Garbage And Turnpike Discussed By Council

The City Council of the City of Munday, Texas met August 10, 1993 in regular session at the City Hall at 7 p.m.

Members present: Mayor Richard Albus and Councilpersons Gary Tidwell, Winters Matthews, George Oustad and Jessie Andrade.

Members absent: Steve Morren.

Guests: Lynn Fitzgerald, Munday Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture; Gary Schur, Charles Baker, and David Neal, Development Corporation of Munday, Inc.; Mayor Oscar Mangis, City of Knox City; and Len Lyons and Chuck Messer, BFI Waste Systems.

Mayor Albus called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. and ordered the reading of previous minutes. Minutes of the July 13 regular and July 20 special meetings were read. Motion by Oustad and seconded by Matthews to approve minutes as read. Motion carried.

Lynn Fitzgerald, Gary Schur, Charles Baker and David Neal met with the Council to discuss the proposed turnpike from Abilene to Wichita Falls. After discussion, a sample resolution was presented to the Council. A motion was made by Matthews and seconded by Tidwell to pass the resolution calling for a feasibility study to be done and supporting the proposed project. Motion carried.

Len Lyons and Chuck Messer met with the Council to discuss the options available to the City in regards to solid waste disposal. The City has been notified by the City of Haskell that the landfill will close on August 31. The Council requested that BFI submit quotes on full service disposal and landfill costs.

Motion by Tidwell and seconded by Oustad to approve the Oil, Gas and Mineral lease on City property with Norman D. Fitzgerald. Motion carried.

The tax rate options were discussed. No action was taken at this time.

Employee reports were given. The Council received bids on the Airport farmland lease and authorized the City Administrator to accept the bid of Fetsch Brothers Farms.

Bids were received for Liability

and Property Insurance. The current policy expires on August 31. One bid was received from Charles Baker Insurance Company. The Council authorized the Mayor and City Administrator to make a few additions and deletions and to accept the bid.

Oustad moved to pay bills as follows: Operating \$17,409.19. Seconded by Tidwell. Motion carried.

Motion by Andrade to adjourn. Seconded by Tidwell. Motion carried.

Munday Defeats Throckmorton

The Munday Moguls and the Throckmorton Greyhounds gave their fans a hard fought game until the end. The Moguls edged out the Greyhounds 12 to 6.

Munday was given several breaks by Throckmorton in the first half but did not take advantage of one until late in the second.

First Gerald Taylor recovered a fumble by the Greyhounds at their 35 yard line early in the first quarter. Munday then moved the ball down to Throckmorton's 5 and was stopped by a stubborn Greyhound defense.

The Moguls' next opportunity came at the beginning of the second when the Greyhounds were forced to punt. Jake Jordan darted past the line and blocked the punt and Munday recovered at Throckmorton's 22 yard line.

Once again a Greyhound defense held the Moguls up, this time at the 8 yard line. Throckmorton was unable to get a first and had to punt.

Munday moved the ball from the 50 to the 30 yard line. On the next play a fumble by the Moguls was recovered by Throckmorton's Steve Stephens at the Greyhound 21 yard line.

Throckmorton didn't have the ball very long. On first down a misdirected pitch back from the quarterback was recovered by Dustin Kiser at the one yard line for the Moguls.

Aaron Kiser took the ball in from there for the first score of the game with 1:49 left in the half. The extra point was missed. Munday went on top 6 to 0.

On Throckmorton's next possession Donny Browning intercepted a Greyhound pass to keep the Greyhounds from having a chance to score before the half.

The Greyhounds received the second half kick-off. Throckmorton went to the air trying to gain ground fast but Bronco Flye stepped in to intercept one at the Greyhound 48.

The Moguls moved the ball up to the 44 and Bronco Flye took it from there. Flye dashed the 44 yards to put Munday up 12 to 0. A two point conversion failed.

It didn't take the Greyhounds long to answer back. Cody Jones took the kick-off down to the Mogul 21 yard line. Throckmorton then moved the ball to the 2 on the ground. Steve Stephens then hit Cody Jones on a pass for the touchdown. A fumble on the snap failed to give the Greyhounds a chance at the extra point. The score then went 12 to 6.

The game seemed to be more intense from then on. Munday pushed the ball to the Greyhound 30 but Josh Stewart ended the drive by intercepting a Mogul pass.

After trading a punt with Munday, Throckmorton had the ball at their own 34 yard line. Three plays later Junior Perez recovered a Greyhound fumble at the 30 for the Moguls.

A score might have put the game out of reach for the Moguls but the Greyhound defense held tough at the 8 yard line.

Quarterback James Gober hit Steve Stephens for a 26 yard gain to put the ball at the 34. Josh Stewart then dodged and raced 66 yards for what would have tied the score, but a clipping penalty caused the touchdown to be called back. Munday also had a penalty on the play. The penalties were offset

which put the ball back at the line of scrimmage.

The Greyhounds then moved the ball 15 yards in two plays. On a second and long Throckmorton went to the air and this time Kole Sanders came down with the ball at the Mogul 33. A penalty against the Greyhounds moved the ball out to Throckmorton's 47.

