 November Nominee For State SenateKnox County Democratic party chairman David Counts of Knox City will join 29 other county chair-
men in the 30 th Senatorial District men in the 30 th Senatorial Distric May 14, to choose a nominee to replace former Senator Ray Farabee on the ballot
general election
general election.
A great deal of controversy has decision to name a nominee befor the August 13 special election, which will result in the election of a senator only for the remainder of
1988. Counts clarifies the matter thusly:
The August 13 election is an open election, and filing is open for some time yet. If several candidates file
for the short-term seat the winner for the short-term seat, the winner may have only received a small per-
centage of the vote, much of which may be of a cross-over party nature. Therefore, the county chairmen wish to name an announced candiate who they feel represents the
wishes of the majority of wishes of the majority of
Democratic constituents in the district.
Due to time problems which may result in the event of a runoff naming a candidate before August and will shorten the campaign, Counts said.
The complications arose when Senator Farabee resigned to take a position with the University of called the special election August instead of taking advantage of last Saturday's statewide city and school district elections. Farabee' name is still on the ballot for the November election, and he has anname from contention the day after he special election.

## Giving Blood Easy And Safe For Donors

Healthy blood donors are needed
Monday, May 16, when the Red Cross Bloodmobile comes to Munday. Blood donations will be accepted from 2:45 to 6:30 p.m. at the Donating blood is an easy job and a rewarding one. A healthy donor can give up to five pints of blood a year with no harmful effects. Howver, according to Dr. George F. Sheldon, a member of the Board of Surgeons, our nation's blood supply periodically has dipped to alarmingly low levels because not enough
people have volunteered their services as blood donors. In fact, it has been estimated that of all the people
ho are eligible to donate blood,
poly five percent ponly five percent actually do so.
Some experts believe that one Some experts believe that one
reason for this decline may be the
unfounded fear that many potential unfounded fear that many potential AIDS by give about contracting
giving bood. Unfortunatly, a few years ago a number fusiops did contract the disease befort it was identified as a major befor it was identified as a major
public health problem and before pubiic heath problem and before
antibody tests were available to keep he nation's blood supply safe. But according to the American Association of Blood Banks, not one ingle person has contracted the
AIDS virus through the process of lood donation. It is important to know that
bloodmobile attendants use only bloodmobile attendants use only sterile and disposable equipment in drawing blood from donors, so
when a person gives blood, the equipment is used its first, last and only time on that person. Therefore, says Dr. Sheldon, one cannot conract AIDS or other diseases such a

## Buckle Up

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Farmers Ëligible For Money Refund

If you were a farmer in the 1970 s, you may be entitled to a refund for some of your fuel expenses. But you
will have to act before June 30 . The refund is a result of a settlement reached by the Department of Energy with oil companies that allegedly overcharged for crude oil ceilings. Conse
Consequently, farmers can get 100,000 gallons of fuel used between August 19, 1973 and January 27, $\$ 14$ for every 100 acres of cropland in production during the seven and a half year period, according to economists with the Extension Ser-
The refund should not be confused with the income tax credit for federal excise taxes on fuel. The Department of Energy will base refunds on actual gallons purchased, estimated gallons used or a
USDA estimate of 23.8 gallons per acre of cropland per year. An explanation of filing procedures for the refund and a simple two page filing form can be obtained from the county Extension office or from
