Greyhounds Stop Mogul Second Half Comeback

The 1992 football season is looking up for the Munday Moguls. The Moguls played a fantastic ballgame this past Friday night against the Throckmorton Greyhounds. A pair of turnovers may have cost the Moguls the game.

The first quarter seemed to be a dead heat. The Moguls received the opening kick-off, but were unable to go anywhere their first possession. The Greyhounds started from their own 31 yard line and were able to make one first down but had to punt four plays later.

One punt by each team later gave the Moguls the ball on their own 19 yard line. Short runs by Ray Hernandez, Jake Jordan, and Bronco Flye left the Moguls shy of a first down forcing them to punt. Terry Tomlinson was unable to find the handle to a bad snap and the Greyhounds recovered the ball on the Mogul 11 yard line at the end of the first quarter.

The Mogul defense was tough but the Greyhounds were able to make a first down on the Mogul 1 yard line. Travis Gober ran in for the Greyhounds' first touchdown. Wes Lathem kicked the extra point making the score 7 to 0.

The Moguls began the second quarter with the ball on the 20 yard line. The Moguls had a short drive but were forced to punt. The Moguls got the ball back four plays later. Two good runs by Bronco Flye gave the Moguls a first down at their own 43 yard line. On the next play a fumble by Ray Hernandez gave the Greyhounds the ball.

Unable to go anywhere on the ground the Greyhounds went to the air. A 32 yard pass from Travis Gober to Josh Stewart gave the Greyhounds the ball on the Mogul 9 yard line. A 1 yard run and the extra point by Wes Lathem 3 plays later made the score 14-0.

The Moguls ran out of time in the first half, but came out ready to play in the second.

After forcing the Greyhounds to punt the Moguls began from their own 38 yard line. With the offensive line opening holes for

the Moguls, runningbacks Dustin Kiser, Aaron Kiser, and Ray Hernandez were able to make to the Greyhound 14 yard line, including a 27 yard run by Ray Hernandez. A line drive kick by Vamberto Maia Filho made the score 14 to 3.

The kick-off put the Greyhounds on their own 27 yard line. The Mogul defense held the Greyhounds again for a punt.

Bronco Flye, Freddie Sosa, and Jake Jordan put in some footwork to help drive the Moguls down to the Greyhound 1 yard line. Dustin Kiser then ran in the Mogul touchdown but the Moguls weren't finished. The Moguls went for 2 points instead of 1. Good running and good blocking put Aaron Kiser in for the 2 points. The Greyhounds now led 14-11.

Comptroller Reports Sales Tax Rebates Through September

State Comptroller John Sharp has released sales tax rebate figures for the month of September. Statewide there has been a 15.6 percent increase over the payments of one year ago.

Knox County has four towns which collect the sales tax. Benjamin had no refund this period but shows a 8.62 percent increase in revenue for the year to date. Goree also had no refund this period and shows a yearly decrease of 6.92 percent.

Knox City received a net payment of \$8,881.25 rebate, a 20.10 percent increase over the same period last year. Their yearly increase is 4.65 percent.

Munday received a check for \$5,707.33, an increase of 21.52 percent over the same period last year and a yearly increase of 42.60 percent.

The yearly increase of 42.60 percent for Munday looks great until one takes into consideration that the City of Munday enacted the optional .5 percent sales tax for economic development on July 1, 1991. Our overall sales tax is 1.5 percent compared to the other towns' one percent sales tax.

According to City Manager Jim Slaton the one percent sales tax is used for city operations and maintenance with 60% going into the street fund and the remaining 40% goes into the general fund.

During the year that the extra tax has been in effect the City has collected \$26,858.09. The Economic Development Board will decide how to use these funds.

Mrs. Aung is a nuclear physicist, and has taken a job in her field in the Houston area. "Dr. Aung has been commuting to Chicago for the past year to be with his family. Since his wife's occupation is unique, she must go where an opportunity in her field exists," stated Kuehler.

Dr. Aung, a family physician with a practice in Munday and Knox City since 1991, will close his offices in November. Patients' records will be available at Dr. Shirley Barretto's office.

Kuehler continued, "We had planned to have two physicians working together with Dr. Barretto's return. With Dr. Aung leaving, we will be actively recruiting another physician to work with Dr. Barretto."

