



**JAMES CARDEN**, owner of Carden Plumbing and Electric in Munday, was injured Thursday afternoon in a two vehicle traffic accident which occurred on North 3rd and Main Street. He was taken to Haskell hospital by ambulance, where he was admitted.

## County residents injured in two traffic accidents

A two car collision on Thursday, April 21, sent a Munday man to the hospital in serious condition.

James Carden of Munday was traveling north on 3rd Ave. and was crossing main street when he collided with Lisa Myers, who was traveling east. Mrs. Myers works with the Knox County Ambulance Service, and was responding to a cardiac call when the accident occurred.

Myer's suburban struck the side of Carden's pickup and slammed it head on into a utility pole.

Mr. Carden was transported to Haskell Memorial Hospital by the Munday unit of the Knox County Ambulance Service. Due to the force of the impact, both his knees were broken, the tubula on his right leg is broke, and he suffers facial lacerations. He remains in the Haskell hospital.

Mrs. Myers was treated and released from the Knox County Hospital.

Munday Police Chief Tom Tejada was assisted by county officers at the scene. The DPS assisted with the investigation.

At approximately 4 p.m. on Sunday, April 24, a Goree man was injured in a two car traffic accident on Hwy. 277 in front of the Goree school building.

Jesus Castorena of Goree was traveling west when he turned and collided with a Dodge Caravan driven by Danny Patton of Wichita Falls. Mr. Patton was heading east with his wife and children, pulling a small camper trailer. Castorena's Ford Ranger pickup struck the front side of the trailer, causing it to come unhitched and flipping it over on its side.

The Patton family was not hurt in the accident. Castorena was taken to the Seymour Hospital by the Munday unit of the Knox

County Ambulance Service, where he was treated and released.

DPS officer Brian Williams worked the accident, assisted by the Knox County Sheriff's Department and Munday Police Chief Tom Tejada. The Goree Fire Department was also called due to a fuel spill. They helped secure the area.

## Ways to avoid food poisoning

Emphasis has again been given to the seriousness and potential danger of food poisoning. Hardly any of us have been spared the uncomfortable symptoms --- stomach ache, cramps, diarrhea, vomiting, fever, headache. Usually these symptoms subside with time, but we are seeing more severe complications.

Use these ideas to "beat the bugs" that cause food borne illness.

1. **Avoid A Raw Deal.** Cook foods, especially raw meats, poultry, fish and eggs thoroughly. Ground meats are more likely to be contaminated because of the large surface area exposed in grinding. In larger cuts, such as roasts and steaks, bacteria may be on the outside surface, but the muscle meat may not be contaminated. With ground meat products, the bacteria will be spread throughout.

2. **Egg Alert.** The culprits here are both unsafe food handling and bacteria inside some egg shells. The bacteria is a certain type of Salmonella that may be transmitted from the hen to the egg. It is possible that an egg, even if uncracked, could have the bacteria in it. So always cook eggs thoroughly, do not wash eggs prior to storage, and store in the original container.

3. **The Convenience Factor.** A bacteria called Listeria may lurk in ready-to-eat packaged foods and deli meats, and the scary thing is that it can grow at refrigerator temperatures. To protect against it, re-heat foods such as hot dogs or deli meats before consuming. Be sure to observe "use by" dates.

4. **In A Stew.** When you cook in large quantity, how do you cool the leftovers? A large pot of hot food should be divided into shallow containers, so that the temperature drops quickly enough and bacteria does not grow in the center.

5. **Beware The Hitchhiker Germ.** Bacteria are hitchhikers and you can give them a ride if you don't practice good hygiene and safe food handling practices. That's why we have to be so careful to avoid cross-contamination. We cross contaminate when we let juices from raw meats or our hands that have touched them, carry bacteria to raw or uncooked foods.

If you or anyone in your family is at increased risk for food borne illness, due to chronic illness, age, or other reason, follow preventive measures to protect yourself from the possibility of severe consequences of food borne illness.

