Records indicate that Mrs. Nelson was the first baby born in Munday, Texas. She married Clyde Nelson on February 9, 1923 in Benjamin, Knox County, Texas. In her early years she was a school teacher whose educational training included attending San Marcos Academy and Simmons College (Hardin Simmons University) and the College of Industrial Arts. She was a faithful church member, serving as a Sunday School teacher, W.M.U. leader, as well as involved in praver. evangelism, and many benevolent ministries. She was recognized as Texas Baptist Mother of the Year by the Baptist General Convention of Texas, in 1959. Her influence was always felt wherever she was. Honorary Pallbearers were Jerry Sanders, Terry Sanders, Larry Sanders and Wayne Phemister.






### cotton ginned


