We vote again, come Tuesday!

This time it's a state-wide issue that has become one of the most controversial we've had in some time.

We'll determine whether or not we'll throw our old Texas Constitution into the trash heap and start being governed by a brand new one. It's supposed to cure all ills of the past and give us immunity to expectant ills of the future, if we're to believe much that is being said by proponents of the issue.

What's the use of adopting a new constitution?

This question has been paramount in the minds of many Texas citizens; including some of those, if you please, who had a part in drawing up the new articles of constitution. That which has been our guideline of government during all these years is plenty good enough to keep us on the right track in future years.

That's their belief -- and we're inclined to go along with this train of thought.

We realize this is not a popular stand, but neither is the other one. The "big boys" down Austin way have been at outs regarding this issue for some time. Even Gov. Dolph Briscoe has been criticized for the stand he's made and his statements regarding a new constitution.

He's agin it, you know. But those on the "pro side" are also coming in for criticism and uncomplimentary remarks.

It's been going on ever since the constitution committee met way back yonder to draw up the new constitution. You must remember that the first session ended in failure, and the committee had to make a second stab at it.

Ever since the committee began meeting some of its members have taken the stand that what's good enough in the past and the present is good enough for the future. We concur!

A state constitution, adopted by our far-sighted forefathers, can not be handled as one would an antique auto. There comes a time when the auto, like a human body, reaches a stage that it cannot be repaired and be made to give the same useful service.

Not so, we believe, with our constitution. It may be old, its pages yellowed -- but its laws can still be binding. And it can be repaired, if you'll allow us to say so.

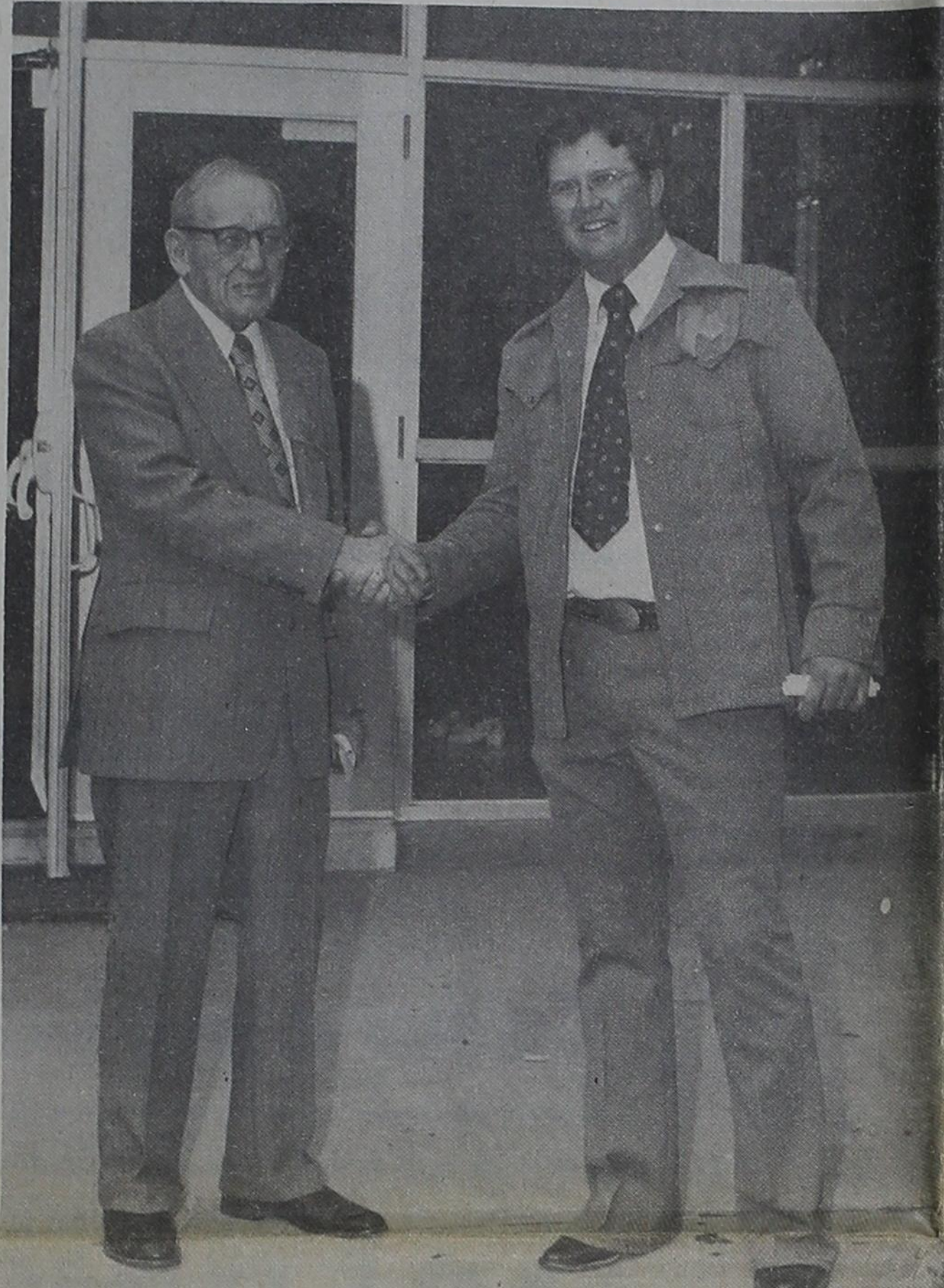
That's what we've been doing for, lo, these many years.

