# Team Begins Season With 33-0 Shutout

## Local Schools Set Open House

Munday and area residents are reminded of the open house for the new school facilities which is slated for 2-5 p.m. Sunday, September 15.

Interested persons will be able to tour the new classrooms, band hall and recently renovated elementary school to see the improvements that have been made. School officials extend a cordial invitation to everyone in the community to attend this event.

The Munday Moguls lived up to their number one ranking Friday night as they trounced Haskell 33-0 in the season opener for both teams. The defending Class A state champions scored on their first four possessions of the game and never gave Haskell a chance to get back in the contest.

The Moguls' first drive was marred by penalties and a fumble, but a pass to Anthony Stinnett for 21 yards took the team down to the 2, and Offutt went over on the keeper for the first score. The kick failed, and the Moguls led 6-0. After Haskell couldn't get anything going, a roughing the kicker penalty gave them another chance, and they drove inside Mogul territory before a stiff defense forced them to punt again. This time the Moguls ground game ate up chunks of yardage and another Offutt to Stinnett pass for 16 yards capped the drive, putting the Moguls up by 12.

Haskell received the kickoff at their 36, and coughed the ball up three plays later. Munday's backs, Offutt, Todd Thompson, Ronny Lowrance and Tim Collier, alternated carrying the ball, and Collier did the honors for the score, sweeping past the Haskell guards from the 6. The two-point conversion pass was good, and the Moguls took a 20-point lead. Again, Haskell couldn't make any headway against Munday defenders, and the Moguls got the ball back quickly. Seven plays took the team over for its fourth score, with passes from Offutt to Stinnett and Kregg Sanders accounting for much of the yardage. The final touchdown of the quarter was scored with 52 seconds on the clock, and the Moguls took a 26-0 lead in at halftime.

The two teams exchanged punts in the third period, and the Moguls lost a fumble, although the Indians just couldn't seem to capitalize on the miscue. The young Haskell team had its hands full trying to contain the Moguls, who played with several lineup combinations.

Munday scored its final touchdown in the fourth quarter on an eight-yard run by Tim Collier, and Lowrance's kick made the margin 33-0. A 22-yard pass to Stinnett boosted the last drive.

Todd Thompson was the game's leading rusher with 128 yards. Collier added 68 yards, and Offutt gained 66 on the ground and passed for 139, going 7 of 13 for the night. Munday will be on the road again Friday night, September 13, to play Hawley.

## Coach Edwards Comments

We played real well during the first half of our Haskell game. In fact, we probably played about as well as we possibly could have. But we really let down in the second half and began making mistakes. Our heads were just not in the game at that point, and to be a championship team we must play 48 minutes each week and not let up.

I was very satisfied with our first half performance. We were very sharp and made very few mistakes. Several of our younger players came in and did an outstanding job for us. Overall, this was the best first game we've played. But we are going to have to learn to play the entire game and not just two quarters. Hawley is going to be a very strong opponent. They are very tough physically, very aggressive, and have improved a great deal. We will be out-sized again, and we will have to play a good game to win.

Our younger teams will host Hawley here Thursday night. Seventh and eighth grade and junior varsity games are on top beginning at 6 p.m. We urge our fans to attend all the games. Their support is very important to us.

## Small Increase Noted In School Enrollment

Munday school officials reported a slight increase in enrollment after a week of classes, and three more students were expected this week.

A total of 415 students were attending school as of Monday, September 9, compared to 409 the first week of school last fall. High school enrollment figures were down by six students, but elementary and junior high classes showed a larger number of students than in 1984. Initial reports this week gave the elementary school 222 students, junior high (seventh and eighth grades) 68 and high school 125. Comparable figures last year showed 190 students in grades K-5, 88 in 6-8 and 131 in 9-12.

The fifth grade class is the largest, with 42 pupils. The kindergarten, sixth and ninth grade classes are the smallest, with 25 students in each. Three more youngsters were expected to join the elementary school this week, adding one student each

to the fourth, fifth and sixth grade classes.

