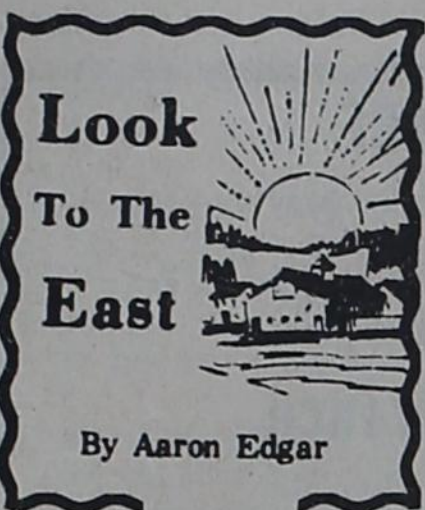

Advertising in some of the daily papers have attracted our attention lately.

Being advertised was an item that was very popular years and years ago, but it became almost abandoned in the past few decades.

The item is the porch swing!

We've noticed them advertised several times lately, and Tommie Kent over at Knox City told us recently that he has sold several of them.

The days of the old porch swing were the "good old days" for many people. Quiet hours of rest and relaxation were spent in them during the waning daylight hours, or most any hour of the day on Sundays.

It was restful to the tense and ragged nerves just to be able to swing gently back and forth with but a slight kicking movement of the foot against the porch floor.

The swing was a place for visiting until daylight had faded and bedtime neared. The cooling breeze of early nighttime brought a feeling of tranquility to the tired body.

It was a place for courtin' the lady fair after the elderly ones had retreated to the bedrooms. It was a place for children to play when other forms of entertainment had ceased to attract.

But the porch swing kinda faded out of the picture.

The reason, we guess, because the porches kinda faded away, also. Those who have built homes since World War II just haven't considered adding a front porch to the blueprints.

The advent of air conditioning sort of made the front porch unnecessary. When mosquitoes became plentiful and the August breezes didn't have a cooling effect, it was better to stay inside with air conditioning than to sit in the porch swing.

Our home was started in the late 1940s. Now, if we put a porch swing on our front porch there wouldn't be room for anything else.

It's nice to sit outside sometimes and watch the antics of the martins as they assemble near our bird house, watch their battles with the sparrows and listen to their chatter. Soon, however, the pesky mosquitoes or biting flies cause us to hasten to the inside.

