#### HELP WANTED!

These final days in preparation of the Vegetable Festival are hectic ones.

For all heads of steering committees and departmental heads, that is. They find much to be done, with time running out on them.

And so the plea for help goes out—and those with a "will to do" can likely find something to do by just letting it be known.

Robert Nix, who heads the vegetable division of the festival, has what we believe to be a most legitimate appeal for help.

His appeal is for the home gardeners to snatch some of those products out of their gardens and bring them to be displayed in the festival. Besides helping the festival along to a very great extent, the home gardener might also display the winning product.

The festival was set about a week earlier than last year. You see we almost had the thing too late for the spud growers last year. Some had to hold off harvesting in order to have their products for display. And that ain't good!

But we ran into other difficulties this year. With the coldness of early spring holding on longer than usual, it was plumb difficult to get a crop of vegetables up and growing. Consequently, our crop of vegetables—of the commercial growers, especially—are a little later than they ordinarily are.

So it's likely that very few vegetables that are grown commercially will be far enough along to be displayed. Hence, the plea to the home gardeners is "the real McCoy." Get them up to the school building for Festival Day!

As someone opined the other day, when we get that vegetable cold storage plant so vegetables can be held over for a while, we can set the festival dates to our own liking—when the produce will be in plentiful supply.

Mrs. Hugh (Louise) Beaty has also issued an appeal. She had quite a selection of old-time pictures last year for her "Knox County History In Pictures." She's like everybody else who are working on the festival—wants it to be "bigger and better" this year.

So she wants your old pictures, individuals, groups, farm and ranch scenes, momentos of olden times—some that will make you go 'way back yonder in reminiscence—just get them to Mrs. Beaty either Friday afternoon or Saturday morning. She'll be on hand at the elementary school building to receive them.

A lot of other people are budgeting their time between regular chores, business duties, and festival jobs this week in order to get the stage set for Friday and Saturday. And we think the festival will be just what they're trying to make it—bigger and better!

When the doors are flung open on the 1965 edition of the Knox County Vegetable Festival, we'll bound you it will be interesting and attractive—and a lot of people will be here to take part in the goings-on.

#### GET GRASSHOPPERS EARLY

Grasshoppers are showing up in large numbers in many areas of the state, causing damage to range vegetation as well as crops. Entomologists of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service say that control measures should be started as soon as numbers warrant control. Best results can be obtained while the hoppers are young and before they leave their hatching beds, says the entomologists. Local county agents can supply information on control methods.

### Munday Couple Among The 75 On European Tour

Seventy-one Texans, a trio of Oklahomans and a single Kansan are accompanying WFAA Radio Farm Director Murray Cox on his 17th annual tour. The group left from Dallas' Love Field June 11 for the month-long air excursion to France, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Russia, Czechoslovakia, Switzerland and Scotland.

Among the group are Mr. and Mrs. H. F. Jungman of Munday. Highlight of the trip will be a Russian stopover where a visit to a collective farm has been requested. Leningrad and Moscow are the principal Russian cities on the itinerary.

An all-day visit to Prague and another collective farm has also been scheduled in the sight-seeing tour.

Aberdeen Angus herds will be seen in Gleneagles, Scotland. Scenic stops include the "Sea of Ice" near Chamonix, Switzerland and Petrodvorets, summer place of Peter the Great near Leningrad, Russia.

Thousands of southwesterners have taken part in the tours led by Cox and his wife, Polly, under the sponsorship of the WFAA Farm Department.

It has been called one of the outstanding tour programs in the country. Each year the tour is different, with some making the trips the past 12 years. In the past, tours have been taken to Alaska, Buenos Aires, Bangkok and Cairo.

### Thrilling Rides For Kiddoes Now In Operation Here

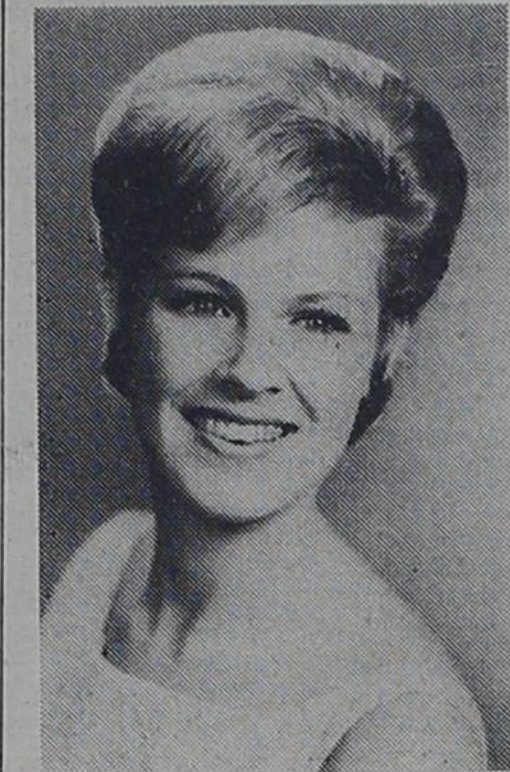
Thrilling rides, including a thrill ride "Tubs-O-Fun" for kids of all ages, has been set up on the city hall square and started operation Tuesday.

