Nothing is sadder than the end of an era. As I joined almost every other Goree citizen last week who stood quietly watching as firemen battled the flames that engulfed the old Laningham building, the skating rink, the building where Archie Struck operated a garage for so many years, a feeling of melancholy swept over me. I was sixteen again and swaying gently to the rhythm of *The Skater's Waltz* or flying around the old rink floor with the popular silk scarf tied around my neck to the fast-paced *Sabre Dance*. I was eighteen and looking over all the paint samples as Mr. Laningham patiently waited for my young husband and me to decide on just the right color for the kitchen walls in the lofty old farm house where we were establishing a home. I was twenty and carefully guiding our old '50 Buick into Archie's Garage to see if he could fix the brakes after I had run over the lilac bushes in the yard.

We all watched as the flames leaped higher, turning to thick, rolling smoke as firemen from surrounding areas arrived to help our men contain the fire and so many scenes from my youth came rushing back from the attics of my memory. It was only yesterday, not thirty-five years ago when we sat in that old skating rink pouring "Tom's Toasted Peanuts" into our Coca-Colas, holding up the bottles in games of "coke-hop" to see whose bottle was made farthest away.

I could almost hear "Uncle" John Coffman's whistle as he ran onto the floor, demanding that the couple who had stopped in the shadows at the back of the rink for a quick embrace "get on out on the floor and start skating or take your skates off and go home." Uncle John wore khaki shirts and trousers and a little slouch hat pulled down over his head and he didn't "put up with any of your foolishness". But, Uncle John, as he was known to every kid, was a man we all knew we could depend on. Ruffians who thought they could come in and take over his rink, spouting obscenities and making passes at all the girls soon found themselves out in the street. He was not a big man and as far as I know, he didn't keep any kind of weapon on the premises, but there was an authoritative, no-nonsense air about him that made kids respect him.

Many sagas unfolded within those old skating rink walls, many teen-aged romances began and ended there. Kids came from all the surrounding towns to skate and to socialize so that it was usually bursting with music, laughter and life. In watching the walls come crashing down, I remembered the night Jacqueline broke up with her boyfriend and came with sad face into the rink. How we all rallied 'round to "pick up the pieces" --Glenda and Jackie--Jeanette and Nancy--all of us. And how happy we all were, and maybe more than a little envious, when Jacqueline's handsome boyfriend came in to ask her forgiveness.

I remembered the night I fell so hard during one of the fast songs and it hurt too bad to even try to get up off the floor. Through my tears of pain, I saw Uncle John's face above me, telling the other kids not to move me, instructing someone to run across to Bob Sadler's Cafe and call my parents. Daddy came and took me around to Dr. Heard's house, and I was not critically wounded at all--just bruised and shaken and mostly humiliated.

Only people who have been a part of an aging small town can identify with the sadness of seeing it destroyed. To people who hurry past Goree on their way to Abilene or Wichita Falls, (Continued on Page 2)

Dan Sloan And Mindy Myers Share Top State Honors

Munday High School's Dan Sloan was selected 1990 Girls' Coach of the Year in all classifications at a banquet held Friday afternoon in Arlington. Sloan was chosen from five Texas coaches nominated to receive this outstanding award.

Among the achievements cited to determine Coach Sloan's success were the 1988-89 State victories for the Girls' Cross Country team, the 1989-90 Girls' State Track Championships as well as recognition for state semi-final accomplishments of his '89-'90 girls' basketball team.

During half-time activities of the Texas All-Star North-South basketball competition, Munday's Mindy

Myers was chosen to receive the award for small schools' Outstanding Girl Track Athlete in Texas. Presented the M.T. Rice \$200 scholarship for best all around track star in all qualifications, Mindy was the only girl in Texas to qualify for both the girls' basketball and track state all-star teams.

The North-South All-Star game consisted of four ten-minute quarters, with the 15 girls on each team allowed four minutes of play in a quarter. Although the south managed to beat out the northern division team by a score of 85-71, Munday fans who made the trip to Arlington were not disappointed in Mindy's performance.

A reception honoring the outstanding girl athletes, their coaches and parents followed the All-Star game. This culminated the four days' activities in which two of the driving forces behind Munday's championship wins, Coach Sloan and Miss Myers, were recognized state wide for the excellence of a combination of hard work and talent.

Knox County Tax Rebates

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Monday that this month's sales tax rebate checks to cities and counties in Texas totaled \$84 million.

"That's a comfortable jump ahead of last year's payments and another indication that our economy continues to grow," Bullock said.