Munday was stopped by the Greyhound defense in four plays.

With the clock ticking, Throckmorton had to move the ball fast. The Greyhounds passed the ball 6 out of 7 plays completing only 1 of the passes and losing ground on the run.

Munday took the ball over and ran the clock out for their first win of the season 12 to 6 over the Throckmorton Greyhounds.

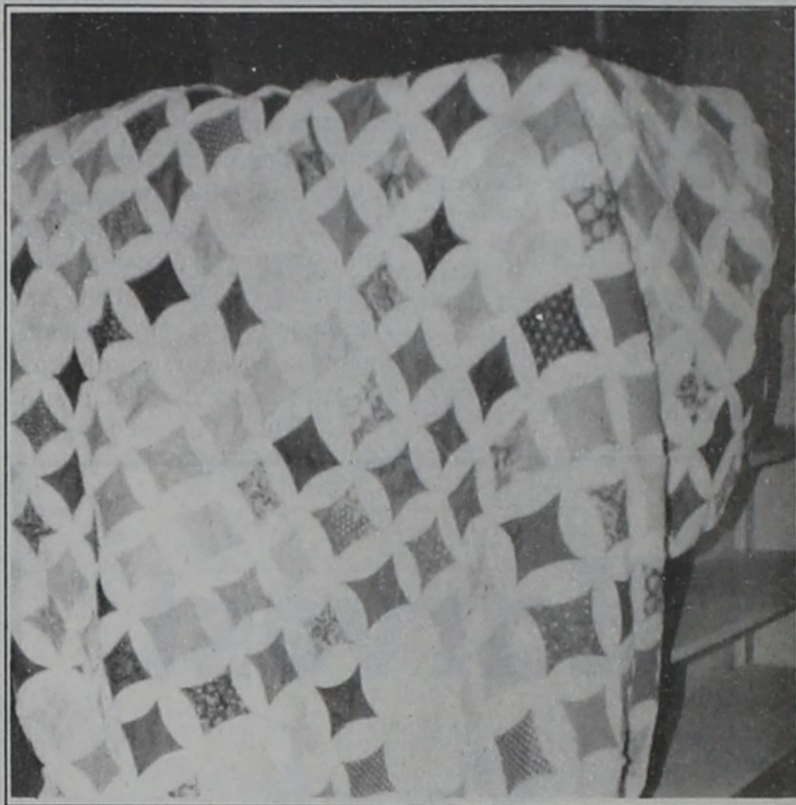

After completing the first year of her return to Knox County, Shirley Barretto, M.D., decided she likes it so well she's ready for a longer commitment.

Dr. Barretto signed a two year contract with Knox County Hospital recently, according to Stephen Kuehler, administrator. "We're delighted Dr. Barretto has shown her confidence in our hospital and our community by guaranteeing us she will stay at least

two years," Kuehler said. "We hope this is just the first of many extended contracts with Dr. Barretto."

Dr. Barretto has office hours in Knox City Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to noon, and in Munday from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.

She and her husband Joe, and son Ivan, 14, have enjoyed their year in Knox County, she said. "One of the things that brought us back to Knox County was the friendly people," Dr. Barretto said.

Kuehler said that Dr. Barretto's commitment to the area is appreciated and will help the board of directors and community leaders concentrate on recruiting another physician to Knox County.

Knox County Hospital District will participate in Health Find in Dallas in October. Kuehler explained that Health Find is a recruiting event that brings rural hospitals together with medical students who are finishing their training. "There's a lot of competition at this event, but we hope to be able to do a good job of promoting our community and our hospital to an interested physician," Kuehler said.

"This is the community's chance to help us bring another physician to Knox County. We'll be calling on some of the members of the community to help us with this event," he said.

Dr. Barretto completed her medical degree in YERMMMC in Quezon City, Philippines in 1971. She served a one-year rotating internship at Sydenham Hospital in New York City, N.Y., and a five-year residency in pediatrics-neonatology at Fordham-Misericordia Lincoln Hospital in New York City.

Since coming to the United States in 1977, she has practiced in New York City, Harvey, N.D. and Bismark, N.D.

At Your Service Dr. Larry Fitzgerald Minister, Church of Christ

Q: What is the Lord's Supper?
A: The Lord's Supper (also often called "communion") is a memorial ceremony instituted by Jesus. While celebrating the Old Testament Feast of Passover, Jesus took unyeasted bread and "fruit of the vine" (grapejuice or mildly fermented wine) and gave it to his followers to consume. He told the disciples that the bread was symbolic of his body given for them and the drink was a memorial of his blood which freed them of their sins (Matthew 26; Mark 14; Luke 22).
The apostles instituted this practice as part of the regular worship service of the church (1 Corinthians chs. 10-11). This "breaking of bread" took place every Sunday (Acts 20:7).