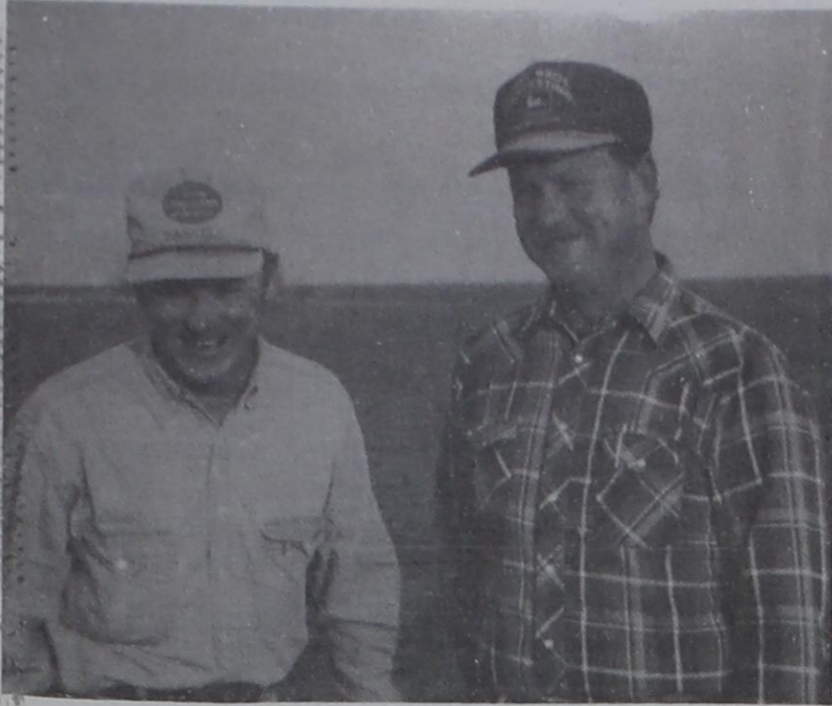

## Lowe Brothers selected Conservation Ranchers

Joe and Jerry Lowe have been selected as the Non-Resident Conservation Ranchers by the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District. The Non-Resident Conservation Award means that the recipient operates land within the boundaries of the district. The Lowe brothers operate a yearling operation in the north east part of Haskell County.

Lowe Brothers operate approximately 650 acres divided into 520 acres cropland, 25 acres grassed waterways, 81 acres rangeland and 10 acres pastureland, and are able to run about 700 yearlings.

Through the Great Plains Conservation Program, the Lowe brothers constructed approximately 77,470 feet of parallel terraces, and 25 acres of grassed waterways. They have done brush work and pasture planting.

Wheat pastures are in a rotated grazing system. By using electric fencing to make smaller fields, the Lowes can have a better and more controlled utilization of wheat

grazing.

Pastureland is seeded to Kleingrass, and Joe and Jerry are currently clearing rangeland to seed back to Kleingrass. This will make more productive grazing.

They rotate approximately 150 acres of cottonland.

Besides the ranching business, they also operate a grass seed and custom harvesting business. From May through October, the Lowes travel with the harvesting business. They harvest grain and grass seed from places such as South Dakota, Montana, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, and Texas. The harvest depends on where it has rained.

Due to their dedication in protecting, maintaining productivity, and improving the land they own and operate in Haskell County, the Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District is proud to recognize Joe and Jerry Lowe with the 1994 Non-Resident Conservation Rancher Awards.

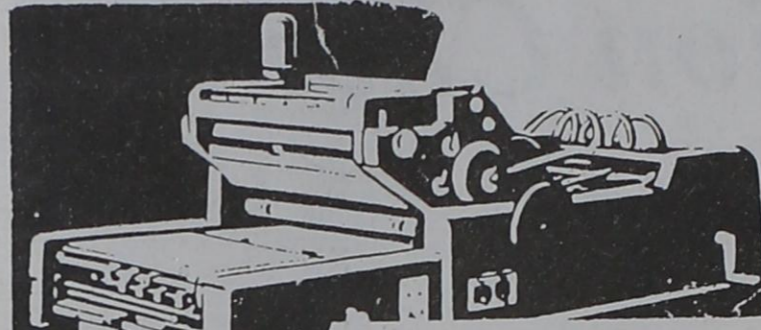

## From A Carpenter's Son

I heard a story once about a fisherman who never caught anything. He couldn't understand why. After all, he had bought a brand new whisper 2000 prop for his bass rig so as not to alert the fish to his presence. In addition he had all the latest equipment in fish finders, trolling motors, etc. He had brand new state of the art rods and reels and the newest lures all scientifically designed. In short, he had everything he needed to be a successful fisherman and yet he never caught any fish.

One day he went out to the lake as usual to put his boat in, and by the ramp he saw a boy fishing with a plain old pole right off the shore. He walked over and looked in the boy's catch bucket and was amazed to find it nearly full of fish. He decided he would ask the boy to come along with him and help him figure out why he never caught any fish.

The two set off together at break-neck speed across the lake with the Whisper 2000 silently spinning. They reached a good spot and trolled around for a while using the fish finder to locate where the fish were schooling. They stopped the boat and put down the anchor to hold them in exactly the right place. Then the man got out one of his fanciest lures, snapped it on the end of the line, and gave it a long low toss out over the

water. It plunked in and he reeled it back, expertly twitching the pole to give the lure its life-like action. After he had reeled it all the way in, he took the lure off, put it away and started to pull the anchor. "What are you doing?!", the boy asked. "There obviously aren't any fish here," he said "so I'm going back to shore." When they got back to the boat ramp, the boy said, "Mister, I know what your problem is. Now, more than ever, we need something solid in our lives, someone we can trust and depend on. Most of us are looking for answers, and that means those of us who know Jesus need to introduce him to those of us who aren't really sure if we do.

It doesn't take a lot of flashy equipment, or fancy technique. Just be honest and genuine and most of all, persistent.

And remember, hardly anyone ever caught on their very first cast. If you truly want to help others by leading them to Christ, (instead of spiritual 'scalp-hunting') then God will be true to you. Have faith.

You may vote early through May 3 at the Goree city office and at the superintendent's office.

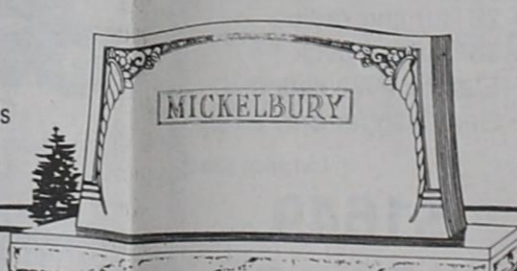