July's rebate checks to cities totaled \$75 million, an increase of almost 10 percent over last July's payments. So far this year, total payments to cities have increased 8 percent.

Rebate checks to counties totaled \$8.6 million this month for an increase of 25 percent over last July's payment and an increase of almost 18 percent over last year's total payments to counties at this time. That jump is partly due to a greater number of counties now collecting sales tax, Bullock said.

This month's checks included taxes collected on May sales and reported in June by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

In Knox County, Knox City's payment for this period was \$7,464.23 compared to \$4,807.21 at this same time last year; Munday's payments totaled \$3,006.92 with \$4,039.79 at this time last year; and Goree with payments of \$571.05 as opposed to \$583.45 at this reporting period last year. Benjamin showed no net payment for this period.

All local sales taxes must be approved by area voters and may be used for any legal city or county expense.

Various Items Of Business Discussed In Regular City Council Session

The City Council of the City of Munday met on July 10 at 7 p.m. in Regular Session. Members present were Mayor Richard Albus, Aldermen Hank Matthews, George Oustad, David Booe, Jessie Tucker and Jessie Andrade. No members absent.

Mayor Albus called the meeting to order and minutes of the June 12 regular meeting were read. Motion was made by Matthews and seconded by Tucker that minutes be approved. All in favor.

Mayor Albus declared that the final Public Hearing on the 1990 Texas Department of Commerce Community Development Grant application commence. This hearing will be open to the public for comments and will

remain open until Mayor Albus declares it closed near the end of the meeting.

Discussion with Bettye Springer, one of the City's attorneys, was the next order of business. This discussion pertained to possible threatened litigation. The Council authorized Ms. Springer to continue in the direction previously designated by the Council. Also discussed was the Department of Labor Child Labor Law violation fine that has been assessed upon the City. The Council authorized Ms. Springer to accept the 50 percent reduced settlement the Department of Labor has offered.

Howard Myers and a few other concerned citizens met with the Council to discuss the Ambulance Service. The Mayor and the City Council would like to thank this group for their interest and input into this situation. No action was needed on this matter.

An Airport Lease Agreement between the City and Reinhart Redder was next on the agenda. Motion was made by Andrade and seconded by Oustad to enter into a one year contract with a two year annually renewable lease with Redder. All in favor.

our town is one of those little places with one blinking light and boarded up store fronts. It's just another one of those little towns where "if you happen to blink, you miss it". But for those of us who have been here forever, it's home and the spirit of the way it was is still alive.

Only someone who doesn't remember the coveted gold-colored taffeta dress in the store window of *Carl's Dry Goods* or the smell of the burgers and fries and the sounds of *Blueberry Hill* pouring from Buster Latham's *City Cafe* could throw a brick through the vacant windows and run away laughing.

Only those who never cried in the darkness of George Nix's *Goree Theater* when Jeff Chandler left Loretta Young in *Because of You* or sat around the booths in Dorse Rogers drug store for ice cream sodas and teen-age gossip could deface those old walls with obscene graffiti.

With the passage of time, many small schools, churches and towns will probably die. Gradually, the large clothing stores may replace the little home-owned shops where a girl can charge a dress for a special party and pay for it when her dad gets paid. Wal-Mart and K-Mart may replace the friendly little stores with the Sherwin-Williams paint samples and the little machine to shake the contents of the can, the friendly little shops where the coffee pot is always on and you know you're welcome to help yourself to a cup.

Interstate highways are built to bypass the little coffee shops and restaurants with the homemade pies and vegetables locally grown. Travelers are in a hurry. They don't have time to stop and talk to the old men who sit in the coffee shops or over domino tables in the park and relive old times. But how delighted those travelers might be if they did take time to listen, to paint mental images of "that time the river came roaring through here like the waves of a mighty sea" or "back when those fellows came through here with those medicine shows, selling tonic and had those gypsy girls dancing".

Small towns have memories of a time when old dogs and young children could wander safely; when an ice cold watermelon shared with friends under a shade tree in the city park was a real treat; a time of revival tents set up on city hall lawns where the whole town turned out to sing *Revive Us Again* in unison, regardless of denomination or creed.

The smoke has cleared now and cleanup operations have begun. The laundry is still standing, though somewhat battered and bruised, but all the other buildings in that block are just piles of rubble. There's nothing left of the old store window that featured the newest line of kerosene heaters or displayed a supply of duckin cotton sacks in the fall of the year.

But if you close your eyes and let your memory wander back in time, you can still hear the sounds of the *Skater's Waltz* from deep within the rubble of charred bricks and mortar.