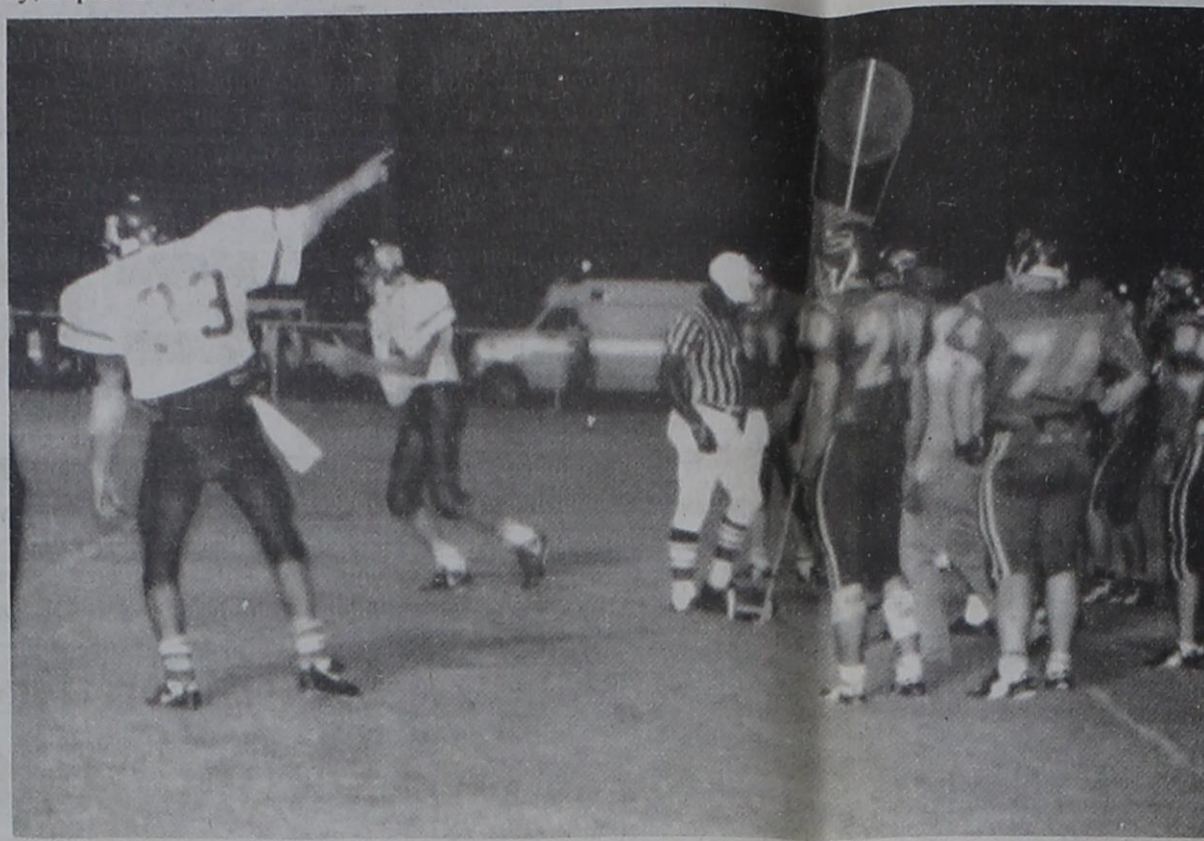

Deadline Near

Only two weeks remain in the sign-up period for Phase II Disaster. The sign-up ends Friday, October 2, and is applicable only to wheat, oats, and barley for the 1992 crop year.

In order to qualify for disaster, you must have made less than 65% of your yield if you have multi-peril (FCIC) insurance or less than 60% of your yield if you do not have multi-peril (FCIC).

If you made less than 35% of your yield, you must purchase multi-peril (FCIC) insurance for the 1993 crop year. This is a change, when the program was first announced it was told that insurance had to be purchased anytime you qualified for disaster, regardless of the yield made. This was not right.

September 30 is the final date to purchase multi-peril or FCIC for 1993 wheat, oats and barley.

Sign-up for Phase III Disaster begins October 13 and runs through February 12. This sign-up is applicable to all crops and the years 90, 91 and 92. You may file on any two years of your choice on each farm, depending on your loss. If you signed up for disaster last spring, you have used up one of your options. If you elect to wait and sign up for 1992 wheat, oats or barley under Phase III and you made less than 35% of your ASCS yield, you must purchase multi-peril (FCIC) insurance by September 30. Purchase of insurance does not apply to the 90 and 91 crop years, only 1992.

Q: Who is the Melchizedek mentioned in the letter to the Hebrews?

A: Melchizedek was both a priest and a king of Salem (Jerusalem). He is first found in the Old Testament (Genesis 14:18-20). Before the Old Covenant was established with its Levitical priests, Abraham gave a tithe to the priest of Salem. In turn, Melchizedek gave Abraham bread and wine - an Old Testament event which predicted the Lord's Supper, most likely.

Another old Testament passage predicted that the Christ would come and be a priest "after the order of Melchizedek" (Psalm 110:4). This passage was fulfilled by Jesus (Hebrews 5:6; 7:17; 6:20).

No one knows who Melchizedek was or where he came from. Some have supposed that he was Shem, the son of Noah. Shem lived for about 600 years. His lineage is given in Genesis 11:10-26. According to Genesis 11, Shem would have been Abraham's great, great, great, great, great, great, great, great, great, great.

grandfather. He would have been alive due to the long life common to pre-flood peoples. It would have been natural for Abraham to pay respect to God through this ancestor.

