Sometimes a fish I've caught will "swallow" the hook. When the hook is deep in the throat, what is the best way to get it out? A: Believe it or not, the best way, according to biolog ists, is to leave the hook in the fish's throat. Experts say that when you simply cut your line and gently release the fish then its odds of surviving are a lot higher. The fish will continue to feed and
grow, and the hook will eventually dissolve, they say. However, if you are intent on getting your hook back, I've found that a pair of needle-nose pliers are best. Grab the shank of the hook and gently work back and forth until the barb is clear of tissue, then remove. On trash fish that you don't care about, you can grab the hook
with the pliers and spin the fish. I'll with the piers and spin he fill. cs .

The State of Texas has recently adopted an amendment to the State Penal Code making meter tampering a third degree felony. A third degree felony comes with a punishment of confinement in the Texas Department of Corrections for a tern of a to imprisonment,
Before the amendment of the new law, it was a class A misdemeanor for meter tampering unless the噱 of loss is now a felony of the third degree
Meter tampering consists of, but is not limited to
(1) Diverting electricity from passing through a meter device.
(2) Preventing electric service from being correctly registered by a meter device (3) Unauthorized activation of electric service As a special note to our members, it will also be considered meter tampering if a meter is reset and electrical service is restored by anyone other than a Cooperative employee.