The Junior Miss Pageant, on both state and national levels, is not a beauty contest. It is a contest sponsored by the Jaycees, and is based on scholastic

achievement, physical fitness, poise and appearance, creative or performing arts, and a judge's interview in which a girl's character, mental alertness, and naturalness are examined.

Randa has won many other honors. She was West Texas Fair Sweetheart, Abilene Beauty Salon Week Queen and a state finalist in that contest, runner-up to the State De Molay Sweetheart. She attended Cooper High in Abilene and was F. F. A. Sweetheart, Homecoming Princess, and many other achievements.

Nancy Bernard won the title of South Plains Maid of Cotton last month at Lubbock. This makes her eligible to compete for the national Maid of Cotton title next December in Memphis, Tenn.

To win this contest, Nancy competed against 20 contestants from 23 cotton producing counties in the South Plains area. There were two days of activities during which the contestants were interviewed by the judges, photographed, presented on closed circuit T. ### All Roads Leading to The City of Festival--Munday

All roads will be leading into Munday on Friday and Saturday of this week, as the "Go, go go signal" will be given for the third annual Knox County Vegetable Festival.

Chairmen of all exhibit departments report that entries are being made ready, and these will be exceeding expectations, pointing to the "bigger and better" than ever before idea of the festival. Despite the lateness of crops, a fine display of vegetables grown in Knox County are expected to be on display.

Other interesting displays will be those of arts and hobbies, horticulture, baked and canned goods, Knox County in Pictures, commercial and educational, aviares and aquarium.

Entertainment features will be the hat contest, potato hunt, sack races, horned toad races, kiddie rides all day—then as evening approaches another old fashioned barbecue will be served, and

Bobby Barnett and his "Western Show Under the Stars," will be the grand finale of this year's celebration.

Starting events of the vestal will be the annual beauty contest at 2 p.m. and a second performance at 8 p.m., after which the festival queen will be crowned. Forty-six of the area's lovely ladies are competing in this event.

Friday, a bus load of business and professional people of Abilene will be in Munday for a tour of the area's vegetable field, processing sheds and other interesting places in the county. They will be guests of the Munday Chamber of Commerce at a noon-day feed.

Many important people in agriculture and vegetable production are expected to visit the festival Saturday. Plans call for another feed for these dignitaries, newspaper people, local townspeople who have been leaders in festival plans at noon Saturday.

The "population" of Munday is expected to swell to over twice its size, as crowds gather here Friday and Saturday for the festival—one which will be talked for a long time to come.

Merchants are again adding to the interest of the festival by displaying farm machinery and other merchandise on the school grounds, where people may view them at intermissions of the busy-day schedule.

