## D-FY-IT Program Planned

 For Knox County YouthTexas), a unique drug and alcohol program geared to the youth of today, is coming to Knox County. The D-FY-IT program, under the direction of James Victory, Munday Chief of Police, will be implemented in county schools at the beginning of he fall school term. The Knox County Chapter will have three divisions. and Benjamin.
Each school will elect one student from each grade, 7-12, to serve on a StudentLeadership Panel. This panel will decide the rules and reglations for theirclub, which puts the students in charge. Each division will have a program coordinator and each school will have an advisory board of adult the community. Teachers and law officers, as role models, are the only adults allowed to become members. No one sets out to become an alcoholic or drug addict. This program promotes prevention, instead of prosecution. The key to behavior modification is through motivation. This program is unique in that it combines positive motivation with positive peer pressure to encourage students to become or remain drug. free.

In order to become a member, the
student must voluntarily drug test and submit to a re-testing
whenever their name is randomly
selected. Once they test "clean", each
tudent will receive a T-shirt and I.D. card for members only. With the I.D. card, students receive rewards and
discounts from various merchants. discounts from various merchants. Merchants of the community who wish to be involved in the program will offer these members discount food. As an extra incentive for and food. As an extra incentive for those
students who are "clean", one member each month will be randomly selected to receive a cash reward for being drug-free.
If a student ever tests positive for drugs, the membership card is col-

## Present Texas Revenue Budget Means Less Money For County

The "bare-bones budget" that was passed recently by the House Appropriations Committee has a devastat-
ing effect on counties in ing effect on counties in the 78th
House District. The most harm will House District. The most harm will
come to the already battered human come to the already battered human
services program and the public school finance program with court orders to equalize funding. With this budget, the state wo be deprived of $\$ 4$ billion in federal funds, which would translate into a shorffall of more than $\$ 8$ billion. Commenting on the budget crisis Rep. David Counts (D) Knox City, stated, "I would like to know how the level of services provided. How should we go about raising the money to provide the services at the present level plus projected needs, if wanted? I continue to hear the 'no-new taxes' slogan, however, taxes equate to services and this is the equation we must work to balance." "I need to hear from you."

MILLER CREEK RESERVOIR Level \& condition: full \& clear Temperature: $63^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ Black Bass: Good to 7 lbs on ratle lures, spinners and jigs. Favorite colors include blood, sand, black, Striner Good to 15 lbs. Best deep-running trolling lures. near on reas.
White Bass: Fair. Mostly small in creeks but several good keepers caught in deep water on live minnows or jigs.
Catish: Good to 10 lbs . on trotline till not taking shad. Best baits on lines are goldfish, large minnows, small perch. Few being caught on poles on Tan Bait, liver and minCrappie: Fairly good. Best in quiet, reen-brushed areas. Some limits slow moving jigs and minnows. Rough fish: Good 121 lbs . on Ta Bait, crawfish, minnows and worms. Q: How does one go about entering a fish for a lake record or state record?

A: The Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept. has set out the regulations concerming these two types of records kept informally but not recorded To legally record a fish you must weigh it on scales certified by the Federal Government (Agriculure Dept) Then the appropriate forms must be filled out. The fish had to have been caught legally and by state guidelines. For instance, if you take a game fish other than catifish off a trotline or out of a trap then this isn't eligible because it is illegal. Game fish caught on pole or rod and reel must have been taken with only two hooks (or devices in the case of lures). I used to use 3 jigs when fishing for crappie. While tis isnt ilega, 1 does nol meet he mate any fish I caught unac have made

Consumers should beware of salespersons using free in-home tests to sell water treatment devices.
The in-home test will show minerals in your drinking water, and perhaps the acidity/alkalinity level. The testing procedures use a chemical
that combines with dissolved minerthat combines with dissolved miner als, such as calcium and magnesium, and causes them to seme to he botom of the bottle. Keep in mind uhat all water, except distul
In general, the presence of minerals is not ahealth threat. In fact, many of the minerals are beneficial to the body. However, some docause water hardness and an undesirable taste. Another demonstration is done with a face cloth that has been previously washed. The demonstrator puts the cloth and a water softening agent into a jar of tap water and shakes it vigorously. Suds will occur in the botue, tergentresidue remains in all washed articles.

forgiveness that is available to us in Christ.. "We are hurt most by those we love, and the fact that it still hurts may mean there is something there to build on, a latent feeling of love that really does want the relationship to be restored." HONEYDEW IN SPRING. SOMEWHAT SURPRISING Homeowners may be surprised to find honeydew from landscape trees such as live oak trees. Upon close inspection in looking for aphids, few or none wil be found. This problem was found by W.R. Moore in Mun was fo

The problem is scale insects are heavily infesting live oaks. The scale insects produce honeydew, and under very heavily infested trees, the honey dew produced by these scale isects can be seen drifting down onto the ground. The honeydew is onto which it drifts.
nto which it drifts the spring and early sumer and at this time cause the greatest damage. Eggs are deposited under the female scale. After hatching, the young, which are called crawlers, emerge from beneath the female shell and migrate to infe the newly developed plant tissue. which attack this scale. Weather conditions which limit the developconditions which limit the devalop, ment of the predators and parasics,
but do not adversely affect the scale, may account for the development of large scale populations.
The scale, which resembles litul turtles lined up along the twigs, can be controlled by spraying two to four times at seven to ten day intervals. Insecticides that might be used are malathion, diazinon, dimethoate, or combination with these insecticides might be used. Treatment should be might be used. Treatment should be $90^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$. for 24 to 48 hours. When using any of these materials, read and follow carefully the instructions on the container label.
