

Pioneer Knox Rancher Dies


Bruce C. McCan, 82, pioneer Knox County rancher, passed away Tuesday morning in a Crowell hospital.


Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday from the Church of Christ in Truscott, with burial in the Truscott Cemetery.