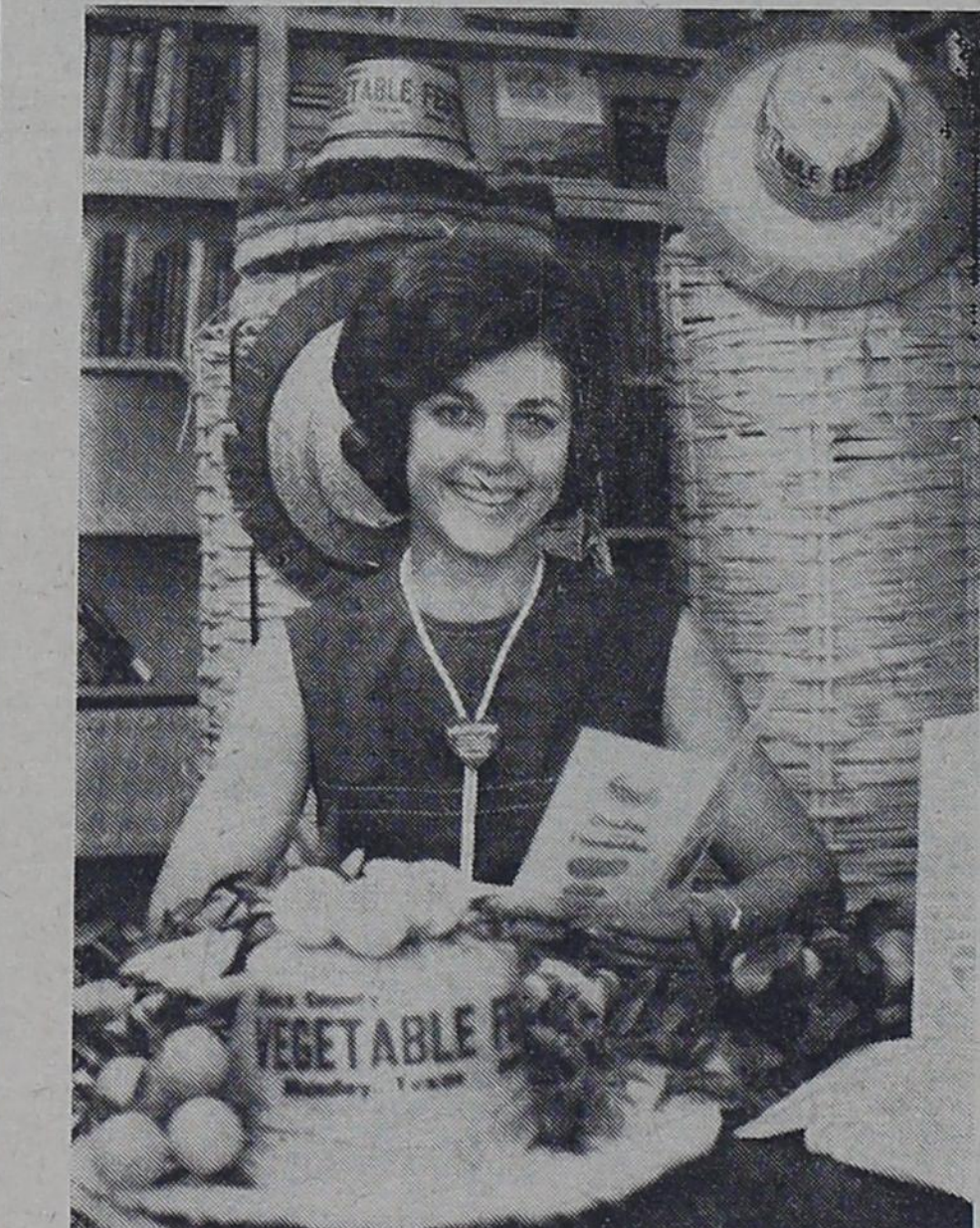
The new officers will be installed at the regular meeting in July.

**FARM and RANCH Notes**  
**JOE W. DOBY**  
COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AGENT

The 1965 edition of the Knox County Vegetable Vestibul will unfold Friday night and Saturday, June 18-19, at Munday. Many people have worked long hours to have a great show for everyone. The primary aim is to let more people know about the vegetables growing in the county as well as the potential production.

All producers, large or small, field or garden, are urged to bring in entries for the judging on Saturday morning. There will be a division for home gardens and one for commercial producers. These entries should be prepared as one would prepare for a market and not for the table. Pick your entries for freedom from disease, high quality, and uniform size. They should be clean. Bring them to the Elementary School Gym in Munday, between 7-9 a.m. on Saturday morning. Burt Williams and Robert Nix are in charge of the vegetable show. Judges will be Dr. Jack Kyle, Horticulturist, Agricultural Experiment Station, Lubbock; Virgil Woodfin, Iowa Park Experiment Station; John Klemm, Campbell Soup Field Representative, Plainview.

The Knox County 4-H Horse Show will be held Saturday, June 26, in Benjamin in the new Riding Club Arena. Judging of classes will begin at 8 a.m. Judge of the show will be Royce McClary, manager of the Triangle Ranch, Paducah.

Performance classes including Pole Bending, Barrel Racing, Reining and Western Pleasure will begin as soon as the halter classes are completed.

Any 4-H member in Knox County interested in horses is eligible to enter. The horse that is used must belong to them or an immediate member of the family.

Knox County 4-H members along with the Agents and Adult leader, Mrs. Arnold Navratil, Gilliland, attended District 3 4-H Camp at Leuders, June 14-16. 4-H members attending were Jacky Miller, Doris Navratil, both of Gilliland; George Doby and Pam Roberts, Benjamin and Judy

Lowe, Munday.

Digging of the Irish Potato Variety test plot is scheduled for Wednesday June 16. The plot is located on land farmed by Gene Thompson east of Munday. Visitors who will be here for the digging and evaluation include Dr. Jack Kyle and Dr. Robert Berry, Lubbock; Dr. John Larsen, Dr. Homer Blackhurst, Dr. Bruce Perry, all of College Station; John Klemm, Plainview; Virgil Woodfin, Iowa Park; Ben Picha, Grand Forks, North Dakota; and Charles Chambers, Paris, Texas.

There are 158 lines and varieties in this year's test. The lines are included for observation of their performance in this area. Many will be used in breeding work for certain desirable characteristics. Many will be discarded because of poor yield or poor resistance to disease.

The specific gravity will be calculated on each variety. This work will be done Thursday in the Cotton Classing Building in Munday. Anyone who would care to watch this operation is invited.

