Look To The East

We join those - even few they may be - who seem to lament the passing of the old town bandstands.

It's sort of nostalgic thinking, however, because we realize that the old bandstands have served their purpose; have seen their day.

Not many people would leave a good musical program, a great opera performance on TV - if they could get it instead of westerns on the tube - to assemble around a bandstand out in the open weather to hear the local band perform.

Back in their prime, we submit, the bandstand was a memorial to the community. Just pass the word around that the local band would be in concert at a certain date and time, and people of the community would gather.

The bandstand had an elevated platform with a railing around it, and band members had a roof over their heads. There was open space between the platform and roof. People would assemble all around to hear the band perform.

There would be time for visiting, maybe between numbers; for children to romp and play; and, maybe, for youngsters to do a little courtin' in the autos parked around the place. When the concert was over, people would scatter all around the town's square a while before going home.

Our recollection dates back to the years that followed the end of World War I, when the band played those popular songs resulting from the war - those that struck tender chords in the hearts of those surviving buddies who returned from that terrible conflict.

At some period during the concert, the bandmaster's wife would entertain with a vocal solo, with band accompaniment. One in particular we remember was "My Buddy", which she sang so touchingly and so beautifully. The song, we thought, was dedicated to a Buddy who did not return. The words went something like this:

"Nights are long since you went away. I think about you all through the day. My Buddy, my buddy, nobody quite so true.

"Miss you smile, the touch of your hand. Long to know that you understand. My buddy, my buddy, your buddy misses you!"

The old bandstand on the southwest corner of the courthouse square in Wellington has long since been demolished. So have 98 per cent of all the others that graced the land.

Another cause for lament is in the fact that we put in some hard work toward a bandstand on the campus of Tarleton College one time. It's gone, too. And so are the footprints we made during ROTC drill periods in the general area!

A bunch of us seniors, wanting to leave a lasting memorial to the fact that we once frequented the halls of learning at Tarleton, decided to contribute the bandstand. We secured permission to miss classes on different occasions and hid ourselves to the college farm to gather and haul in rocks for the erection of the bandstand.

Local Golfers Win District

The Munday High School golf team won the right to represent their school in the regional games in Lubbock on April 24 and 25 by winning the district contest at Haskell last Monday.

The local boys' combined score was 315. Knox City won second with a score of 325, and will also be entered in the regional tourney.

The local boys' lowest score during the season had been 328, but the 315 last Monday bested this score by 13 points.

Individual scores in the 18-hole district contest were: Gary Allen, 76; Kyle Josselet, 81; James Mitchell, winner of the medalist trophy, 74, and Greg Myers, 84. Buddy Urbanczyk, the fifth member of the team, scored 107.

Team scores in district were: Munday, 315; Knox City, 325; Haskell, 337; Paducah, 356; Aspermont, 369, and Crowell, 404.

A total of 16 teams will be playing in the 36-hole regional meet in Lubbock.

Supt. Myers Speaks To Hall County Teachers

Douglas Myers, superintendent of the Munday Public Schools, was principal speaker at a meeting of the Hall County unit of Texas State Teachers Association in Memphis on Monday night, April 7.

Myers, who was introduced by Mrs. Ann Jones of Valley School, vice president of the Hall County unit, began his talk by telling the group that "this is a critical time in Texas for teachers and small schools."

In his personal opinion, he said, the state TSTA has been spending too much money and time on promoting the unification of N. E. A. and T. S. T. A., when it should have been promoting bills for rural areas and teachers.

"If the Governor's bill is passed, all small schools in this area will be closed," Myers charged.

He related that the governor is stating "no new taxes", and that he will keep spending on schools at \$6 million, but he is not telling the people that taxes in local districts will be raised more than three times the amount now paid. The people should be made aware of this trend. The Governor has a "weighted approach" instead of average daily attendance, which is the present method of drawing money from the state fund.

Myers went on to relate the Plan-A co-operative program his school is under would completely be ruined

if the Governor's bill is passed.

"The co-op is operating very successfully, and it should be continued," Myers added, "and we should keep talking to our legislators. Speaker of the House, Bill Clayton, says the Governor now has enough support to railroad his bill through.

The speaker went on to tell about the 15 school districts in several counties in and around Munday that had sent representatives to Austin to talk and explain the effect of the Governor's bill on small schools, and they had really stirred up some interest in the market value of property and the increased cost in taxes.

