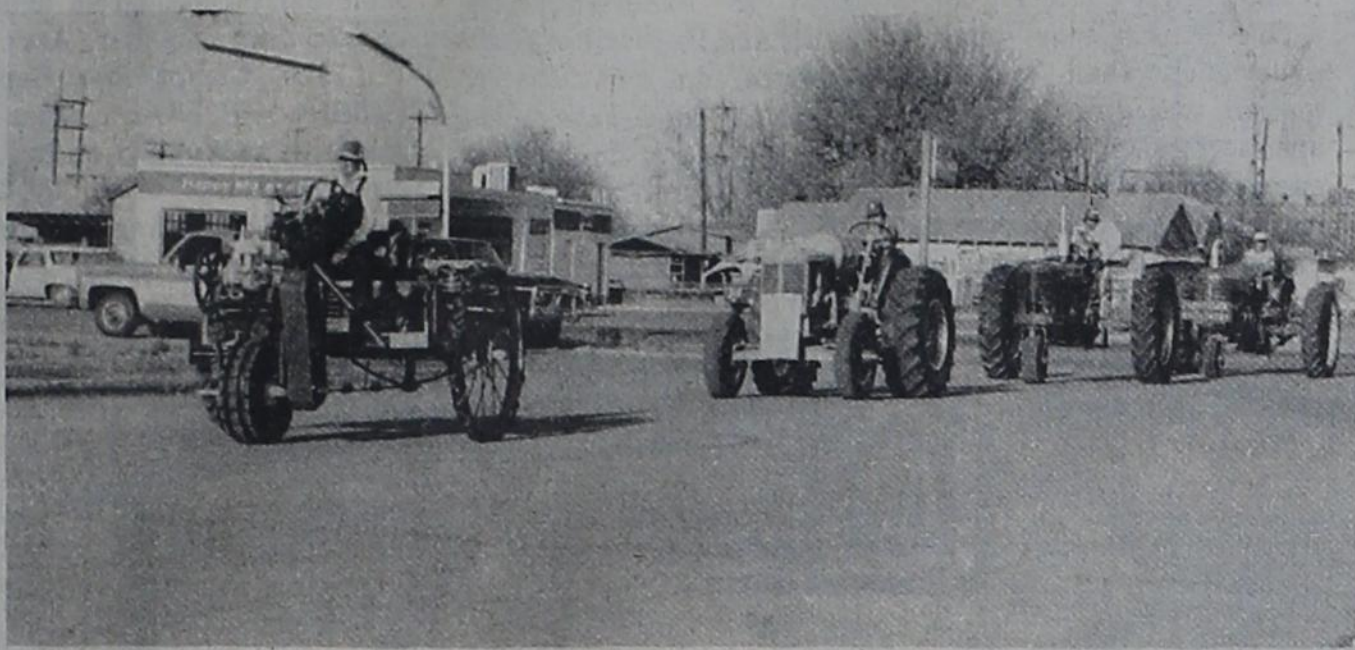

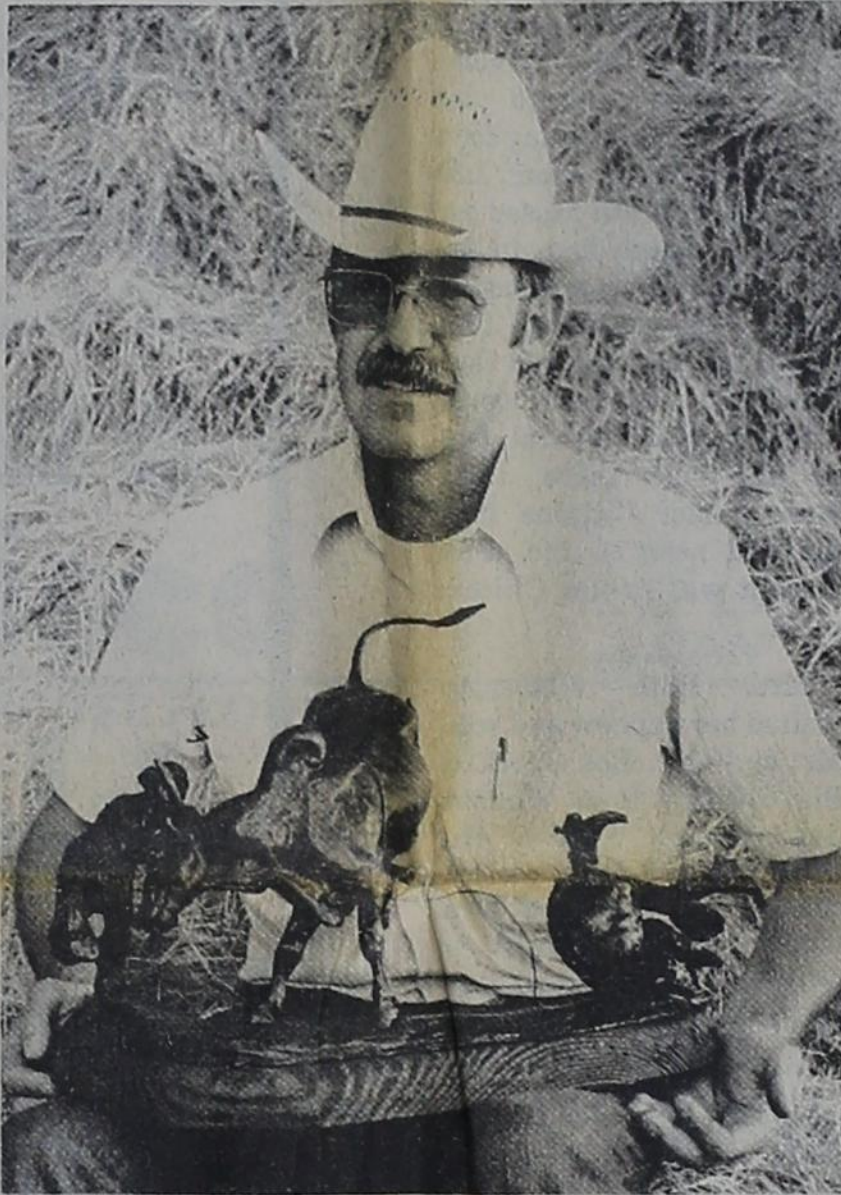
Benjamin Gets 3 Aldermen

Re-elected were Phillip McAfee, who led the ticket with 133 votes, and Wm. S. Bryan, with 131 votes. John Reneau is the new member, receiving 86 votes. Others on the ticket were Stacia Cook, who received 50 votes, and Kenneth Hendrix, with 80 votes.

James Amerson, retiring member, did not seek another term.

A total of 163 votes were cast, two of which were absentee.

For the convenience of those who desire to haul off their own trash, facilities of the dump ground will be available from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. on Saturday.

Local Firm Awarded Contract For Housing

Awarding of the contract Tuesday morning means that construction is expected to begin soon on modernizing 10 dwelling units of the Munday Housing Authority project in East Munday.

The contract was awarded to Home Building Center of Munday, and it is hoped that construction will begin early in May.

Present for awarding the contract were: Cameron Allred of Fort Worth, architect for the Department of Housing and Urban Development; Hal Amerson, chairman of the Board of Commissioners, Munday Housing Authority; Daniel

Ramirez of Home Building Center, and Jeanie Carden, executive director of the Munday Housing Authority.

The contract calls for demolition work, plumbing, heating, electrical and necessary site improvements. Mrs. Carden said that only eight of the ten units will be reconstructed at this time.

The units were originally constructed in 1953. By August of 1975, there were only three tenants living in the apartments, then only one in January, 1977. They were completely vacated in July, 1977.

Because of vandalism and other factors, the units now consist only of shells of structures. Nothing remains but the brick and foundations, and some of the brick has disappeared. "The modernization program will be almost like building from the ground up," Mrs. Carden said. She stated further that anyone interested in occupying one of these modernized apartments should make application as soon as possible. "They will be just like new apartments," she concluded.

The Power Of His Resurrection

The LOVE OF GOD was displayed on what we call Good Friday as Jesus took a "spirit of forgiveness" with him to the cross. He asked God to forgive the persons responsible for his crucifixion. He granted salvation to one being crucified with him. So on the "cross of Christ", the measure of God's love was poured out for us.

On the first day of the week following that Friday, the POWER OF GOD was displayed. On that day Jesus rose from the confines of the tomb to release into the world power to help persons be victorious in the face of strong opposition, even death. That power can change and transform life and will come to all who

commit their ways to the Lord Jesus Christ.

