LINE OF THE FACE.

THEIR RELATION TO THE BEARD AND THE MUSTACHE.

A knowledge of Drawing on the part of men, says a Woman Artist.

"A knowledge of drawing on the part of men would have the effect of increasing their good looks."

"The natural request for an explanation is the question: How is it that these lines and curves occur in everything."

"The first principles of drawing are proportional lines and curves. These lines and curves occur in everything."

"Here is an example. Just take this pencil and draw a face. Oh, anything will do. But be sure to make two straight lines over the eyes for eyebrows. That's the how serious that expression is."

"Now run over those straight lines and in their places make two curves which end up below. That face has the appearance of intense surprise, hasn't it? If you turn the pencil over and make the ends down in the first instance, the difference between the two would be more striking."

"Well, the human face has its lines," and by studying them our men could improve. It is not surprising that the elementary exponent is to adapt the face, and to stand in the lines of the face, and to make a man's face."

"In technical language include the straight and curves. Such is an excellent illustration of the two curves which is so needed for use to explain the difference in a man's expression."

"Take a man with an aquiline nose, long, drooping mustache, why? It occurs to me that the lines of the nose and the mustache. Such a man should have a small pointed beard and a mustache with a pointed tip at the end."

The customer is told to jerk the ends in. It is quite a pity to see such fine lines split in that way. The wisest cut is the straight one, and age more because it is the fashion for a man to have a mustache. You talk about women being led to Dante, Paulsen, but in the matter of your whiskers you men are worse slaves than they are."

"Now don't run away with the notion that I advocate general shaving. Some men who are clean shaven are better. Be the lines of their faces simply demand that of which they are depriving their customers every man who requires a strong, very intellectual face to do without beard or mustache. The hair on the face is the most important of the bad lines of some months that will be left totally uncovered spot the face."

SPRIT SLATE WRITING.

How the Emersons Wrote.

Spiritualistic slate writing, if cleverly done, always makes a marked impression on a susceptible audience because it utterly baffles their efforts to detect the trick. They see a small cabinet suspended above the stage by means of cords or ribbons. It has an open front and is empty. The magician stands in front of it and says that it will be seen and taps it inside and again, his hand so doing that it is loose.

On a stand near by has a small case, a common school slate, a bottle of ink and with a quill pen in it and a few sheets of ordinary white writing paper. All these he passes around among the audience, and then he fixes a sheet of the paper to the slate by means of wafers, places the ink bottle with a quill pen in it in the cabinet, together with the bottle of ink, the latter having the pen still in it. He then takes the wafers and the pen and the pen not in the ink bottle, but lying on the bottom of the cabinet. He then comes to the front of the stage and passes it around for examination, when the writing is immediately recognized as having been done with India ink.

The explanation of the trick is simple. The cabinet is not empty, despite the performer, the fluid used being a solution of sulphuric acid of the purest quality. To make the solution 20 drops of the concentrated acid are added to one ounce of filtered water. Writing done with this solution is invisible until exposed to heat. When the acid is exposed to heat, it comes out perfectly black, but it is not so with the ink. The heat is applied by means of an electric current run over wire with a coil of rubber tubing, the ends of which the cabinet is suspended containing copper wires, which conduct the current to the slate. Black threads suitably attached enable the performer to make the sounds in the cabinet, to cause the rubber to shake and to jerk the pen out of the ink bottle.

Several sheets of paper are prepared in advance, with a different inscription, the performer telling one inscription from another by secretly marked pin-pricks.—New York Herald.

Emma Goldman, the High Priestess of anarchy in this country, has been arrested as an accomplice of Czolgosz. It is believed that she was part of a wide spread plot to assassinate the President and that the poor fool who did the shooting was only a tool of the anarchists.

Dr. Mann, who operated on the President immediately after the shooting, does not seem to share the optimistic views about the President that the other attending doctors have expressed. That President McKinley is dangerously wounded there can be no doubt and Dr. Mann no doubt is justified in saying no one could forecast the result.

