless there is no competition. Don't be misled by terms such as:

"Percentage off" -- OFF what??
"Half price" -- a legitimate term, if truthful; just make sure you know half of what price.

"Famous labels you will recognize. We cannot print them." -- Why can't brand names be included in an advertisement??

Read the fine print -- "as is", "irregular", or "slightly damaged." Check for flaws or damage, although some can be repaired and be good buys.

Remember this:
January is the month for store-wide clearance sales.

February offers Washington's birthday sales on winter clothes and sportswear.

March brings winter clothing.
April means sales on Easter fashions and coats.

May features Mother's Day sale

including lingerie and handbags.

June brings Father's Day sales.

July features 4th clearances.

August has a variety of sales -- summer clothes, furs, back to school.

September -- more back to school.

October features Columbus Day specials, school and fall clothes.

November means Thanksgiving and Christmas.

MICROWAVE MANIA

Be careful with microwave popcorn -- there's a slight danger of damage and the popcorn may be fired out. If you still want to try microwave popcorn, first check the cookbook that came with your oven. Many food product packages offer information and directions BUT they may not apply to your oven.

To speed ripening of an avocado simply microwave one avocado on high setting for 15-20 seconds. Allow the avocado to rest for 20 minutes on countertop (This is very important as the heat within the food will continue to transfer and increase while the food rests). The process may be repeated after the 20 minute rest if more ripening is needed. **DO NOT MICROWAVE** for periods longer than 20 seconds without rest periods.

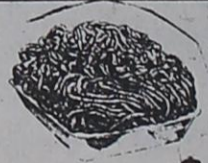

CUTTING TRACTOR FUEL USE

With the spring planting season at hand farmers should have their tractors in good running order to keep operating costs down.

Attention to a few details can help farmers reduce fuel consumption in farm machinery, whether gasoline or diesel powered.

Perhaps the most neglected item on any engine is the air cleaner. A dirty air cleaner can cut down the amount of free air flow and change the fuel-air mixture. A tractor operating at full load needs about 1,200 cubic feet of air to burn one gallon of fuel. Anything less cuts down on power and increases fuel consumption.

Tractor engines also should operate at the proper temperature, usually 180 to 190 degrees F. Engines operating at lower temperatures because of faulty thermostats use more fuel, exert less power and wear out faster.

Farmers can save as much as 400 gallons of fuel a year, based on 800 hours of tractor operation, by cutting down the time an engine idles. Studies show that tractors idle as much as 12 percent of the time and use half a gallon of fuel an hour at idle speed. A fast idle will use 40 percent as much fuel as the tractor engine needs at full load.

So, pay careful attention to idle time when operating a tractor, make sure the engine thermostat is

operating properly, and service the air cleaner regularly. These practices can reduce operating costs, and that's critical for 1987.

WHEAT FIELD DAY AND TOUR

The Texas A&M University Research Station at Munday and the Knox County Extension Program Council Crops Committee have scheduled a wheat field day and tour for 8 a.m. Monday, May 4. The program will begin at the station headquarters located on the east side of Munday on Highway 277.

It's dangerous to park alongside a road with only your parking lights on when it's dark or rainy and visibility is bad. Drivers approaching from behind may not realize that you are stopped at the side of the road and may follow your taillights, resulting in a rear-end collision. Prevent this by using your flashing hazard lights.