A dinner meeting, dutch style, will be held on Thursday night beginning at 7:00 p.m. in the Shamrock Cafe in Munday for all vegetable producers. At this meeting, the results of the potato variety test will be given. All of the distinguished gentlemen mentioned earlier will be there to discuss the growing and marketing of all vegetables important to our area. Everyone is invited. Please leave word with Mrs. Combs at the Chamber of Commerce by Thursday noon or write me at Benjamin, if you plan to attend so we will know how many places to prepare.

Grasshoppers are causing damage in many parts of the County at the present time. A. L. Broman, USDA man stationed at Vernon, has been checking the county the past week. He found one large area 3.5 miles west of Benjamin. Another was noted west of Truscott on the Alexander Ranch. Undoubtedly there are many others.

The easier time to control these outbreaks is before they leave the hatching ground. They are then concentrated in a small area and very little spray is needed.

Grasshoppers can be controlled by baits, sprays or dusts. Sprays have proven to be the best control in most cases. Materials that are recommended are Malathion, Sevin, Aldrin, Toxaphene and Heptachlor. The rates of application and restrictions as to use are given on the label or in MP-339, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Grain and Forage Crops. Read the label and follow instructions.

Now is the time to kill those overwintered boll weevils. Many fields have a tremendous population of these pests feeding on leaves waiting for the first squares. A community wide effort now could add many weeks to the time when they would need to be controlled again. It would give the beneficial insects a chance to build up a population that would help control boll worms. The cotton insect guide lists 7 different insecticides effective.