Attorney General Knox has very properly refused the request of the Navy Department to appoint one of the assistants in his office to assist the Judge Advocate in the Schley investigation. Attorney General Knox says to comply with such request would be construed by the public as an attempt on the part of the government to convict Admiral Schley. The public is already convinced that Admiral Schley is not condemned and it will not be any fault of the Navy Department. The attempt to bring in the President as a prosecutor by employing members of the Attorney General's office to assist in the prosecution is not creditable to Secretary Long, who has already shown that he is an uncompromising partisan of Admiral Sampson.

Senator Goss in opposing a resolution against the anarchist, said he saw no difference between the President and any other man. Of course of the life if the President is disposed to look at it that way there is no use to argue with him, but we have seen the temptation to remind him that of all the millions of Americans who have been born, living now or have passed away since the republic was formed, only twenty-four men filled the office of president of these United States. Of course Senator Goss is neither an anarchist or an anarchist sympathizer, but when he says the President is no more than any other man he uses one of the trite sayings of the anarchist themselves. Emma Goldman, after her arrest, used about the same language towards the President. There is, therefore, no difference between the average citizen and the Chief Magistrate of seventy-five millions of people, and an assault on the Chief Magistrate, as such, is an assault on the government itself. What Senator Goss means, perhaps, was that the life of a president was worth no more to him than the life of the humblest citizen. None will dispute this, but when a man is elevated to the presidency the nation expects themselves to protect him during his term of office by making the laws as strict as possible. Czolgosz shot McKinley the president not McKinley the man. Had Wm J. Bryan been elected president, McKinley would have been living at Canton quietly and unknown to the assassin while Mr. Bryan would have been the object of his vengeance. Free State men do not agree with Senator Goss that there is no difference between the president and any other man, but believe that an attempted assassination of the President, whether successful or not, should be made a capital offense punishable by death.

PRESIDENT IS SIKING.

Newspaper reports from the President lead the public to believe that all danger was passed, consequently when the following bulletin was received this morning the public was very unprepared for the bad news: 'The President is sinking rapidly though still unconscious. Prepare for the worst.'

'Cortleyan.' This bulletin was dated Buffalo 8:40 a. m. At 8:50 a. m. another bulletin says: 'The President's condition is somewhat improved in past two hours. There is a better response to stimulents. He is free from pain and is conscious. Pulse 125, temperature 99.8.'

This sudden turn for the worse, and especially the high pulse rate and high temperature are considered dangerous symptoms by all physicians. We sincerely hope the President will recover, but the news this morning leads us to believe that the end is near at hand.

Buffalo, Sept. 11.—The president will live, but will probably carry the bullet of the would-be assassin with him to the grave. This is the expressed opinion of Dr. Charles McBurney of New York in a statement to a representative of the Associated Press after the consultation of physicians Tuesday morning. He announced that the president has been the danger point and now only the possibility of complications remains. He also announced that unless the bullet is embedded in the muscles of the back and cannot trouble, there will be no need to operate. In his opinion it cannot even be located with X-rays. Only the use of X-rays he said would be to satisfy curiosity.

All other physicians were equally as confident after the consultation that the president was assured. Dr. Minter said the president was 'out of the danger point by adding "with plenty of daylight behind him." Dr. Rowell Park expressed the view that "unless some unexpected complication occur we expect him to recover."

ATTEMPT ON HIS LIFE.

Deliberately shot by an Anarchist While Holding a Reception at Buffalo. Buffalo, Sept. 9.—President McKinley was shot and seriously wounded by a bullet fired at him while he was holding a reception in the Temple of Music at the Pan-American exposition a few minutes after 4 o'clock Friday afternoon. One shot took effect in the right breast, the other in the abdomen. The first is not so serious a nature and the bullet was extracted. The latter pierced the right wall and he is not expected to recover. It is the opinion the president will recover.

