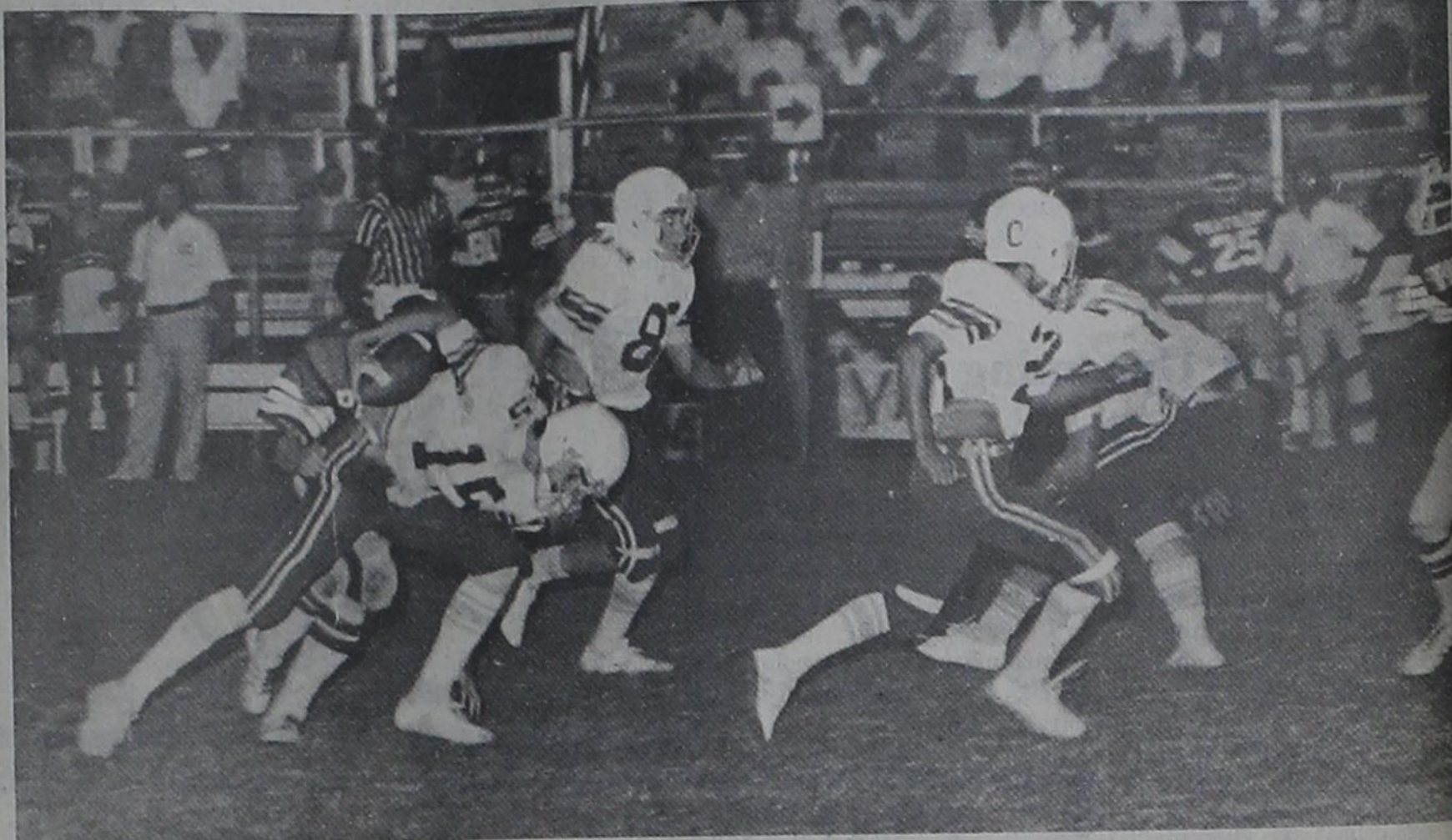

They also ripped open the soft drink machine door, doing extensive damage to the machine and removed the money box containing approximately \$70.00.

Candy, Cheese-Crisps and peanuts along with a money box was on the counter. Peanuts, candy and money were taken and the Cheese-Crisps were left. Total loss was estimated at over \$1,000.00.

Two inside doors were also damaged beyond repair, with the locks torn from the doors. A boot print was obvious on one of the doors. One room was filled with chemicals, parts and a lawnmower and everything was still intact. The other door opened into an office and machines were taken from this room.

Maynard Moore, manager, stated that everything was in order when he was at the building about 5:30 Sunday afternoon, so the burglarly took place sometime afterwards.

An undetermined amount of money was taken. Nothing else was apparently taken, unless the football boys find other items gone as they need them.