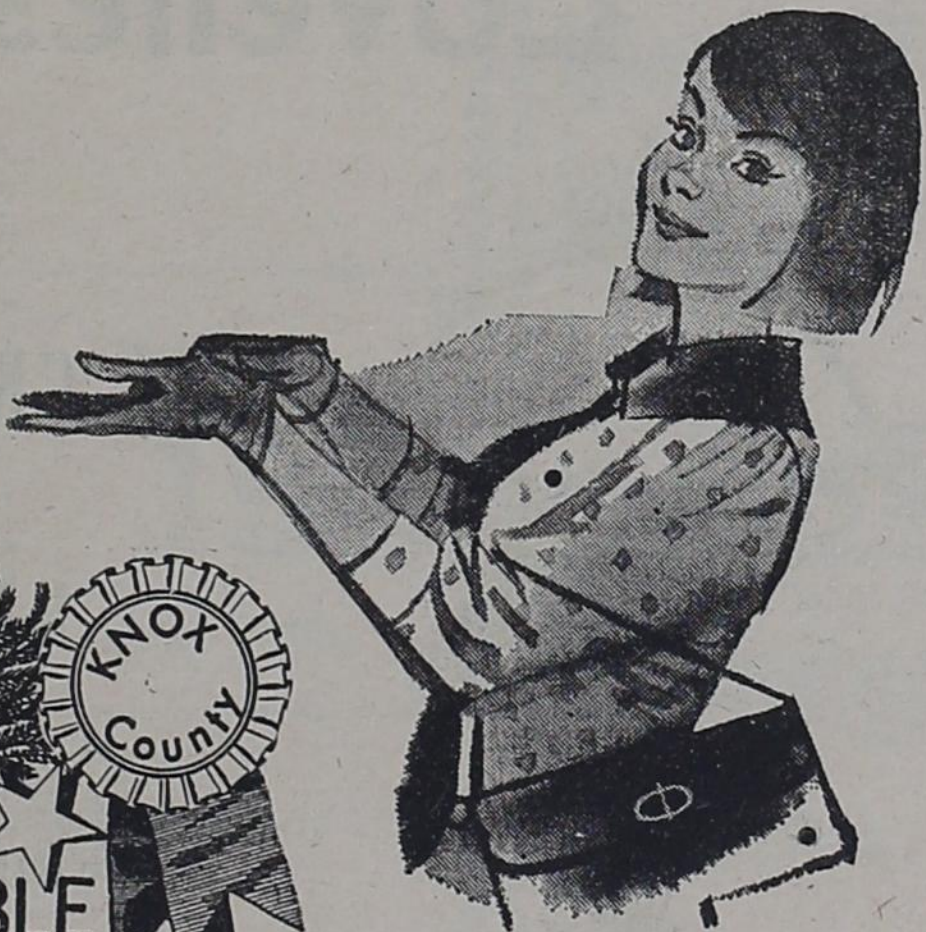

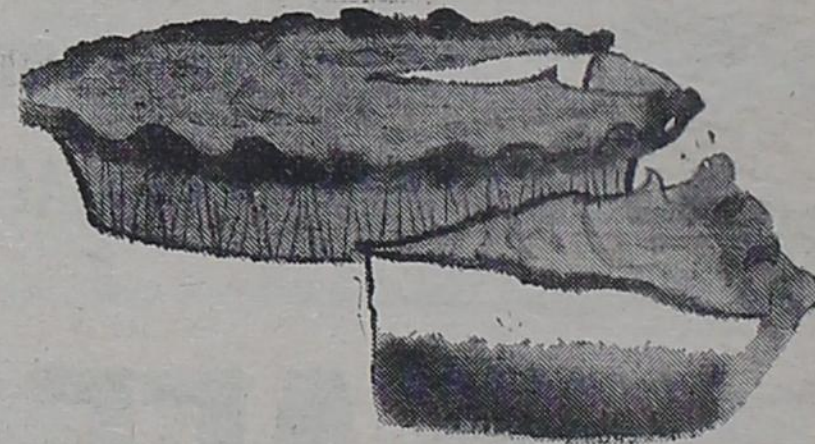

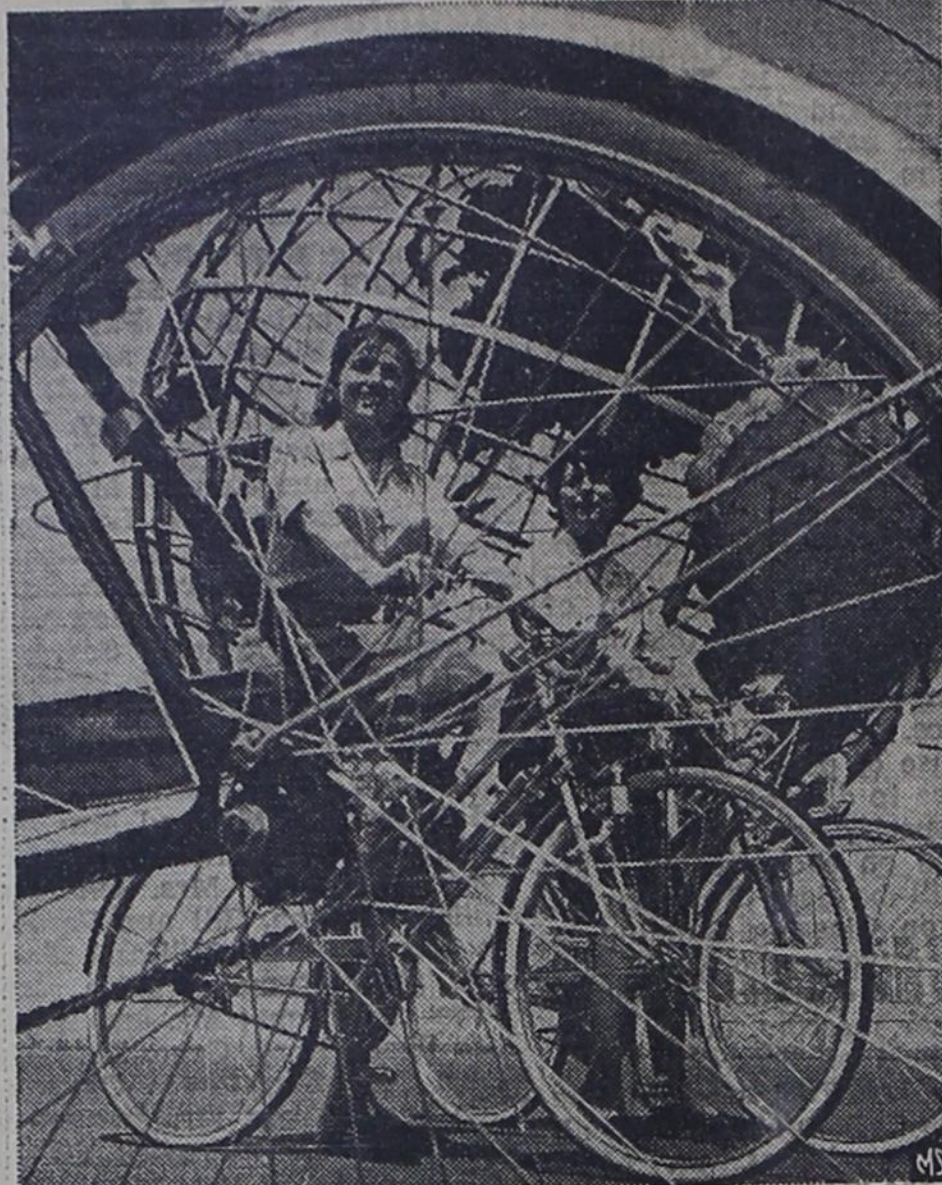
## Blind And In Wheel Chair, Austin Girl To Make Goodwill Trip To Denmark

Karen Barraga of Austin is going to Denmark—despite the fact that she is blind and will be getting around in a wheel chair during her three-week stay there.

Karen will represent the Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults as Texas' Disabled Goodwill Ambassador. She is one of 53 young people selected by the Easter Seal Societies across the nation to accept a unique invitation from official and voluntary agencies and individuals in Denmark for a specially planned cultural and educational visit. All members of the group will be handicapped.

There will be others besides Karen in wheel chairs. There will be the races, national origins, and most prevalent types of disabilities of American boys and girls throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, and the

## Fair Game For The Fun-Minded

Karen, who is known formally as Karen J. Barraga, 20, will represent Texas on the unusual trip abroad. It was announced here today by William E. Russell, Executive Director of the Texas Society for Crippled Children and Adults.

