# **Area Cotton Harvest Nears Completion**

With the weather being uncooperative, area cotton farmers are having some trouble winding up their harvest. Local gins report approximately two-thirds of the cotton in the county has been processed.

According to authorities at the Rhineland Co-Op Gin, they have ginned 9,000 bales thus far and have 4,000 more already stripped and waiting in the fields.

Knox Prarie Co-Op reported 5,800 bales already processed and 1,500 yet to be ginned.

The Goree Producers Co-Op has ginned 5,600 bales so far, with 500

more on the yard and 200-300 acres of cotton remaining in the field.

Pat Hutchinson of Munday Gin and Seed reports at least 600-700 acres of cotton not yet stripped. They have already ginned 4,360 bales.

With rain, freezing rain and possible snow in the forecast for the next few days, it looks doubtful that there will be much stripping going on in the area. Hopefully, there will soon be some warmer, drier weather, with plenty of those famous Texas winds to assist cotton farmers in concluding their harvest.

# **Local School Damaged By Broken Water Lines**

The local elementary school received a much UN-wanted Christmas present .... a flood.

The building was checked on Christmas Eve night and all was well. However, when Janice Dutton arrived Christmas morning at 8:00 a.m., the entire east end of the building, up to and including principal Doug Donoho's office, was flooded. Upon inspection, it was discovered that two one-inch water lines in the hot water closet located in the northeast end of the building were broken.

The Munday Volunteer Fire Department was called to help pump out the water. School personnel, school board members, local citizens and approximately 15 members of the fire department joined together to remove the furniture and carpet from the classrooms. According to school board president, Ronnie Stewart, everyone who

knew about the incident came to help. Stewart said that all of the carpet on the east end had been removed except for three rooms, which were only slightly damaged. These three rooms were to be dried out for temporary use and will be replaced at a later date. Two rooms on the west end of the building were also slightly damaged, but were able to be vacuumed free of water and showed no apparent permanent damage. Charles Yost will begin replacing carpet in the other rooms on December 30. It is hoped that all rooms will be ready for use when school resumes January 2.

Stewart stated that the building received between \$20,000 to \$30,000

## Water Quality Project Announced **For Knox and Haskell Counties**

Two Texas sites are among the 45 new national water quality projects recently announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture for 1991.

The new sites are the Seymour Aquifer Hydrologic Unit Project, which includes about 250,000 acres in Knox and Haskell counties of the Rolling Plains, and the Lake Fork Creek Hydrologic Unit Project, which includes 234,000 acres in Hopkins, Rains and Wood counties in Northeast Texas.

The announcement brings the number of water quality projects in Texas to four, said Dr. Billy L. Harris, project administrator and soils specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at College Station.

"Together, the four projects represent a major statewide effort to improve and maintain the quality of surface and groundwater across 6.78 million acres," Harris said. "They are designed to address existing and potential nonpoint source water pollution problems related to agriculture and forestry."

He said the five-year hydrologic unit projects will help farmers and ranchers apply the best management practices to improve water quality and protect surface and groundwater.

The projects are also intended to demonstrate the agricultural community's willingness to address water quality problems and concerns.

The Seymour Aquifer represents the only source of moderate to large supplies of fresh groundwater in that portion of the Rolling Plains. Land users will be encouraged to adopt practices that reduce or prevent water pollution.

Assisting Harris with the projects are Dr. Robert Lemon, Extension Service associate in water quality, who is working with the Seco Creek and Seymour Aquifer projects; and Dr. Mark McFarland, Extension



Service associate in water quality, the Upper Bosque River and Lake Fork Creek projects.

Lead agencies with principal responsibility for the projects are the Extension Service and Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board and local districts, along with two USDA agencies, the Soil Conservation Service and the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Project acitivities are being coordinated with other state and federal agencies and organizations involved in water quality, Harris said.

These include the U.S. Geological Survey, Texas Water Commission, Texas Water Development Board, Texas Department of Agriculture and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

#### **Begin Retirement With Social Security Estimate**

Retirement usually comes much sooner than most people realize, so everyone should begin planning now for their retirement years.

The people at social security can help you get started with your own "Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement" (PEBES). This statement gives valuable information to help people with the important decisions about their future retirement income.

To get a PEBES, you should first call social security's toll-free number 1-800-2345-SSA (1-800-234-5772) and ask for Form SSA-7004. Fill it out completely. In a few weeks you will receive in the mail a printout showing total earnings under social security, the number of social security credits currently on record, estimated future social security retirement benefit amount at age 62 and at age 65, as well as what you and your family could receive in social security disablitiy and survivors benefits. Your social security benefits are not intended to replace all pre-retirement earnings; people should plan to supplement them with savings and other investments.