We believe that ever since we've been old enough to cast a ballot, we have voted on one or more amendments to the state constitution in about every general election. That's what we think the amendments are: repair jobs on a fine "piece of machinery" that has served us well and will continue to do so.

Under the proposed new constitution, there are also provisions for amendments. So why not just continue to amend the present one?

K-City Greyhounds Down Moguls, 13-0

"It was a whale of a football battle," many fans asserted, but the victory was salvaged by the Knox City Greyhounds, who defeated the Munday Moguls 13-0 in the two teams' annual contest and the Moguls' homecoming game.

Fans of the two teams and homecoming visitors jammed the Mogul Field for this game. They were entertained by some superior football strategy and tactics, although they witnessed the defeat of the Moguls.

Quarterback Jimmy Moore scored twice for the Greyhounds to spoil homecoming for the Moguls. The game ended in a 13-0 victory

and another step forward for the Greyhounds in the District 7-A race.

Moore opened the scoring in the first quarter when Charlie Flye returned a punt to the Mogul 12. Jerry Stamps ran off-tackle for 11 yards, and Moore added the other one.

The next two quarters were scoreless, and fans

witnessed some strong defensive plays for both sides.

Knox City completed the scoring in the fourth period when the 'hounds drove 64 yards in six plays, with Moore again adding the last, and very important, yard.

Munday now stands at 2-2-3 for the season and 0-1-1 in District 7-A. Knox City is 6-1 and 2-0.

ies, when those present witnessed the crowning of Miss Cindy Brown as homecoming queen and Mrs. Lois Duke coming home queen.