### SCREENING CLINIC TO BE HELD AT BENJAMIN SEPT. 17

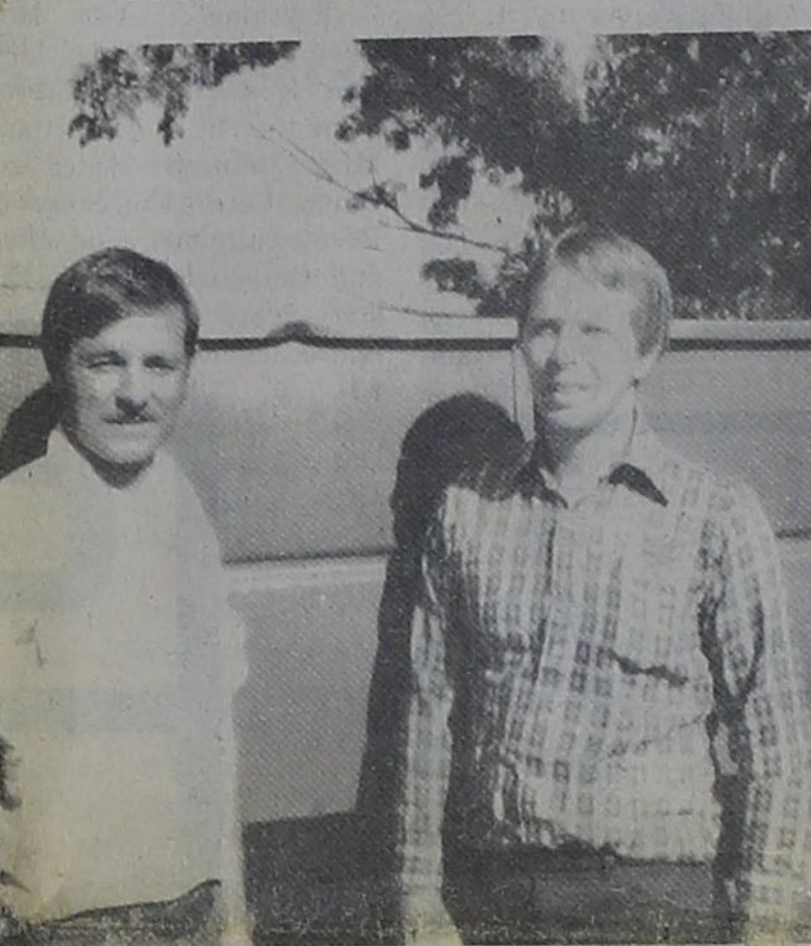
A Screening Clinic will be held in Benjamin at the Sorosis Club building on Monday, September 17, 1979 from 9:00 a.m. till 12:00 noon. This clinic will be held by the Texas Department of Health.

The following screening tests will be offered: blood pressure, diabetes, anemia, skin disorders, height and weight. If an abnormality is found, the person will be notified and referred to the physician of their choice.

## Olney Savings Plans Munday Branch Office

Olney Savings Association has made application for the approval of a branch office to be located in Munday.

Hearing on the application is set for Monday October 1, 1979, in Austin. For Olney Savings Association, it is a period of suspension until the time is up for protests to be filed. At this time, if protests have been filed, a later date for another hearing will be determined. If no protests are made, it should be a relatively simple matter to proceed with plans of opening an office in Munday. The location is not definite at this time.

Olney Savings Association have contemplated a branch office here for several years; however, the final decision was made about two weeks before application was filed. Don McClatchy, president of Olney Savings, stated, "We do business in Knox County to the extent that we feel an office is definitely warranted."

L. C. Boyd founded the company, then known as Olney Federal Savings and Loan Association, in 1927, and began making "rounds" through Knox County in the 1930's. They have continued to do business with Knox County residents through the years. Don McClatchy has been making this route since 1950.

The first loan of \$625.00 made in Munday was September 17, 1938, to Mrs. Minnie Heath. The organization's minute book states: "The funds are to be part of

construction cost of a modern four room and bath dwelling to be situated in the southwest portion of Munday, Texas."

This house was later sold to the McClarans and Doris Dickerson purchased it from the McClaran estate. It has since been moved to farm land owned by Mr. Dickerson. Richie Smith's residence is located on this site where the home was built.

In talking with Mr. McClatchy, he advised the Courier that real estate loans during the 1930's were usually made to defer 50% of the cost of construction so he would estimate the cost of this home in 1938 was around \$1,250.

# The Campsey Home, A Landmark Of Munday

The late Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Barton farmed north of Munday until about 1917, at which time they purchased a "town house" and made the move so their daughter, Beatrice, could go to school in Munday. The boys had gone to war and she was not able to travel with the horse and buggy by herself. She was the youngest of six children.