It was shortly after 4 p. m. when one of the three which comprise the presidential party, a medium-sized man of ordinary appearance and plainly dressed in black, approached as if to greet the president. Emma Goldman, Cortleyan and President Milburn noticed that the man's hand was swathed in a bandage in a handkerchief. Reports of bystanders differ as to which hand. He worked his way amid the stream of people up to the edge of the dais until he was within two feet of the president. President McKinley smiled, bowed and extended his hand in a genial spirit when suddenly the sharp crack of a revolver rang loud and clear to the astonishment of those nearby. Then there was complete silence.

President McKinley stood stock still with a look of astonishment, almost of bewilderment, on his face. Then he retreated a step while a paleor began to ring over his features. The president was only partially aware that something serious had happened, passed in surprise while necks were craned and all eyes turned as one to the rear.

Then came a commotion. With the leap of a tiger three men threw themselves toward the would-be assassin. Two of them were United States secret service men who were on the outlook for any such thing. The third was a man just such a cademy as had here before fallen the president and the nation. The third was a bystander, a negro, who had only an instant before grasped the hand of the president. As the man who tripped himself up on the president's assistant. In a twinkling he was borne to the ground, his weapon was wrested from his grasp and strong arms pinioned him down.

It is proved that a moment before had stood mute and motionless as a bewildered ignoramus of the enormity of the thing, now as with a single impulse he was forward with a head for the goal, he welled up from the thousand throats and a thousand men charged forward by hand upon the perpetrator of the crime.

For a moment the confusion was terrible. The crowd surged forward in a mad rush of commotion. Those nearest the door fled from the edifice in a flash of a stampele, while hundreds of others, they were not, yielded blindly forward in the effort to penetrate the crowded building and see the man who had shot the president. President McKinley after the first shock of the assassin's shot returned to his senses. He was seated himself, at the same time removing his hat and bowing his head to the crowd. This is the expressed opinion of Dr. Charles McBurney of New York in a statement to a representative of the Associated Press after the consultation of physicians Tuesday morning. He announced that the president has been the danger point and now only the possibility of complications remains. He also announced that unless the bullet is embedded in the muscles of the back and cannot trouble, there will be no need to operate. In his opinion it cannot even be located with X-rays. Only the use of X-rays he said would be to satisfy curiosity.

All other physicians were equally as confident after the consultation that the president was assured. Dr. Minter said the president was 'out of the danger point by adding "with plenty of daylight behind him." Dr. Rowell Park expressed the view that "unless some unexpected complication occur we expect him to recover."

ATTEMPT ON HIS LIFE.

Deliberately shot by an Anarchist While Holding a Reception at Buffalo. Buffalo, Sept. 9.—President McKinley was shot and seriously wounded by a bullet fired at him while he was holding a reception in the Temple of Music at the Pan-American exposition a few minutes after 4 o'clock Friday afternoon. One shot took effect in the right breast, the other in the abdomen. The first is not so serious a nature and the bullet was extracted. The latter pierced the right wall and he is not expected to recover. It is the opinion the president will recover.

It was shortly after 4 p. m. when one of the three which comprise the presidential party, a medium-sized man of ordinary appearance and plainly dressed in black, approached as if to greet the president. Emma Goldman, Cortleyan and President Milburn noticed that the man's hand was swathed in a bandage in a handkerchief. Reports of bystanders differ as to which hand. He worked his way amid the stream of people up to the edge of the dais until he was within two feet of the president. President McKinley smiled, bowed and extended his hand in a genial spirit when suddenly the sharp crack of a revolver rang loud and clear to the astonishment of those nearby. Then there was complete silence.

President McKinley stood stock still with a look of astonishment, almost of bewilderment, on his face. Then he retreated a step while a paleor began to ring over his features. The president was only partially aware that something serious had happened, passed in surprise while necks were craned and all eyes turned as one to the rear.