Buildings can be torn down. They can be destroyed by fire, vandals, or natural causes. They can be carried away, brick by brick, until there is no evidence they ever existed at all.

But not memories!

Motion was made by Booe to pass an ordinance annexing the 3.671 acre tract in the name of Knox Prairie Co-op into the town of Munday. Seconded by Oustad. All in favor. (Full text in City Ordinance files)

The Council received a petition requesting annexation from James and Linda Edrington to wit: The Southwest corner of the Northeast 1/4 of Survey No. 35, Blk. 2, D&W RR Co. Survey, Knox County, Texas. Motion was made by Oustad to accept the annexation request and to set the first public hearing for July 30th with the second public hearing set for August 14th, 1990. Seconded by Andrade. All for.

The next item on the agenda dealt with employees, but no action was required on this matter.

Mayor Albus signed a 911 Interlocal Agreement bringing 911 one step closer to being obtained.

Mayor Albus called for final comments on the public hearing for the Grant application, however, at this time, no one other than the Mayor, the City Council and the Administrator was present. Mayor Albus declared the public hearing closed. Motion by Matthews to pass a resolution authorizing the filing of an application with the Texas Department of Commerce for the Community Development Fund and authorized the Mayor to act as the chief executive officer and authorized representative in all matters pertaining to the participation in the Community Development Program. Miller's Creek Reservoir
Level: Full
Condition : slightly stained
Temperature (at surface): 78° F
Catfish: Excellent to 60 lbs. on trotline. Excellent on rod and reel throughout the day and night. Hitting shad, large minnows, goldfish and jackrabbit chunks on trotline. Taking Tan Bait, liver and grasshoppers on pole. One 20 pounder hit a crappie jig near water intake.

Black Bass: A few black bass hitting spinners on northeast shore of main lake. Best colors are yellow, gold and black. Largest reported is 5 1/2 lbs.

White Bass: Excellent at night under lights in main lake and at all times at water intake. Biggest reported at 3 lbs. Hitting jigs and spinner-jigs.

Hybrid Striper: Very good to 12 lbs. on trolling lures, Rat L Traps and small live perch.

Crappie: Very good. Cool weather has improved numbers and size. Take

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ing minnows and yellow tube jigs best. Biggest reported at 1 3/4 lbs. Hitting from 1-6 feet deep.
Perch: Very good on dry flies and worms. Big mouth sunfish reported at 1 1/4 lbs.
Carp & Buffalo: Good to 7 lbs. on Tan Bait, worms and minnows.
Fishing Tip
Q: When should I use a swivel on my

line?
A: This is a good question and is really a matter of opinion based on experience. Swivels keep your line from twisting during retrieval and make changing lures easy. However, a swivel also adds weight and changes the action of the lure. When fishing for large fish make sure that you use a heavy duty steel swivel that is rated for larger catches. I do not use swivels when I crappie jig due to the action and additional weight. Also, I don't use them when I fish a plastic worm or flipping lure. However, I do use a swivel for trolling and casting spinning lures.

Knox County Designated For Disaster Declaration

Governor Bill Clements announced recently that the Federal Emergency Management Agency has added Knox County, along with Foard and Maverick counties, to a presidential disaster declaration issued in early May as a result of heavy flooding and storm damage.

The declaration means individual residents in these counties are eligible to apply for a variety of loans, grants and other assistance.

Governor Clements' announcement brings to 68 the number of Texas counties that have been declared disaster areas because of flooding, thunderstorms and tornadoes since April 15.

In addition, Governor Clements announced the Federal Emergency Management Agency has granted his request to add these three counties, along with Bowie County, to a separate disaster declaration covering flood and weather-related damage to buildings and other public works owned by local governments, bringing the total number of these counties to 44.

This declaration means the federal government will pay 75 percent of repair costs to public buildings, roads and bridges damaged because of recent flooding. The local government will pay the remaining 25 percent.

Q: When should my son be baptized? How old should he be?