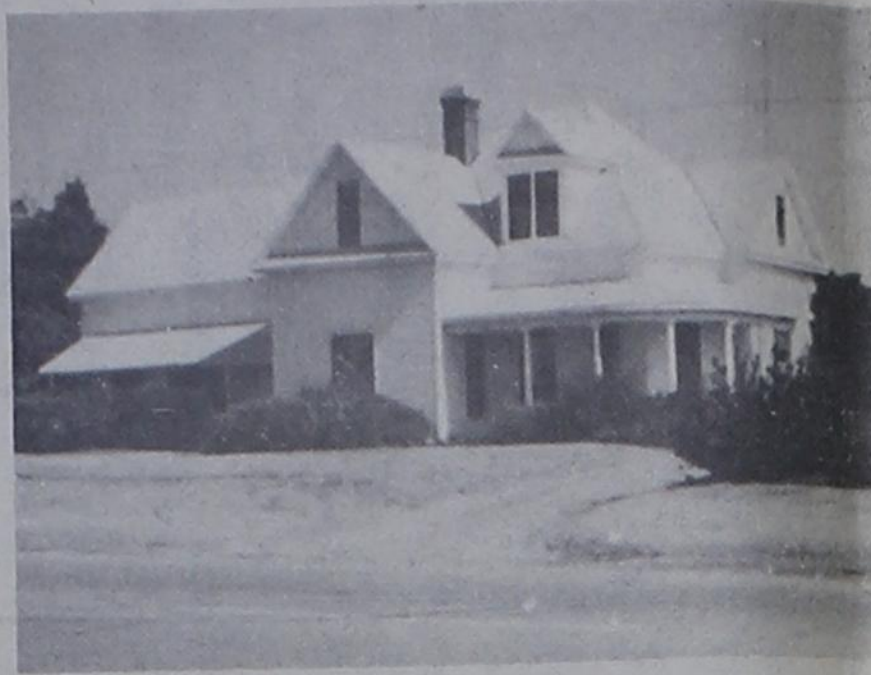
A 1920 graduate of Munday High School, she has enjoyed two of her classmates as friends through the years: Mrs. Ina Reeves Hannah and Mrs. Bera Bowden Spann. Mrs. Hannah has only recently moved with her children to El Paso. Mrs. Spann still lives in Munday, spending the summers in Colorado.

The firstborn of the Barton family was Jewell (Mrs. G. H.) Johnson, who now resides in Amarillo. Between the two daughters, four sons were born: Cecil, Jennings, Alton and Palmer. All are deceased and buried in Johnson Cemetery in Munday.

In 1924, Beatrice was married to Brooks Campsey, a young man reared in Benjamin, who lived and worked on the Burnett ranch. After their marriage, they made their home in the Knox City area for about nineteen years.

Mrs. Barton passed away in 1943 and Mr. and Mrs. Campsey, with their three children, moved into his home to live and care for him.

Patsy, the eldest, was a high school freshman when

they moved to Munday. Marjorie Lou was a sixth grader with Palmer, their son, just beginning the first grade.

The house was once again filled with laughter of young people, family dinners and happy times - all the things that go into making a house a home.

Through the years, the Campseys added to the house and rearranged it as was necessary for it to grow with the needs of their family.

Her father passed away, but the house was already "home" so the family continued to occupy it.

Years passed and the children "left their nest" as children do, one by one, but the Campseys never considered another house. They were happy in this one. The upstairs was not needed, as it had been when the children were home, and

they all five had slept there because Mr. Campsey was afraid for the children to sleep upstairs alone, in case of fire.

Patsy is now Patsy Tidwell and resides in Knoxville, Tenn. She has just been "home" for a good visit with her parents. Marjorie Lou is Mrs. Jack Reese of Abilene and Palmer lives in Vernon at the present time. The Campseys have been blessed with ten grandchildren.

Coming as often as possible, they must roam throughout the house, upstairs and down and see "everything". Also Mrs. Cecil Barton and daughter, Sue Howard, of Amarillo come to visit. Both they and Mrs. Johnson visited recently. Cecil's son, Robert of Pecos calls his aunt often and comes when he can. His son, Scott Barton, taught and coached in the Munday

Schools last year. The Campseys enjoyed the time he spent with them very much. Alton's son, Joe, lives in Benjamin.

The whole "clan" think of the house as home; and, no doubt, the walls could tell some stories of all the happy times as well as sad ones experienced in this beloved abode.

The house is still a stately looking structure and a very neat home in appearance. Mrs. Campsey has shutters on the upper portion of the living room windows with pleated domestic drapes on the lower windows, that accent very well the carved facings of the windows and doors. It is a very inviting home and a very comfortable one. She has it

furnished with touches of old and new.

The house is possibly the oldest residence still standing in Munday if not, certainly one of the oldest. It is truly one of Munday's landmarks and one that would be missed if it were not here.

Even though the Campseys feel, at times, this is a lot more house than they need at this period in their lives, they have never seriously thought of moving. Why? Because it's home!

Old homes, like old shoes, become more comfortable with age, and this is particularly true of the Campsey home that is filled with memories of many, many years!

## Northwest Texas Council Plans Boy Scout Roundup

An intensified fall membership recruiting plan for adult leaders, new sponsors and youth members was announced at the conclusion of a council-wide fall roundup planning meeting of the Northwest Texas Council, Boy Scouts of America, August 29, according to Ralph E. Siebach, council roundup chairman.

