City Manager Albert Field warns all city residents that all 50-gallon barrels in alleys will be picked up and hauled away. This operation will start Tuesday, September 26. Men are checking garbage containers in each alley within the city and the ordinance of the regulation closed garbage can will be enforced.

Field said "Anyone who has such a barrel they wish to keep must not keep garbage in them and must remove them from the alley, as only regulation cans with closed lids will be allowed on any premises."

"The open barrels are breeding places for flies, adding to the health hazard here," Field concluded.

Shelbys Enjoy Texas Hospitality, Arkansas Rocking Chair Pace

Familiar figures showed up in Muleshoe this week and were welcomed as "home folks back home." Mr. and Mrs. F. L. "Prof" Shelby, now living in Havana, Ark., spent several days visiting friends here.

Shelby was one of the first members of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce, served as Farm Bureau president and helped to build the Pleasant Valley Community Center building, among the many things that he was noted here for.

Mrs. Shelby taught school for 42 years of her life, 17 of which was in the Muleshoe School system. She is now retired.

For 17 years the Shelbys operated the Shoestring Ranch and he became more and more familiar to the residents of the West Texas town as he daily delivered eggs to employees in business places, stores and homes. At the Shoestring Ranch he had 3,000 hens and 1,500 acres of alfalfa.

In Havana, he has 2,200 hens and some cattle. He has 100 acres of Bermuda which would graze cattle, but he uses for the chickens to roam on.

"We have enjoyed our visit here and that good Texas weather that we are planning to come back next year and stay longer. Our reception back as visitors has been just more than cordial," the old-timer said.

"When we were coming this way, we began to feel like home when we passed the small town of Earth. And sure enough we were," Shelby said.

Mrs. Street was required to register, complying with the Alien Law in the United States, each year and no longer will she be required to do this.

"At last," she said, "I am a citizen of the United States of America."

Mrs. Street is the mother of five children, Jim, Roxanne, John, Matthew and Vickie. Street farms in southern Bailey County.

Wollard, 69, died at 2:45 a.m. Friday, September 22, at West Plains Hospital where he was taken following an apparent heart attack shortly before.

A resident of Muleshoe for the past 38 years, Wollard moved here from Milford, Texas. He was born June 25, 1898 in Long Lane, Mo. He was a veteran of World War I and a member of the First Methodist Church, Muleshoe Masonic Lodge, Kiowa Shrine and American Legion.

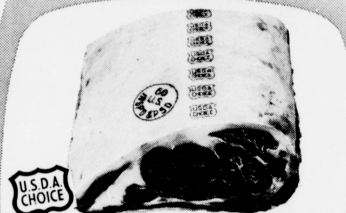

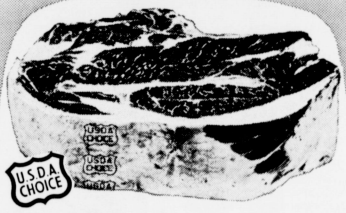

The convention will adopt a policy program comprised of resolutions from affiliated county organizations and will elect state officers and delegates to represent the Texas unit at the National Farmers Union convention.

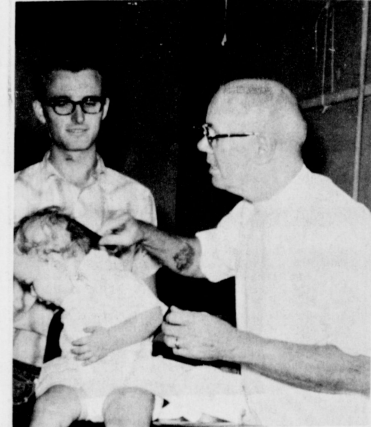

Two Million Dropouts On National Labor Forces

There are 2 million 16-21 year olds in our labor force today who chose to drop out of school without a diploma, Buford Scarborough Texas Employment Commission Manager, said here today.

There will be 32 million adults in the labor force without a high school education by 1975 if the current dropout rate continues, according to the TEC official.

"Many school dropouts face a lifetime of dull, low-paying jobs or no jobs at all, since dropouts have an unemployment rate of 13 percent--more than 3 times the rate for the whole labor force," Scarborough said.

In terms of dollars and cents the picture for dropouts isn't any brighter, he points out. A teenager leaving school before graduating can expect to earn \$1,000 less per year than the person who stays and get a diploma.

"If this country (or community-choose one) is to continue its growth, we desperately need qualified -- and that means educated -- people who can take on the new skilled jobs being created every day," he declared.

The President's Council on Youth Opportunity has launched the 1967 Stay-in-School Campaign to convince all young people of the importance of a good education in their own lives and for the future of their country.

"If you are in school, stay there and get at least a high school diploma," Scarborough urged.

Ain Walker, a senior at Muleshoe high school and Music director of the Circle Back Baptist Church will lead the music for the revival.

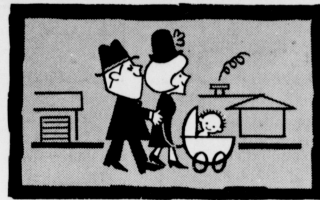

Veterans Q's and A's

Q -- Please clarify who receives the death gratuity in the case of a serviceman who dies while on active duty.

A -- Each of the military services - Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and Coast Guard pays this benefit in cases of deaths of its servicemen. The amount is equal to six months pay, but not less than \$800 or more than \$3,000. The money must be paid to the serviceman's surviving spouse, or secondly, to surviving children. Servicemen who do not have a surviving spouse or children may designate parents, brothers or sisters in any combination to receive the money in case of death.

Q -- I have been on active duty for 21 months. Am I now eligible to go to school?

A -- No. You need full two years to qualify if on active duty.

Q -- I have been on active duty for the past eight years. Am I eligible to go to school?

A -- Yes.

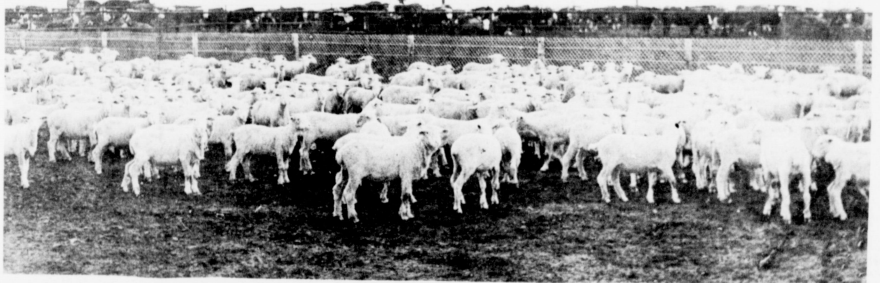

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


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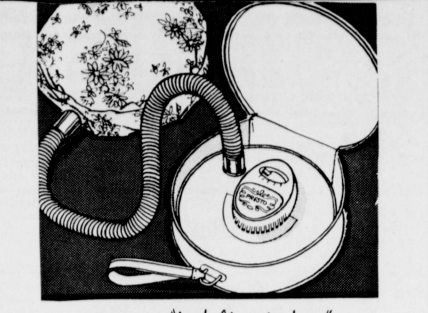


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BUCKLE SAVES LIFE
