





their eggs. Recent research conducted by Mr. James White and Dr. Don Rummel of the Research and Extension Center at Lubbock, indicates that only 5 to 10% of the overwintered weevils are able to survive and infest cotton that is squaring the first week in July.

When all the producers in an area use the same general planting date the amount of weevil damage will be reduced during most of the growing season. Once cotton produces 1/3 grown squares until the second generation weevil adult begins to emerge in mid August, there is little movement of weevils from field to field. Therefore, weevil populations will remain low in fields that were not infested with overwintered weevils or where early season control was carried out until weevil migration begins in mid

August. July, producers will need to control the weevils with an early season application just before the first squares are 1/3 grown.

In most cases, only one application will be needed. However, in early May planted fields several applications may be needed to control overwintered weev-







Crops need 16 essential nutrients, supplied either by the air or the soil, and there are no shortcuts or miracles to substitute for a good fertility program. Some guidelines to follow when considering the use of miracle products are: what percent of N, P, and K is in the product; what are the levels of secondary and micronutrients; is there any documented research to back up the claims; what ingredients make the crop achieve bigger yields; what is the cost versus benefits you can receive. 