"The theme of this year's roundup is 'Light Up A Life With Scouting' and we will be seeking 1,500 new youth members, 25 new unit sponsors and many new adult leaders by December 31. The kick-off for the fall recruiting program will be a council-wide School Night for Scouting on September 11," Siebach said.

At the planning meeting on August 29, it was determined that the Greenbelt District Roundup, which

includes the counties of Baylor, Childress, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, King, Knox, Throckmorton and Wilbarger will be under the general direction of Don Davis, Vernon, with Ronnie Benson, Vernon, heading up the School Night For Scouting program. The Greenbelt District set objectives of 277 new youth and 5 new units.

"Many council and district fall programs have been planned to support the recruitment of new youth, adult leaders and the organization of new units. Districts are all planning special adult leader training programs and exciting special youth programs are on the drawing board for October and November. It is really shaping up to be one of our best fall recruiting years", Siebach concluded.

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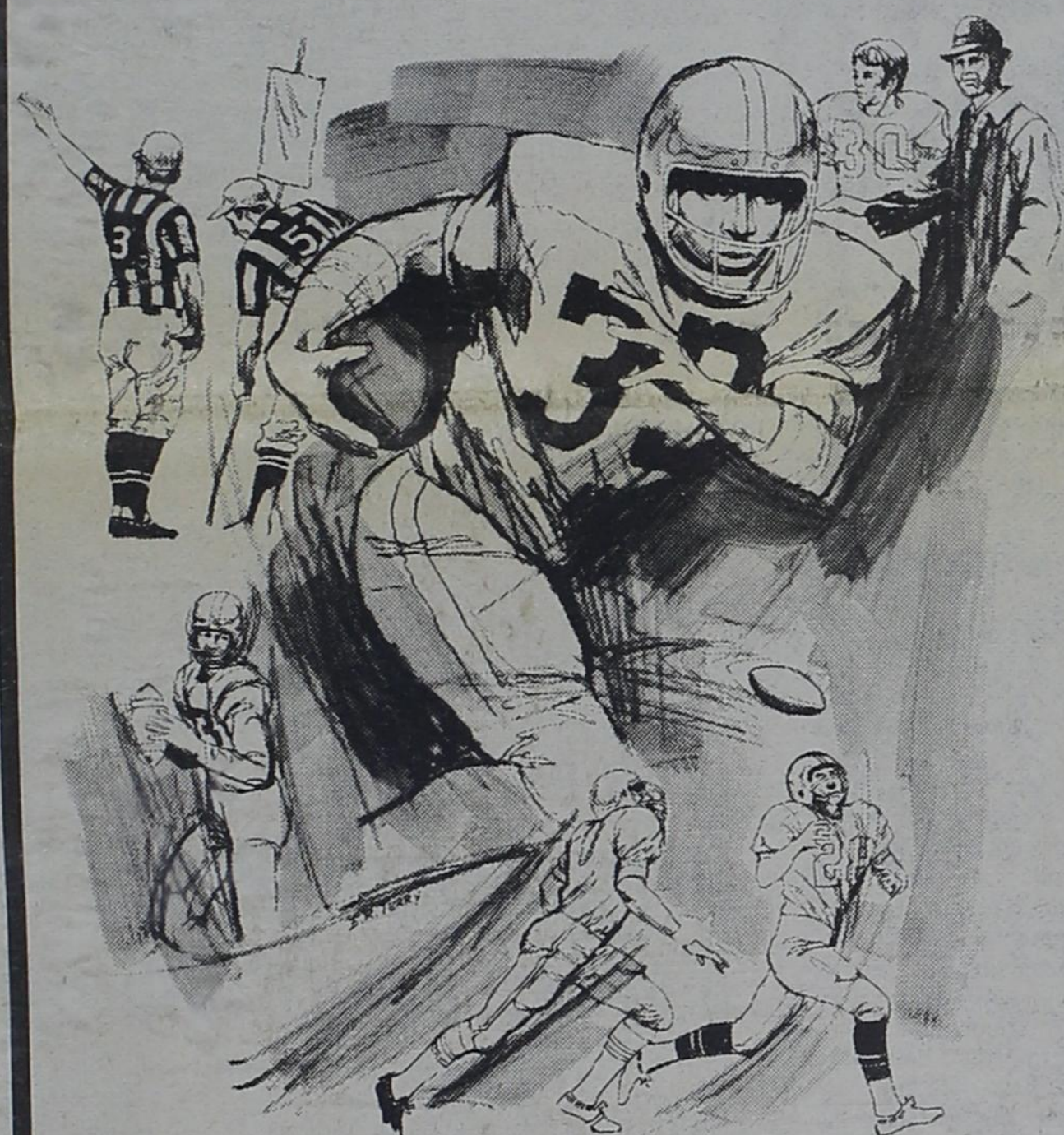

Most of the peaches in Texas have now been harvested. The trees have gone through a long hot dry summer and in many cases they had a heavy load of fruit. They will be more susceptible to diseases due to this weakened condition. One of the most important things that growers can do from now until fall, is to take care of those trees. Keep them watered, don't let it continue to suffer from the drought, and try to get some growth established on the