She will join the 52 other young people in New York on June 21 for a day of orientation and entertainment before taking off via Scandinavian Airlines for Copenhagen on June 22. First event on the schedule is a dinner to be attended by a number of American and foreign notables, given in the Waldorf-Astoria by the Institute for the Crippled and Disabled.

On June 22, the group will visit the World's Fair and will be guests at a luncheon and an official ceremony at the Denmark pavilion, departing for the airport directly from the Fair.

Karen, who was born blind and

without the use of her lower legs, has received care and treatment from the Travis County Society for Crippled Children and Adults, an affiliate of the Texas Easter Seal Society. She is a freshman at the University of Texas where she is described by members of the faculty as an excellent student and a "most outstanding" person.

Karen was an honor graduate of McCallum High School, a regular high school in Austin. She plays the piano and composes music, and for years has composed poetry which critics have judged to be outstanding.

Since 1953, Karen has been an avid participant in camp activities, having attended camp for nine consecutive summers at both Texas Lions Camp for Crippled Children at Kerrville, and the Soroptomist Camp near Dallas where she was awarded the Best Camper award in the summer of 1961. The summer of 1964, she was a "camp-aide" at Camp Kysoc near Louisville, Kentucky, which is sponsored by the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children.

The Danish hosts have planned a full and varied itinerary for Project DIADEM (Disabled American's Denmark Meeting). The group will participate in the Nordic Youth Congress, observe the traditional Danish celebration of the American Fourth of July at Aalborg, visit historic and scenic places, such as Hans Christian Andersen's home, and Elsinore Castle, scene of "Hamlet", and will be honored guests at official meetings and receptions.

There will be sightseeing tours of Copenhagen and other Danish cities, the fiords, lakes and islands; visits to art galleries, museums, rehabilitation facilities, and a side trip to Sweden.

Danish handicapped youth groups will meet with them to exchange views and experiences; and they will visit in Danish homes.

Physical therapists and lay volunteers will accompany the group and specialist doctors will be on call during the stay in Denmark.

Selection of the goodwill ambassadors was under the supervision of executive directors of state affiliates of the National Society for Crippled Children and Adults (The Easter Seal Society), sponsors of the American phase of the journey. All complied with rigid criteria established by an international committee representing both governmental and voluntary agencies.

DIADEM was originated by Lord Mayor Urban Hansen of Copenhagen and Marshall M. Fredericks, famed sculptor of Royal Oak, Michigan, member of the U. S. Committee. Other organizations comprising the U. S. Committee, in addition to the Easter Seal Society, are the U. S. Vocational Rehabilitation Administration and the Institute for the Crippled and Disabled.

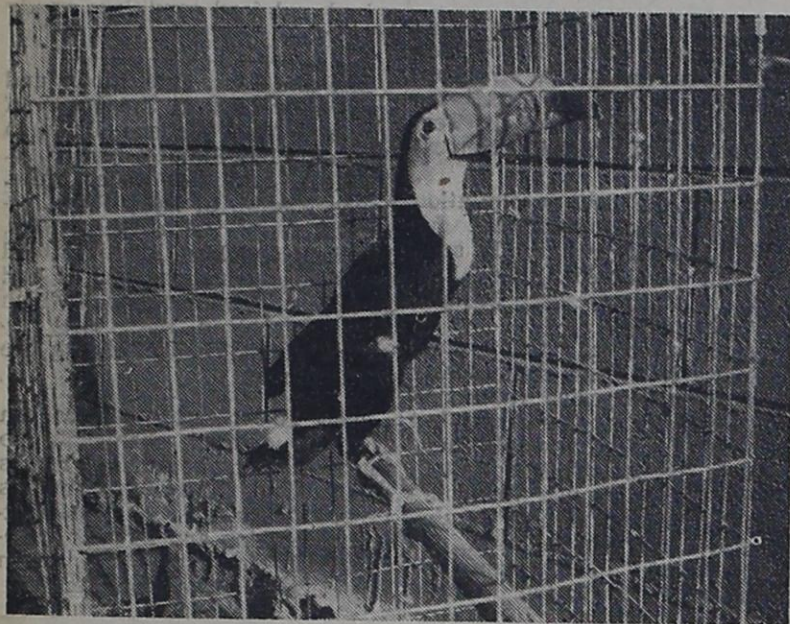

## Cotton Farmers Oppose Recent Subsidy Scheme

Cotton farmers all over the Rolling Plains and throughout the Cotton Belt are alarmed about the apparent pell-mell dash to cram government payment down the throats of producers.

These same farmers are tired of hearing non-farm groups say they know what the farmer wants. Cotton farmers are perfectly capable of presenting their own case. Cotton growers repeatedly have registered opposition as strongly as they know how to any change in the present skip-row planting measurement and to prevent direct payments from the government treasury which are closely scrutinized by the urban population.