Here are the enrollment figures broken down by grade: kindergarten, 25; first grade, 30; second grade, 34; third grade, 30; fourth grade, 36; fifth grade, 42; and sixth grade 25; seventh grade, 37; eighth grade, 31; freshmen, 25; sophomores, 34; juniors, 33; and seniors, 33.

## Local Lambs Place At West Texas Fair

Eight Knox County 4-H'ers entered livestock in the West Texas Fair at Abilene last weekend. All the animals were in the market lamb division.

In a field of approximately 65 heavyweight fine wools, Todd Thompson was third and Bryan Latham placed ninth. Bryan showed the 14th heavyweight fine wool cross, also in a group of about 65 lambs.

Medium wool divisions pitted approximately 90 lambs in each category. Robin Reneau had the 13th lightweight medium wool, and Tyler Thompson and Jae-Jae Reneau showed the eighth and 14th lambs, respectively, in the heavyweight medium wool class.

Kent Latham was 13th in heavyweight Southdowns. Also entering a lamb in the show but not placing was Trey Thompson.

Also resigning was assistant librarian Allene Beaty, who plans to re-open her framing business. Elba McMahon will continue her part-time position at the library, and Mrs. Beaty will substitute if needed.

Mrs. Thompson is a native of Borger, and her mother is a librarian there. She was chosen from a field of 13 applicants for the job, and although she has no library experience, she is well acquainted with books and authors, an important requirement for a librarian.

She will attend 20 hours of library workshops within the next year in order to receive her state librarian certification. In addition to the workshop hours, she must also have 1000 hours of work in the library to gain her certificate.

Mrs. Thompson feels her job will be made much easier when the library acquires a computer sometime this fall. "We don't know exactly what we will put on the program," she said, "but hopefully we will learn more about which services and materials are being used by our readers."

## Munday Couple's Relatives Have Close Call In Japan

People all over the world have been shocked at the recent rash of plane crashes, the nearest of which occurred at the Dallas/Fort Worth Airport. But for Munday residents Cordell and Tince Offutt, the news of a crash in a faraway land had more impact than the tragedy in our own state.

When a jumbo jet crashed in Japan, killing all but a few of the 500-plus passengers aboard, their first thought was of their daughter-in-law, Teresa Offutt, and her son Mike, who were vacationing in Teresa's native Japan. She wanted to show her son the sights and cultures of her homeland. The tour group they were with was booked for the ill-fated flight, but Mrs. Offutt preferred to travel by train. Since the train was full, she decided to go on the airplane, but at the last minute asked the tour director to call the train station to see if there had been any cancellations. Little did she know that the two cancellations on the train, which she and her son took for the trip, probably saved their lives.

Mrs. Offutt's husband, Gary, was on a week-long fishing trip and did not hear of the plane crash until his wife and son arrived home safely, but his parents spent some nervous hours until they learned that all was well. The Offutts live in Idaho Falls, Idaho, where Gary is head of the chemical engineering department of Allied Chemical Company.