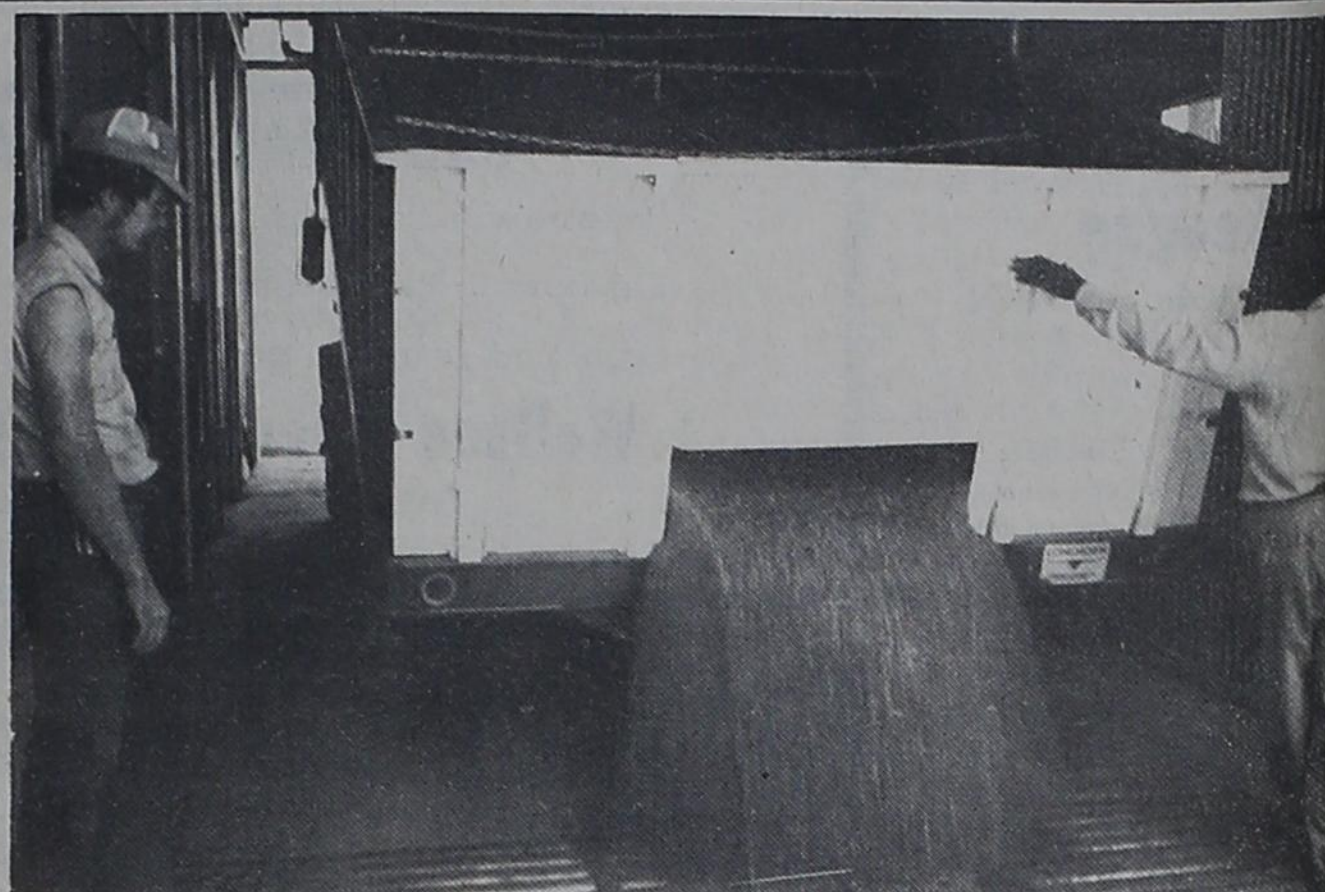
We ran across a clipping the other day where a writer was reminiscing editorially about the front porches and porch swings. Here's a mite what he said:

"The porch would have its light bulb, but why bother, ordinarily? Better the dark for listening to the concert of the crickets, for watching the lunacies of the lightning bugs.

Area Wheat Harvest Starts Sunday

Activity broke loose shortly after noon Sunday, and the first of this week saw combines in operation almost everywhere one looked. The 1975 wheat harvest is finally under way! Farmers had waited anxiously, custom combine operators became jittery as it appeared they must move to other commitments northward before they could begin operations here. Now, all available combines are being placed into operation, and it's "the busy season" at all elevators in Munday and surrounding towns.

A few loads of oats were received by local elevators Saturday.

The first wheat to reach

the Farmers Co-op Elevator came from the Baker Farms, from acreage on their Squaw Creek farm. Another load came from L. M. Patterson's farm, and still others who started bringing in wheat were Dwight Key, J. W. Michels and Rhoades Allen.

Moisture content from Baker's wheat was "clocked" at 13 per cent, and it tested 60 pounds to the bushel. With this ideal test, the wheat was placed directly into railway cars.

At Chickasha Elevators, Bobby Hutchinson stated that the first load brought in by Bob Jarvis tested 16.20 in moisture content. Ronnie Ward brought in a load, also on Sunday afternoon, that

tested 14.23. These were a bit higher than the ideal test.

Chickasha Elevators received oats Saturday from Bully Ratliff and Kenneth Baker.

The first wheat received by Knox Prairie Seeds was "a little jag" on Tuesday, March 27.

Al Cartwright brought in the first load of wheat Sunday which contained

13.70 in moisture. A second load came from the F. T. Jarvis farm and tested 14.56 moisture and 60 pounds to the bushel.

Combines are started as soon as the night dews disappear daily, and operations continue into the night -- until the moisture again begins to build up. It is hoped the weather will remain dry until all the wheat is harvested.

Water Flows Into Millers Creek Reservoir

The cracks on area farm and ranch lands became filled the latter part of last week. Tanks along the Millers Creek watershed also appeared to be full, and these released water which began to accumulate in the Millers Creek Reservoir.