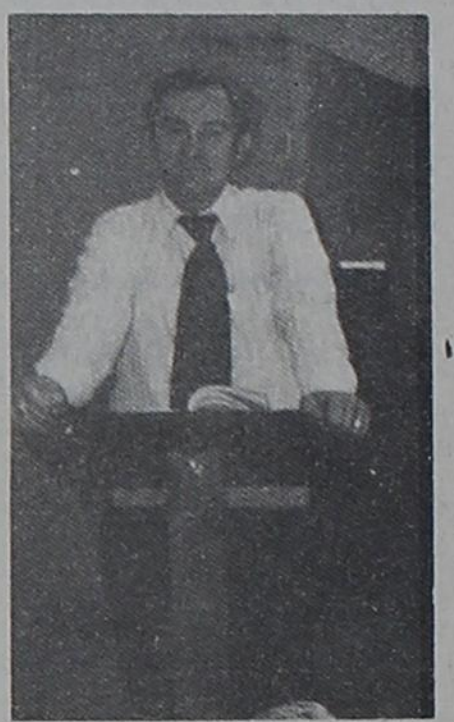

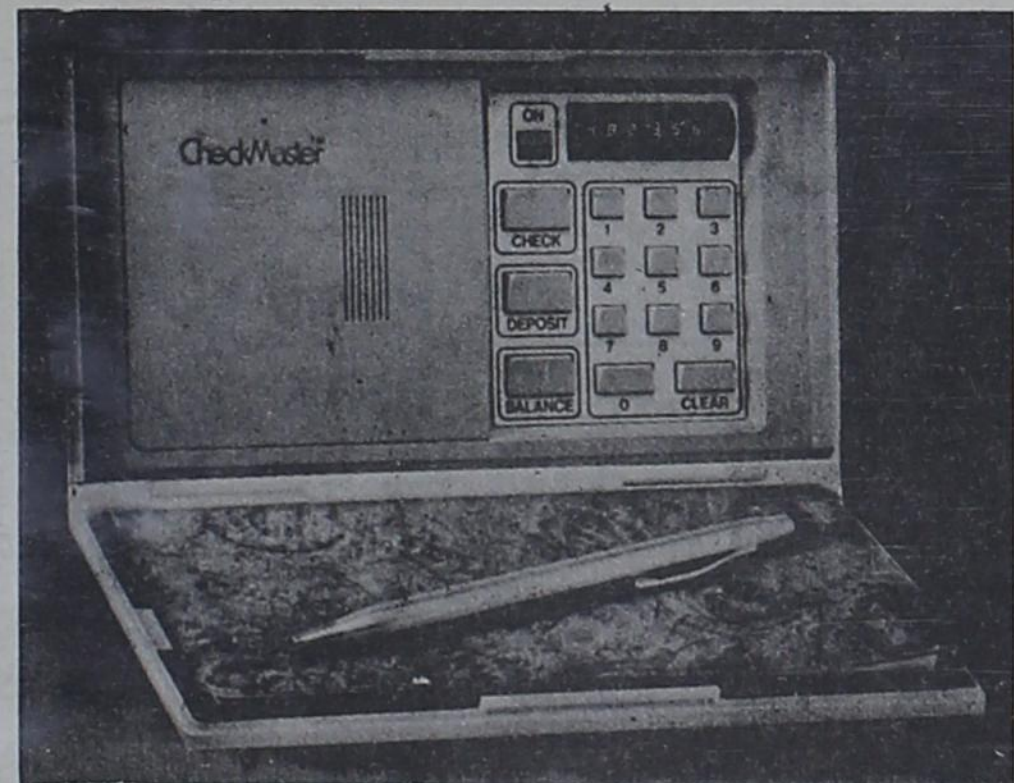

New Constitution Is Designed To Reduce People's Controls

State Representative W. S. "Bill" Healy of Paducah said today the proposed new State Constitution would create more problems than it would solve and urged Texans to vote against all eight propositions on the November 4th ballot.

"We do not need a full-time legislature," declared Healy. "I think that would cost the taxpayers just about as much, on a proportionate basis, as our full-time Congress. And that really is what Proposition 1 on the ballot would mean."

"Proposition 2 would abolish our Court of Criminal Appeals and force the Supreme Court to hear appeals in both civil and criminal cases. That can only result in slowing down the judicial process.

"You can go down the list, and if you study each proposition carefully, you will discover that this entire rewrite of the Constitution is designed to reduce the people's control over their State Government.

"I always have had great faith in the legislature, but I don't have as much faith in any group of 181 people as I would have to have in order to vote for this proposed Constitution. And even if I did trust the present Legislature with all of the massive powers this Constitution would give to it, I would have to balk when I realized that the complexion of the legislature can be changed by the voters every two years.

