I have a lot more social life in the passing of the years: some might even call me a "frivolous" old gal. I'm seeing five gentlemen every day!


As soon as I wake, Will Power helps me get out of bed. Then I go to see John. Then Charley Horse comes along, and when he is here, he takes up a lot of my time and



Junior Varsity Girls Program to address women in agriculture: Business management

Early in 1997, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will offer the opportunity for a new group of Texas farm and ranch women to begin the Women In Leading the way for the team Agriculture: Business Management Program. This program inpoints, Angela Albus and Laura cludes a series of 3 two-day seminars to be taken in successive years. These programs are designed to help women gain insights into and a broader understanding of financial management, business transfer issues, commodity marketing and agricultural policy.

According to the program director, Dr. Danny Klinefeller, the need to develop the management skills of farm and ranch women is critical for the following reasons: there is a tremendous need to strengthen the management team on farms and ranches, particularly in light of the added risks that will be created by the changes in the government farm program; too few wives are adequately prepared to take over the business affairs if something should unexpectedly


happen to their husband; Texas has ten percent of all women in the U.S. who run their own farm or ranch operation; the census of agriculture indicates that over the last twenty years, women managers have been the only group actually increasing in numbers in agricul-

Because Texas is a community property state and because women tend to live longer than men, a major portion of the privately held farm and ranch land in the state is owned by women absentee landlords.

The program will be offered in two locations in 1997. January 29 - 31, 1997 - College Station and February 19 - 21, 1997 in Lub-

The cost of the program is \$175 which covers all seminar materials, breaks, and lunches. Registration is due by January 10, 1997.

Annie Mae Morgan, age 96, died on Thursday, November 14, 1996, at her home in Waco, Texas. ·

She was born to the Texas pioneer couple, Mr. and Mrs. W.T. Freeman on February 8, 1900 in Vernon, Texas. In 1911, she and her family moved to the Gillespie community in Knox County. Annie married Joshua Carl Morgan, a farmer in the Sunset/Gillespie community, in 1933. He preceded her in death in

Annie was ahead of her time and a remarkable woman of her generation. Second to her love for her family, was Annie's passion for education and teaching school. She began her teaching career in the Red Top

community near Munday, Texas. After her marriage and the birth of her two children, Annie, a farmer's wife and a mother, continued her career and pursued her college degree. She graduated with a Bachelors Degree in Education from West Texas State College in Canyon, Texas by taking correspondence courses and attending school during the summers at Baylor in Belton, Texas, Sul Ross in Alpine, Texas, and North Texas State Teachers College in Denton, Texas. Annie went on to teach in the Sunset, Munday, Knox City and O'Brien, Texas school districts. She effected many lives, as many as three generations, during her 40-year teaching career in the Knox and Haskell County school. She retired in 1972.

In 1979, Annie moved to Dallas, Texas to be near her daughter. She lived there until 1987 when she moved to Waco, Texas to be near her son.

During her retirement and up until age 95, Annie continued her hobby of quilting. She left a legacy of beautiful quilts to her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. Annie loved literature and poetry. Shakespeare was among her favorites. She was a member of the Baptist Church:



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

Ms. Carden has been the Executive Director of the Munday Housing Authority since June of 1978. The staff of the Munday Housing Authority consists of Ms. Carden along with Maintenance Men Jamie Welborn and James Williams and part-time office assistant Beverly Crownover.

The Housing Authority formed in 1954, and consisted of 30 units, in 1972, 36 more units were built, and in 1978 nine more units were built. Also the Housing Authority has 24 Farmers Home Apartments, and is building ten more apartments under Farmers Home, which they hope to have completed in February of 1997.

PTO's Elementary School Teacher of the Week

Mrs. Linda Chapman is a sixth grade teacher at Munday Elementary School and has been on duty in her chosen field for almost twenty-six years. All but seven of those years have been completed right here in Munday, working in the special educa-

tion department for nineand-one-half years and the remainder in the classroom.

Mrs. Chapman is married to Ronnie Chapman and they have two children - a grown daughter, who has a three month old baby boy, and a ten year old son who attends school in Haskell. The Chapman's live on their family farm between Haskell and Throckmorton. It's the same farm that Mr. Chapman's father grew up on.

Her hobbies include reading, riding horses, embroidering and playing the piano.

This year Mrs. Chapman has seventeen students in her homeroom class but teaches Social Studies to a total of sixtytwo fifth and sixth grade students. "Everyday is unpredictable and you really have to be flexible - you never know when you might have to change up from day to day," she explains.

"When I first started teaching the teachers weren't even allowed to wear slacks to work - we had to wear skirts or dresses. When we were finally allowed to wear slacks they had to be a part of a pants suit. Most of them were made of polyester. That's just a few of the little changes I've seen take place," she adds with a smile.

Mrs. Chapman thinks that one of the biggest changes that has taken place during her tenure has been in the area of discipline. "It's harder now, it seems as if the parents don't back the teachers as much as they used to."

"Another change I've seen is that the students in the fifth and sixth grade are much more mature than they were twenty years ago. When I first started teaching they were children, now they're much more grown up," she says.

Mrs. Chapman is dedicated to her profession and to the children. She explains, "I strive to teach these children about the concepts of the working world - it's not all entertainment and you won't be catered to out there. There are priorities that must

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
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
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
