D-FY-IT Rally Held

An organizational rally for D-FY-IT (Drug-Free Youth In Texas) was held at the auditorium of Munday High School on Thursday, September 19, at 2:45 p.m.

Kim Brockett, local D-FY-IT coordinator, explained the program to the seventh through twelfth graders. The purpose of the student-run organization is to give positive peer pressure to help students remain drug-free and to urge those who use drugs to stop.

A recent survey showed that although the United States accounts for only 6% of the world's population, it accounts for 60% of all drug abuse. D-FY-IT offers a positive way to deal with this problem on a local level.

The D-FY-IT program originated in Tyler, Texas, and has

since spread to many other states. Canada and several other countries. At the time they join D-FY-IT, students are given a T-shirt and an identification card. This card allows members to obtain discounts at participating businesses in any town where the D-FY-IT program exists.

Students who join D-FY-IT ere required to test drug-free. Random testing will be done periodically. Any student who tests positive for drugs will have their D-FY-IT card revoked for a period of time to be determined by the student board. (Students who are tested are identified by Social Security numbers only...no names are ever revealed.) If a student tests positive for drugs, counseling is offered. If that same student tests positive a second time, counseling is mandatory. The student will have a choice of several qualified individuals from whom to receive this counseling.

At the present time, the local D-FY-IT chapter is attempting to organize a group trip to Six Flags for D-FY-IT Day on October 5. On that day, discounts will be given on gate tickets to the amusement park to all D-FY-IT members and their families. Transportation will be provided by school buses and chaperones will also

Another upcoming event for D-FY-IT is Homecoming '91.To assist with the expenses of this worthwhile organization (drug test kits, T-shirts, etc.), the Homecoming Committee has graciously granted the dance concession stand to D-FY-IT. When you attend and purchase items at the concession stand, remember that all proceeds will go toward helping Munday youth remain drug-

Munday Youth Injured In Hunting Accident

Kevin Walker, grandson of Collis and Emesteen Michels, was injured in a hunting accident near Rhineland Saturday evening.

Kevin had joined two friends, Phillip Bowen and Jeffry Cook, for an afternoon of dove hunting. According to Munday Police Chief Randy Whiteside, while reloading his gun, Kevin apparently got mud in the choke. On his next shot, the choke exploded, sending a piece of shrapnel approximately two inches long into Kevin's neck. (X-rays later revealed that the piece of metal narrowly missed Kevin's jugular vein and the top of his lung.)

Phillip and Jeff, both Boy Scouts, applied direct pressure to the wound and got Kevin into the pickup. In their haste, the pickup became stuck in the mud. Knowing the importance of keeping the victim calm, Jeff remained in the vehicle with Kevin while Phillip ran to the nearest house for help.

Luckily, the occupants of the house where Phillip sought help knew where Whiteside was dining and called him immediately. Whiteside called for an ambulance and then rushed to the accident site. When he arrived, he found the boys walking on the Rhineland highway, supporting Kevin between them. Due to Phillip and Jeffry's calm approach to the circumstances, Kevin was not in shock...only worried about his grandmother.

He was taken to Knox County Hospital and later transferred to Wichita General Hospital. He was scheduled to undergo surgery at 10:00 a.m. Tuesday morning to remove the shrapnel from his neck. While the injury caused partial paralysis in his left arm, a full recovery is expected.

Whiteside credits Phillip's and Jeff's Boy Scout training and calm response with preventing Kevin from going into shock or suffering a life-threatening loss of blood. Their quick thinking just may have saved their friend's life.

Open Bass Tournament Set For Sunday At Miller Creek

Moguls Defeated By Stamford Bulldogs, 33-7

The Munday Moguls did something Friday night that they haven't done in a long, long time...they lost their second game in a row, falling to the Class 2A Stamford Bulldogs, 33-7.

That's the first time since 1983 that the Moguls have lost two consecutive games. At that time, Munday was in District 4-AA, with Jim Edwards at the helm for his first year as Mogul coach. Munday lost four games, falling to Knox City, 12-15; Electra, 7-28; Rotan, 0-20 and Haskell, 14-20. Coach Edwards and the Moguls have come a long way since then.

Friday night's game opened with Stamford receiving the kickoff and marching downfield to Munday's 30-yard line before the Mogul defense could stop the Bulldogs. The Moguls were unable to generate any offense at all and punted three times during the first period.