He related that Rep. W. S. (Bill) Healy of Paducah was doing everything possible to help schools keep the state program of finance as it is now. He also stated the Governor's bill would be no help to the teachers, and encouraged teachers to write or call or make contact with the Legislators and to let the people know about the "Governor's So-called Finance Bill."

After the dissertation on finance, Myers talked of things "close to us" from a teacher's viewpoint. He advised parents to get involved, for example, in basketball games . . . 50 children in the games and about 15 parents attending. "Look what we are doing to our kids," he emphasized.

Prominent Negro Minister To Hold Revival Services Here

Dr. S. M. Wright, pastor of People's Baptist Church of Dallas, will be the evangelist for a city-wide tent revival here, which is being sponsored jointly by the First Baptist Church of Munday and the West Beulah Baptist Church.

Services will be held from May 26 through June 1.

Dr. Wright is held in high esteem by fellow pastors in the state of Texas, and he was a key speaker at the Texas Evangelism Conference held in Dallas in January of this year.

Directing music for the revival will be Larry Russell, who is currently

serving as music minister of the First Baptist Church in Electra. Larry has been in the Munday First Baptist Church for previous revivals and is outstanding in singing, directing congregational music, and playing the trumpet.

"God isn't particular who you are, what your faith or color," leaders for this revival state. "He wants to fellowship with you during this revival, May 26-June 1."

New Athletic Director Is Employed For Local School

Members of the Munday School Board elected a new football coach and athletic director for the local schools at a meeting of the board last Thursday night.

He is James Pope, 34-year-old former resident of Rochester, where he graduated from high school in 1958, and who has been employed as first assistant coach at Floydada High School.

Pope expects to become associated with the local schools next Monday, in order to become acquainted with the local Mogul prospects for 1975 and to formulate plans for an athletic program prior to closing of the 1974-75 term of school.

After graduating at Rochester, Pope attended Ranger Junior College under a scholarship, then attended

Sul Ross University in Alpine. He was a two-year letterman in football at Abilene Christian College, Abilene, where he graduated in 1962.

The new Mogul mentor coached at Floydada from 1967 to 1971, and returned in 1974 as assistant coach of the Whirlwinds and track coach. He has also held coaching positions at Phillips High School and Kermit High School.

Pope is married and has three children: Pamela Jo, aged 9; Jay Michael, 6, and Patrick, 8 months. His wife, Ruth Ann, who is a graduate of Washington State University, will be assigned a teaching position in the Munday Elementary School.

The Popes are members of the Church of Christ and have been very active in church and community affairs where they have been located.

The family plans to move to Munday as soon as living accommodations can be arranged. They are presently negotiating for the purchase of a home in Munday.

Local high school officials; Douglas Myers, superintendent, and Troy Gaunt, high school principal, are well pleased with the school board's decision on a high school coach. They express the hope that Mr. Pope will have a successful and enjoyable association with the local school activities.

Special Election Slated Tuesday

Voters of Texas will go to the polls on Tuesday, April 22, in a special election to voice their opinions on two amendments to the State Constitution.

County Judge Sam E. Clonts stated Monday that the two voting boxes in Knox City and Munday will be consolidated into one box

for each town. All other voting boxes will remain unchanged, he said.

Munday voters will be going to the Community Center to cast their ballots. James Smith will serve as election judge.

The two amendments will be worded on the ballot as follows:

No. One: "The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs, and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 per cent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

No. Two: "The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month, and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."