Following the rains of Thursday night and Friday night, Millers Creek began to flow -- although too slowly to become very excited about.

But it flowed! Pete Beecher, manager of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority, took a trip to the lakesite during the weekend, and he

came back with the report that it'll take a long, long time for the lake to fill up at the present rate of flow!

The temporary dam that impounds water for the low water intake equipment became full, and water was flowing around the spillway.

"We'll probably come in for quite a bit of criticism," Pete said, "since we've received so much rain and impounded so little water. You see, there are those who have predicted all along that the reservoir will never be filled from the Millers Creek watershed."

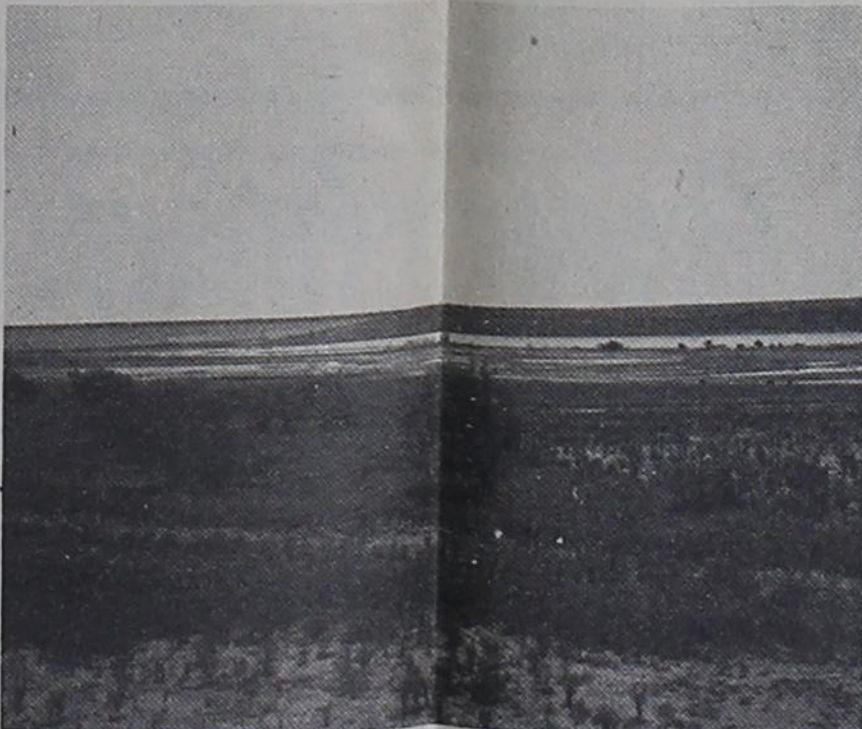
Anyway, we have received a starter!

Area Gets Wind, Hail Damage

The last of the rain and storm-laden clouds visited the Munday area last Thursday afternoon, and some wind and hail damage was reported.

Clouds looked so stormy that the local siren sounded a tornado alert, and many people sought shelter from the storm. High winds unroofed a portion of the Shamrock Cafe, and workmen were busy repairing the roof Friday. Mrs. Allene Beaty had her TV antenna blown down, and glass was broken in the sign at the Gulf Service Station.

Hail damage was reported by Jerry King, south of Munday, and by Elmer Bruce and Hershell Cowan, who farm southeast of town. The latter two reported their wheat was almost completely destroyed.

Mr. Huff stated that he thought the past four years in Munday had been the best four years of his life and he had thoroughly enjoyed working with his students and their parents, and the Munday community.

Citywide Clean-up Campaign Slated

"Help clean up your city!" This word is going out this week as the City of Munday announced that it is sponsoring an annual city-wide clean-up campaign. The drive will open on Monday, June 9, and continue through Wednesday, June 18.

"The success of our campaign will depend largely upon the people of our town," city officials stated.

"You are urged to clean up your premises, both at home and in the business district, and those owning vacant lots can help by having these mowed of tall weeds and grass, which are harboring places for mosquitoes, and remove all rubbish from the premises."

Trash will be picked up by city trucks from June 9 through June 18, with a limit of one load per residence being permitted for free pick up.

Leaves and grass cuttings should be placed in containers. Tree limbs must be cut into lengths easily handled, and placed where they can be conveniently picked up.