### Bad Check Collection Law Amended

Effective September 1, 1979, the offices of County Sheriff and County Attorney will be working more closely together in order to collect bad checks. The law has been amended, and officials are now allowed to collect a fee, the amount of which varies depending upon the amount of the check. The fee will be paid into the County treasury and should prove to be an additional deterrent to bad check writers. Merchants have been notified that, effective September 1, all checks will be processed through the County Attorney's office. Merchants were furnished some five procedures they are to comply with before turning a check over to the County Attorney for collection.

trees now that the season is over. As fall approaches they will need to consider the use of copper fungicide for bacterial canker, bacterial leafspot, leaf curl and other diseases to prevent their overwintering. Leaf curl is the condition where the leaves become puckered and take on a reddish color. This condition is first observed on the new leaves next spring.

In most areas this will be the only leaf crop that is damaged, the second group of leaves that are developed will normally be free of the disorder. It is very important that you keep the first crop of leaves on the trees to insure maximum growth of the fruit next year. To do this, you will need to make a fall application of a copper fungicide such as Copper Bordeaux or Kocide 101. Use these at the rate of 1/2 tablespoons per gallon of water of 2 lb/ 100 gal. of water.

In addition to preventing leaf curl, the fall application

of copper applied at leaf shed will also prevent some infection of trees by bacterial canker of bacterial leaf spot. This application should be made about the first of November.

Also, if you had problems with the peach tree borer this year you need to treat them this fall. Borers are present if you have holes in the trunk of the trees at or just below ground level.

Treat trees between October 20 and November 15 when soil is dry and soil temperature is 55 degrees F. Remove weeds and loosen soil about one foot from the trunk. Place Paradichlorobenzene crystals (PDB) in a narrow circular band, preferably in a groove about 2 inches from the trunk. Place several shovels of dirt over the crystals and mound the earth into a cone-shaped pile about 6 inches high around the base of the tree. For 2-3 year old trees, use 1/2 ounce, 4-5 year old trees, 3/4 ounce and mature trees, 1 ounce. Remove earth mounds in early spring.