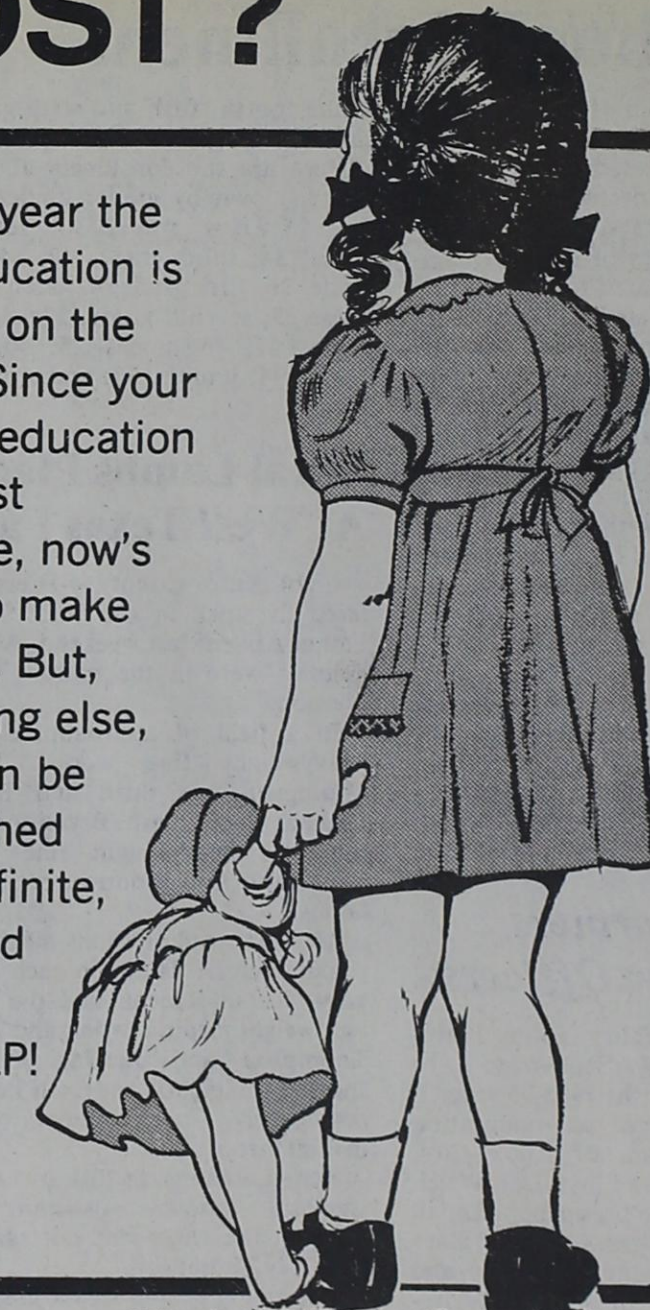
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**Ambulance Report**

Cain ran the ball in for the second touchdown late in the third quarter, then passed early in the final period for a third score. Then it was Hawley's turn to light up the scoreboard, capitalizing on passes from the quarterback to the split end for touchdowns with four minutes and 12 seconds showing on the clock. But they just didn't have time to try for another score.

Rotan scored first on a 91-yard drive capped by David Yanez' 4-yard run. Roscoe came back and took the lead with a Tommy Williams 46-yard touchdown. ### FALL FERTILIZATION AND WEED CONTROL

Now is the time to think about dragging out that fertilizer spreader one more time and giving the lawn one last application of fertilizer before winter gets here. September, for this area, is a good month to get that job done.

Fall fertilization is considered by many experts to be the key to prolonging fall color and promoting early spring recovery of bermuda and St. Augustine lawns. It helps to produce a dense turf which resists winter weed invasion.

Later this fall when cool weather gets here, the grass plant will be in the process of storing food reserves so it can live through the long months of winter dormancy. Fall fertilization assures the plant of the nutrients it needs for that process.

There is really no such thing as a "fall" fertilizer. A balanced fertilizer can and should be used all during the growing season on all lawns. Research has indicated that a fertilizer with a nutrient ratio of 3-1-2 will do the best job in most all situations. Examples of fertilizers with 3-1-2 ratios are 15-5-10 or 12-4-8. If you use a 15-5-10, you should apply 7 pounds per 1000 square feet, or if you use a 12-4-8, the application rate is 8 pounds per 1000 square feet. Avoid applying fertilizer to a wet lawn, and it's always a good idea to water the fertilizer in to the soil.

Grasses fertilized in the fall with nitrogen and potassium have shown greater survival during winter months and faster spring recovery than grasses fertilized with high phosphorus materials in the fall. Nitrogen and potassium are the first and last numbers on the bag and phosphorus is the middle number.

