BENJAMIN-A meeting of the citizens in the Benjamin school district was held in the Knox County courthouse Wednesday night of last week for the purpose of discussing the current water problem and organizing a group to work toward solving the town's water shortage. 





> ment to perform any of the functions that are vested in him with certain exceptions. The powers and functions of the Farm Credit Administration are not transferred to the Secretary, as well as the powers and functions of the Boards of Directors and officers of the corporations that exist in the Department. Of course the Corporations of the Department, such as the Federal Land Bank, the Production Credit Corporation, and others, legally speaking, independent personalities and act on their own in their own name rather than in the name of the Department of Agriculture of the United States. The Plan further calls for the appointment by the President of two additional Assistant Secretaries of Agriculture and the appointment by Mr. Benson of an Administrative Assistant who will be under Civil Service. Of course, the purpose of the Plan is to simplify and make more workable the operations of the

Diptheria occurs most frequently in early childhood. It is caused by a germ that grows in the nose and throat and throws out a toxin or poison into the blood stream. This poison may attack the heart muscle or it may cause a paralysis known as peripheral neuritis.

Diptheria is a dangerous disease for a child to have as it is highly infectious to other children. It starts with a sore throat, fever, and sometimes croup and hoarseness.



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
