IN STATE TRACK COMPETITION

Munday Stars Ready To Take On Austin

A host of Munday sports fans will converge on Austin this weekend for the state track and field competition, which will be taking place Friday and Saturday at Memorial Stadium. Five Moguls and six Mogulettes, plus alternates, are gearing up for the meet in practice this week.

Slated for two busy days are Kathy Wilde, who is entered in two individual events and two relays; Mindy Myers, who will defend one state title and try to win two more in addition to running on a relay; and Anthony Stinnett, who will enter two individual contests and two relays. Perry and Terry Collier and Trey Thompson will each compete in individual events and two relays.

Other Munday contestants are Mogul Lowell Hutchens and Mogulettes April Offutt, Alicia Cook, Angie Offutt and Eva Campos. Alternates for the teams will be Chad Bordovsky and Marc Andrade for the boys and Denise Kuehler, Jae-Jae Reneau, Robin Reneau and Esther Escamilla for the girls.

Wilde's triple jump is scheduled for approximately 9 a.m. Friday. The girls' high jump competition, which will feature Myers, is set for 3 p.m. Stinnett will long jump at 4 p.m. and Hutchens will perform in the shot put at 8 p.m.

Saturday's schedule for Munday participants includes the 400 meter relay for both teams, 9:30 a.m.; 800 meter run, Myers and Thompson, 9:50 a.m.; Wilde's 100 meter hurdles, 10:10 a.m.; the girls' 800 meter relay, 10:55 a.m.; the 400 meter dash, Stinnett and Perry Collier, 11:10 a.m.; the 200 meter dash for Terry Collier, 11:45 a.m.; the 1600

meter run, Myers, 12:05 p.m.; and the 1600 meter relay for both teams, 12:40 p.m.

Karnack is the defending champion in both boys' and girls' divisions of the Class A state track meet, and it should be a great contest between Karnack and Munday for the titles this year. *****

Registration will be limited to no more than eight teams because of time, and teams will be accepted on a first come, first serve basis.

Incumbents, Reed Win Election Seats

Munday's two incumbent councilmen won their jobs for another two years in the city election Saturday, and the Munday Independent School District board of trustees will welcome a new member at their next meeting.

Gene Brown was the top vote-getter in the city election, drawing 138 ballots. Richard Albus received 106 votes for the other council seat. Challenger David Booe and Gary Howry took 100 and 39 votes, respectively, and Stan Decker got ten write-in votes for city council.

Munday mayor Doris Dickerson received 141 votes in his unopposed bid for re-election, while Bill Smith garnered one write-in vote.

In the race for a two-year unexpired term on the school board, Floyd Reed Jr. got the nod over Larry E. Smith by a margin of 119 to 76 votes. The three incumbents who regained their seats without opposition were Joe Tidwell, 182 votes; John B. Reneau III, 176; and Dan Offutt, 171. Their terms are for three years each.

Knox County voters elected Jerry Williams of Knox City and Vernal Zeissel of Munday to the county hospital district board of directors. Williams, a board appointee who was filling an unexpired term, got the most votes with 448, and Zeissel was right behind with 433. Roland

Marion of Knox City came in third in the election with 344 votes. Write-in votes were received by Claudell Bratcher, 2; Carl Coulston, 1; and E.D. Richards, 1. All these men are from Vera.

Robert Coffman received 12 write-in votes to land on the Goree city council along with incumbents Bob Presnall and Barton Carl, who got 23 and 22 votes, respectively. Margie Allen, an incumbent who chose not to run for re-election, received eight write-in votes.

Incumbent Goree school trustee

Darrell Patterson got 27 votes in his re-election bid, and Richard Hutchens drew 32 votes for the other school board seat. Incumbent Wayne Birkenfeld declined to run this year.

Knox City incumbent councilmen Larry Staggs and Jonathan Godsey retained their seats and will be joined on the city council by Joe Barnard. The three men handily defeated Charles Auburg, Kenneth Crownover and Buddy Angle for the council spots.