Whoever Melchizedek was, his life became a prophecy for the coming of a non-Levite priest who couldn't serve as priest on earth but is now serving as a sympathetic high priest in Heaven (Hebrews 8:4; also see Hebrews 5-7).

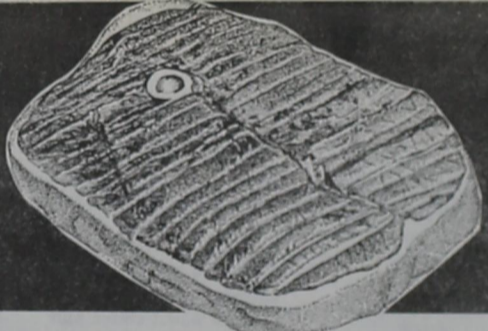

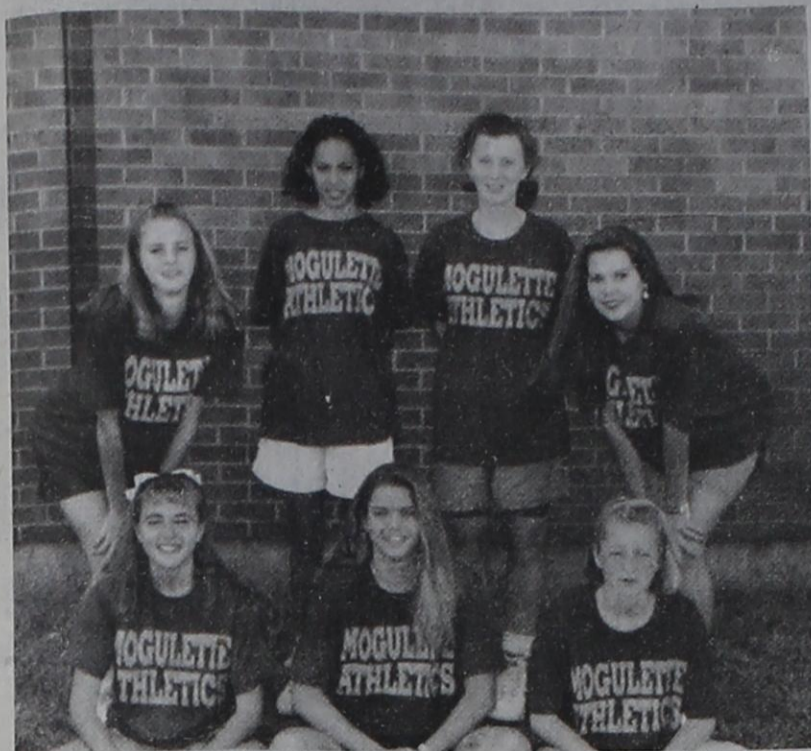

How to live the perfect life? According to the Hebrews, one lived such a life by keeping the Sabbath. The seventh day of the week, named Sabbath, was first set aside for the rest of slaves and animals. The worship leaders of Israel designated the seventh day as a day of worship, in imitation of God who rested on the seventh day after creating the heavens and the earth in six days. The Hebrew "verb" "shabat" means to stop, to cease, to be unemployed. So, the word came to mean to rest or to stop in order to praise (God).

The number seven symbolized perfection, the perfection of God's creation and rest. To the mystics, to observe the Sabbath meant to participate in God's rest and perfection. To the average worshiper, to observe it was to reveal oneself as faithful.

Perhaps another verse, in a different context, describes the practical meaning of the Sabbath: "One does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Deut. 8:4). According to the Old and New Testaments, life is imperfect or unfulfilled apart from God, regardless of how much bread we have.

Jesus kept the Sabbath, but he did not keep all the rules that had

developed around this important day. There were rules against preparing meals, lighting fires, tending to a hurt animal or a human in danger, of walking further than 1,367 yards and of even untying a knot or tracing more than a letter of the alphabet. My mother has told me of similar rules her parents prescribed for keeping the Lord's Day, Sunday, in her childhood home: no card playing and no visiting of friends. We are not so strict now, but we still need to experience a Sabbath, a renewing rest with God. Jesus was accused of breaking the Sabbath when he was doing good, compassionate acts of healing. He was doing his "Father's work."

Perhaps if we re-discover this spirit of Jesus, a zeal for God and a devotion to ease human suffering, we will discover the rest of God that fulfills our souls.

SELECT WHEAT VARIETY CAREFULLY

Wheat planting has begun and some producers are still asking me about wheat varieties and how they performed in my result demonstration for this year. There are many management decisions that should be made prior to selecting a wheat variety such as, will the wheat be grazed out, grazed and cut, or just cut for grain? Is 1993 going to be another year for rust? Will there be sufficient moisture for a crop? All of these questions pose problems in selecting a wheat variety. Listed below are results from five years of result demonstrations, 1992 results and rust resistance ratings of some varieties.