"We have the best State Government in the Nation now, in my opinion. I do not think we could improve it by changing the Constitution to remove the ceiling on Welfare spending, to remove the ceiling on taxes required to finance the debts of local government, to remove the ceiling on the

State's contributions to state employee and teacher retirement funds -- and, most of all, to remove the right of the people to set the ceiling on the salaries of Legislators.

"If we really do need to do some of the things this new Constitution would authorize, such as relaxing the present prohibition against lotteries, let's do them one at a time -- not in one fell swoop.

"I don't think the people of Texas are ready to turn over to the Legislature the power to call itself into Session and set the salaries of its own members and at the same time give it almost unlimited authority to regulate health care, environmental projects, land reclamation, navigation, recycling of wastes,

energy resources, gambling, and state employee and teacher retirement funds.

"The present Constitution has been construed and interpreted by the Supreme Court of Texas and we know what it means. If the new one should be adopted it would cost a tremendous amount of money and we would be a half-century before we would know how the Supreme Court would construe and interpret the new Document.

"This is why I agree with Governor Briscoe that all eight propositions on the November 4th ballot should be defeated," Mr. Healy concluded.

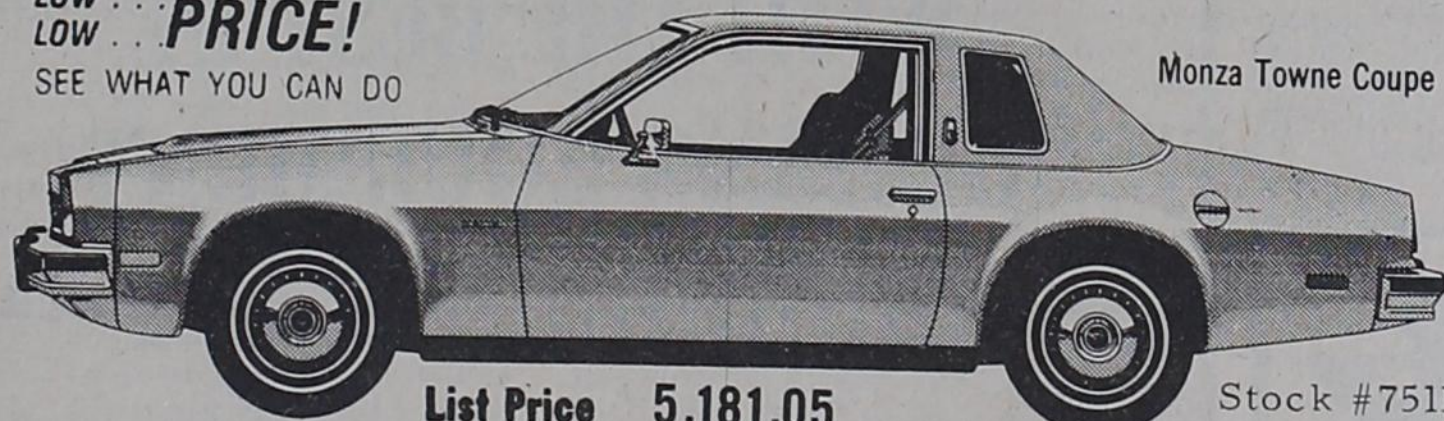

TEXAS TALK

Solar heat collectors on a commercial scale will probably show up on the farm before anywhere else. Exactly when solar energy units can practically be used is still an open question. Certainly not right away, but tests performed in six states by the Agricultural Research Service indicate that low temperature drying of grain by use of simple solar collectors is technically feasible. Technically feasible and economically practical are often some distance apart. It appears this is still the case with solar drying since the main thing the ARS testing ascertained was a need for more tests. The new series of tests will be conducted during the next two years and will provide more information on economics of the various commercial systems as well as increasing the technological information available on solar energy collection.

