He would roam around to see that everyone was comfortably seated and getting well filled. He was ably assisted by Ryland Gleaton, assistant manager, who seemed just about as busy as anyone.

Hill said this was the only association with two presidents: C. G. Burson, Sr., of Haskell and J. C. Emmert of Wellington, both of whom were present. We had a visit with Mr. Emmert, who we knew personally more than 30 years ago.

Mr. Hill introduced the speaker, Dr. Virgil P. Lee of Houston, and said he would "give as much history of the association as he wanted to." It turned out that Dr. Lee didn't want to delve into the past of the association. After saying he arrived on the Knox Prairie in 1901 and grew up here, he decided to dwell on the farmers' problems, take raps at the government's farm program, and keep us entertained with witty sayings and jokes.

The Last Roundup came for C. L. Mayes last Sunday.

The Death Angel who rides herd on all of us, tossed his lasso over him at about 5:30 p.m. and ushered him into the Great Beyond. And thus ended the colorful life of one of the few remaining real pioneers of the Old West.

One can not think of the town of Munday without associating it with C. L. Mayes, for he was here before the town was. He had a part in the establishment of West Munday, in the town's move to its present location when the railroad came, and in every period of development of the town and community.

From ranch hand, to range cook, to range boss; from book-keeper to merchant, to banker, his life's span covered a period of almost 75 years in the development of the Old West as it is known on the Knox Prairie. A member of the Texas Cowboy Reunion Association, we guess Mr. Mayes never missed a meeting of this group since it was organized.

Many came to him for counsel and advice, and received it; for financial aid, and few were turned away if worthy. He is gone, now, but the imprints he's made on the community will continue on and on, forever.

At the hospital on another mission Sunday, we tried to visit Mr. Mayes, only to learn he had left for home a few minutes earlier. Arriving home, we were surprised to hear of his death.

## Heart Attack Claims Life Of C. L. Mayes, Colorful Pioneer Resident Of Munday

C. L. Mayes, 89, colorful pioneer of the Old West who decided to cast his lot with Munday after helping bring the town into existence, passed away at the family home here at about 5:30 p.m. Sunday. He reportedly suffered a heart attack.

He had returned from Methodist Hospital in Lubbock some two and one-half hours earlier. He had been a patient there since February 3, when he was injured in an automobile accident in Lubbock.

His daughter, Mrs. Guy Ruth-erford, and her husband had seen him comfortable situated at his home, then departed for their home in San Angelo before the attack occurred. They were intercepted in Anson and told the tragic news of his death.

Charles Lynn Mayes was born January 7, 1876, in Homer, Ga., and came to the Munday area in 1890.

An early day school teacher in Munday and Seymour, he had also been a cowboy, range cook and range boss in the early development of this area. He served as bookkeeper for the Baker-Bryant Co., Munday's first general mercantile store, later operating a store of his own.

He also became interested in banking and served many years as a director in the First National Bank in Munday. At the time of his death, he was chairman of the board of directors. He also served one period—1932-1935 as president of the bank, and had been a director since that time.

Even at 89 years of age, Mr. Mayes had never retired. He continued to look after his property holdings in Munday, and maintained an office in the First National Bank building, where he was engaged in real estate and finance.

He was a charter member of the Texas Cowboy Reunion Association at Stamford, attended all of its annual meetings, and held several offices in the association. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Following the death of his first wife, the former Helen Isbell, he married Sue Baker in 1922. She preceded him in death in 1963.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Tuesday from the First Methodist Church in Munday with the pastor, Rev. Frank Weir, officiating.

Burial was in Johnson Memorial Cemetery under the direction of McCauley Funeral Home. Serving as pallbearers were L. B. Patterson, Jr., Charles Baker, Travis Lee, M. L. Wiggins, V. E. Moore and Jasper Bevers.

Survivors include the daughter, Mrs. Guy Ruth-erford of San Angelo; a son, Jack Mayes, also of San Angelo; two sisters, Miss Mattie Mayes and Miss Mamie Mayes, both of Fort Worth; five grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

The time of the visit this year was changed to spring instead of fall because of the weather and local activities and will be better for the people donating blood.

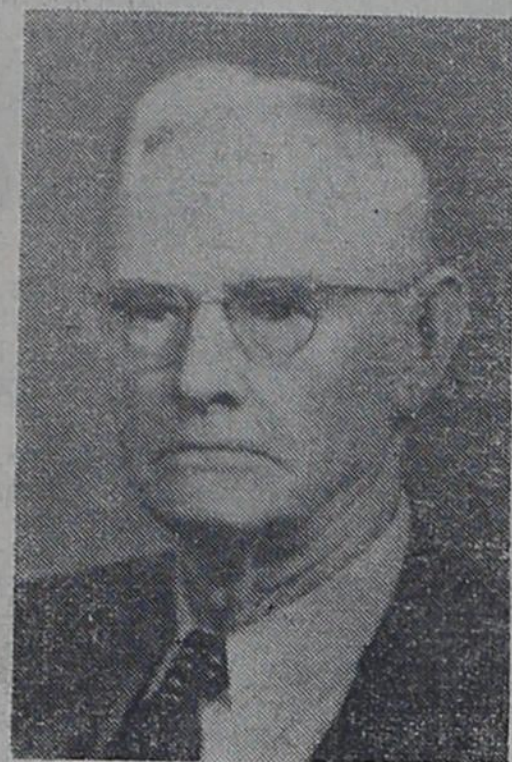

## Knox Grand Jury Submits Report

The following is a report of the 50th Judicial District Court grand jury, which was in recent session:

We, the Grand Jury, of Knox County, for the February term of 1965, having been duly sworn and empaneled as such and meeting in Benjamin, Texas, on February 18, 1965, respectfully submit the following report:

This Grand Jury has made a careful and thorough study of the financial and business affairs of Knox County, Texas. We wish to express our appreciation to the officials who have assisted us in this study.