Incumbent Donnie Roberts and

Dale Turner were elected to the Knox City-O'Brien Consolidated School District board of trustees over Rob Harrison. *****

REMEMBER BLOODMOBILE MONDAY

Giving Blood Easy And Safe For Donors

Healthy blood donors are needed Monday, May 16, when the Red Cross Bloodmobile comes to Munday. Blood donations will be accepted from 2:45 to 6:30 p.m. at the Munday Community Center.

Donating blood is an easy job and a rewarding one. A healthy donor can give up to five pints of blood a year with no harmful effects. However, according to Dr. George F. Sheldon, a member of the Board of Regents of the American College of Surgeons, our nation's blood supply periodically has dipped to alarmingly low levels because not enough people have volunteered their services as blood donors. In fact, it has been estimated that of all the people who are eligible to donate blood, only five percent actually do so.

Some experts believe that one reason for this decline may be the unfounded fear that many potential donors have about contracting AIDS by giving blood. Unfortunately, a few years ago a number of people who received blood transfusions did contract the disease before it was identified as a major public health problem and before antibody tests were available to keep the nation's blood supply safe. But according to the American Association of Blood Banks, not one single person has contracted the AIDS virus through the process of blood donation.

It is important to know that bloodmobile attendants use only sterile and disposable equipment in drawing blood from donors, so when a person gives blood, the equipment is used its first, last and only time on that person. Therefore, says Dr. Sheldon, one cannot contract AIDS or other diseases such as hepatitis by being a blood donor.

Democrats To Pick November Nominee For State Senate

Knox County Democratic party chairman David Counts of Knox City will join 29 other county chairmen in the 30th Senatorial District at a meeting in Seymour on Saturday, May 14, to choose a nominee to replace former Senator Ray Farabee on the ballot in the November general election.

A great deal of controversy has erupted from the county chairmen's decision to name a nominee before the August 13 special election, which will result in the election of a senator only for the remainder of 1988. Counts clarifies the matter thusly:

The August 13 election is an open election, and filing is open for some time yet. If several candidates file for the short-term seat, the winner may have only received a small percentage of the vote, much of which may be of a cross-over party nature. Therefore, the county chairmen wish to name an announced candidate who they feel represents the wishes of the majority of Democratic constituents in the district.

Due to time problems which may result in the event of a runoff, naming a candidate before August will also save finances and resources and will shorten the campaign, Counts said.

The complications arose when Senator Farabee resigned to take a position with the University of Texas. Governor Bill Clements called the special election for August instead of taking advantage of last Saturday's statewide city and school district elections. Farabee's name is still on the ballot for the November election, and he has announced that he will remove his name from contention the day after the special election.

Area Court Cases Heard In Benjamin

Several district court cases were heard by Judge David Hajek in Knox County proceedings last week. District attorney Tom Schrandt and county attorney Bobby D. Burnett represented the prosecution.

Charles McCrary was arraigned on charges of burglary of a vehicle. Pretrial motions were considered on behalf of Linda McCrary, who is charged with theft. A trial date will be set later.

Pretrial motions were also heard in the cases of Rudy Jacques and Lonnie Collier. Jacques is charged with delivery of cocaine, and Collier faces three counts of delivery of marijuana. A trial date has yet to be set. Appointment of counsel was requested in the case of Anita Collier, charged with delivery of marijuana. Pretrial motions will be considered next month.

Derrick Hardin appeared in court on a charge of burglary of a vehicle. Appointment of counsel was requested, and pretrial motions will be heard in June.

Reggie Cruse appeared in court on the state's motion to revoke probation. Finding that the defendant had violated the terms and conditions of his probation, the judge ordered a 60-day jail sentence, with fines and fees to be paid within 120 days.

Freddie Murray pled guilty to a charge of burglary of a vehicle and was sentenced to serve eight years in the Texas Department of Corrections. Murray had previously been tried in Baylor County on charges of theft over \$750 and a motion to revoke probation. He was sentenced to a pair of eight-year terms in those actions, and Judge Hajek ruled that the three eight-year sentences could be served concurrently.