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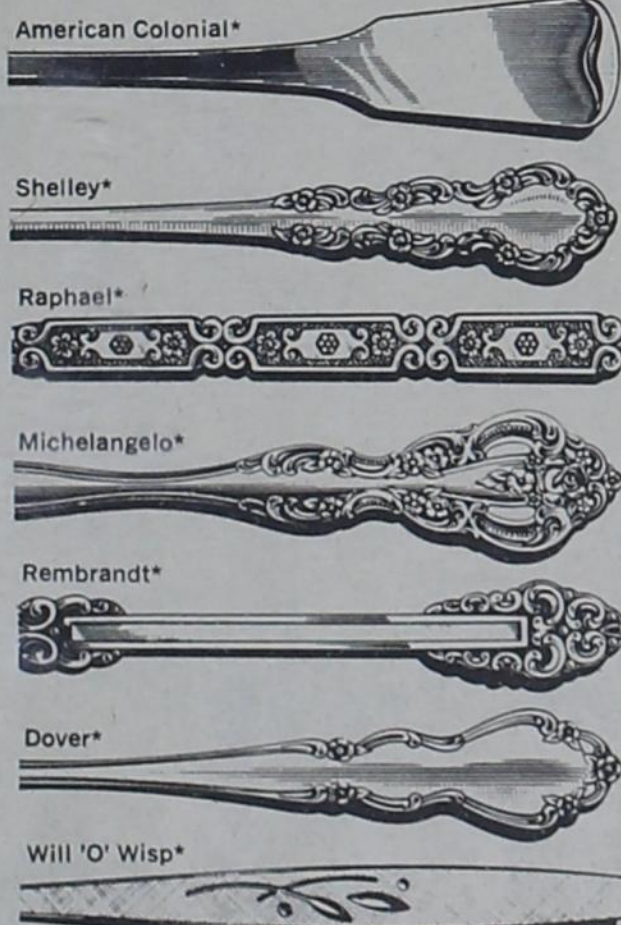
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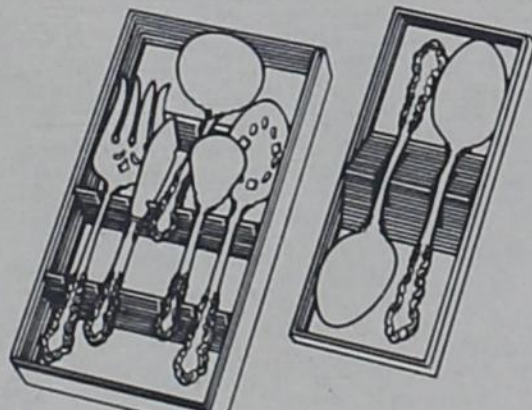
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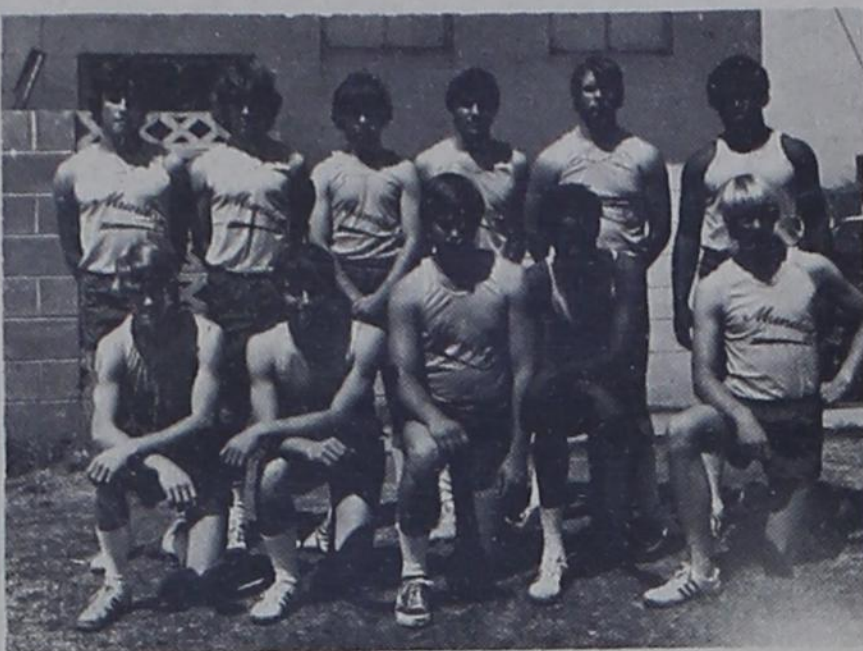

LAWN MOWING SAFETY

Spring lawn mowing time is here, and with it will come numerous accidents unless certain precautions are taken.

A few points to keep in mind for the safe operation of a lawn mower are:

1. Always wear leather shoes and long pants while mowing the yard.
2. Remove any rocks, sticks, toys or other objects in the yard before mowing.

3. Keep children and pets out of the yard while it is being mowed.

4. Don't mow grass if it is wet as it can damage the grass and clog the mower blade and discharge chute.

5. Always mow slopes sideways. It makes mowing easier and reduces slipping. Also, "push" don't "pull" the mower.

6. Always turn off the engine and disconnect the spark plug wire when working on the mower or refueling. Also, don't refuel the mower while the engine is hot.