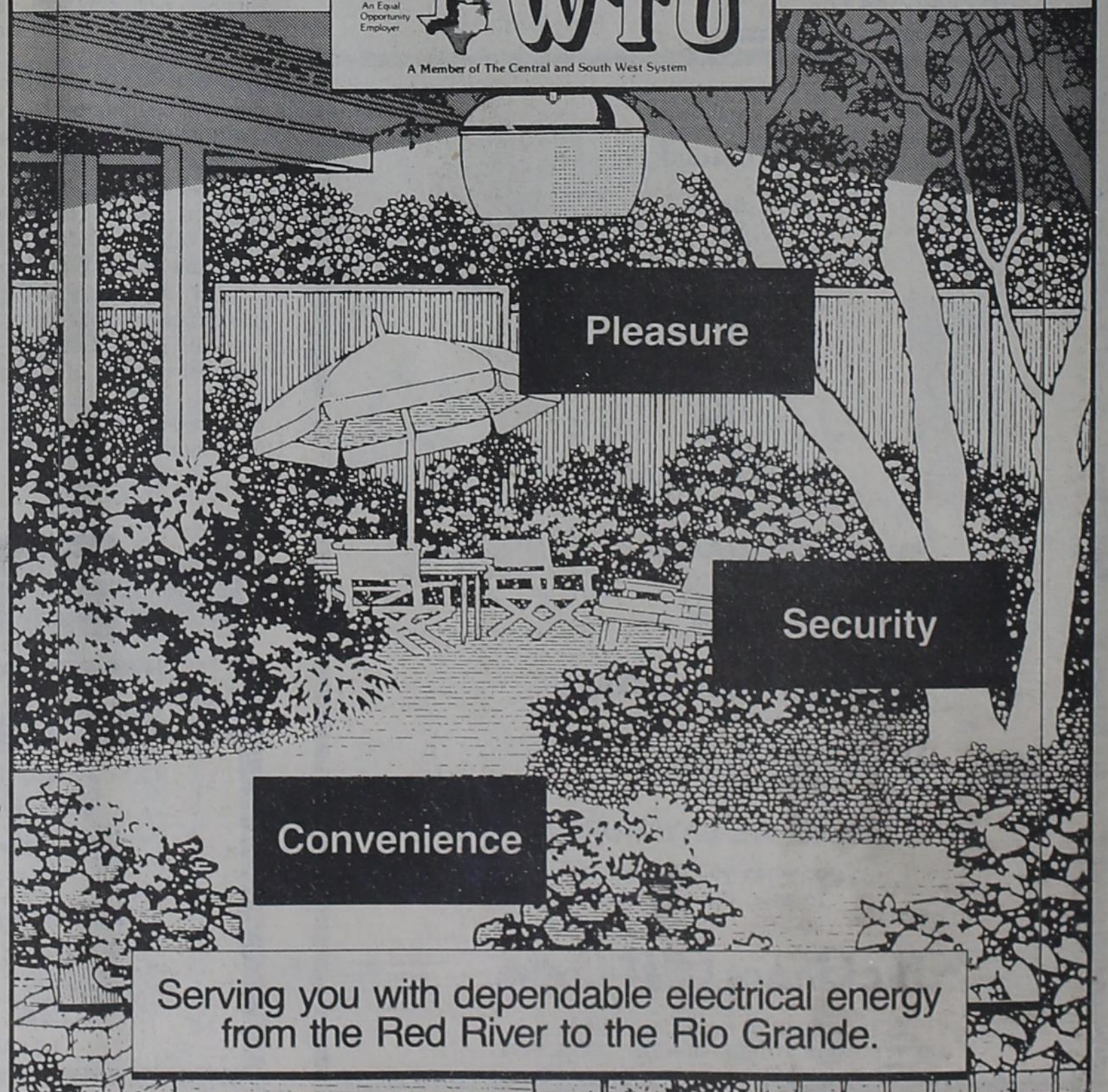

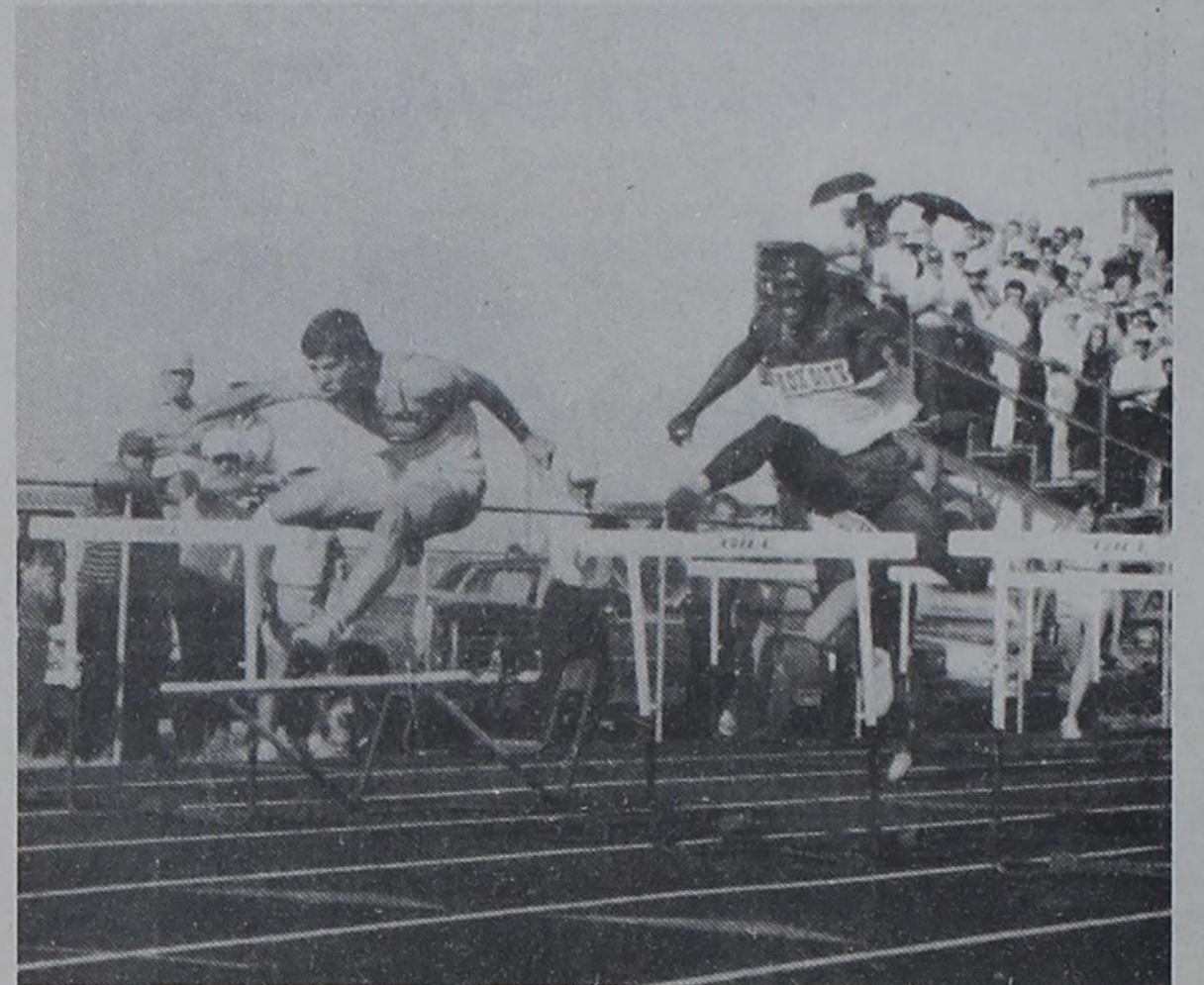
Munday Pioneer Dies In Sherman

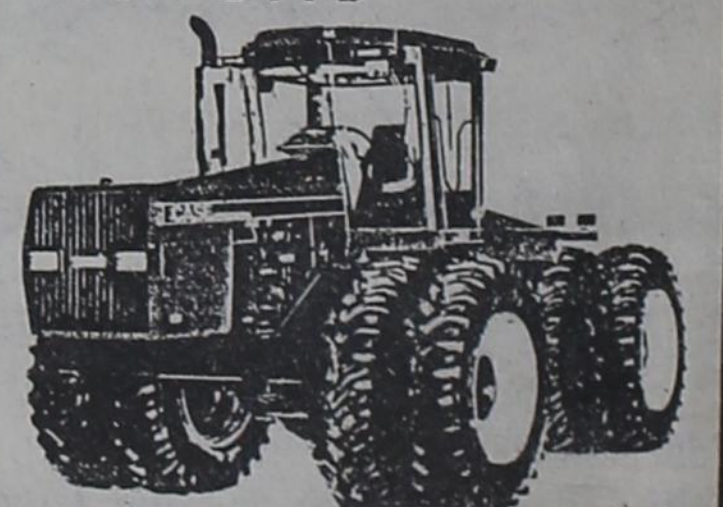

Small Microwave Not As Powerful As Larger Ovens

The compact microwave ovens that have become a fixture in many singles' apartments, college dorms and office lunch rooms can't perform like the large ovens. The difference, says home economist Dr. Susan Quiring, is in the cooking wattage. "Most microwave recipes and package directions on prepared foods are developed for ovens with wattage outputs of 600 to 700 watts. The smaller ovens typically have lower wattage outputs from 400 to 500 watts," explains the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service specialist. She says that one of the factors that determines cooking speed is output wattage. If it's less than 600 watts, cooking times may be 20-30% longer than times recommended in the directions. "It's still best to check the food at the time stated," Quiring says, "then more time can be added if necessary." Cookware may fit too tightly for even heating of food in some compact ovens, says the home economist. If the dish seems too large for the oven, she advises making smaller portions or using two smaller containers and cook each separately. Quiring reminds oven users to make sure the food doesn't touch the top of the oven. It should be 2-3 inches from the top for even heating and to prevent damage to the oven. "Before using any foil in the oven, check the manufacturer's instructions," emphasizes the specialist. "Then, if you are using an approved foil container or foil for shielding it should be at least one inch from the oven walls. If it's too close, small lightning-like flashes can occur, causing damage to the interior of the oven." She also suggests checking the manufacturer's manual to see if there are some foods that cannot be prepared in your oven. Popcorn, for example, may not be suitable for cooking in all low-wattage ovens. "If you don't have the oven manual and are unsure of it's wattage, check with a local dealer that carries that model, or write the manufacturer," says Quiring. ***** Steak is 74 percent water by weight.