The co-operation of everyone is urged in making this a most successful clean-up campaign.

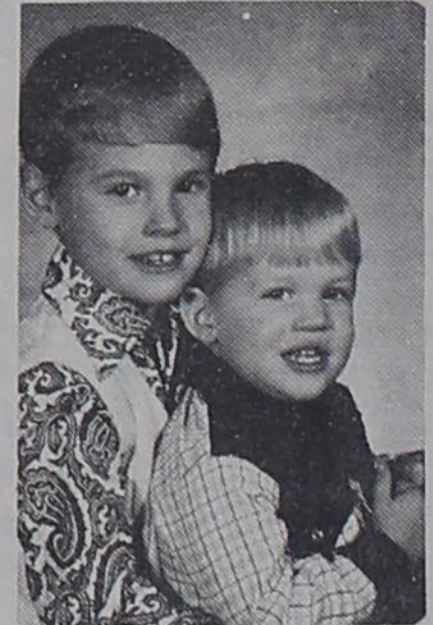
Delegates to the Conference are Douglas Myers of Munday and Barton R. Carl of the Goree church. Alternates are Charles Baker and Mack Tynes.

Farmers Are Putting More Rangeland Into Cultivation

The American farmer is setting the pace to overcome the probability of a major food shortage. More and more farmers are clearing rangeland and putting it into cultivation.

Statistics indicate that the world population will double by the year 2005. The demand for food and fiber is increasing daily. This situation presents a challenge to the farmer because while he is expected to produce more he must protect more.

Most of the good tillable land is already in cropland and land now going into cultivation requires more intensive conservation treatment to protect it from wind and water erosion. A good rule to follow before putting new land into cultivation is to check with your local Soil Conservation Service office and obtain a soil survey which will tell which land is not suitable for cultivation.

Cost sharing programs are also available under the Great Plains Conservation Program and Agricultural Conservation program which may help on the cost of installing needed conservation treatment.

To protect more of our American land and to keep it green and fertile for the next year and the next generation the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture offers these recommendations:

1. Farm all land under a conservation plan.
2. Plant the right crop in the right soil.
3. Use effective soil and water conservation techniques.
4. Consider some form of minimum tillage or no-till.
5. Keep steep land or other areas highly susceptible to wind or water erosion covered by grass or trees.

Bobby Therwhanger of Munday is one of the many farmers in our area putting new land into cultivation. He realized the need for proper protection and applied for assistance through his local Wichita Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District. Technical assistance was provided by the Soil Conservation Service.

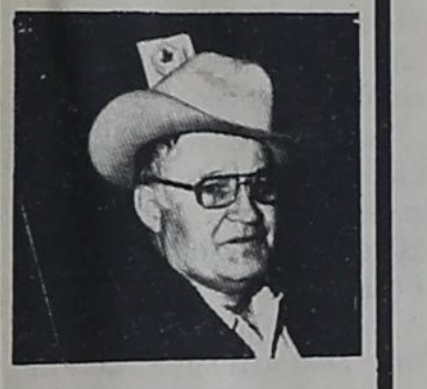

Crop Camels have heads but no humps. The term "Crop Camel" is used as a reference to any crop that gets along on little water but in this area is generally reserved for sorghum. Primary reason for the development of sorghum as a feed grain was because it provided essentially the same nutritive value as corn but had unique growing properties. Properties such as becoming practically dormant during a drought and then resuming growth as soon as water is available. Most common of the grain sorghum types are the kafirs and milos or a hybrid developed from the two varieties. According to authorities such as J. H. Martin, sorghum originated in east Africa with the Kafir variety coming to the United States from South Africa in 1876. Milo followed in the early 1880's. Hybrid developments and farm improvements have moved average yield from under 20 bushels per acre in 1950 to a current average of close to 65 bushels.