7. Never leave a running mower unattended.

8. Keep the mower in good working shape.

A lawn mower turns into a hazardous machine if used carelessly. Next to the automobile, the rotary mower is the second most dangerous device used by the public in the United States.

New Farm Bill Should Help Restore Confidence

Washington, D.C. - Senator Lloyd Bentsen (D-Tex.) said the new Farm Bill passed by the Senate should help restore the confidence farmers must have for maximum production efforts.

Bentsen said that although the Bill falls far short of perfection, it does set government price supports substantially higher than they currently are. And, the Senator added, it is the best that could be approved in light of Administration opposition.

The measure now goes to Conference with the House. In a Senate statement supporting the legislation, Bentsen said that the economic situation among farmers is one of widespread uncertainty and discouragement.

"The policies of the current Administration, the skyrocketing costs of production, and the widely fluctuating markets have combined to eliminate the

confidence our farmers once had in maximum production efforts," the Senator said.

"The NATIONAL GRAIN SORGHUM PRODUCERS ASSOCIATION is currently illustrating this lack of confidence. The Association, representing 5,200 actual grain producers all across Texas and the Mid-West, is now conducting a poll to determine if its members would support a voluntary reduction in planted acres."

"Although the results are still coming in, to date 95 percent of those answering the poll support the voluntary reduction in production, and that percentage has held constant since the first returns."

"This is an alarming reflection that our current farm program is not giving our farmers the confidence to generate the production that our consumers need."

"This situation must be turned around. Farm markets must be stabilized so as to give farmers the confi-

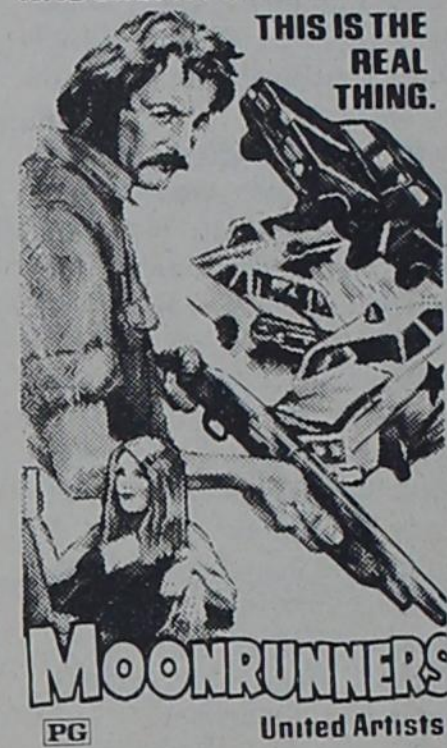
dence to generate the food production the American housewife, and indeed, the world, must have."