When a Christian partakes of the Lord's Supper, he is to remember what torture Jesus had to undergo so that he might be forgiven of sins. The bread represents Christ's body of flesh and Christ's spiritual body on earth (the church) (read carefully 1 Corinthians 10:16-17 and Ephesians 1:22-23). Therefore, as a Christian celebrates the Lord's Supper, he is to examine himself and consider what Christ did for him and what he's doing for Christ through the church (1 Corinthians 11:28).
By the way, the term "supper" does not mean an evening meal. It is a poor translation. The original Bible word means the "main meal of the day." Indeed, the Lord's Supper is our main spiritual meal of each week.

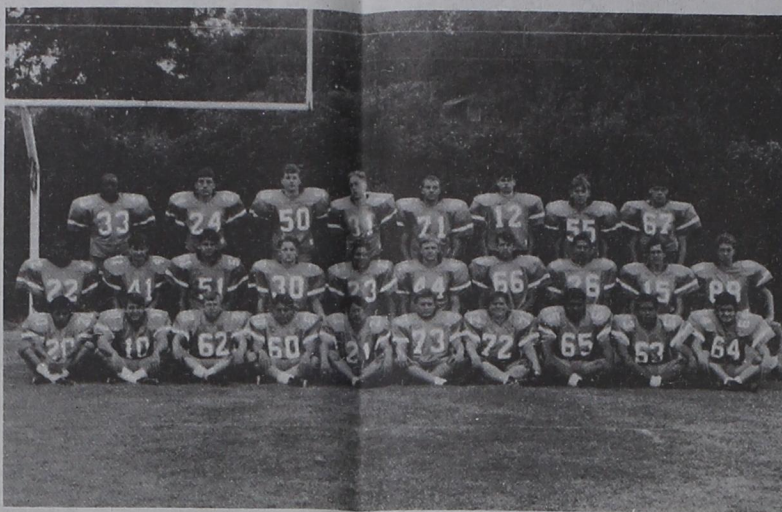
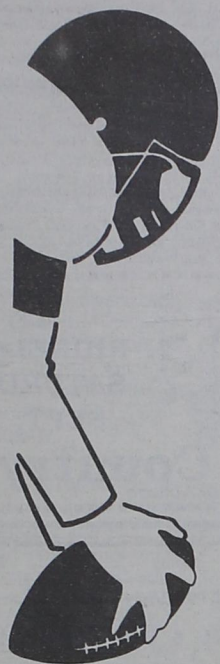

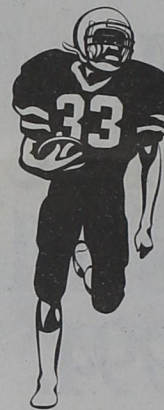

NOTICE OF UTILITY RATE INCREASE
The following increases will become effective on the water bill that you received on November 1.
WATER - The charge for water has been \$1.75 per thousand. It will be raised to

\$1.80 per thousand.
SEWER - The charge for 1 bath in your home has been a flat rate of \$4.50, 2 baths \$5.25 and 3 baths \$6.00. These will be raised to 1 bath \$5.00, 2 baths \$6.00 and 3 baths \$7.00.

GARBAGE - The charge for residential garbage has been \$9.00 plus \$.70 State tax and most commercial garbage has been \$10.00 plus \$.78 State tax. These charges will be raised to \$10.00 plus \$.78 State tax for residential garbage and \$15.00 plus \$1.16 State tax for most commercial garbage. The charge for garbage pickup outside of the city limits has been \$18.00 plus \$1.40 State tax. This will be changed to \$20.00 plus \$1.55 State tax. The City has decided to implement these increases because of the following reasons:

1. The City has recently experienced major problems at the wastewater treatment plant. It was determined that the plant was in need of extensive renovation. Most of the evaporation ponds have deteriorated to the point of complete failure. The Texas Water Commission is requiring the City to rebuild these ponds and to place a plastic liner in the bottoms of the ponds to prevent sewage from entering the underground water table. An Urgent Need Emergency Grant was applied for and received by the City in order to provide most of these necessary repairs. This grant will provide \$350,000.00 toward the \$420,000.00 project. The City must provide the remaining \$70,000.00. For this reason, the City decided to raise the water and sewer charges.

2. The garbage rate was raised in order to prepare for the increased cost that is coming for garbage disposal in the very near future. The City is faced with a considerable cost increase for garbage collection and disposal due to the fact that the landfill at Haskell will be closing. The City will either begin hauling our garbage to Abilene or Wichita Falls to be disposed of or contract out the collection and disposal of the garbage to a company that provides these services. The last option will be the cheapest option, at least in the beginning, but no matter which option the City chooses, the cost of garbage will rise considerably. It was felt that several small increases would be easier to adjust to than one large increase. The preliminary quotes that the City has received for contracting the garbage out have indicated that while residential customers will only see an increase of \$2 to \$4 per month, commercial customers can expect increases of 250 to 400 % above what they are now being charged.

The State and Federal mandates placed on this and all cities have cost you, the customer, thousands of additional dollars in charges each year and appears to be growing. Regulations are made and enforced upon cities with no funds provided for the implementation of these rules. The City must comply with the regulations or face penalties and fines.