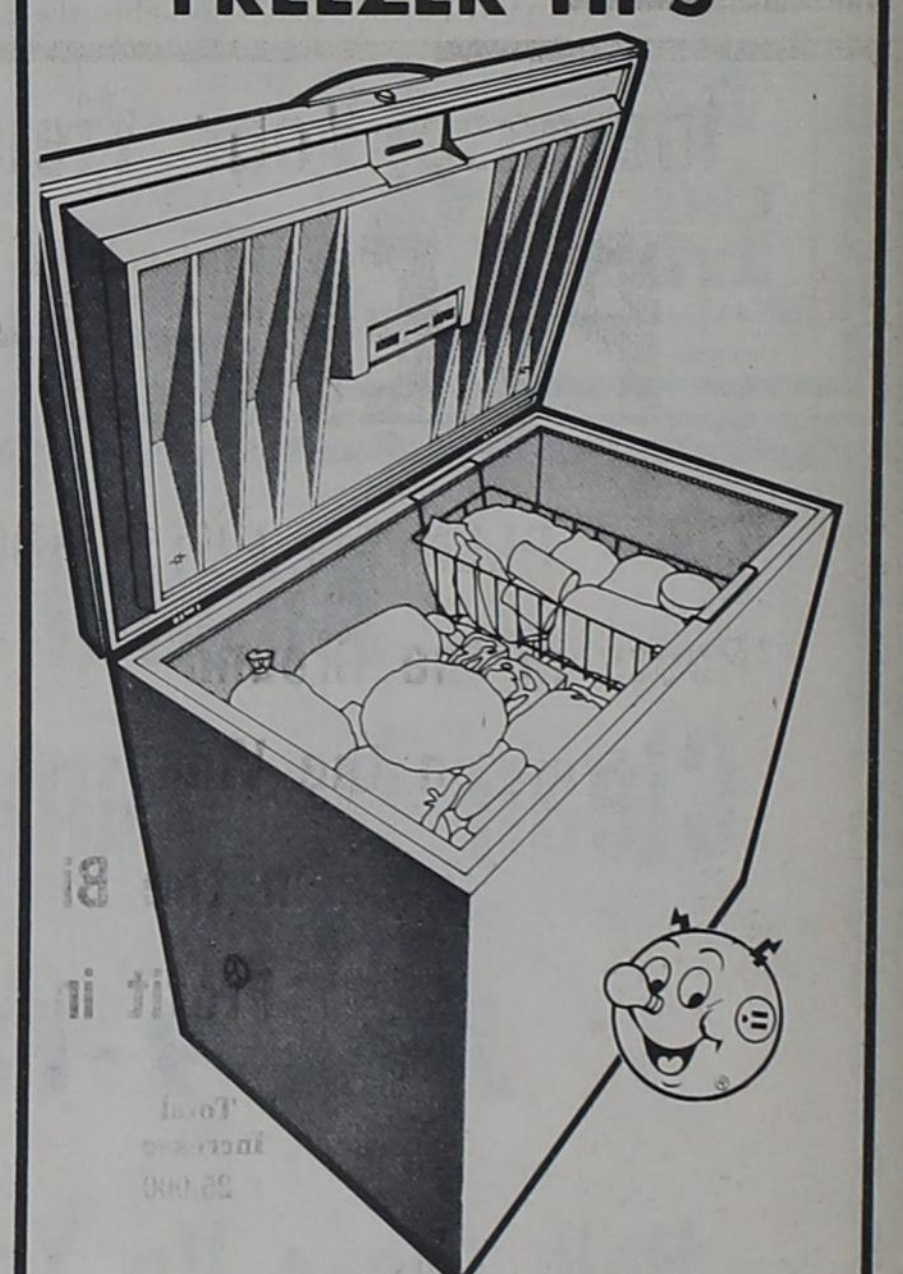

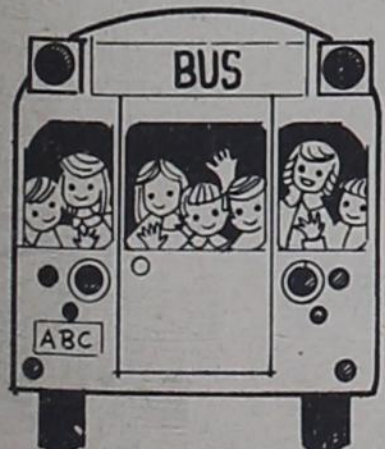

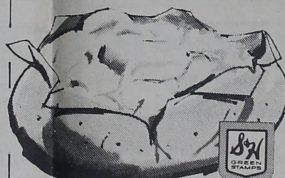
