through the peaceful, summer countryside at sundown? The heat of midday is giving way to the refreshing coolness of dusk. The skies are darkening over dark, green healthy corn and milo fields. Large tractors sit cooling in the corners of freshly plowed summer-fallowed fields. Listening, you can hear irrigation engines aboring tirelessly as they

np life-giving water to ne thirsty, demanding crops. The engines have been serviced, the water changed, and the tractors have stopped for the day as lights come on in the comfortable farmhouses, and the farmers seek rest from their day's labor.

It is easy to understand how reports have been made that the farmers are once again happy and content with their lot. To all appearances, things are as they have been. The tractors seem very peaceful in their natural settings; nothing like the awe-inspiring symbols of dissent as they rolled through the city streets carrying signs and angry farmers just ten short months ago. The farmers themselves are with their families and friends for a refreshing meal and a discussion of crop conditions and local news and gossip. Later in the evening, there will be a private time of reflection, planning, and probably a word with God, his partner on the farm.

The reporters of good news from the farmland, will not understand or see that in this private time, each day, comes the gut-wrenching fear and realization, that in spite of good crops and high yields, there will not be enough money made from the sale of crops plus the puny, unasked for government payments, to pay the bills for fuel, repairs, wages, land, rent, chemicals, fertilizer, and machinery, and still be able to live. They won't see that whether you figure with a computer, a calculator, or a pencil stub on the back of an envelope containing a bill, there is still no way to make it pay. These reporters prefer to quote and believe the overeducated, inexperienced "experts" from our colleges and the USDA concerning the economic situation of the farmer.

Maybe it does make sense that a man with a white shirt and clean hands is smarter than a farmer with dirt under his fingernails and dust and grease on his clothes. Remember, though, that man with the white shirt doesn't feed himself and 56 other people. He doesn't consume 40% of his nation's industrial output. His only production is words and figures on a piece of paper. He is strictly a consumer since nothing that he produces can be worn or eaten. Why, then, should his words and figures have so much influence on the market prices of the producing farmer's commodities?

Thoughts similar to these run through a farmer's head nearly every day. Don't be surprised, therefore, that if after we have harvested this year's losses, the tractors

If you're not sure of the meaning of these different seeds; certified, breeder, foundation, or registered, then you're probably in the majority. Perhaps these brief definitions will help. Foundation Seed: Requirements are the highest of any class of seed. These are the basic seedstocks of new and old varieties and other strains developed by Experiment Stations and USDA plant breeders. Breeder Seed: A unique variety developed by a plant breeder and maintained by him. He writes the description of his crop. Registered Seed: Seed produced from foundation seed handled under procedures acceptable to the certifying agency. Certified Seed: Produced from registered seed and considered among the best seed for producers. Check the label to make sure what you're getting. All seed in the certification program in commercial channels must be tagged as certified, registered or foundation seed.