The winter weed season will also be on us before too many weeks go by, and we can expect the winter weeds to invade our lawns. These are mostly annual weeds that are easily controlled by chemicals called preemergence herbicides. They kill the weed seed as it germinates and

are very effective if properly applied. These chemicals will kill all seeds as they germinate, so don't use them if you are seeding tall fescue. Examples of these materials are Balan, Betasan, and Dacthal. Balan, Betasan or Dacthal should be applied between September 1 and September 15.

Apply these materials according to their label rates.

## National Farmers Group Asks For New Legislation

The president of the Texas Farmers Union returned in late August from a strategy session on the 1985 Farm Bill, and predicted that Congress will start work immediately on farm legislation when Congress reconvenes in early September.

"The National Farmers Union board of directors met in Denver last week, and issued a statement that calls upon Congress to adopt farm legislation that will allow farmers to at least have a shot at 'break-even' prices, instead of current 'shut-down' prices," said Joe Rankin, a cotton farmer from Ralls, and the president of the Texas Farmers Union.

"The NFU Board (made up of Farmers Union leaders from across the country) noted that without improved farm income, the entire Farm Credit System and other related lending institutions are in danger of failing," continued Rankin.

"The price that farmers are re-

ceiving this season for the major commodities that are grown here in Texas are so low (30-50% lower than in 1981 in some cases) that many can't service their debt, much less the other factors that make up 'cost of production' -- management costs and return on investment."

The Texas family farmer group, in hope of convincing Texas Congressmen to vote for legislation that would give farmers the right to vote in referenda on whether to control production, will be traveling to Washington, D.C. during the month of September. The Denver strategy session was to coordinate policy position for the national group of family farmers and ranchers, many of whom will be traveling to D.C. to participate in the 'Fly-In'.

Rankin, who will be leading the Texas delegation, has solid hopes for the success of the September effort.

"Leaders of the Texas Farmers Union, other ag organizations, and

many individual farmers have been visiting with Texas Congressmen through the month of August, and we have made some impact," said Rankin.

"What we must continue to impress upon Congress is that the promise of exports bailing farmers out of the depression that we are in is a pipe dream. The current administration wants us to export more at lower prices. But if we produce more, the price only goes down farther. We must make an effort to reduce the tremendous oversupply of raw commodities in this country--through referendum and mandatory controls of supply."

Sections 1 and 2 of House Joint Resolution 6 propose a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to issue an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development bonds.

The additional bonds to be issued will be dedicated for deposit in the Texas Water Development Fund, with \$190 million of those bond proceeds to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition and with \$400 million of those bond proceeds to be used for state participation in the acquisition and development of facilities for storage, transmission, transportation, and treatment of water and wastewater. Of the remaining bonds authorized, \$190 million will be dedicated for use in water quality enhancement projects, and \$200 million will be dedicated exclusively for flood control projects.

The amendment would also allow the legislature to provide for the creation, administration, and implementation of a bond insurance program to which the state pledges up to \$250 million of its general credit to insure payment of the principal of and interest on bonds or other obligations issued by political subdivisions of the state for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, recharge, chloride control or desalinization. Unless authorized to continue by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the Legislature, the bond insurance program will expire on the sixth anniversary of the date on which this section becomes a part of the constitution. Bond insurance issued before expiration of the program will not be affected by such expiration.

