Business nonsense can become accepted practice if enough businesses buy into it. Anatole France said, "If fifty million people say a foolish thing it is still a foolish thing." However, all too often common beliefs and common practice are substituted for what ought to be done.

Some Nonsense Examples

A few months ago, I wrote about a problem we were having getting the computer we ordered shipped to our office in an expedient manner. The company shipped the wrong computer and the exchange process wasn't easy.

The first problem involving the lack of common sense occurred when the company was shocked that we had broken the security seal on a computer box that wasn't ours. Common sense would tell you--unless you are telepathic--that you must open the box to see if what's in it is what you ordered. When the box is addressed to your firm, you assume it is yours.

The second instance that demonstrated complete lack of common sense was when the computer company sent Seldom is there only one way to fix what isn't working. us an invoice for 18 cents for a poster that was missing when we returned the misshipped computer. That's right, develop tunnel vision and assume that there is only one they spent 33 cents on postage to send out an 18-cent invoice. Factor in the time, materials, and opportunity cost just validated a complete lack of common sense.

Here's another example. An extra value breakfast meal at my favorite fast-food stop includes a small coffee. But, Marts. You may write to him in care of Minding Your if you win a free value meal in an annual promotion game Own Business, PO Box 67, Amarillo, TX 79105.

Some Quick Fixes

· Look for "we've always done it this way" problems. If you don't have a good reason for any business activity other than it is the standard routine, don't continue to do it. All "standard practices" should be evaluated frequently and changed when a better way is found. Look hard for better ways.

· Ask the question, "Does this really make sense?" If employees are involved, ask them. If venders or suppliers are involved, ask them. If customers are involved, ask them

· Don't let it happen again. Often, the only difference between the wise and the foolish is "when." What the fools are still doing at the end is what the wise were doing in the beginning. When the wise see their folly they stop and don't repeat the foolishness.

. There may be more than one "common sense" option. More often than not, you will find several solutions. Don't way to succeed.

Emerson wrote, "Nothing astonishes men so much as of creating and sending the "18 cent invoice" and you've common sense and plain dealing." That might be a pretty good recipe for eliminating business nonsense as well.

"His robe was so white - it was a bright, pure, innocent white - a color that I had never seen before and haven't seen since," he explains. "I knew it was the Lord but I could never get close to him. He was trying to tell me something." Suddenly Palma was returned to his body and he overheard a corpsman shout, "He's alive. He's breathing!" Palma was transported to a medivac unit and sent to D'Nang. There Palma was pronounced dead during an operation to repair his badly damaged internal organs and to clean up the stump that was left where his arm had been. "This time the Lord told me he wasn't through with me and that I had a lot of work to do," he says. The road to recovery has been long, hard and painful. Palma has undergone some 26 major operations. He lost his spleen, his left kidney, his gall bladder, part of his left lung, and 1 1/2 feet of intestines. He was paralyzed for six months from the waist down and still has pieces of shrapnel in his
