Contrary to public opinion, the cost of the operation of a public junior college "will be negligible," declared Dr. Hunt. "Realistic studies show that education pays dividends to an area - in many cases-\$20 for every \$1 invested."





# THE MISSION OF YSLETA The Church that changed sides!


When the Indians revolted against Spanish rule in 1681-2 in the upper Rio Grande Valley in New Mexico, refugees sought safety at the mission at El Paso del Norte (now Juarez).
