## Boll Weevils Are Moving Into Earliest Cotton Fields

As cotton has begun to square, the
need toinspect fields for need to inspect fields for early season pests increases. Earliestplanted fields
are now squaring. Fleahopper boll weevil infestations are increasing.
Only a week is required from the time one can see a square developing until that square is one-third grown.
Boll weevils must deposit their eggs Boll weevils must deposit their eggs
in squares that are at least one-third in squares that are at least one-third grown in order for the larvae to survive. Boll weevil control applicathird grown square stage to prevent third grown square stage to prevent
overwintered boll weevils from deoverwintered boll weevils from de-
positing viable eggs and to delay the development of damaging infestations until later in the growing season.
Boll weevils continue to be cap-
tured in pheromone traps but are tured in pheromone traps but are
decreasing. Seven boll weevils were decreasing. Seven boll weevils were captured in one trap this week. When using traps, the week prior to the one-
third grown square stage is third grown square stage is most
important. When or more boll weevils are captured per trap that week, overwintered boll weevil control measures are suggested. On June 20, only seven weevils were caught in eight traps located throughout Knox County. If producers do not use traps, the need for early season control can be indicated by the numbers of weevils boll weevils per acre (four per 100 feet of row on cotton planted in 40 inch rows, or three per 100 feet of row in 30 inch rows), control measures will be needed.

## CRP Sign-Up

## Begins July 8

Farmers will soon have an opportunity to enter more land into the Conservation Reserve Program. The
eleventh sign-up is set for July 8 -19 cievent sign-up is set for July 8-19.
During the first ten sign-ups, most Texas cropland farmers could count on bids of $\$ 40$ or less per acre being accepted. However, Secretary of Agriculture William Richards says farmers should not rely on that formula when making bids this time.
"Under the new CRP provisions, bidson eligible land will previsions, based on environmental benefits obtained perdollarof oost," Renefhards said. "Producers who wish to enroll in the CRP should be aware that there is increased competition." Richards says to increase water
quality benefits under ers offering areas such as filter strips, grass waterways, windbreaks, shel-
terbelts and ter belts and contour grass strips will ing the bid evaluation pracess ing the bid evaluation process.
Richards adds that bids for enroll-
ing wetlands will not be accepted during the sign-up because the Food, Act of 1990 establishes a Wetlond Reserve Program. Reserve Program. Richards says producers can simultaneously enter the same acreage and CRP. They can withdraw from he commodity programs withou penalty if the CRP bid is accepted Acceptance of a bid is not binding to either the producer or USDA until the contract is signed.
In the first ten CRP sign-ups, TexIn the first ten CRP sign-ups, Tex-
ans had 3.9 million acres of land accepted into the program. On average, erosion was reduced by 36 tons age, erosion was reduced by 36 tons
on each of those acreas as a result of the program. That's over 40 million tons of soil that did not erode as a direct result of the Conservation

Why does the Bible tell us to "fear God"? I can't believe in any God that I have to fear.
A: This is another example of how poor English Bible translations have misled neople. There are three Greek nouns that are translated "fear" in the New Testament. (The original language of the N.T. is Greek.) Phobos: is probably what you are inking about when you say "fear" or "terror". When this type of "fear" is used in the New Testament, it generally is used in a negative context such as in Romans $8: 15$ : "For you did not receive the spirit of slavery tof fall back into fear, but you have received the spirit of sonship." When this term is used in the positive sense, itrefers to "dread" of something. The dread of disease will cause someone topractice healthy habits, for instance. It was the outrageous dread which
creates our English term "phobia". The phobos of God is the dread of The phobos of God is the dread of
that which defiles us and prevents us from growing to maturity in God. Trom growing is maturity in God.
Thitent of 2 Corinthians $7: 1$ The second Greek term translated "fear" is deilia. This is the terror which produces cowardice. God does not want our obedience because of this type of fear or timidity. "For God did not give us a spirit of fear (timidity) but a spirit of power and love and self-control" (2 Timothy 1:7). The third Greek term translated "fear" in the N.T. is eulabeia. It does not mean "dread" or "cowering to a menacing God". It means deep respect or reverence. We are told that Jesus had this type of "fear" (which
should be translated "reverence"). "In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to Him who was able to save him from death, and he was

A big part of successful control of timing the application when a majority of mesquite plants are suscep-
tible. Two of the best indicators of susceptible mesquite are soil temperature and the foilage iself.

The plant should also be actively moving carbohydrates from leavesto root systems, because the herbicide

Together soiltemperature and foliage are good indicators for timing any foliar application, be it hand spraying, ground broaccast or aerial
broadcast. Timing is specially critical to aerial applications where only small amounts of herbicide solution will hit the leaves. It may be less

be found when rains cause the mesquite to put on a new flush of growth. Spraying then often resulls in in very poor control. Wait until all foliage is a mature, dark green. Also, if mesquite foliage appears insects, or drought, postpone spraying.