The Goree community picnic will end on a musical note Saturday night, May 14, when a country music show will follow the men's leg contest and the original hat parade, which is set for 7 p.m.

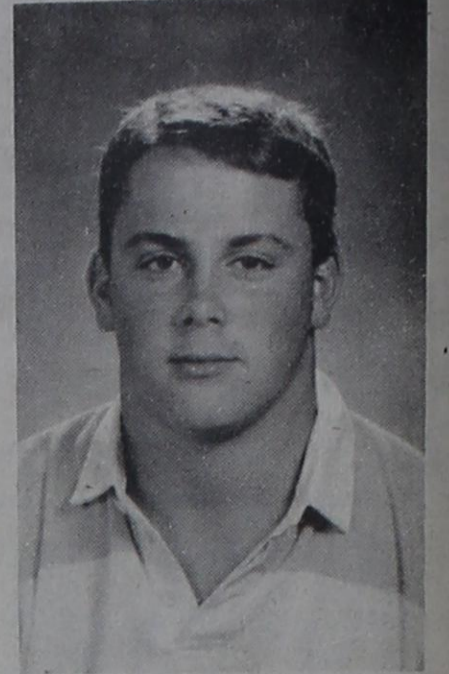

Conservation Update Needs Public Views

The U.S. Department of Agriculture plans to update the National Conservation Program and invites public comments on the proposed changes by June 4.

USDA would especially like public views on what the National Conservation Program priorities should be; the balance of Federal, state, and local conservation responsibility; and USDA efforts as they relate to increasing assistance to small-scale, limited-resource and minority farmers, research on alternative farming systems that may result in reducing chemical use, linking benefits to conservation programs and management of rangeland and forest land.

Recent conservation appraisals revealed that approximately 1.5 million acres of land are being removed from agricultural use each year; nearly half of the cropland is eroding too fast to maintain long-term productivity; and 57 million acres of cropland and pastureland are affected by excess salinity.

USDA's efforts through the National Conservation Program are expected to reduce erosion on agricultural land, especially highly erodible cropland, and protect surface and ground water from contamination from nonpoint pollution.

Persons interested in submitting suggestions and recommendations

for the National Conservation Program should mail written comments to reach their state SCS conservationist before June.

Farmers Eligible For Money Refund

If you were a farmer in the 1970s, you may be entitled to a refund for some of your fuel expenses. But you will have to act before June 30.

The refund is a result of a settlement reached by the Department of Energy with oil companies that allegedly overcharged for crude oil during a period regulated by price ceilings.

Consequently, farmers can get back about \$80 or more for every 100,000 gallons of fuel used between August 19, 1973 and January 27, 1981. That equates to a little over \$14 for every 100 acres of cropland in production during the seven and a half year period, according to economists with the Extension Service.

The refund should not be confused with the income tax credit for federal excise taxes on fuel.

The Department of Energy will base refunds on actual gallons purchased, estimated gallons used or a USDA estimate of 23.8 gallons per acre of cropland per year. An explanation of filing procedures for the refund and a simple two page filing form can be obtained from the county Extension office or from Evelyn Balis at the Knox County treasurer's office in Benjamin.

Funeral arrangements were under the direction of McCauley-Smith Funeral Home.