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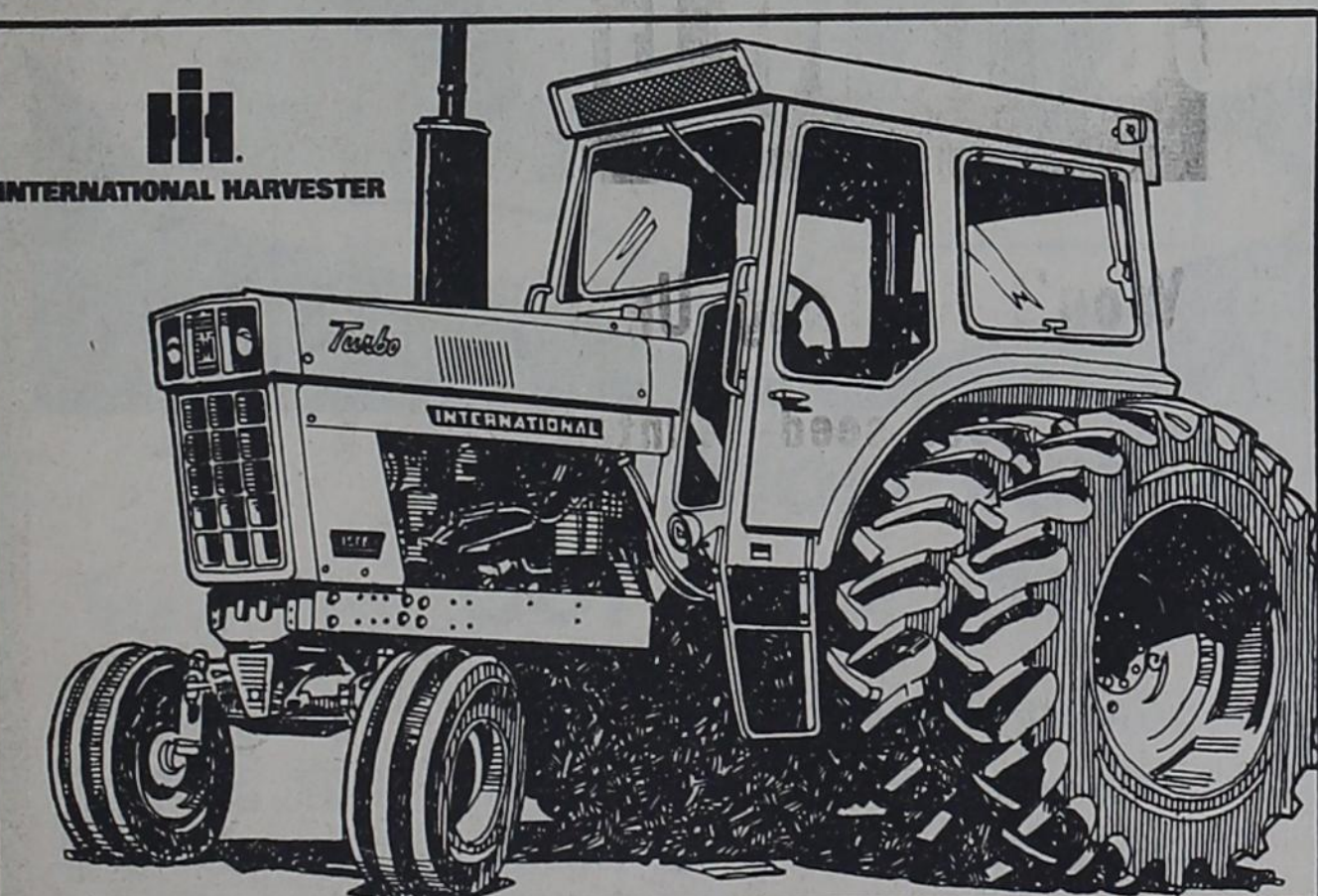

Soil Conservation Service Marks 40th Anniversary

April 27, 1975, marks the 40th anniversary of the Soil Conservation Service of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Forty years ago, the country faced tremendous problems brought about by erosion, floods, land damage, and violent dust storms.

On April 27, 1935, a new agency, the Soil Conservation Service, was created to combat the forces that threatened to lay waste to millions of acres of cropland.

The Soil Conservation Service began working with landowners by demonstrating means of erosion control, but it became apparent that really effective conservation work was done better when landowners led the job themselves.

In 1937, President Roosevelt recommended that each state legislature enact laws permitting landowners and land occupiers to form units to be called Soil Conservation Districts. Rallying to the call, all the states, Puerto Rico, and the Virgin Islands, enacted laws permitting formulation of districts.

Soil and Water Conservation Districts set out to focus attention on land and water problems on all privately-owned land, develop annual and long-range programs designed to solve the problems, and to enlist all the appropriate help available from public and private sources.

Now, over 3,000 conservation districts, covering 97 per cent of all privately-owned lands, have formed in mutual concern to protect, conserve, and improve the world we live in.

Typically, a conservation district has five local supervisors, elected by local landowners. The supervisors work with the Soil Conservation Service District conservationist and other agencies in helping the landowner apply conservation measures on his land.

More than two million landowners are voluntarily planning and applying conservation measures in local soil and water conservation districts. They are helping to control erosion, improve water supplies, prevent floods, curtail pollution, and develop recreational areas.

L. D. Offutt, chairman of the Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District, said the SCS has been giving technical help to landowners here since 1942.

The Wichita Brazos SWCD, organized August 6th, 1942, was created to help the landowners in Knox County develop needed conservation measures. SCS assists the district under a jointly-signed agreement. About 650 landusers are planning and applying conservation practices on their land with technical assistance of the SCS, Offutt said.

The scope of the SCS program has expanded since establishment 40 years ago. And the Soil and Water Conservation Districts have grown beside it, bringing a better life and future to everyone.