The House Agriculture Committee, although it hasn't sent a cotton bill to Congress, now appears ready for an effort to cut the national allotment 2 million acres, drastically reduce the skip-row planting and get a direct farmer payment plan enacted into law.

A compensatory payment program would make cotton farmers wards of the federal government. It would, in fact, put them on the federal payroll without civil service status.

Cotton farmers aren't nearly as divided on the issue of compensatory payments as some non-farm groups and trade of-

ficials who have been wooed into the direct subsidy camp profess to have detected.

A direct subsidy plan, in its simplest terms, would involve dropping the government loan to around the so-called world price level and issuing supplemental subsidies directly to growers. The low loan level still would be set by the government. The low loan level would act as an umbrella to the world market and other cotton exporting countries would continue to sell just under the price announced by the U. S. The low loan level would not sell any larger volumes of cotton.

Growers fear, among other things, that any compensatory payment plan inevitably would mean limitations on the payments any individual farmer may receive. A direct subsidy program would reward inferiority and inefficiency and would penalize foresight, ambition, and initiative. The inevitable limitations would put a ceiling on opportunity for the genuine farmer.

The Rolling Plains is found to have some of the most efficient, enterprising cotton farmers anywhere. Through their working and acting together, they have made this region one of the greatest cotton areas in the world.

## Rains Are Aid To Game, Fish

AUSTIN — Soaking rains in many Texas areas have been timely from an Animal Kingdom viewpoint, said P. B. Uzzell, coordinator for wildlife of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

He said the new precipitation was particularly pertinent for ground nesting game birds, such as quail and wild turkeys, because moisture presence is needed for hatching.

Uzzell observed that there doubtless had been some losses from from excessive rains and turbulence in some areas but that birds affected would have time to re-nest. This definitely applies to the popular mourning dove which is vulnerable to wind because of its fragile nests.

The benefit to big game, he explained, comes in the fact that

water sources have been replenished and a general boost given to summer forage.

For the angling trade, fisheries people said the new water is "all on the good side" since levels are raised and food conditions vastly improved.

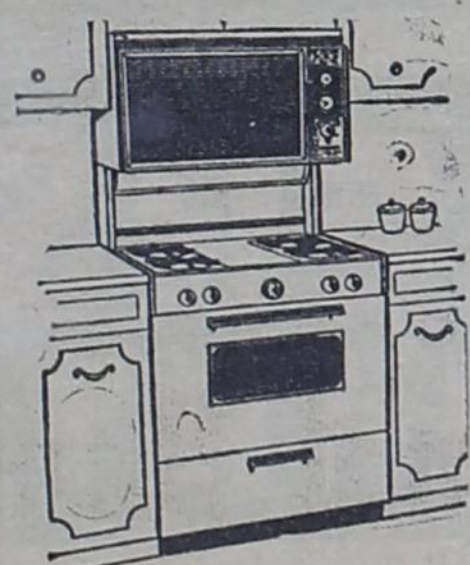

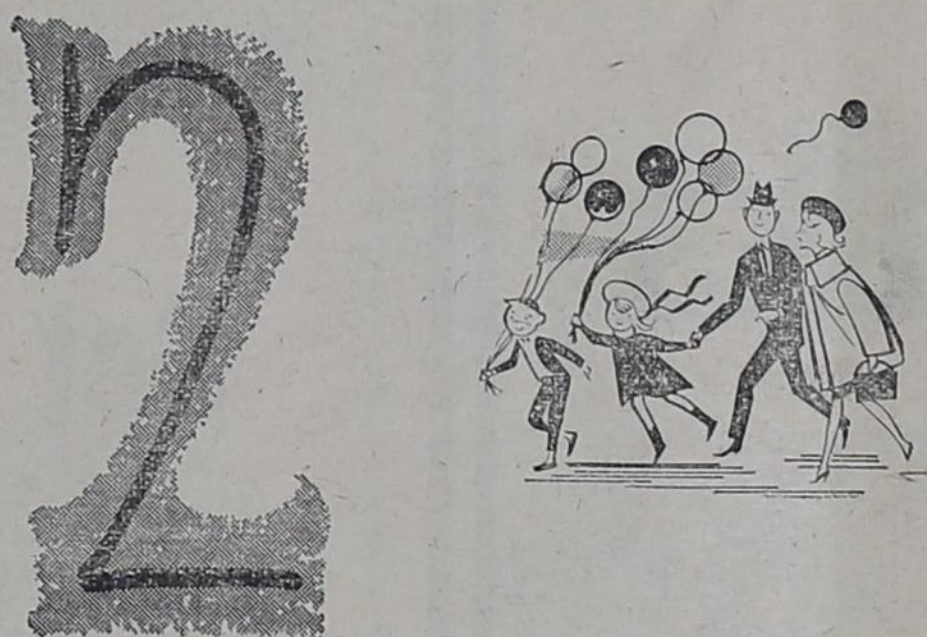

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1965. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 44 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for an increase in the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members; to fix the membership in the House of Representatives at 150 members; to require apportionment of the Senate according to population; and to delete the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator.

### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 25 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read respectively as follows:

"Section 2. The Senate shall consist of 39 members. The House of Representatives shall consist of 150 members."

"Section 25. The state shall be divided into Senatorial Districts of contiguous territory according to population, as nearly as possible."

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling legislation in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature."

"This Amendment shall be-

come effective upon its adoption."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the 7th day of September, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment increasing the membership of the State Senate from 31 to 39 members, retaining the present membership of the House of Representatives, requiring apportionment of the Senate according to population, and deleting the limitation that no single county is entitled to more than one Senator."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

## Housing Credit Is Available To Senior Citizens

Elderly people, if they live in rural areas, need not give up the idea of building, buying or repairing their homes on credit.

This word comes from Wilburn A. Satterwhite, Farmers Home Administration county supervisor, serving Baylor, Knox and Throckmorton Counties.

Satterwhite said citizens who are 62-years and over, living in a rural community of 2,500 or less, may be eligible for a 33-year loan bearing 4 per cent interest to buy an older home or build a new one.

The FHA supervisor said elderly residents may also be eligible for smaller loans for home repairs.

He pointed out the increasing demand in small towns for rental units designed to meet the housing needs of older folks.

The Farmers Home Administration can loan direct funds to non-profit organizations for construction of senior citizen rental housing units designed for independent living.

Funds for construction of senior citizen rental housing units may also be provided by private investors with FHA

# LONE STAR AGRICULTURE

## New Headway Against Insects

Ever hear of a housefly eating itself to death? Or a boll weevil starving itself to death in a cotton field? Or an ant colony killed off by enslavement?

Well, researchers are making it happen! And in the process some of Texas' most pesky insect pests at last may be brought under control.

The breakthrough against the housefly may have been achieved by the recent discovery of a feeding stimulant. A chemical element was found that attracts the female fly and causes it to remain in one spot and eat voraciously on a treated substance, regardless of its food value. Scientists are now experimenting to see if they can cause the fly to feed exclusively on non-nutritive substances and literally die of starvation by overeating the wrong foods.

Another substance has been found which repulses that scourge of the cotton farmer—the boll weevil. An extract of a plant relative of cotton, the Rose of Sharon—or Althea, appears to drastically inhibit the boll weevil's feeding habits. Research is now being concentrated on a practical method of treating cotton fields with the substance and perhaps starve the weevil out of its usual feeding quarters.

The South American Fire Ant invaded Texas in force some 10 years ago. It builds hard mounds in fields that are capable of breaking plows and the sting of the insect can kill young cattle and wild life. Now a natural enemy has been discovered which may drastically reduce the colonies.

Down in Uruguay, entomologists noticed that some fire ant mounds were beginning to disappear. By digging in, they found the fire ants had been invaded by a parasite ant which lives entirely at the expense of the host colony. Parasite ants had captured and held the queen fire ant immobilized while the fire ant workers were forced to feed and keep the invaders. Life in the colony was so disrupted by the parasite that the ant population dropped sharply, although it never entirely disappears.

Although this discovery is an interesting commentary on ant life, scientists are hesitant to im-

port the parasite until more is known about its habits. There is always the danger that an imported control insect may become as destructive as the original pest.

But research goes on. And man is constantly seeking that "extra margin" which will give him mastery over insects.

## NEW MARKET FOR PEANUTS

Texas peanut growers should be interested in a U. S. Department of Agriculture developed process for lowering the calorie content of peanuts. When the new product goes into commercial production, it should open new markets, reports Secretary of Agriculture Freeman.

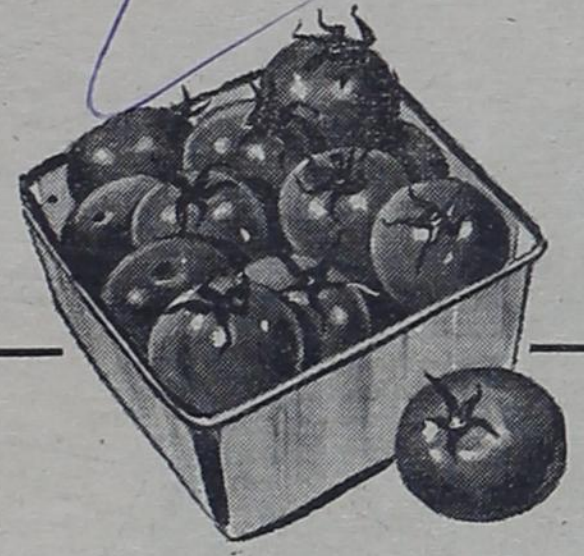