Following a scoreless first quarter, Stamford got the ball rolling. Their first scoring drive started at their 18-yard line and took only five plays. Darrell Willis ended the suspense with a 44yard touchdown run with 10:19 remaining in the second period.

Dusty Marr, defensive back for Stamford, intercepted a Mogul pass on the Bulldog 13-yard line to stop Munday's first scoring opportunity. Taking 18 plays, Stamford pushed across for their second touchdown with 20 seconds left in the first half. The

Bulldogs went to the locker room at halftime with a 14-0 lead over the Moguls.

Munday came back fighting in the second half. Chad James, Bobby Dockins and Aaron Kiser moved the ball downfield as Munday's offensive line began opening up holes in the Stamford defense. Dockins scored Munday's only TD of the night on a two-yard run with 7:09 left in the third quarter.

On the following kickoff, Daniel Serrato stopped a Stamford runner at the Munday 10-yard line. The defense then held as the Moguls took over at the one-yard line. From that point, a confident Munday team began to move the pigskin. It looked like the Moguls were going to score, but a fumble stopped the scoring drive.

Stamford took only three plays, moving 46 yards, to take a 20-7 lead early in the fourth period.

Turnovers continued to plague the Moguls, as they lost the ball twice to fumbles during the last period. Stamford took advantage, scoring two more times for a 33-




Louise Hamilton, 75, passed away Friday, September 20, at the Munday Nursing Center.

Windbreak Seedlings Available At SCS

That's right folks! It's that time of the year again. The board of directors of the Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is now taking orders for the annual windbreak seedling program.

The local conservation district makes the low-cost seedlings available for local landusers in an effort to promote soil and water conservation. Trees available this year include: Afghanastan pine, Arizona cypress, Ponderosa pine, Red cedar, Catalpa, Cottonwood cuttings, Desert willow, Green ash, Honeylocust, Little walnut, Nanking cherry, Native plum, Osage orange, Pecan, Red oak, Russian olive, Sandcherry, and Skunkbush sumac. The seedling will be delivered on February 26. 1992, for a spring planting.

If you will notice, there are a few new species of hardwood trees this year including Nanking cherry, Native plum and Sandcherry. All of these are great for wildlife.

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At Your Service


(Note: This question comes from out of state, but applies to us all.)

Q: Do you think it is ever right for a preacher to refuse to perform a marriage ceremony? My pastor has done this and I can't understand why.

A: I cannot answer on behalf of your minister. I do not know what his reasons are. I follow the principles set down in scripture concerning marriage.

When I'm asked to perform a wedding ceremony, my first questions help to ascertain whether or not a person is scripturally qualified for marriage. Those who are divorced, unless their divorce was for the reason of unchastity, cannot re-marry. This command comes directly from Jesus. It did not come from man, theologian, preacher or "the church". Jesus said: "...whoever divorces his wife, except for unchastity, and marries another, commits adultery (or makes her commit adultery)" (Matthew 19:9).

Those who are scripturally qualified for marriage are (1) people who have never been

married (1 Corinthians 7:1-2); (2) those who have been widowed (1 Corinthians 7:39-40); (3) those who have divorced because their spouse committed unchastity (Matthew 19:9); and (4) meet legal qualifications (Romans 13:1ff).

There are times in which the best advice is not to marry although this advice is not binding. We have an example of this in 1 Corinthians 7:8-9, 25-40. This may be because of the fact that society might cause problems for the couple (as in the case of "mixed marriages"). There might also be economic or social barriers, age differences, etc. Yet I've noticed that if these couples have a strong faith for the Lord and a strong love for each other, they often become good examples for the rest of the couples in their congregations once they marry. In the case of these opinions, it's not up to the preacher to make the judg-

One final thing that might enter into a preacher's decision to perform a marriage ceremony is whether or not a couple wants to participate in something that is unscriptural. For example, I will not perform a ceremony that is followed by a reception that serves alcoholic beverages or incorporates a blasphemous "rite" such as found in some non-Christian ceremonies (appealing to Buddah or Allah, etc.).

I suggest that if you are truly concerned about this that you go to your preacher (not behind his back) and ask him why he wouldn't perform the ceremony and his reasons behind the decision. If you still have questions, please write.