With few exceptions we find our County business run generally in compliance with the law.

We find that the hospital plan now employed by the County, wherein the County pays one-half and the official or employee pays one-half of the premium, to be in accordance with the law. (Article 2372 V. A. T. S. This is also in accordance with a current Attorney General's opinion.)

We find that the County Judge is entitled to reasonable travel expenses outside the County, in addition to the \$25 per month allowance now being paid him by Knox County, and that the Commissioners of Knox County are entitled to receive for necessary travel expenses an amount not to exceed \$300 per year, plus vehicle expense now received by them, in accordance with the law. These matters have been determined from the opinion from the Attorney General's office, as requested by our District Attorney.

We make the following recommendations:

1. That quarterly reports from the office of the County Treasurer's office, reflecting the financial condition of Knox County, if made in accordance with good accounting practices, and following the recommendations of the County Auditors, and in accordance with the law, be made and published by the Commissioners Court, as required by law, in all the newspapers in the County. And that the Commissioners Court provide funds for clerical help in the County Treasurer's office, not to exceed \$300 per year.

2. That any officer or official of the County shall not use County equipment for his personal gain, or the personal gain of any individual, as such. That the County Commissioners keep the County materials and supplies at the County barns, or at some other specified location if there is not County barn available, and that such location be designated upon the minutes of the Commissioners Court.

We request this Honorable Court that we may be recessed until our services are further requested.

Surviving are his wife, Edith; a son, Robert Ross of Roswell, N.M.; two brothers, Ross of Amarillo and Ed of Houston; two sisters, Mrs. T. S. Edwards of Knox City and Mrs. C. L. Bailey of Wichita Falls.

Federal Crop Insurance Corporation is now accepting applications from Knox County farmers for all-risk protection on 1965 cotton crops. F.C.I.C., an agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, offers this protection, at cost, to farmers of the County in an effort to help stabilize farm economy. When a cotton crop is lost from causes beyond the farmer's control, an indemnity check from FCIC will return operating expense, thus avoiding the loss of working capital.

FCIC fieldmen will be in the County for the next few weeks explaining the insurance program to farmers and showing them exactly how it will work with their particular farming operations.

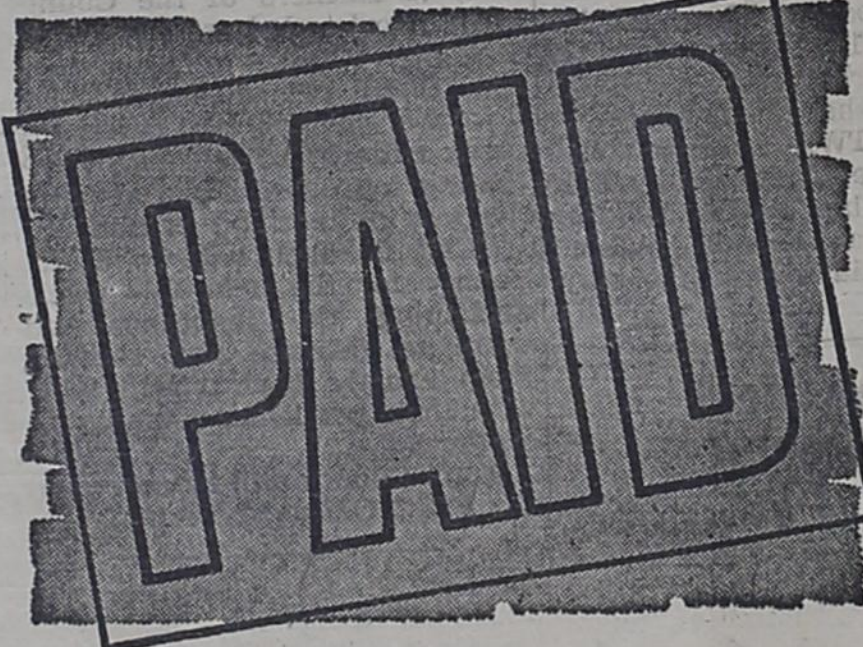

**Early Pruning Impulse Is Risky**

Resist the urge to prune trees and shrubs in the garden until you are relatively sure all danger of severe freeze is past, says

Everett Janne, Extension landscape horticulturist at Texas A & M University.

Often the impulse is to start pruning rose bushes and other shrubs with the first shirt sleeve weather in January and February. In most areas of Texas there is still danger of freeze damage to tender growth as late as mid-March.

Warm weather in January forces the terminal buds to begin growing. If this growth is removed by early pruning, the lateral buds begin to grow during the next warm spell and a late cold snap may cause serious damage to these buds, says Janne.

The following are the only justifications for pruning plants: to remove dead or diseased wood; to repair storm damage or mechanical injury; to balance the top with the root system when transplanting; to develop and maintain a desired shape or size; to rejuvenate older plants; or to improve or increase flowers and fruit.

Flowering trees and shrubs which flower from early summer through the fall months, such as Crepe myrtle, hybrid tea roses, and shrub althea, usually produce their flower buds on new wood. They should be pruned

in late winter or early spring after danger of frost is over and when new growth begins, says Janne.

Complete information and illustrations on pruning trees and shrubs can be obtained from your local county agent's office by requesting B-977, "Modern Pruning Methods," published by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, Texas.

Wouldn't it be like everybody in town trying to make money by taking in each other's washing?
