

TEXAS TALK

Extension Swine Specialist Phil Ricks of Johnston County, N.C., says that some hog producers recognize the fertilizer value of swine waste and have designed systems that allow them to take advantage of it, but many give little thought to the nutrient value. The manure in an underfloor pit is so concentrated that little bacterial action takes place, thus the nutrient values remain fairly constant. Depending on the storage system you use, some waste will retain its nutrient values longer than others. "You lose only about 20% of the nitrogen when waste is stored in a pit, while you may lose over 50% when waste is stored in a lagoon. Have the manure analyzed each time you change rations," he suggests. Ricks figures that 4,000 gallons of manure per acre would supply enough nitrogen to produce top-quality Coastal bermuda-grass on one North Carolina farm. *****

INSPECT COTTON FOR THRIPS

Cotton that has emerged since the rains is making good growth. High winds are causing some damage to the foliage, however, insect activity is light.

Producers should inspect those cotton fields that are adjacent to wheat fields. Thrips moving out of the wheat into cotton can cause stand reduction. Control measures should be applied for thrips only in those cases where heavy infestations are causing damage to the terminal buds and interfering with stand development.

All horse owners in Knox County are urged to vaccinate their horses against sleeping sickness.

Sleeping sickness, or encephalitis, is a virus disease transmitted by mosquitos. Both Eastern and Western types of the disease can occur in Texas and immunization and mosquito control are the only effective weapons to prevent the disease. No effective treatments are available once the animal is affected, so prevention is the best weapon to protect your horses. Since vaccines afford protection for only one year, annual revaccination is
