



Knox County Loses Ground On Tax Rebates

Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander has delivered a total of \$187.7 million in monthly sales tax payments to 1,097 Texas cities and 118 counties, a 3.9 percent increase over the \$180.5 million allocated in September 1998. Year-to-date, payments to cities and counties are running 6.2 percent ahead of last year.

September sales tax rebates include local sales taxes collected in July and reported to the Comptroller in August.

Knox County's rebate was down some 3.81% from the rebate received during the comparable payment in the prior year.

At the last rebate Benjamin received \$197.65 compared to \$195.40 last year at this time and compared to \$348.60 during this period last year. Knox City's rebate was down from \$12,051.65 last year to \$10,918.66 this year and





Flu And Pneumonia Vaccine Update By Dr. Barry Embury

It's that time of year again; summer days are drawing to a close and the cool mornings remind us that winter is on its way. Our thoughts turn to Thanksgiving, Christmas, time with family and friends and of course - the dreaded flu and pneumonia season.

In a recent article from the American Academy of Family Phy-(AAFP), sicians Richard Zimmerman, M.D., M.P.H., AAFP's liaison to the Center for Disease Control (CDC) was quoted as saying "We're not talking about a small public health problem; we're talking about a major problem." The Flu virus is very contagious and can be easily passed from person to person that accounts for it causing illness in 10% to 20% of the USA population each year. The Flu virus can cause fever, headache, sore throat, cough, muscle aches and extreme tiredness lasting several days. It can also progress to influenza pneumonia. In addition to causing significant illness, "the flu" can seriously disrupt a person's ability to perform daily activities including home life, work and school activities. Influenza may also be fatal in some people who have other medical problems. In fact, approximately 20,000 to 30,000 people die in this country every year from influenza. In addition, the dollar cost of treating the flu and its problems each year in the USA is staggering. The viruses that cause the flu continue to change every year causing new outbreaks of the Flu. The shot you received last year only protected you from the type of flu virus that was around then. This constant changing is why the flu vaccine (shot) must be given every year. This year's flu virus requires a new vaccine in order to fight it. Each year's influenza vaccine contains three virus strains that are the likely ones to circulate in the USA in the upcoming winter. The Flu shot is recommended in the fall, mid-September to mid-November. This allows sufficient time for the body to develop the immune response (this can take 2-6 weeks) before the peak flu seasons of late December and early March in the USA. The vaccine may be given up to and even after the flu season has started in our community. In 1993 the reimbursement for the influenza vaccine by Medicare was initiated which has helped to improve the usage of the vaccine.

in the upcoming season from the virus strains in the vaccine or it will lessen the severity of the disease if it occurs. The flu shot will not guarantee that you will not get the flu; remember the flu shot only protects you from the virus that are expected to be the most severe for that year. After receiving the flu shot, if you develop a respiratory illness it is considered coincidental and not related to the flu shot. Some people who get a flu shot have a sore arm for a day or two which can be relieved with Tylenol or Motrin. If you are allergic to eggs you may have serious side effects from the flu shot, so talk to your doctor before getting the shot.

First timers - that is, some of the people who have never had the flu shot before, may develop fever, extreme tiredness, muscle aches and other general symptoms 6-12 hrs. after the shot. These symptoms tend to last 1-2 days and typically will not occur with the next year's flu shot.

Who should get the flu shot? A new 1999 American Academy of Family Physicians (AAFP) policy encourages family physicians to offer the vaccine to patients at age 50 as a routine annual immunization. As in previous years the flu shot is highly recommended for any person that is over the age of 6 months and who are at high risk because of other medical problems such as cardiovascular (heart) disease, diabetes, lung disease (COPD, emphysema, asthma, bronchitis and previous pneumonia), kidney disease, cancer, alcoholism, HIV and diseases that affect the immune system or other long term diseases. Family members, care givers and people who are in frequent contact (including children) with these high risk people should also consider having the flu shot for their own and the other person's health

duces absenteeism and significantly lowers the risk of getting the flu."

Pneumonia prevention with a pneumococcal vaccine is also recommended.

The Pneumococcal bacteria (pronounced new-mo-kok-al) can cause pneumonia (infections of the lungs), bacteremia (infections of the blood) and meningitis (infections of the brain). This bacteria causes severe illnesses and unfortunately kills thousands of people in the USA each year. The Pneumonia shot protects against 88% of the different kinds of pneumococcal bacteria which means that it does not stop all bacterial pneumonias from occurring and it has no effect on viral infections. A National Institute of Health study suggests that most cases of pneumococcal pneumonia are prevented by the vaccine.

The pneumococcal vaccine is safe and cannot give you pneumonia! Some people have mild swelling and soreness at the shot site lasting a day or two. In addition about 1% of people may develop a fever, muscle pain and more serious swelling and pam. Unlike the flu vaccine, the pneumonia vaccine in most people is only needed once and lasts up to 10 years. Some people with certain medical problems may require a booster after 6 years. There is no specific time of year that is recommended for the vaccine but often it is offered during flu vaccine time as both vaccines may be given on the same visit, which has improved its usage. The pneumonia vaccine is also covered by Medicare. The Center for Disease Control recommends anyone 65 years and older receive the vaccine as they are 2-3 times more likely to get pneumonia. Some experts suggest receiving the vaccine between the ages of 50 and 65, as it may result in better responses. The vaccine is also recommended for anyone over the age of 2 who has heart or lung disease, diabetes, some cancers, HIV and anyone at high risk for pneumonia. I hope you have found this article informative and helpful (references available upon request). As a physician and concerned individual, I encourage each of you to consider receiving the flu vaccine and the pneumonia vaccine this year. I and my staff will be available to assist you with any questions and to administer the vaccines if you choose, Please see my ad in this week's paper.



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
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The flu shot cannot give you influenza! The flu shot reduces the likelihood of developing an infection and safety. In an effort to protect people at high risk from influenza by exposure from caregivers, the flu shot is recommended for physicians, nurses and other personnel in both hospital and outpatient-care settings (providers of home care) plus volunteers, clergy and frequent visitors in any of these settings. Other people who should receive the flu shot include residents and staff of nursing homes and other chronic-care facilities as well as public safety workers (police, firefighters & EMS).

In fact in generally any healthy person, adult or child, who wishes to reduce the likelihood of becoming ill with influenza may consider receiving the flu shot. Dr. Zimmerman said, "Recent studies have shown that use of the influenza vaccine in healthy adults is safe and cost-effective, re-