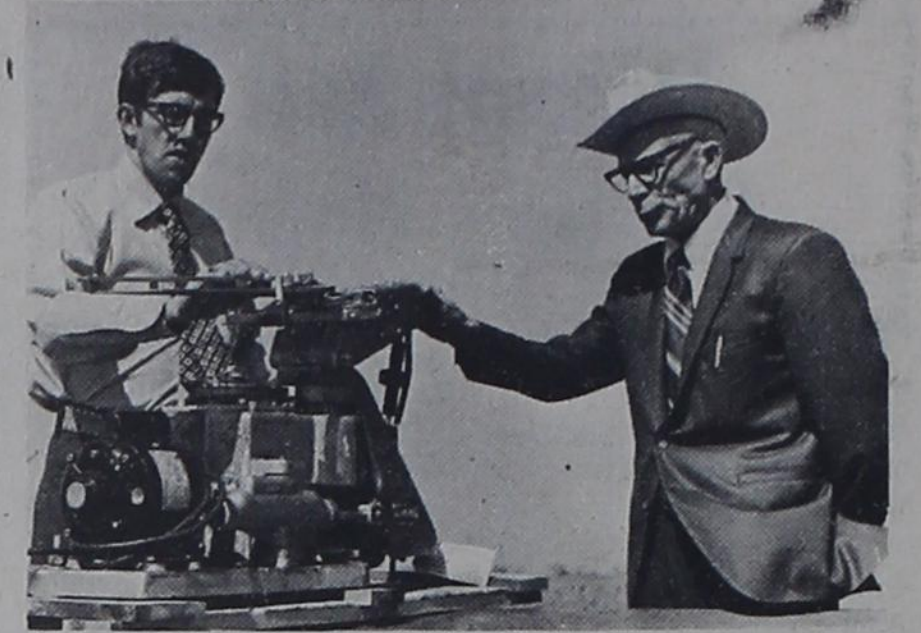

Trapshooting Championship To Be Held In Haskell

Texas Zone III Trapshooting Championship is to be held in Haskell at the Haskell Trap Club, Saturday, April 19-20. Knox County is in this zone. It is expected to be a record number.

The zone program consists of 500 targets. Fifty pair doubles, 200 singles, 100 handicap, and preliminary 100 handicap event. Shooting starts Saturday the 19th at 1:00 p.m. and again Sunday at 9:30 a.m., with the 200 championship singles followed by the 100 championship handicap.

Zone III is the smallest zone of the five zones in the state. It consists of 31 counties in Texas, but produces some of the finest trapshooting in the nation.

Texas 4-H Center Opens Its Doors

The Texas 4-H Center at Lake Brownwood opened its doors for the first time April 2 when some 200 volunteer 4-H adult leaders gathered for a statewide 4-H Adult Leader Forum.

The \$1.4 million educational training facility for the state's 4-H program was constructed under the leadership of T. Louis Austin Jr., chairman of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, who is also vice chairman and chief executive officer for Texas Utilities, Dallas.

"This modern facility can accommodate more than 250 people," points out H. T. Davison, 4-H and youth specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Ser-

vice and executive director of the 4-H Foundation. "It features a 300-seat assembly hall and 15 additional conference rooms that can accommodate from 12 to 100 people each. The Center is served by an ultra-modern kitchen and has excellent space for outdoor recreation, a swimming pool, and other accommodations attractive to both youth and adults."

Marshall Crouch, Extension 4-H and youth specialist, has been temporarily assigned to Brownwood to direct the operations of the 4-H Center and to assist with programming activities, notes Davison.

The 4-H Center was designed and planned as a leadership training facility for 4-H members and adult leaders who serve the youth of this state," says Davison. "4-H members will use the Center primarily in the summer months while adult leaders will receive in-service training during the school year to enhance their work with 4-H members. When the Center is not being used by 4-H or other Extension oriented activities, it will be available to any group with a program of an educational nature."

The facility will accommodate banquets and special one-day meetings as well as other activities. Those interested in using the 4-H Center may contact Davison at Texas A&M University or call the Texas 4-H Center at Brownwood.

As bad as things are economically, Americans still spend only about 16 per cent of their income after taxes for food. In a majority of the world's countries the amount of income paid for food exceeds 45 per cent. In 25 years the percentage of disposable income spent for food in the United States has decreased more than 28 per cent. As dramatic as this decrease is, the increase in selection and quality of foods available to the American consumer, evidenced by the more than 11-thousand food selections at many supermarkets.