When the empty tomb was discovered that morning long ago, a transformation began to be experienced in the lives of persons who had been with Jesus. Peter, Thomas, and many others began to re-evaluate the events of the last few weeks and received assurance that Jesus was truly the "Anointed One" - the promised Messiah. From that small number of disciples, the transformation began to move out in ever widening circles, like the ripples that move out when set in motion by tossing a rock into a pool.

One person who was to experience that transformation we know as the apostle Paul. He had persecuted Christian people, but on the Damascus Road he experienced the presence of

Jesus and that changed the direction of his life. And when he wrote to the Philippians he testified, "I have suffered the loss of all things and count them as refuse that I may gain Christ, and be found in him." (Phil. 3:8) But then he expressed his commitment to Jesus Christ as his Lord. He said, "All I want is to know Christ and experience the power of his resurrection; to share his sufferings and become like him in death, in the hope that I myself will be raised from death to life." (Phil. 3:10-11, TEV).

Easter is the day we are called to experience the LOVE and POWER of God's presence and witness to what that love and power has done and is doing in us today.

Paul considered nothing of equal importance to that of

knowing Jesus Christ as Lord and experiencing the power of his resurrection. As we experience this in our lives we will be clothed in the glorious presence of our Lord. When we do we will cease to live on the experiences of others, for we will know his presence ourselves and the glory of his eternal presence will make us "new every morning."

Christ lives - and now is the time for us to rejoice and live.

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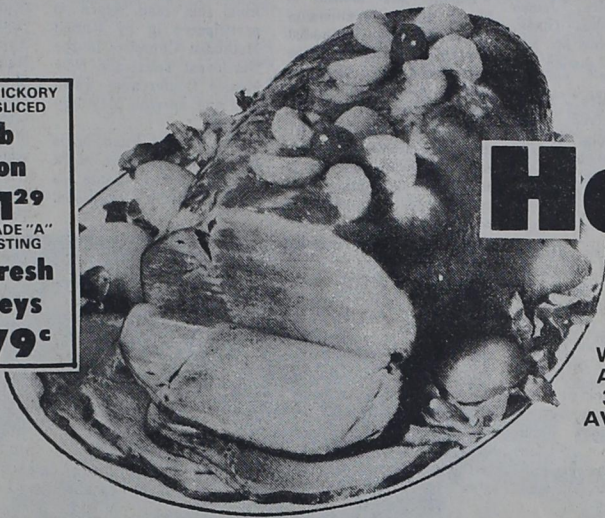

