

**Type 'O' blood donors needed at** upcoming Red Cross blood drive

When accidents happen, help can't wait. Time doesn't always allow a patient's blood type to be confirmed before a blood transfusion is needed. That's why it's so important for blood donors with 0-negative blood to donate. Their blood is the universal type that is often used in trauma cases because it is compatible with all blood types. Their blood often means the difference between life and death at a time when minutes count.

Type O donors are in high demand: O-positive blood is needed because it's the most common blood type. More than 39 percent of the population has O-positive blood. While only seven percent of the population have O-negative blood, it is the type of blood most frequently used.

Eligible donors - no matter what blood type - are encouraged to give at the upcoming Red Cross blood drive June 3rd, at the Community Center in Munday, 261 S. Munday Ave., from 2:00 to 6:30 p.m.

"Volunteer donors are the only source for lifesaving blood," said Brenda Smith, Bloodmobile Coordinator. "There is no substitute for human blood. Patients right here in Munday depend on each other for a safe and adequate blood supply. If you don't give, who will?"

Donors must be 17 or older, weigh at least 110 pounds and be in general good health. Donating blood is safe. Blood donors are in no danger of contracting HIV/AIDS or hepatitis. A new and sterile needle is used for each donor and the needle site is made aseptic before the blood is drawn.

Zapata plead guilty to an aggravated assault charge and admitted stabbing Frank Zavala, 37, of Seymour with a homemade "shank" on April 28.



### Association to meet in Corpus Christi

The leadership of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association will focus on ways cattle producers can overcome the current harsh financial times during the group's June 14-15 meeting in Corpus Christi, Texas, says Chaunce O. Thompson Jr., president from Breckenridge.

"It's no secret that cattle producers are struggling against powerful economic forces and drouth conditions," he said. "We know the problems, most which are not new, so we are looking for solutions."

More than 200 TSCRA directors and committeemen are expected to turn out for the meeting, which will be held in the Marriott Bayfront Hotel.

At the committee level, the cattle producers will discuss a recent state district court battle over meat packer control of the marketplace, how to manage animal health and feed options during drouth and unprofitable times, things to avoid in "downsizing" a ranch work force, the pros and cons of ecosystem management, lawsuit reform and the laws and regulations of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Committee meetings will be held from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday.

Speaker of the Texas House Pete Laney, D-Hale Center, is also invited to provide a legislative outlook for the 1997 session of the state legislature.

Thompson will report on the association's activities, while Lamm will discuss U.S. immigration laws and policies from the perspective of the advocacy group Federation for American Immigration Reform.

### Texas Division of Emergency with State and local fire officials average wildfire activity this sumsummer fire season. In preparing for the worst, they consider extreme dry conditions and a recordbreaking winter fire season as early indicators of the danger ahead.

Below normal rainfall, which began to plague the state last fall, tions, says the Texas Forest Service, create wildland fire dangers that they usually do not see until summer.

"During the 1996 winter fire season. Texas had record fire activity, fire intensity, and loss," said Mark Stanford, assistant department head for the Texas Forest Service. "Drought conditions that greatly contributed to the fire season still exist across the state."

Stanford said that while spring "green up" has reduced wildfire activity the lull is temporary. Vegetation -- light and heavy fuels for fire -- is both abundant and unseasonably dry. He said that as the drought continues vegetation will become drier and easier to burn.

Most areas of the state, accordvice, have received less than half their needed rainfall for this time of the year. Areas, such as Corpus Christi, San Antonio, Lubbock and Houston have received only one fourth of their normal rainfall.

More than 80 counties still have burn bans in effect. Stanford predicts that as the extreme dig conditions continue, many more areas will need to enact similar bans.

He said that green up is limited to only the eastern two thirds of the state. Wildland fires continue to occur even in those areas that have seen limited rainfall.

"Without regular rainfall," Management is working closely Stanford said, "Texas will see above who predict that the ongoing mer, with increased fire losses, and drought will lead to a long, intense the potential for large destructive fires."

> These events, he said, again will task fire fighting resources. They will demand a cooperative response among all levels of government.

"Everyone must be extremely cautious, avoid outdoor burning. has left most of Texas well behind and be careful with outdoor cookseasonal averages. The dry condi- ing and cigarettes. We must all work together to stop the fires before they start."

### **Cee Vee anticipates** historical marker at old ranch house site

Cee Vee residents have applied to the Cottle County Historical Commission and the Texas Historical Commission for placement of a historical marker at the location of the original CV Ranch house, which dates back prior to the turn of the century. The 27" X 42" marker on an aluminum pole will depict the history of the C V and Mill Iron Ranches and the community of Cee Vee.

The proposed marker will be located on the right-of-way on the south side of FM 1440 at the site of the original Cee Vee Mercantile Store. The Tracy and Bennie Evans family has agreed to permit the use of the land where the original Cee Vee store was built for development of the Tracy Evans Memorial Park. They have also agreed to donate rock from the remains of the Cee Vee Store for landscaping the project.

Signs are planned on Highway 83 at Cee Vee road 1440 and at the Northfield crossing on the North Pease River to direct travelers to the Cee Vee Historical Marker.