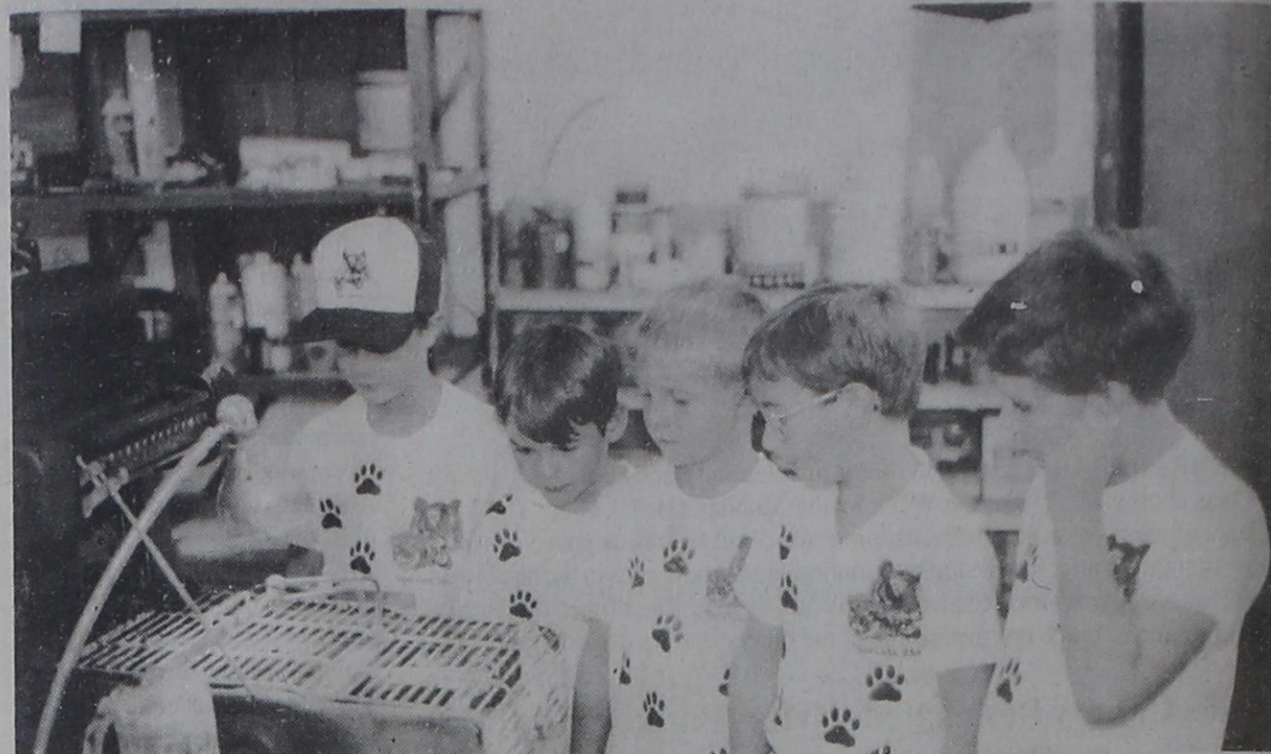
A: First of all, baptism is not a decision the parent makes for his/her child. It should be the child's own choice. The Bible has absolutely no record of infants being baptized. In every instance recorded in the Bible the subjects of this act had been taught (Matthew 28:19); had faith (Acts 8:12); were convicted of their sins and therefore repented (Acts 2:37-38); confessed that Jesus was the Christ - (not confessed their sins) (Acts 8:37).

In all biblical instances of baptism, those being baptized were those who chose to follow Christ. It, therefore, must be your son's choice, as well. Your son should understand what sin is and what the action or baptism does.

It is by baptism that we choose to accept the grace of God hence, in this regard, "baptism saves us" and gives us a clear conscience (1 Peter 3:21; Acts 2:38). Baptism washes away our sins (Acts 22:16) giving us the right to walk the walk of a new life (Romans 6:1-4). Those who have been baptized wear Christ and therefore can be called "Christians" (Galatians 3:27).

I suggest the age of twelve as being the earliest age in which you should encourage your son to take this important step. Although some children seem to know what they are doing by the age of 9 or 10. When a child loses his childhood innocence and is convicted of sin, this is when he should be baptized. It should be his choice and should not be pushed into such an act by his family or peers. Prior to his baptism, he should understand that once he makes this decision, he is required by God to "continue steadfastly in the teaching of the Bible and the fellowship of Christians" (Acts 2:42) "not forsake the assembly" (worship services) (Hebrews 10:25) and "grow in grace of knowledge of Christ" (1 Peter 2:2; 2 Peter 3:18).

Water, Best Drink On Hot Days

A nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service recommends drinking water instead of iced tea or soda to quench thirst.

