Fireworks Safety Is Your Responsibility

Many cities in Texas have banned the use of fireworks within city limits. Even though fireworks are still available in most of these cities, the ban has improved public awareness of potential fire and safety problems.

Using fireworks safely car reduce the number of fires and injuries caused by fireworks. The Texas Commission on Fire Protection offers the following ten recommendations for safely using fireworks.

1. Purchase fireworks only from a vendor that displays a State Fire Marshal's Office retail fireworks

2. Remember that many cities and comunities regulate the possession and use of fireworks. Contact the local fire department or law enforcement authorities for rules in your community.

3. Never let children use fireworks. Always designate a responsible, sober adult to ignite

fireworks.

Hunter Education Class Scheduled For July 6-8

A course in hunter education has been scheduled for July 6-8 from 6:00-10:00 p.m. in Munday, according to Ricky Moeller, Hunter Education Instructor.

"According to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's mandatory requirements, starting September 1, 1989, those persons whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1973, must have successfully completed the course in order to hunt in Texas. Effective September 1, 1990, the age group affected will be those whose date of birth is during the period September 2, 1971 through August 31, 1974 -- and so on. By September 1, 1993, all hunters born on or after September 2, 1971 must have successfully completed the course to hunt in Texas. However, any individual may take the course on a voluntary basis and is encouraged to attend regardless of requirements," according to Mr. Moeller.

"The course is open to adults and youngsters and will include instructions in rifle, shotgun and bowhunting handling and safety; outdoor responsibility and ethics; laws and regulations; conservation; hunting traditions; wildlife identification; field care of game; wilderness first aid and survival," Moeller added.

Students 12 years of age or older successfully completing the course will be issued a hunter education certificate from the

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Those less than 12 years of age will receive a certificate of attendance, but must take the course again for proper certifica-

More than 160,000 Texans have already completed the hunter education course, which is mandatory in 39 states.

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



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

Q: I'm 15 years old, but mature for my age. My boyfriend is 17. I want to go steady, but my parents won't let me. Do you think it's wrong to go steady?

A: I went steady when I was 17, but never to a girl who was 15 (no matter how mature she was). The one over-riding principle to anything we do is to ask the question: "Would Jesus have done this?"

Going steady is usually seen as the first major step toward mariage. Generally, in our culture, youth do not get married at such an early age. I would advise you to wait a couple of years before taking such a dramatic step in your life as going steady. Studies have shown that when you marry before you are twenty that your chances of a failed marriage are far more than when you marry after twenty. God hates divorce, and we should respect that (Malachi 2:16).

Going steady intensifies your emotions and makes sexual immorality a stronger temptation. God wants you to reserve sexual intimacy for your marriage relationship (Revelation 21:8 compare with 1 Corinthians 7:1-5).

I know two years seems like a long time, but if you are mature for your age at 15, just think how much more mature you will be at 17 or 18 years old.