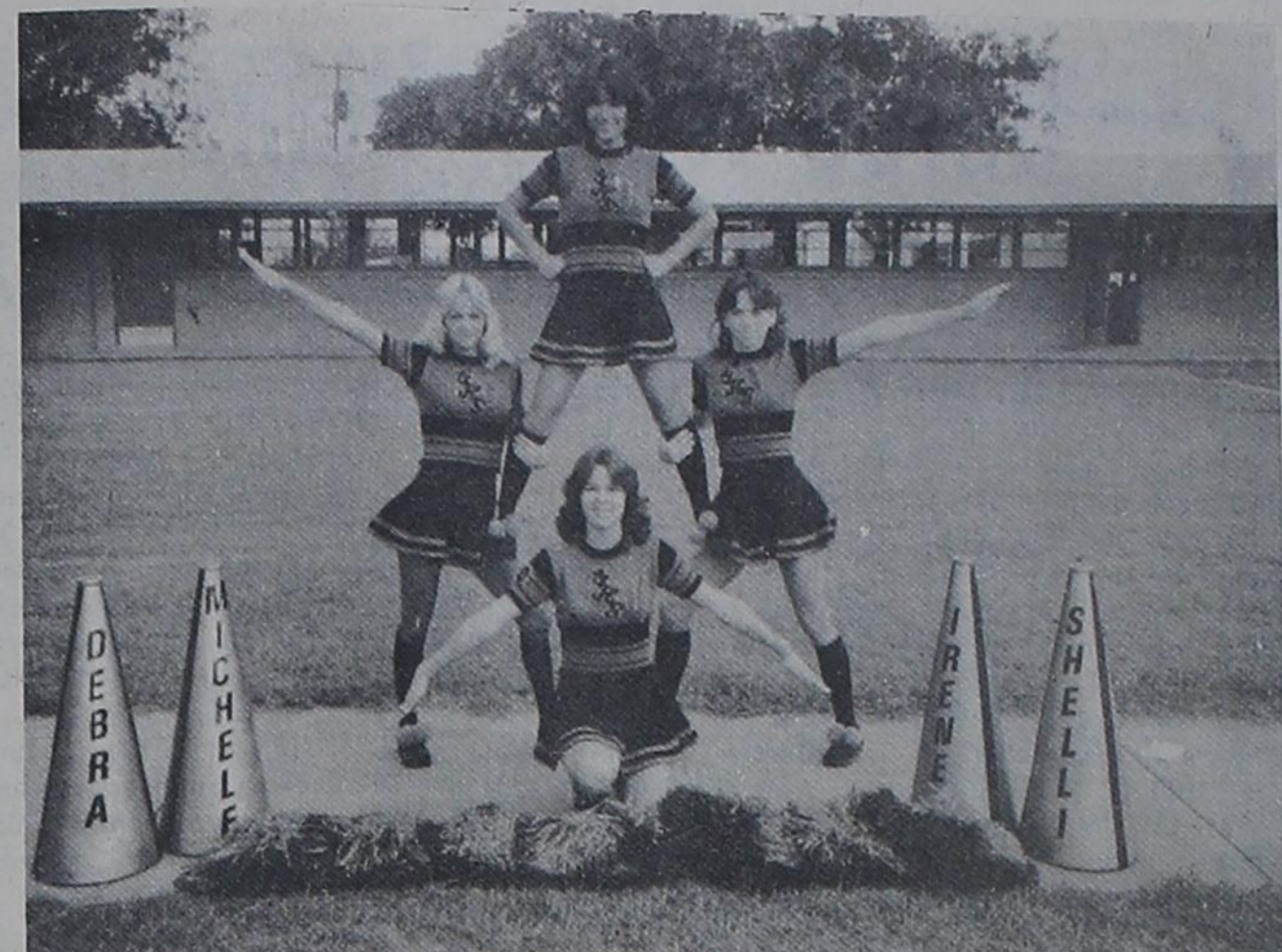
### Bike-A-Thon To Be September 29

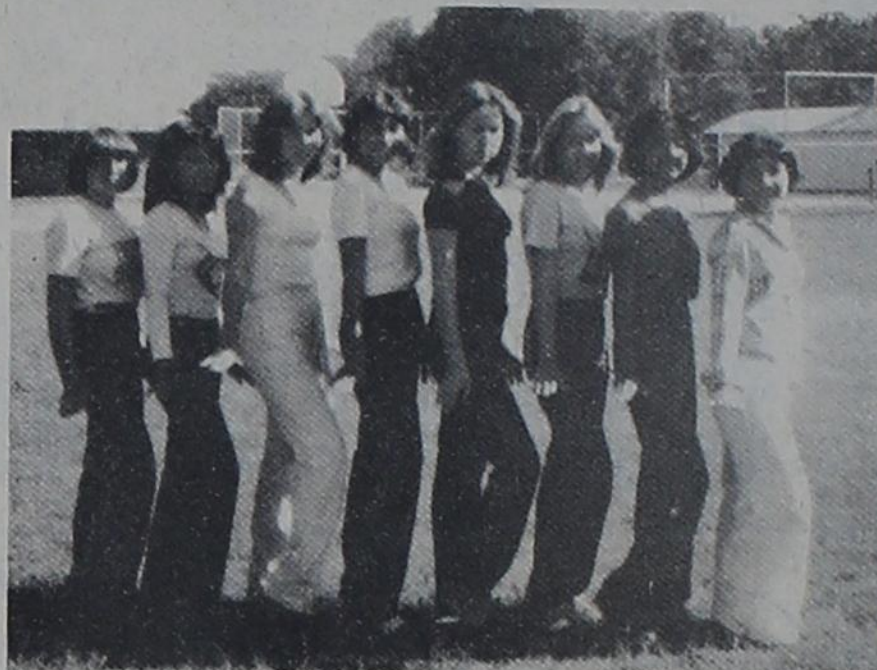

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## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would:

- Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and
- Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

## PROPOSICION NO. 1 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 108)

La Resolución Conjunta #108 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas referente al nombramiento y a los plazos de los notarios públicos.

La enmienda propuesta: —Requerirá que el Secretario de Estado nombre a un número conveniente de notarios públicos para el estado; y —autorizará para que los plazos oficiales para notarios públicos sean por no menos de dos años y por no más de cuatro años.

La provisión temporal de la enmienda constitucional propuesta declara que la enmienda entrará en vigor el 1° de enero de 1980; que cada persona que haya sido nombrada como notario público antes del 1° de enero de 1980 continuará ejerciendo como notario público hasta vencerse el plazo por el que fue nombrado; y que esta provisión temporal se vencerá el 1° de enero de 1982.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional para el nombramiento de notarios públicos para el estado para un plazo de no menos de dos años ni de más de cuatro años, según lo provisto por la ley."

## PROPOSICION NO. 2 EN LA BOLETA (H.J.R. 133)

La Resolución Conjunta #133 de la Cámara de Representantes propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas para proveer una revisión del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo. Esta enmienda propuesta permitirá a la Legislatura el decretar leyes:

- Para proveer una revisión legislativa del proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo;
- Para prescribir condiciones para que las leyes sean puestas en vigor;
- Para suspender, revocar o expirar las reglas;
- Para prescribir procedimientos; y
- Para delegar autoridad a cualquiera o a ambas cámaras, o a los comités de cualquiera o de ambas cámaras.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional para proveer una revisión legislativa del

proceso reglamentario en las agencias del departamento ejecutivo."