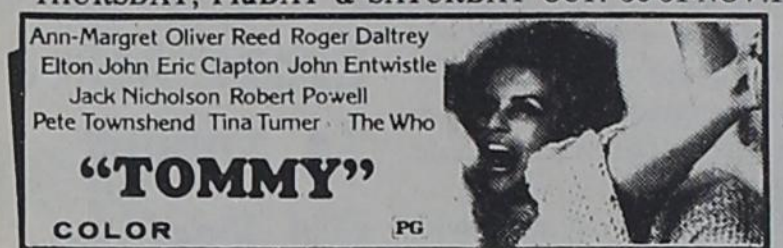

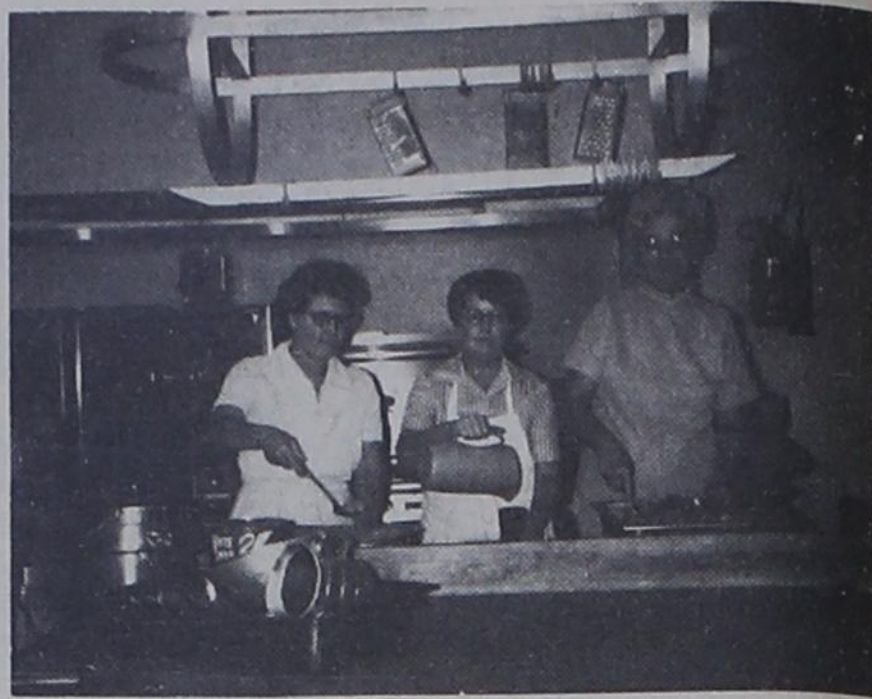

Deadline for submitting recipes and hints from the past will be November 21.

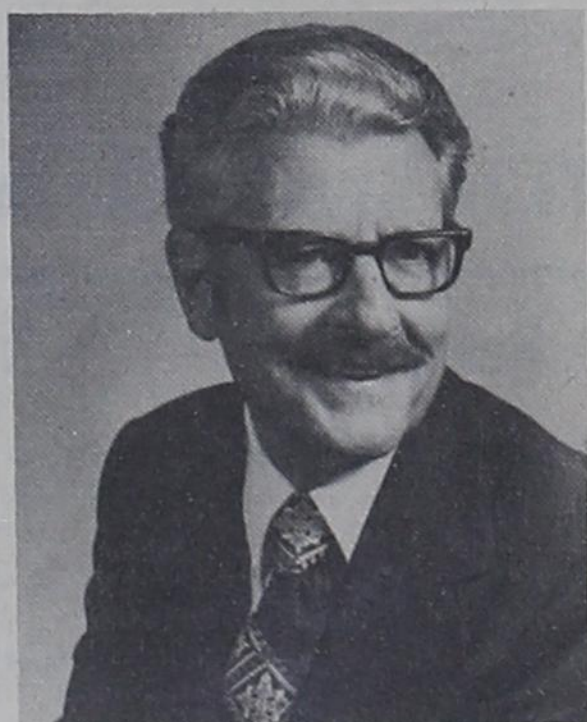