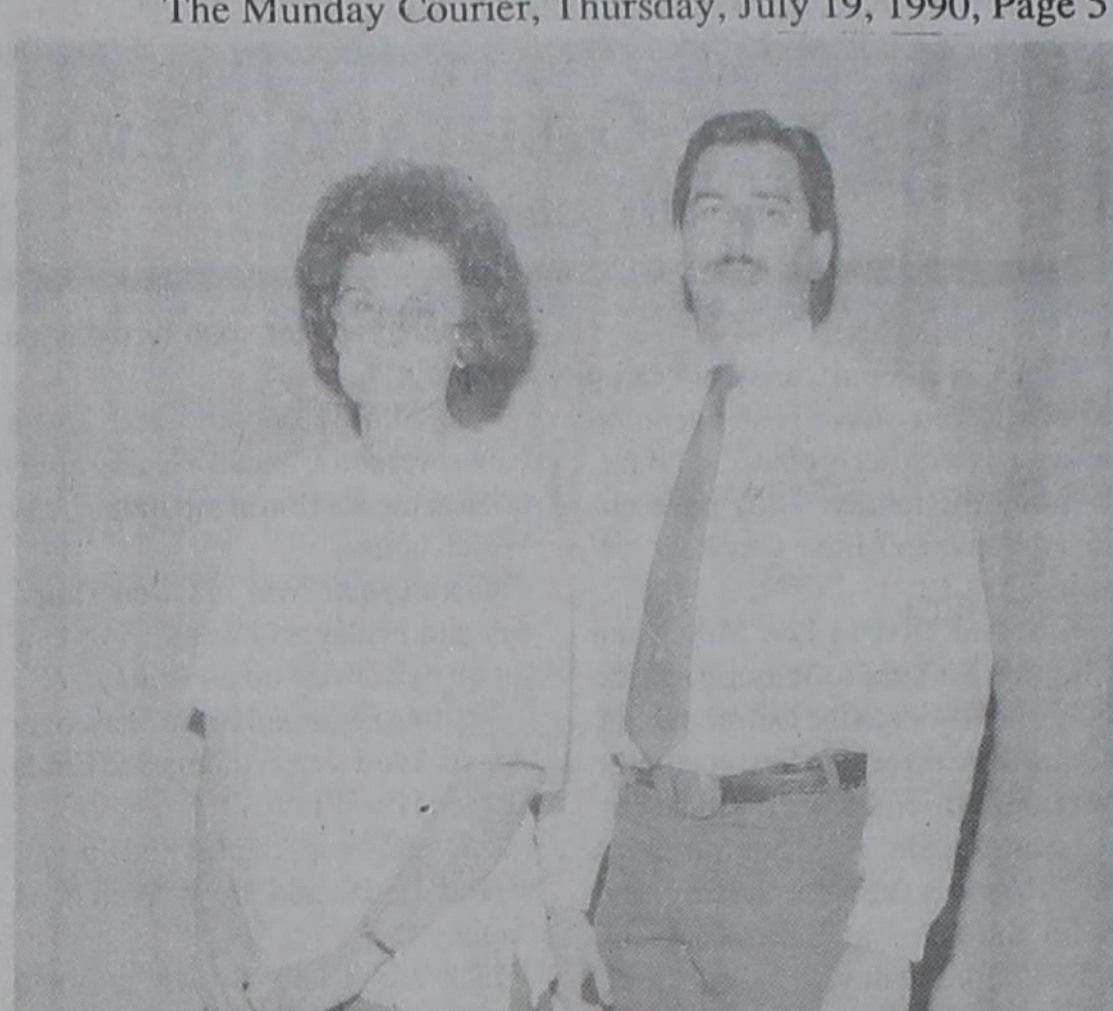
On hot summer days, it's important to increase fluid consumption and according to Dr. Bethann Witcher, the best way to do this is by drinking water.

Dr. Witcher stated that iced tea, like any other drink, is okay in moderation, but it should not be part of every meal, especially in the heat, because tea is a diuretic that takes fluid out of the body.

The body contains 40-50 quarts of water. Two or three quarts are lost daily and must be replaced. As little as a 3 percent reduction of body weight from water loss can affect strength and endurance and a 15-20 percent water loss can be fatal. Water helps the digestive process, sets up a cooling system during exercise in the form of perspiration, carries nutrients to the cells and removes waste. A healthy complexion depends on water-enhanced skin tones, and joints are lubricated by water.

"On the curative side," Dr. Witcher added, "water can often help relieve headaches and decrease premenstrual bloating. Also, drinking large glasses of water during the day and right before meals can help curb appetites for maintaining or losing weight."

The best way to forget your own problem is to help someone else's.

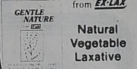