## PROPOSICION NO. 3 EN LA BOLETA (S.J.R. 13)

La Resolución Conjunta Senatorial #13 propone una enmienda en la constitución de Texas para autorizar a la Legislatura para que provea una garantía de préstamos, a las personas calificadas, para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. De esta manera, la enmienda propuesta podría permitir a la Legislatura el proveer, emitir y vender bonos de obligación general llamados "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" (Bonos de Seguridad Para Préstamos Agrícolas y Ganaderos) del Estado de Texas, sin exceder la cantidad de \$10 millones de dólares. Todo dinero recibido de la venta de estos bonos sería depositado en un fondo diferente en la Tesorería Estatal y sería administrado por el comisionado de agricultura, sin más apropiaciones. Estos fondos garantizarían préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas. El comisionado de agricultura usaría estos fondos bajo las provisiones prescritas por la Legislatura, con el propósito de garantizar préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas; para adquirir hipotecas de bienes raíces escrituras de bienes raíces compradas con préstamos garantizados. Estos fondos serían usados también para adelantar un porcentaje del principal y del interés debido en esos préstamos, a la persona que califique para el préstamo. La Legislatura también podría autorizar al comisionado de agricultura para que venda cualquier terreno adquirido mediante esta enmienda. El comisionado de agricultura requeriría al menos un 6 por ciento de interés en dichos préstamos. La enmienda propuesta apropiaría la cantidad suficiente para pagar el principal y el interés de los bonos que vayan adquiriendo más valor, o que se venzan durante el año fiscal, menos la cantidad del fondo de interés y amortización al final del año anterior.

La enmienda propuesta aparecerá en la boleta como sigue:

"La enmienda constitucional para autorizar a la Legislatura para que por medio de la venta de bonos de obligación general del Estado de Texas, provea una garantía para que las personas calificadas puedan obtener préstamos para la compra de bienes raíces agrícolas y ganaderas."

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# In Touch

## DEALING WITH TEMPTATION

The fact that death exists testifies that sin must also exist. Romans 6:23 states that the "wages of sin is death". We must be aware that Satan is behind every sin, attempting to ruin our spiritual lives. "Your enemy, the devil, prowls around like a roaring lion looking for one to devour." (1 Peter 5:8). In addition to Satan's craftiness, we should also be mindful of our own weaknesses. The apostle Peter, confident of his faith, declared boldly he was ready to go to prison or even die for the Lord (Luke 22:33). But Jesus, in the following verses, prophesies that Peter will deny him before the rooster crows. Since Satan and his influence are prevalent in our lives, perhaps the following nine suggestions will help overcome temptations.

1. **Never under/overrate your strength.** Temptation can overpower you, just as it did Peter in the above passage. But temptation can be overpowered with God's help. "God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can stand up under it." (1 Corinthians 10:13).

2. **Avoid evil companions.** "Evil companions corrupt good morals" (1 Corinthians 15:33). Companions do influence us, so we must choose our associates carefully. If we run with the goats, we must be prepared to smell like 'em.

3. **Don't neglect prayer.** Even when we can't explain our feelings, the Holy Spirit intercedes for us with "groans that words cannot

express." (Romans 8:26). Our warning comes from John 9:31 which states, "We know that God does not listen to sinners. He listens to the godly man who does his will."

4. **Keep studying the Bible.** In the account of Jesus' temptations in Matthew 4, his response to Satan after each offer was "It is written..." It was the Word of God which helped Jesus through this period of trial.

5. **Remember the Lord is watching.** God is our closest witness to the things we do. "All things are naked and open before him to whom we must give account." (Hebrews 4:13). We mustn't think of God as a policeman waiting to arrest and punish our every move, but rather a loving God who cares about our relationship with him. "He is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but everyone to come to repentance." (2 Peter 3:9). It is God's desire for all to be saved, but we must obey his commands.

6. **Say no immediately to temptation.** "No" is the only language the devil can understand. "Resist the devil, and he will flee from you." (James 4:7). Someone once said, "What is long in mind will soon be in hand." If we hesitate, we give Satan a foothold he won't give back.

7. **Practice thought control.** Our greatest defense against temptation and Satan is to fill our minds with other more wholesome thoughts. Consider Paul's advice to the Philippians in Chapter 4, "...whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable - if anything is excellent or

praiseworthy - think about such things.

8. **Know what sin is.** Make yourself a list of sins. God made his own list in Galatians 5:19. The scriptures say that the acts of a sinful nature are obvious: "sexual immorality, impurity, debauchery, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, discord, jealousy, fits of rage, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions and envy, drunkenness, orgies, and the like." There is sin in this world; to combat it we must know our enemies well.

9. **Avoid as many temptations as you can.** Familiarize yourself with temptation's characteristics. Watch for idleness, for it caused David's downfall in 2 Samuel 11. Watch for loneliness, for Elijah received a reprimand from God because of it (1 Kings 19). Be cautious of self-pity (the blues), for in Exodus 16, the blues caused Israel to grumble and doubt.

These nine suggestions may help you to resist temptation. Remember, Satan is a coward, for if you resist him, he will flee from you. Satan knows all about your desires and weaknesses. The only way to combat him is with an obedient faith in God and a persistent effort to deny ourselves in the service of Jesus Christ.

