Cotton Classing Has Begun

Cotton harvesting activities have been heavy between rains, especially in the Munday area, according to B. B. Manly, Jr. of the USDA Cotton Classing Office in Abilene.

On Tuesday, October 26, Mr. Sidney Ferrell opened the sub-office at Munday. opened October 28.

Prices being offered for cotton are very good this year, and range from around pound. Some acreages are meeting October 18. being contracted at 33 to 35 cents per pound above the Government loan rate, which would mean from 64 to 67 cents per pound for the most predominant qualities processed this week.

Around 2,000 samples were processed from the Munday area this week, bringing the season total to

Predominant grades were: 41 with 40 percent; grade 51 with 16 percent; and grade 42 with 24 percent. Nine percent was reduced in grade because of bark. The predominant staple was 30 with 49 percent. Other staples were 31 with 34 percent and 32

with 13 percent. Mike readings were 89 percent in the premium 3.5 4.9 category with 4 percent falling below 3.5 and 7

percent above 4.9. Mr. Ferrell will be in his sixth season as Officer-In-Charge of the Munday Office.



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Can we afford four more years without effective leadership?

There is a critical decision to be made on November 2nd. It goes far beyond the question of which Presidential candidate can govern with integrity and honesty. We must determine which candidate has the ability and strength to lead our country out of economic chaos, and the vision to see that all Americans—not just the powerful and influential—have a better future.

During the past two years, the middle class has paid far too dear a price for a President lacking that ability.

Since Gerald Ford took office, the unemployment rate has risen 50%, from 5.5% or 5 million people, to 7.9% or 7-1/2 million jobless Americans.

Today's inflation rate of 6% is higher than it was at any time between the

Korean War and the inauguration of Richard Nixon.

The 1968 food dollar is now worth *57*¢.

Mr. Ford's budget will account for the largest single deficit and more than 1/3 of the public debt incurred during our entire 200-year history.

Real GNP has actually declined during each of Gerald Ford's two years in office.

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

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