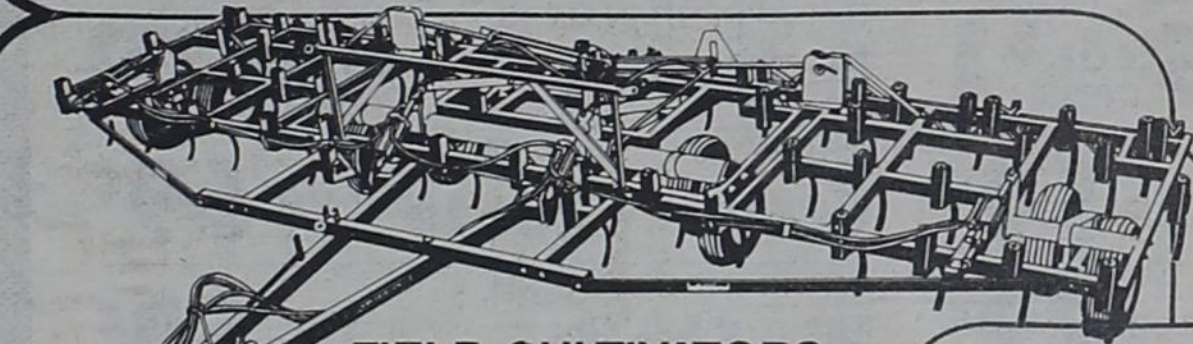

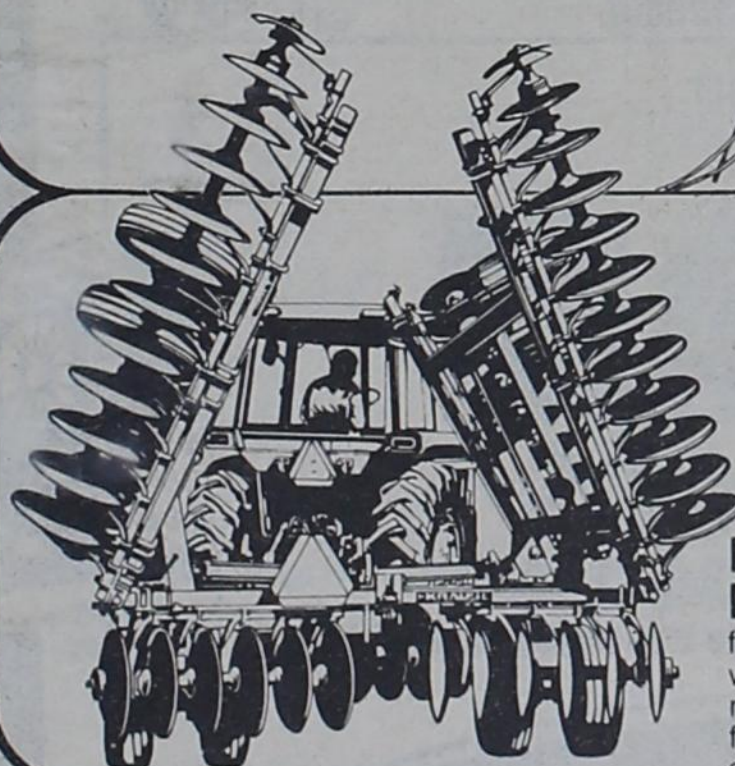

Faith In The Resurrection

Mary Magdalene, we are told in St. John's Gospel, "Came to the tomb very early on the first day of the week when it was still dark." We are not told why she went to the tomb so early. When they wrote their Gospels, Mark and Luke say that it was to anoint Jesus's body for final burial. But, according to John, Jesus's body had already been "wrapped with the spices in linen cloths, following the Jewish burial custom" immediately after crucifixion. (John 19:40). It must be accepted that there are several minor details of what happened after the resurrection on which the four Gospels fail to agree. Some of these differences can easily be explained. Some cannot. But we know that it is quite usual for witnesses to the same event to disagree on minor details. The truth is that the early Church and, in particular, the four Gospel writers, agree on one central fact; on the third day the tomb was empty. Jesus had risen from the dead as he said he would. The early Church was under no illusions as to the importance of this central fact. In the Acts of the Apostles (10:34ff) we read how Peter attested "to the fact that they had killed Jesus by hanging him on a tree, yet three days afterwards God raised him to life

and allowed him to be seen, not by the whole people but only by certain witnesses God had chosen beforehand."

Peter's faith was not based on the fact that Jesus was a fine preacher, or a good man, or healed the sick, but because he rose from the dead. Later St. Paul was to emphasize the same truth: "If Christ had not been raised then our preaching is useless, and your believing is useless." (1 Cor. 15:14) In other words, if Christ is not risen then we are all fools. In short, our Christian faith is founded on one fact: that Jesus rose from the dead. Today we are not able to witness those events surrounding the discovery of the empty tomb in the same way as the apostles did. We must rely on someone else's testimony. We rely on Peter who proclaimed in the Acts (ibid) "Now I, and those with me, can witness to everything he did throughout the countryside of Judea and in Jerusalem itself..." And we can rely on John's testimony who declares (John 20:5ff) "Then the other disciple (himself) who had reached the tomb first also went in, he saw and he believed."

The testimony of men like Peter and John is reliable. Their lives prove it. After the resurrection they were totally transformed, so that the previously disloyal Peter could stand in public and address the people with confidence. Through the power of the Holy Spirit the apostles came to believe in Jesus Christ. They realized that Jesus had that special power which belongs only to God. All he had said about himself before his death had come to pass.

Their faith in Jesus justifies our faith in Jesus. The realization of his resurrection can open our hearts to receive the divine life which flows from the power of Christ as God. Through faith we can share immediately in the new life of the resurrection. What was previously impossible becomes possible. We can truly forgive others; anger gives way to patience; the pain of suffering is calmly accepted instead of bitterly resented. We witness, by the new life which transforms us, that Jesus is the Savior of mankind.

These are the fruits of faith, at first hidden in men's hearts but later brought forth in the light of resurrection. Our new life of faith is like the life in the tiny seed buried in the dark earth which breaks out in the springtime. It is like the life of Christ who lay buried in the tomb but who rose to a new life on that first Easter morning. On this joyful day when mankind has once again been given the chance of new birth, let us pray for the gift of real faith so that we too, my spread the Good News that Jesus, the Lord, has died but now is risen for ever.