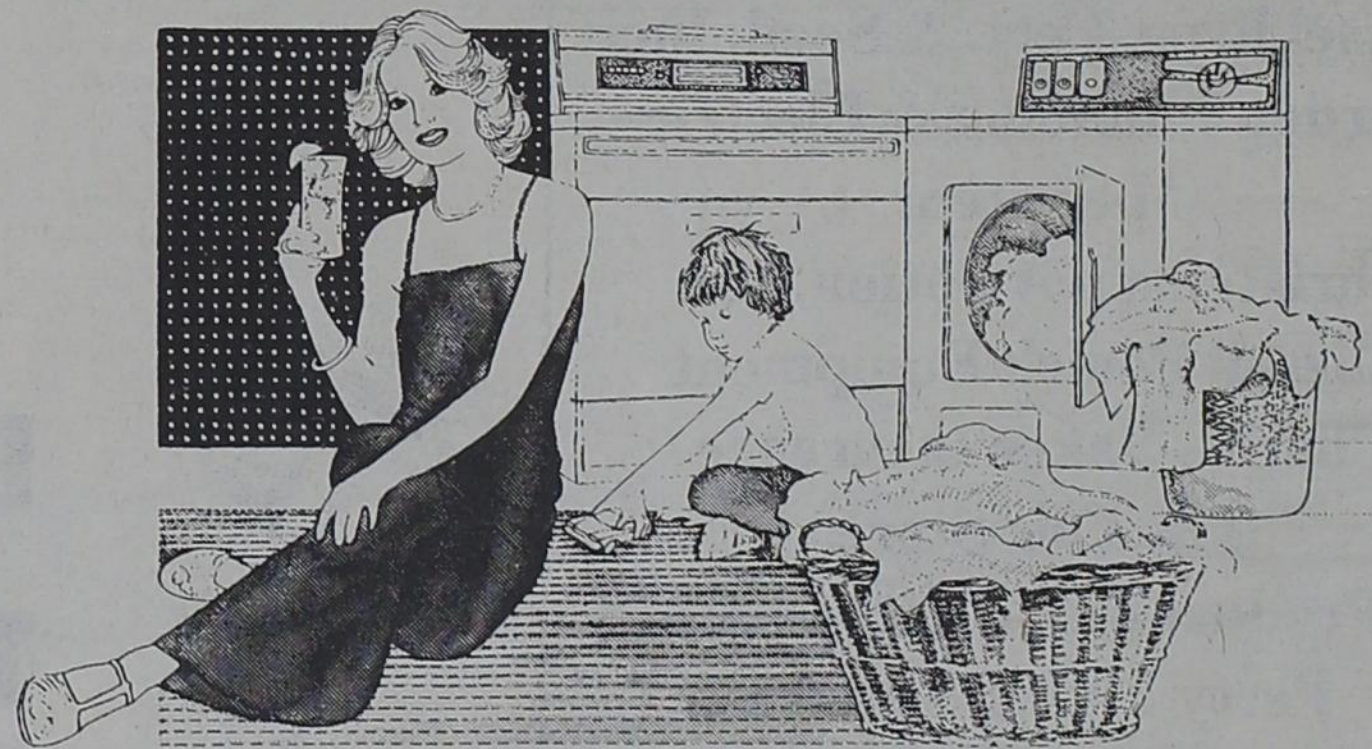

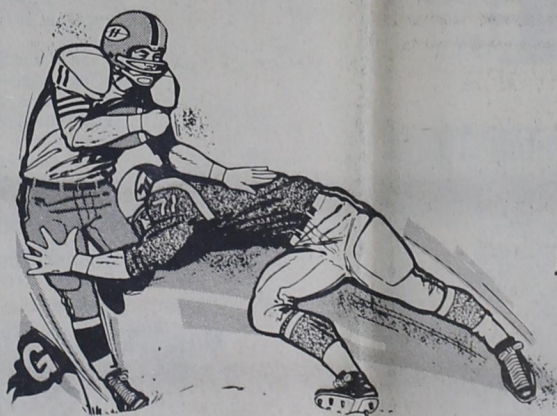

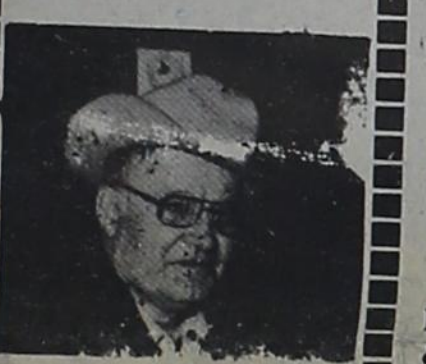

The Council says it's hard to attach a dollar value to the contributions of cattle by-products. 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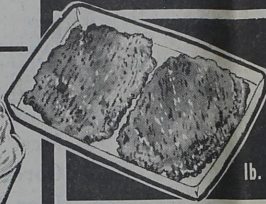
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