The amendment would authorize the legislature to create and appropriate money to special funds in the state treasury to make grants, loans, and other financial assistance available to governmental entities for certain enumerated water planning purposes. Also, the legislature would be permitted to extend the benefits of constitutionally approved water projects to nonprofit water supply corporations.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the issuance of an additional \$980 million of Texas Water Development Bonds, to create special water funds for water conservation, water development, water quality enhancement, flood control, drainage, subsidence control, recharge, chloride control, agricultural soil and water conservation, and desalinization, to authorize a bond insurance program, and to clarify the purposes for which Texas Water Development Bonds may be issued."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Section 3 of House Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Texas Water Development Board to issue and sell Texas agricultural water conservation bonds in an

amount not to exceed \$200 million, if authorized to do so by a two-thirds vote of the members of each house of the legislature. The Texas agricultural water conservation bonds would be general obligations of the State of Texas, and would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury in each fiscal year. The amendment would allow Texas agricultural water conservation bonds to be issued and sold only for four years after the date on which this Act becomes a part of the constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance and sale of \$200 million of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to authorize a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property if such relocation or replacement is done in conjunction with or immediately following the relocation or replacement of water mains serving the property. Any legislative enactment permitting the expenditure of funds for such purposes would authorize the city or town to fix a lien on the property, with the owners' consent, for the cost of relocating or replacing the water laterals, and would provide that such cost shall be assessed against the property, with repayment by the property owner to be amortized over a period not to exceed five years at the rate of interest set by law. Such liens could not be enforced until after five years from the date the liens were affixed.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to enact laws permitting a city or town to spend public funds and levy assessments for the relocation or replacement of water laterals on private property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the use of the proceeds from the sale of permanent school fund land to acquire other land for the permanent school fund. Currently, the constitution requires that proceeds from the sale of such land be invested in certain bonds and other securities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing proceeds from the sale of land dedicated to the permanent school fund to be used to acquire other land for that fund."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 89 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts by determining

the services the district must provide, by setting requirements a resident must meet in order to qualify for services, and by determining any other relevant provisions necessary for providing health care to residents.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to regulate the provision of health care by hospital districts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would enable the State of Texas to enter into an agreement with another state to confine inmates from the state of Texas in penal or correctional facilities of the other state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to permit state prisoners to be placed in penal facilities of another state pursuant to an interstate agreement."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioners court of Chambers County to divide Chambers County into not less than two and not more than six justice precincts. Under current constitutional law, Chambers County may be divided into not less than two and not more than five justice precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing Chambers County to be divided into two to six precincts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 9 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant an additional \$500 million in bonding authority to the Veterans' Land Board for the veterans' housing assistance program. Under the current constitution, the Veterans' Land Board is authorized by Article III, Section 49-b-1 to issue and sell not more than \$800 million in bonds, \$500 million of which may be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. This amendment would increase that authorization to permit the issuance and sale of up to \$1.3 billion in bonds, \$1 billion of which would be used for the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund. In addition, the amendment would remove the current definition of "veteran" from the constitution and permit the legislature to redefine "veteran" as the changing times and circumstances require.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing \$500 million in additional bonding authority for the veterans' housing assistance program and changing the definition of those veterans eligible to participate in the veterans' land program and the veterans' housing program by authorizing the legislature by law to define an eligible veteran for the purposes of those programs."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 72 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature either to enact a statute or to attach a rider to the General Ap-

propriations Act to require prior approval of the expenditure or emergency transfer of any funds appropriated by the legislature to state governmental agencies.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to protect public funds by authorizing prior approval of expenditure or emergency transfer of state appropriations."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to provide for the issuance of general obligation bonds, the proceeds of which would be deposited in a fund to be known as the farm and ranch finance program fund. The fund would be administered by the Veterans' Land Board and would be used to make loans and provide other financial assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land. The amount of bonds outstanding at any one time would be limited to \$500 million. The principal and interest that becomes due on such bonds in each fiscal year would be paid from amounts remaining in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year, with the balance due to be appropriated from treasury revenues in the fiscal year when such amounts become due.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide financing assistance for the purchase of farm and ranch land."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would define indictments and informations as instruments charging a person with the commission of an offense, and would delete certain technical requirements as to the form of writs and processes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the manner in which a person is charged with a criminal offense and to certain requirements applicable to state writs and processes."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the Texas Supreme Court and the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from federal appellate courts. In addition, the two courts would promulgate rules of procedure relating to the review of those questions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment granting the Supreme Court of Texas and the Court of Criminal Appeals of Texas jurisdiction to answer questions of state law certified from a federal appellate court."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 14 proposes a constitutional amendment that would create a board with responsibility for the reapportionment of judicial districts, subject to legislative approval. The amendment would provide for the continued power of the legislature to provide for judicial reapportionment, and would provide that reapportionment