The city of Goree has been awarded \$250,000 for water distribution line improvements, including 25,640 feet of water line and 20 fire hydrants. This project was selected through a acomprehensive scoring system between Commerce and Regional Review Committees, each comprised of 12 local elected officials appointed by the Governor, from each of the 24 planning regions of the state. Funding recommendations made by those bodies were reviewed and approved by the State Development Review Committee.

## **Cow's Performance Related To Nutrition**

The way a cow is handled during the winter will have an influence on her calf's future and next year's calf crop.

The cow's reproductive performance and the health and weaning of her calf are greatly influenced by her nutritional status throughout the year. If a cow is allowed to calve in poor or thin body condition, the odds are against her to maintain a 12 month calving interval.

Cattle are usually fed hay during the winter, but if not enough energy is supplied by that hay, additional grains should be supplied.

Producers should have their hay tested to obtain the real protein content. This enables them to feed cattle without over or under feeding. Producers also should make allowances for weather conditions. As temperatures drop and wind and rain increases, nutritional needs of cattle increase as much as 20%.

A dry pregnant cow can usually live on 20 pounds of average quality hay per day during the winter. But, if hay quality is poor or the weather is cold and wet, an additional two to

three pounds of a 20% protein supplement should be fed daily. A cow nursing a calf needs about five to six pounds of a 20% protein supplement with about 22 pounds of hay per winter day. If weather conditions are bad, the supplement should be increased to seven to eight pounds

Shelter should be provided when cattle have to face severe winter conditions. A windbreak may be sufficient, but overhead cover is important during heavy rains.

**EPIPHANY** 

Epiphany comes from the Greek word meaning "Manifestation." It is the term used for an official visit of a King or Emperor to some city of his realm. The apostles applied this term to Christ's manifesting Himself as a Divine King (Saviour) in 2 Timothy 1:10 and in Titus 1:3,4.

Epiphany started as a feast of the Lord's nativity celebrated on the day of the winter solstice in Egypt, which was twelve days behind the Julian Calendar (the one we use today). This festival also included the commemoration of the Magi's visit and adoration.

Here is a poem, written by William E. Brooks, which I found in the Christmas Ideals book from 1972 that tells of the visit of the Wise Men to the Infant.

#### THREE KINGS

To Bethelem town in the long ago Three kings of the East came riding;

Seeking the King in the manger low...

#### SAVING STITCHES

Have you ever thought about the adage "A stitch in time saves nine?" It really is true! In these days of hurry, a bit of preventative maintenance can save you time and relieve lots of frustration as well.

Try these ideas to increase the wear life of clothing. Each is a simple way to reinforce areas that tend to wear out quickly or need repair frequently.

1. Sew twill tape into the crotch seam of pants -- it will make the seam stronger and prevent embarrassing rips.

2. Sew a patch of twill tape or salvage under buttons that receive lots of stress -- the buttons won't tear off so easily.

3. Reinforce stitching of the underarm sleeve seam -- it will save ripping and embarrassing holes.

4. Stitch a reinforcement triangle on each side of the top of patch pockets -- this will prevent torn edges.

5. Reinforce the stitching of inside pockets of pants and skirts -- this will help you keep loose change since holes won't occur as easily.

6. Drop a dot of seam sealant on the stitches of buttons -- it literally seals the threads together and button stitching won't pull out.

7. Sew a small support button under heavy buttons -- it will help support the button and prevent tearing off.

8. Sew twill tape or fabric salvage into shoulder or yoke seams -- it will prevent bias edges from stretching and stitches from popping.

9. Use a waistline stay in waisted dresses to reinforce the seam -- it will help stabilize the waist's size and prevent popped stitches.

10. Use a 9" zipper instead of 7" zipper in skirts or pants -- it will receive less stress and will be less likely to break when putting on or taking off the garment.


11. Use interfacing in cuffs, collars, neckline bands and buttoned openings -- garments will wear longer and keep their shape better.

12. Use beeswax on thread used for handstitching -- it will strengthen the thread and prevent tangling.


#### **AUTOMOBILE OPERATION** COST UP

#### **Lower Food Prices** In Store For January

Higher crude oil prices are raising food costs, but Texas consumers will get a January New Year's present-lower prices on three staples: beef, coffee and orange juice.


"Many beef cuts will dip temporarily by about 10% a pound, frozen orange juice will decline about 20% and coffee costs will continue downward because of a 10% larger supply," said Dr. Dick Edwards, a food marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Edwards said the beef discounts will stem from a 10% larger supply of cattle being marketed in January and February, but this will be a temporary situation. Beef prices will begin moving back up by late February.

According to Edwards, larger coffee supplies are driving prices down because coffee-producing nations are still bickering over marketing rights
