days. Do not desiccate more cotton than can be stripped within a three week period.
Before desiccation, watch the five Before desiccation, watch the five
day weather forecasts and reports of impending hurricanes. Long delays
in harvest following desiccation can be expensive. The uncertainty of Rolling Plains weather is the biggest gamble associated with this practice. The two desiccants that are com-
monly used in the Rolling Plains include arsenic acid and paraquat. Both materials are marketed under a number of trade names. Arsenic acid is applied at 1 to $11 / 2$ quarts per
acre in five to ten gallons of water per acre. Paraquat rate of application is $1-2$ pints per acre in at least ten gallons of water by ground application or at least three gallons of
water per acte by aerial application water per acre by aerial application.

## WTU Refund Is Due This Month

West Texas Utilities Co. cus-
tomers will receive another fuel tomers will receive
refund this month The refund, requested by the company, was approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas
and will total about $\$ 4.6$ million This includes actual over-collection This includes actual over-collections
of fuel costs from December 1986 through July 1987, plus interest. The refunds will be credited to customer bills. A typical residential
customer will receive a little more customer will receive a little more
than $\$ 7$. This is the sixth refund made to WTU retail customers since the summer of 1985. The fuel rates charged to cus-
tomers have been adjusted with every refund, but the price of natural gas, WTU's main power plant boiler fuel during the period has continued to decline.
