GOOD VALUE

But now and then it is argued that the machines cost too much-that the price tags are unreasonably high even in these days of the 50-cent dol-

A few facts punch deep holes in that argument. Between 1939 and 1950, for instance, the factory prices of farm equipment went up 54 per cent-while the cost of iron and steel rose 76 per eent, and the wages paid labor in farm equipment plants jumped 104 per cent.

And this doesn't take into account the improvements that have been made in the equipment. The machines are far ruggeder and more efficient than they used to be. Important improvements have inevitably added to their manufacturing cost. Their life is longer. And they do the jobs they are destined for faster and with proportionately lower operating and maintenance

THE MONEY WE SPEND AT RETAIL

An authority on department store and variety store retailing recently stressed the need "for a crusade on expense reduction."

That may seem odd to some customers, who have the idea that the retailer needn't wory too much about expenses, as all he has to do is to tack them on to the selling price of his goods. But, in a free, competitive economy it isn't as simple as that. Last year, for instance, retail business as measured by volume was extremely good. A vast quantity of merchandise was sold and huge sums of money changed hands. But typical dry goods stores averaged a net profit of only 2.3 per cent. It is obvious that when the profit margin is so narrow, every effort must be made to keep overhead costs down.

The merchants aren't complaining-they aren't asking for big profits. But the consuming public should know that only a very small part of each dollar we spend at retail stays with the owners of the stores.

AFTER TWO DECADES

Secretary of the Treasury Humphrey has stated that the federal budget cannot be balanced in the next fiscal year, despite substantial cuts in appropriations. There will be a deficit, and it probably will be necessary to again increase the legal debt limit.

As the Portland Oregonian said editorially, "It took two decades to get the government and the taxpayers into this mess." We can't get out of it overnight. In the meantime, the Administration must be encouraged in its efforts to reduce costs as rapidly as possible—and the people must have the character and the resolution to accept and applaud the fact that the Santa Claus era seems to be ending. That won't be easy. But it will be infinitely easier than the national bankruptcy that would inevitably result from continued unbridled spending.

THE BARBITURATE DANGER

An article in Today's Health, a publication of the American Medical Association, warns against the excessive or improper use of barbiturates.

Written by Dr. Donald A. Dukelow, the article says that in 1951 more than 688,00 pounds of York mayor was serving. He rethese drugs were produced—enough to put every man, woman and child in the nation to sleep for 20 days if administered in the usual dosage. It is estimated that more than half of the huge barbiturate production is distributed through illegitimate channels for non-medical purposes.

When used properly, under a physician's supervision, barbiturates are of great value and can prevent much suffering. But, as is true of most habit-forming drugs, improper use can lead to destruction of the victim's personality, crime, and even death.

Hang up those empty feed sacks or plie them neatly on a rack. This is the best way to keep used bags in good condition. A few pains in opening sacks so as not to tear them will pay off. Dont' allow birds to waste feed. Use feeders that prevent waste and fill them 1/2 to 2/3

Make a practice to wipe off light bulbs and reflectors in the pens ever so often. It is surprising how much light is lost simply because bulbs and reflectors are filmed over.

Check up on the favorite laying haunts of chickens. Eggs are lost because birds don't lay them in the nests. Dark corners, under the nests and roosts, should be wired off so birds just can't lay in those hard to get at places where eggs are either broken or get dirty.

Work out a plan to cull and sell loafers if you are trying for good egg production. Non-laying birds are lost to the market because the farmer didn't get rid of them while they were in good

A good poultryman is first of all a good manager. No matter how big or how small an operation he has, mass production can never substitute for good management.







Trailer Bed Extension

A ROUND the farm, hauling is a constant problem. Sometimes the two-wheel auto trailer is the right size, but other times it's too

The illustration shows a way of doubling the capacity of a trailer by constructing a demountable box,



which simply fits on top of the trailer bed.

Using scrap lumber, form two rectangular frameworks the size of the trailer box. Cover the sides with Masonite quarter-inch Tempered Presdwood, a tough material that will stand lots of abuse.

Now nail, as shown, four twoby-fours to the inner framework. These will then fit into some iron strapping that should be bolted nto the trailer. Then the trailerm-a-trailer is complete. When not needed, it is easily removed and