will be the responsibility of the Legislative Redistricting Board if the Judicial Districts Board fails to make a timely reapportionment. The amendment would provide for the creation of judicial districts smaller than a county in counties where the creation of such districts has been approved by the voters at a general election. The amendment would provide for more than one judge for a judicial district. The amendment would rename supreme judicial districts as courts of appeals districts. The amendment would provide that the jurisdiction of district and county courts may be as provided by law. The amendment would provide for the jurisdiction of justice courts, which may have additional jurisdiction as provided by law. The amendment would provide for rules of judicial administration and civil procedure to be promulgated by the Supreme Court, and would provide that the legislature may delegate additional rule making power to the Supreme Court or to the Court of Criminal Appeals. The amendment would provide that courts and judges in existence at the time of its adoption remain in existence until otherwise provided by law.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the reapportionment of the judicial districts of the state by the Judicial Districts Board or by the Legislative Redistricting Board, and providing for the administration and jurisdiction of constitutional courts."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 14 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 27 proposes a constitutional amendment that would abolish the office of County Treasurer in Andrews County and transfer the powers and duties of that office to the County Auditor. The amendment would also abolish the office of County Treasurer in El Paso County if, at the statewide election at which this amendment is submitted to the voters, a majority of the voters who vote in El Paso County favor the amendment. The functions of the office of El Paso County Treasurer will be performed by a person employed or designated by the El Paso County Commissioners Court. The amendment also provides for the abolition of the office of County Surveyor in Denton, Randall, Collin, Dallas, El Paso, and Henderson Counties upon approval of such abolition by a majority of the voters who vote on the question at an election called by the commissioners court of the county. If the office of County Surveyor is abolished in any county, the commissioners court may employ or contract with any qualified person to perform the duties of the office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for:

(1) the abolition of the office of county treasurer in Andrews County and El Paso County;

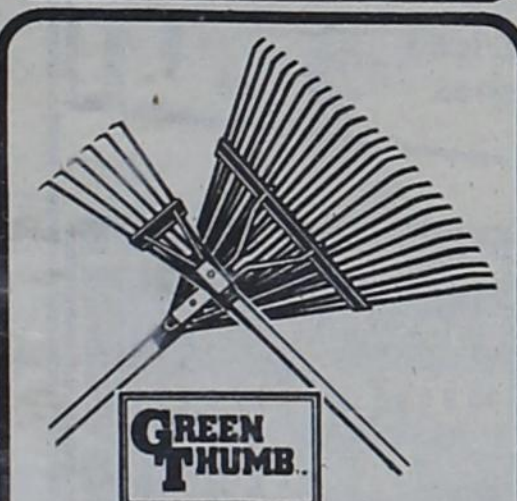
(2) the abolition of the office of county surveyor in Collin, Dallas, Denton, El Paso, Henderson, and Randall Counties."

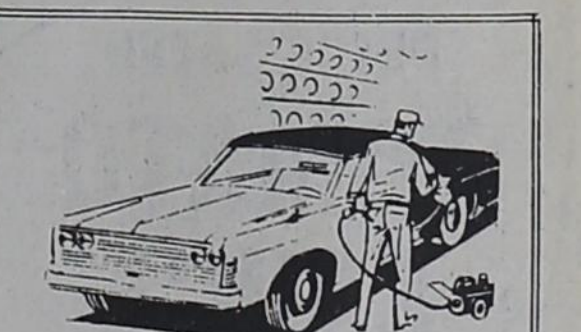
