
Flower Show Results **Need Clarification**

Employers Required To Pay Social Security Tax On Tips

A new law requires employers to pay Social Security tax on the full amount of covered tips their employees receive, according to Frances Braden. Social Security representative in Vernon. Under the old law, employers paid Social Security tax only on the amount of tips deemed to be wages for purposes of meeting the Federal minimum wage

As under prior law, the employee is responsible for keeping a record of cash tips and, if they total \$20 or more, reporting them to the employer by the 10th of the month after they have been received. The employee share of the taxes is deducted from regular wages or from money the employee gives the employer. The employer adds the amount of tips earned to the regular earnings and pays the matching employer tax on the total.

Since the amount of the Social Security benefit a person receives is based on average annual earnings during the working years, tips can make a real difference at retirement," Braden said. "That's generally when total income is reduced, and many people rely on portion of their retirement in- Courier.

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The change was included in the Omnibus Budget Reconciliation Act of 1987, enacted December 22, 1987. According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five vear survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 vear survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Detection Unit will be in Mun- priate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

> V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

> A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early can-

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.



* FARM AND RANCH REPORT *

TIME TO TREAT FOR **CATTLE GRUBS**

Time has come for ranchers to perform one of their management practices, testing for grubs.

Cattle grubs are internal parasites and their damage is largely unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage. Feed efficiency and animal vigor are reduced in infested animals.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May.

The time to control grubs is from now through August when grubs are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss and decreased feed efficiency. Considerable hide damage will occur if infested animals are slaughtered. Hide value has increased rapidly during the past year.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no functional mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle. Yet they frighten animals, making them difficult to

Heel flies lay their eggs on an animal's hairs in the lower leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's skin.

Then they begin a migratory course through the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few months, and after eight to nine months, appear in the mature grub state on the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd, it's best to treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide or injectable treatment during the May through August period.

Insecticides labeled for use include Coumaphos (Co-Ral), Prolate (GX-118), Famphur (Warbex), Fenthion (Tiguvon) and Fenthion (Spotton).

Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulate throughout the body and kill grubs while they are small. Injectable treatments are circulated in the animal's body fluids to kill the invading pests.

CHECK THOSE DATES

Food products often have dates on them, even though it's not required by law. Both the manufacturer and the store want you to be satisfied with the product.

If you know how to use it, the date can help insure your satisfaction by indicating product freshness and giving you a guide for safe storage time.

Here are the common dating terms and what they mean:

"Sell-by" date. This is the last day the product should be sold by the store. It still has a reasonable storage time under proper conditions in your home. So, for example, if a carton of milk has a "sellby" date for today, it will still be fresh for several more days if kept

refrigerated in your home. "Use-by" date. This date tells you how long the product will retain top eating quality after you buy it. The food may still be safe and

edible, but not at its peak of quality. "Expiration date". This date tells you the last day the food should be eaten or used. If you haven't used the food by that date, it's best to

discard it. Some canned and packaged foods have "pack" dates which tell when the product was processed. Since these foods have a long shelf life, this date is generally less significant to consumers.

NONFAT YOGURT

ON THE MARKET Look for a new yogurt product in the dairy case. It's plain, nonfat yogurt. Eight ounces contain 0 grams of fat, 45% of the recommended daily allowance for calcium and 110 calories. While low-fat yogurt has been marketed for a year, a completely nonfat yogurt is new to the market.

STORE LEATHER AND SUEDE FOR THE SUMMER

Do you own a leather coat or a suede jacket? Have you stored it properly for the summer in Texas? If it's heavily soiled, take it to your drycleaner for special cleaning. Otherwise, drape it with fabric - not plastic - and store it in a closet you use frequently. Air circulation and controlled temperature are important in keeping your leathers and

suedes looking their best. STORING ICE CREAM

If you take advantage of summer ice cream sales by stocking up, remember to store the containers properly. Over-wrap ice cream containers with freezer paper to prevent ice cream from drying out. Also remember that ice cream is best if it's eaten within two months of purchase. The best temperature for freezer storage is zero degrees F. or