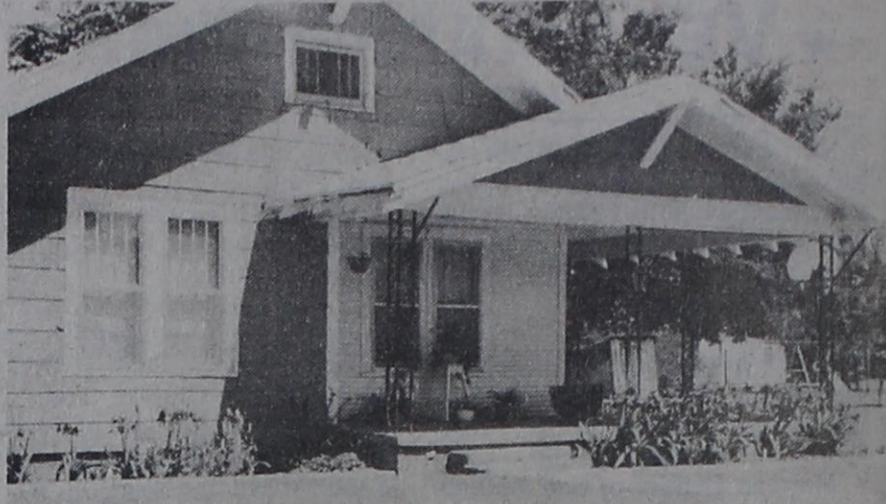

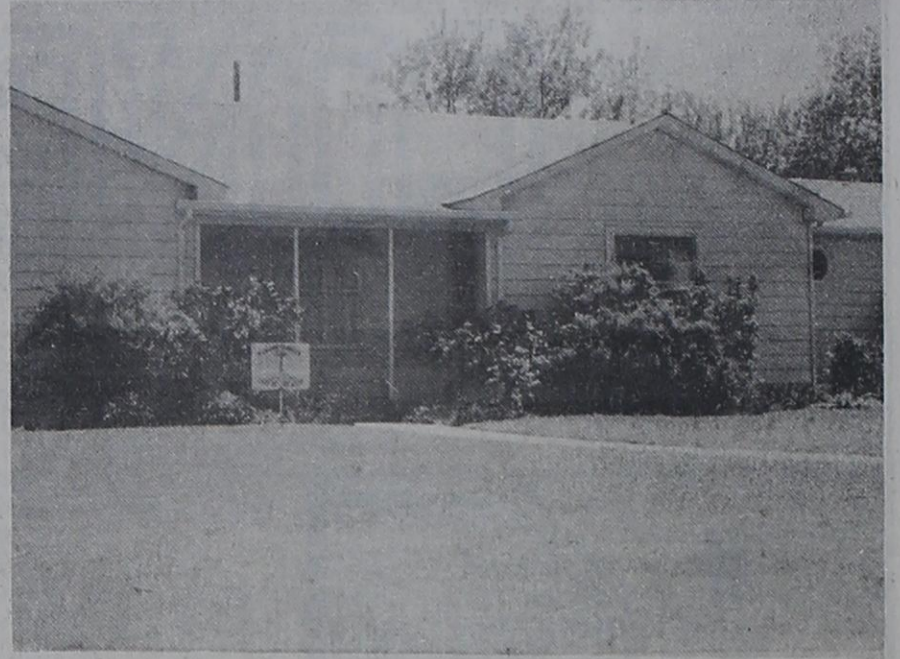
Proceeds from the sale will go toward refurbishing the Mogul fieldhouse.