Then came a commotion. With the leap of a tiger three men threw themselves toward the would-be assassin. Two of them were United States secret service men who were on the outlook for any such thing. The third was a man just such a cademy as had here before fallen the president and the nation. The third was a bystander, a negro, who had only an instant before grasped the hand of the president. As the man who tripped himself up on the president's assistant. In a twinkling he was borne to the ground, his weapon was wrested from his grasp and strong arms pinioned him down.

It is proved that a moment before had stood mute and motionless as a bewildered ignoramus of the enormity of the thing, now as with a single impulse he was forward with a head for the goal, he welled up from the thousand throats and a thousand men charged forward by hand upon the perpetrator of the crime.

For a moment the confusion was terrible. The crowd surged forward in a mad rush of commotion. Those nearest the door fled from the edifice in a flash of a stampele, while hundreds of others, they were not, yielded blindly forward in the effort to penetrate the crowded building and see the man who had shot the president. President McKinley after the first shock of the assassin's shot returned to his senses. He was seated himself, at the same time removing his hat and bowing his head to the crowd. In an instant the necessary guard

you and President Milburn were at his side. His waistcoat was hurriedly opened and the president's chest examined, but mentioning those about him to remain calm and telling them not to be alarmed.

A force of exposition guards were on the scene by this time and an effort was made to clear the building.

Spectators crowded down the stairs from the galleries and the crowds on the floor surged toward the rear of the room, while, despite the strenuous efforts of police and guards, the throng without struggled madly to get into the mission.

As soon as the crowd in the Temple of Music had been dispersed sufficiently the president was removed in an automobile ambulance to the exposition hospital where an examination was made by the best medical skill in Buffalo.

The president retained the full exercise of his faculties until placed on the operating table and subjected to an examination. Upon the first examination it was ascertained that one bullet had taken effect in the right breast just below the nipple, causing a comparatively harmless wound. The other took effect in the abdomen, about four inches below the left nipple, and about four inches to the left of the navel and about on a level with it.

Upon arriving at the exposition hospital, second bullet was probed for. The walls of the abdomen was opened, but the ball was not located. The abdomen was hastily closed and after a heavy incision it was decided to remove the patient to the hospital at the exposition. The president was taken to the exposition hospital. This was done. At the Milburn residence, the task of probing for the bullet which had been located in the abdomen was begun by Dr. Rowell Park, but the bullet was not located.

When it was decided to remove the president from the exposition hospital to the Milburn residence, the new task was broken to Mrs. McKinley's anxiety as possible. She bore the shock remarkably well and displayed the utmost fortitude and self-control.

CONFECTIONS FROM GRAIN.

Wheat and Malt Food in the Manufacture of Candy.

A manufacturing plant in New Jersey formerly used as a mill for flour is now operated by a corporation engaged in the unique industry of making confections from wheat and malt. About the last materials in the world one would expect to find in candy.

In the early days of the mill the grain is fanned, ground and milled in proper proportions. Then it is cooked in a mangle from which a thin strip is squeezed by hydraulic press and conducted to a great iron evaporator. The mangle is run on a vacuum pan. Here it is vigorously stirred and further evaporated. The thickened mass is then placed in shallow tin pans, where it is cooled and hardened. Plain or flavored with various essences, the mass is rich and brown in color. Combined with chocolate it is dark as the familiar candy, in the candy shop.

When a batch of goods is needed for the market, the stock in the pans is broken into soft lumps and put into the boiler surrounded by a steam jacket. It is reduced by heat to the consistency of tar at a mangle from which a thin strip. Skilled workmen shape the mass into long strips that lie like golden snakes in the candy shop.

They are fed to a cutting machine, a noisy little monster with an insatiable hunger. The food is cut into the desired size and the machine with a hot jet it turns out malt creamies ready as fast as a mangle can furnish candy.
