John Young of Corpus Christi and his accuser Mrs. Colleen Gardner, who claimed she was paid a premium salary by the Texas congressman for "sexual favors". Misuse of federal funds in this case did not seem to cast as dark a shadow as the Hayes incident.

Contests (with prizes) each day of the tourney will include the following:





cities? Our customers pay less for natural gas than most cities, including other cities in Texas.** We feel we're doing a pretty good job of selling natural gas at the most reasonable price possible.

2. Does gas cost adjustment guarantee profits for Lone Star? Not at all. In fact, the company has been forced to initially absorb 15 per cent of higher adjustments. This is a serious loss that must eventually be recovered if our cities are to have adequate gas supplies in the future, and if Lone Star is to have a fair return, to which it is entitled by law. conducted of major Texas cities by Lone Star Gas Company.