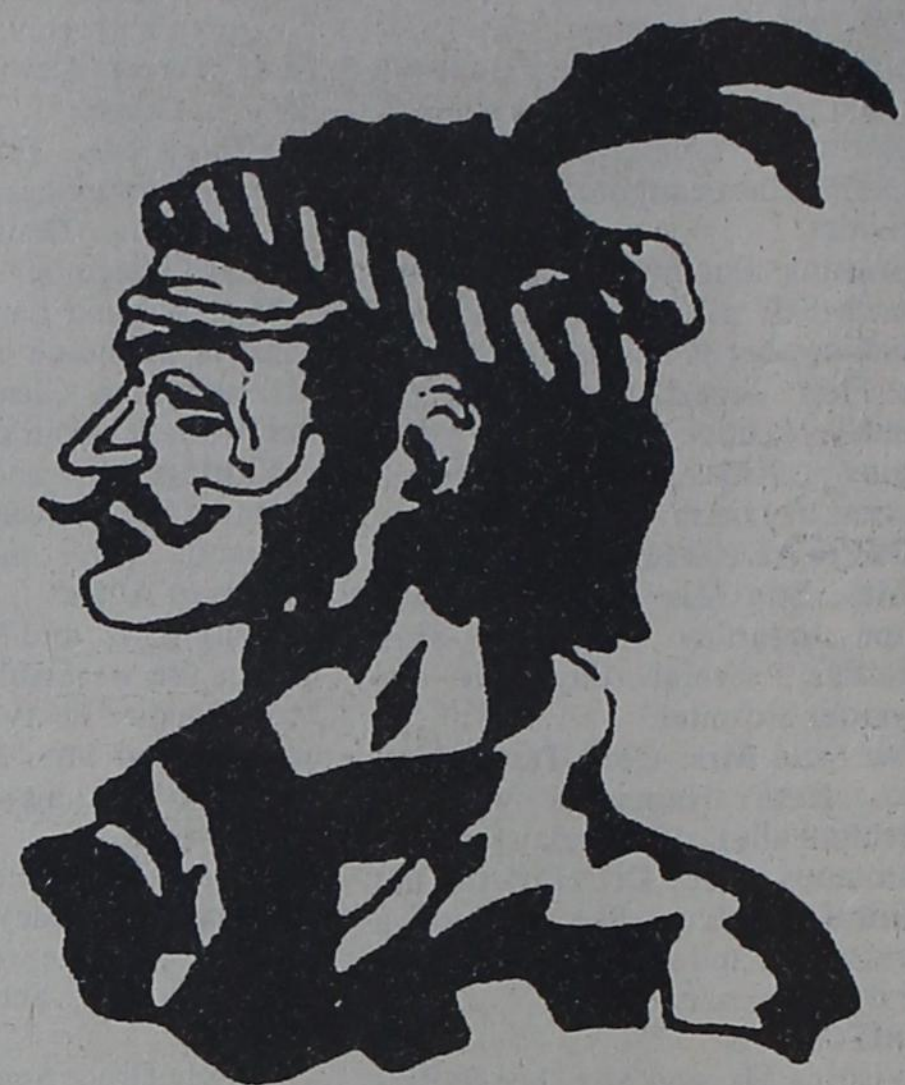

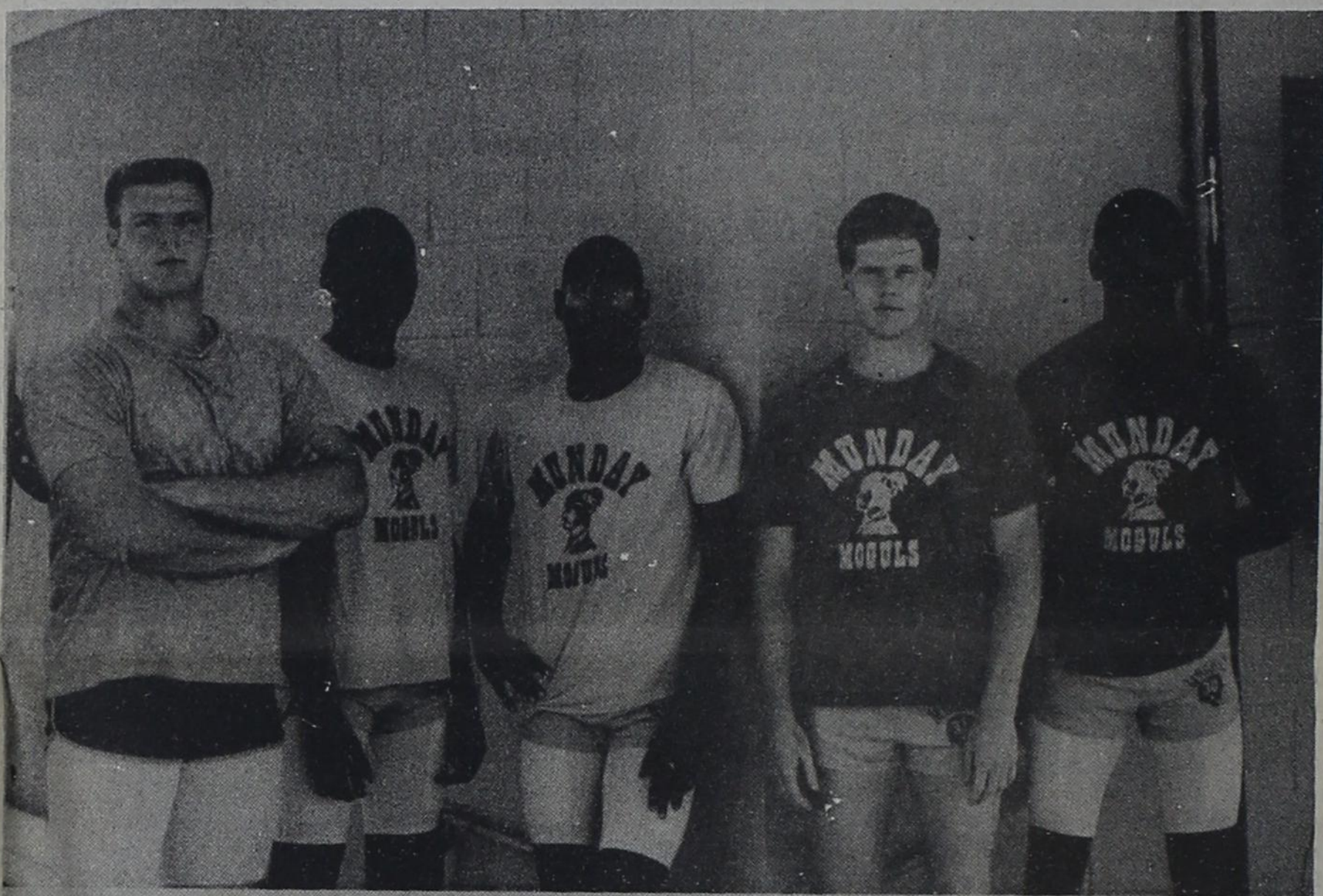

BECAUSE THE PEOPLE MUST KNOW

TO ALL WATER SUPPLY CUSTOMERS: CITY OF GOREE

The United States Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has adopted requirements that all public water systems notify their customers about lead exposure. This notification is intended to educate and inform consumers on this issue in light of the fact that your drinking water may be a potential source of lead exposure. This is being done even though your water system is not in violation of the current standard. There are also other potential sources of lead contamination in the environment.

The following specific language is required by EPA in this notice:

The EPA sets drinking water standards and has determined that lead is a health concern at certain levels of exposure. There is currently a standard of 0.050 parts per million (ppm). Based on new health information, EPA is likely to lower this standard significantly.

Part of the purpose of this notice is to inform you of the potential adverse health effects of lead. This is being done even though your water may not be in violation of the current standard.

EPA and others are concerned about lead in drinking water. Too much lead in the human body can cause serious damage to the brain, kidneys, nervous system, and red blood cells. The greatest risk, even with short-term exposure, is to young children and pregnant women.

Lead levels in your drinking water are likely to be highest:

1. if your home water system has lead pipes, or
2. if your home has copper pipes with lead solder, and
- if your home is less than five years old, or
- if you have a soft or acidic water, or
- if water sits in the pipes for several hours

Ways to avoid potential lead exposure are to "flush" faucets before use and to use cold water for drinking and cooking. You may wish to have your home tap water tested for lead content by a competent laboratory. You may also wish to check to see if lead pipes, solder of flux are used in your home plumbing.

The Water Authority has made a preliminary inspection of our system and has found no source of lead contamination. We will continue to monitor our system and periodically test the water we supply to insure that it reaches you within the specified standard.

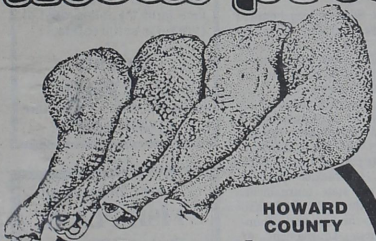
